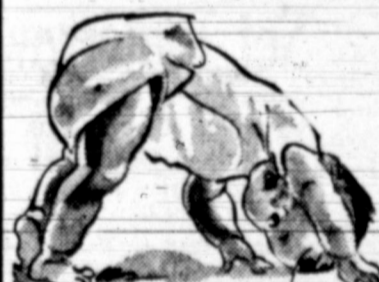

 resources." Democratic National Chairman John M. Bailey termed Kerr "one of the great senators of his era in history."
Born In Log Cabin
 A big, genial man, Kerr rose from a log cabin birth in the old Indian Territory to become a millionaire even before he embarked on a political career with election as governor of Oklahoma in 1942.

He easily won the Democratic nomination and election to the Senate in 1948. He was considered the richest man in the Senate, with estimated wealth of \$35 million to \$51 million derived from oil, cattle and uranium.
 Kerr was born on Sept. 11, 1896, in the East Central Indian Territory that later became the state of Oklahoma. He became rich after oil was discovered in the vicinity of his birthplace.
 Kerr's first wife, the former Reba Shelton of Ada, died in 1924. In 1925 he married Grayce Breen of Tulsa. Mrs. Kerr was in Washington at the time of his death but their three sons and one daughter recently returned to Oklahoma.

Played Influential Role
 From the time he entered the Senate until his death Kerr played a big role in congressional affairs. But the peak of his influence was reached in the last session.

One senator summed up the Oklahoma's influence in the last session by calling it "the Kerr Congress." Kerr led the fight for Kennedy's foreign trade program, tax revision, welfare reform, public works and the communications satellite bill.
 While he scored impressive legislative victories for the President, Kerr was no administration pawn. He also played a major role in Kennedy's biggest senatorial defeat in the 87th Congress, the 52-48 vote against the President's medical care plan.
 Kerr is a co-author of the Kerr-Mills bill setting up a medical care plan handled by the states. He said he did not like the President's proposal to finance the program through Social Security.

Consumer Credit Outlook Is Good For New Year

Wynn Veale, manager of the Credit Bureau of Pampa, stated today that a credit report of some type is made on an individual in the United States every one-half second, according to statistics compiled by the Harold A. Wallace Research Center of Associated Credit Bureaus of America, Inc., the international trade association for credit bureaus and collection service offices.
 Other figures made available by the Center reveal that during 1962 credit bureau members of the Association issued approximately 67,000,000 Factbilt credit reports, an increase of 8.1 per cent over the 1961 total.
 Collections amounted to \$97,060,000 as compared to \$88,000,000 for the preceding year. This represents a 10.2 per cent increase in the number of past-due accounts receivable collected by members of Associated Credit Bureaus of America Collection Service Division.
 Present long-range forecasts indicate these figures will continue to rise during the next 12 months. All reports currently available indicate that 1963 will be a period of continuing expansion for United States business in general and for the consumer credit industry in particular. Anticipating this, members of Associated Credit Bureaus of America are prepared to offer retail and professional credit granters more service faster and more economically than ever before. Automated systems, all-inclusive and intensified training programs for both management and staff personnel and better coordinated and more cooperative procedures between credit granters and credit bureaus or collection service offices have all been utilized to provide maximum service.
 With more and more credit granters resorting to automation to handle credit department accounting procedures, Associated Credit Bureaus of America, as an association, has provided several new services to assist members in processing an ever-increasing volume of business. A national system for reporting derogatory information channels data from the files of national credit card issuers into the files of local Associate Credit Bureaus of America affiliated credit bu-

reas with a minimum of effort.
 The year 1962, Veale stated, economically speaking, represented a steady, albeit conservative, gain in the United States' continuing recovery from the business slowdown which ended early in 1961. Despite the drastic reduction in steel production in late spring, the vagaries of the stock market in early summer, abnormal unemployment and the tense world situation, consumers expressed their faith in the future and themselves by actively using their credit-buying privileges. While doing so, they maintained a good payment-to-debt condition and built up their cash reserves by increasing savings to a record-breaking high.
 Admittedly, a few problems developed — collection difficulties mounted in regions of high unemployment, mortgage defaultments climbed sharply and bankruptcy filings reached an all-time high by June 30, 1962, the close of the 1961 fiscal year. However, these danger signals were quickly recognized and corrective measures instituted. For example, many Associated Credit Bureaus of America members in cooperation with their local retailers, inaugurated debt counseling services which are available to any debtor who feels he needs expert financial advice to work out his credit problem. In addition, many members have sponsored educational programs designed to aid credit granters learn proper credit-granting procedures or to inform the public of both the advantages and the pitfalls of credit buying.
 On the whole, therefore, the consumer credit situation remains well in hand and should continue to do so throughout 1963.

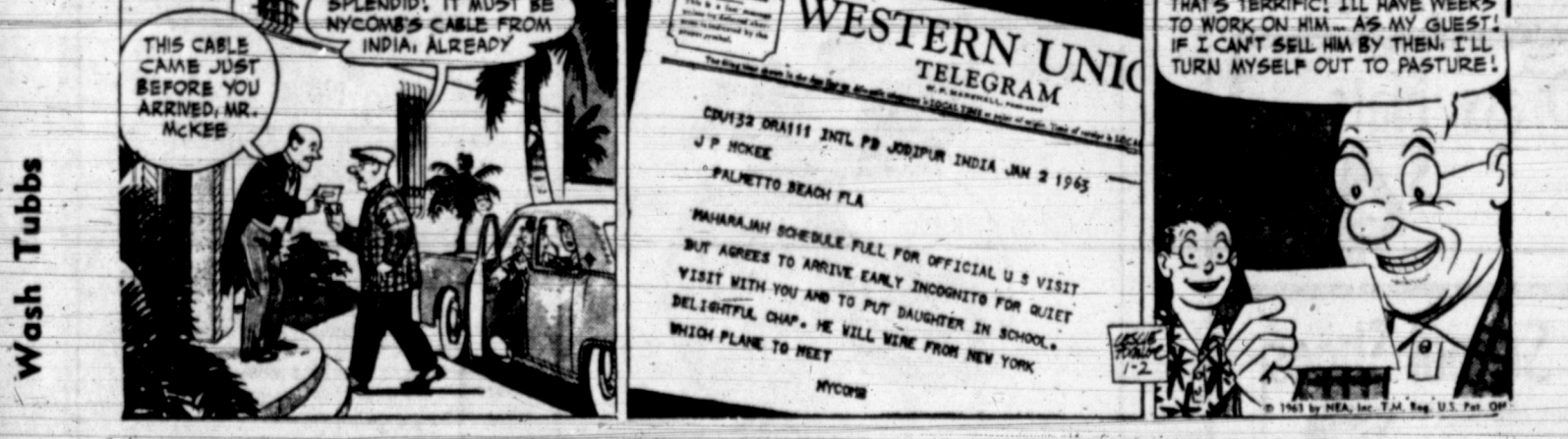
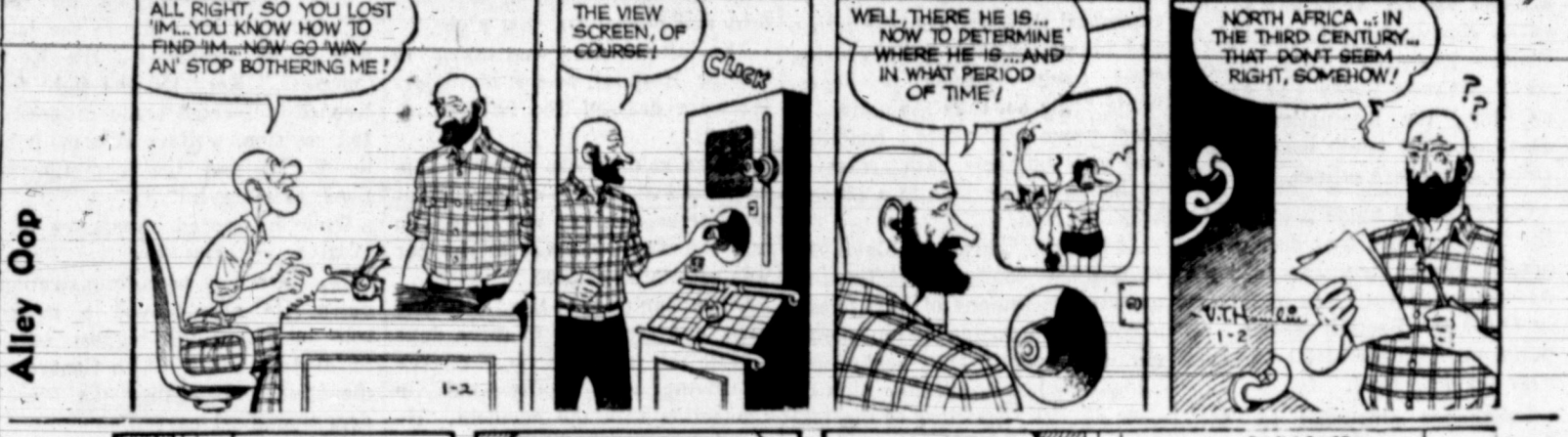

Texas Blanked In Cotton Bowl

NFL Signs Stovall, Poage, Estes

DALLAS (UPI) — Louisiana State, which came to Dallas to "have a good time" and did just that in defeating Texas 13-0 in the Cotton Bowl, turned the trick by surprising the Longhorns with their passing.

"We didn't expect LSU to throw and catch like they did," losing Texas coach Darrell Royal said of the Tigers' prolific use of passes to keep the Texas defense off balance.

"We came to Dallas to have a good time, and we had a good time," said LSU coach Charles McClendon in expressing "extreme pride" in his squad's "team effort."

Double Pass Protection
The Tigers, who were winning only their fourth of 10 post-season bowl efforts, stunned the 75,504 spectators as well as Texas by electing to double their normal 10-pass-per-game and throw 21 against the Longhorns.

But, it also was a surprise to Royal to learn that LSU receivers could catch as well as they did. The Tigers, who had averaged only four completions out of every 10 efforts during the regular season, hit 13 of their 21 tries Tuesday for 132 yards.

Lynn Amedee, the 175-pound quarterback of LSU's No. 2, or "go," team, was the hero of the Tiger victory, kicking 23-and 37-yard field goals, hitting nine of 13 aerial efforts for 94 yards; running twice for 10 yards and re-

covering one of three lost Texas fumbles.

For this role in the Tiger triumph, Amedee received 37 of the 43 votes cast for the game's outstanding back.

Stovall Signs Contract
Of the six votes which escaped him, four went to teammate All-America halfback Jerry Stovall, who signed a pro contract after the game with the St. Louis Cardinals of the National Football League, and two went to Jimmy Fields, the No. 1 LSU quarterback whose 22-yard scoring run accounted for the games other points.

Texas fumbles, both of them by tailback Jerry Cook—the game's top rusher with 39 yards, set up Field's touchdown and Amedee's final field goal, LSU also picked off another Texas fumble and intercepted a pair of Texas passes.

The Texas offense, which had compiled a 9-0-1 record in winning the Southwest Conference title, could do little with the LSU defense, managing only 80 yards

rushing and 92 passing.

The Longhorns did make one minor threat in the second quarter, driving from their own 14-yard line to the LSU 25, but the attack bogged down there and Tony Crosby's 42-yard field goal efforts strayed off course.

However, McClendon said he "never felt safe at all."

"They (Texas) were behind five times this year and came back to win," he explained.

There was a good deal of speculation on why Texas' No. 1 rusher, fullback Ray Poage, never was called on to carry the ball.

Texas quarterback Johnny Genuyn explained:

"We were using him as a decoy on the belly series (with tailbacks Tommy Ford and Jerry Cook running the ball) and then we got so far behind we didn't run anybody."

Texas All-America guard Johnny Treadwell, who was voted the outstanding lineman, said Texas "had a bad day" and "you can't do that against a good club."

DALLAS (UPI)— The National Football League signed four players Tuesday after the Texas-LSU Cotton Bowl game and the American Football League got one.

All-America halfback Jerry Stovall of LSU and Tiger tackle Don Estes signed pro-contracts with the St. Louis Cardinals of the NFL. Texas end Tommy Lucas signed a pro contract with the Dallas Cowboys and Longhorn fullback Ray Poage joined the Minnesota Vikings.

Texas halfback Jerry Cook signed with the Houston Oilers of the AFL.

Texas linebacker Pat Culpepper said he made a verbal agreement to play with the Oilers. Culpepper said he would not sign anything "until my scholarship runs out after graduation."

Ole Miss Tops Hogs In Sugar Bowl Play

NEW ORLEANS (UPI) — Pro football talent scouts swooped down on the Sugar Bowl Tuesday following Mississippi's thrilling 17-13 victory over Arkansas in the 29th annual renewal of the New Year's Day classic.

One of the first players plucked was Glynn Griffing, Mississippi's do-everything quarterback who was the overwhelming choice as the game's most valuable player. The 6-foot-1, 200-pound senior signed with the New York Giants.

Griffing closed out a brilliant college career with his greatest performance, running for one touchdown, passing for another, and setting a Sugar Bowl record with 242 yards in pass completions.

Broyles Praises Griffing
Arkansas coach Frank Broyles praised Griffing, calling him the greatest college passer he had ever seen. He said the Ole Miss quarterback was the difference between the two teams—particularly on the big third-down plays.

"It was Griffing and Mississippi's big third-down plays that beat us. He would complete the big third-down pass and break your back," Broyles said.

Griffing threw a 33-yard touchdown pass to halfback Louis Guy in the second quarter that gave Mississippi a 10-3 edge at intermission, and the husky Rebel signal caller climaxed an 80-yard

drive in the third period with a one-yard scoring plunge.

The Rebels took a 3-0 lead early in the second quarter on a 30-yard field goal by Billy Carl Irwin, saw Arkansas drive back to tie it up on a 30-yard field goal by Tom McKnelly, and then took the intermission lead with the 67-yard touchdown march that was climaxed by the Griffing-to-Guy scoring pass.

Grab Mississippi Fumble
Arkansas, fighting mad at the start of the second half, grabbed up an Ole Miss fumble at the Rebel 18 and scored in two plays to knot it at 10-10. Billy Moore passed to Jesse Branch for the final five yards, and McKnelly tacked on the tying point.

Mississippi took the lead for keeps in the third stanza on Griffing's one-yard plunge, but Arkansas made one last strong gasp with McKnelly booting his second field goal of the day from 22 yards out.

While most eyes were on Griffing during the post-game signings, other Sugar Bowl players also were in demand. Mississippi's Jim Dunaway was being courted by the Minnesota Vikings. Calgary was after Arkansas' Billy Moore. Razorback halfback Jesse Branch was signed by Calgary, and Houston's Oilers got Arkansas fullback Danny Brabham's name on the dotted line.

Sooners Stopped In Orange Bowl Classic

MIAMI (UPI) — Coach Paul (Bear) Bryant hung most of the praise for Alabama's 17-0 Orange Bowl victory over Oklahoma squarely on quarterback Namath today, but Sooners coach Bud Wilkinson said the Alabama line play was the big thing.

"That's Namath, son — N-A-M-A-T-H. But don't worry about it, you'll learn how to spell it in the next couple of years," jibbed the happy Bryant at a photographer trying to get Namath's name straight in the dressing room after the game.

The crowd of 73,380, including President Kennedy, that watched the game Tuesday should be little disposed to quarrel with Bryant.

Throws Touchdown Pass
Namath threw a 25-yard touchdown pass to Dick Williamson in the first quarter to put the Tide out front, then set up the second score with his running and passing. He was the game's leading passer with 86 yards on nine of 17 tries.

Cotton Clark scored the second Alabama touchdown on a 15-yard bolt in the second quarter and Tim Davis booted both extra points and a 19-yard field goal in the third period.

Fumbles hurt the Sooners badly, the worst after an impressive 81-yard Oklahoma drive following Alabama's first score.

Fullback Jim Grisham snapped through the line for a key 23-yard gain and quarterback Ron Fletcher threw to Al Bumgardner for 55 yards to the Alabama seven.

Grisham Fumbles Twice
But there the speedy Alabama defensive line smashed into Grisham and he fumbled. Mike Hopper recovered for Alabama on the six. It was Grisham who fumbled again not long afterward when the Sooners had driven to the Tide's 18. Dan Kearley recovered this one for Alabama on the eight.

Southern Cal Edges Past Wisconsin In High-Scoring Rose Bowl Battle

PASADENA, Calif. (UPI) — Wisconsin rewrote most of the Rose Bowl records but Southern California pointed to the 42-37 score today as proof it deserved the national football championship.

Badger quarterback Ron VanderKelen put on the greatest exhibition of passing in the history of the New Year's Day classic as Wisconsin scored 23 points in the final quarter but fell short before 98,698 fans.

And after it was over coach John McKay said the final score proved Southern California deserved to be rated No. 1 and Wisconsin still was second in the nation.

Share Player Award
The drama of the game centered around the passing of VanderKelen and Trojan quarterback Pete Beathard, who were chosen co-players of the game, and the pass-catching duel between All-America ends Pat Richter of Wisconsin and Hal Bedsole of Southern California.

VanderKelen in his amazing demonstration of passing completed 33 of 48 throws for 401 yards and two touchdowns.

Beathard, however, threw a record four touchdown passes while completing eight of twelve aerial strikes.

Great as VanderKelen's passing proved to be, he was stung by his aerial game also, throwing three interceptions. And two of them were turned into touchdowns by the Trojans.

Richter Sets Mark
Before the final second rolled around, he posted a record 401 yards passing and a new mark of 406 total yards. Richter's 11 catches also was a new Rose Bowl mark.

Other records were 32 first downs for one team by Wisconsin, the most total points in a Rose Bowl game, the most points for a losing team and the most net yards passing, 419 by Wisconsin, in addition to VanderKelen's personal marks.

The loss was the third straight for the Badgers in the Rose Bowl. For Southern California, it was the 10th victory in the classic against three losses.

Black Hawks Hold Big Lead

McDonald ended an 11-game scoring drought when he scored one of the Black Hawks' goals and he also assisted on another.

Willy Marshall In Scoring Race

Marshall picked up three points on assists to start the New Year Tuesday with a flurry that helped Hershey to a 9-0 rout of Pittsburgh and moved him to within five points of the front-running Sweeney.

Marshall now has 17 goals and 28 assists for 45 points while Sweeney has 15 goals and 35 assists for 50 points.

Buffalo opened up a 13-point first-place lead in the Western Division by downing Springfield, 7-1, and Baltimore beat Providence, 5-3, in the other Tuesday AHL action.

As long as every special-interest group can pressure Congress to receive handouts, it will be impossible to honestly cut taxes.

Can you imagine? Activities that have nothing to do with authorized functions of government lose more money each year than is collected by the personal income tax!

By removing those activities, tax reduction is automatic. Section four provides that, after three years, (after spending cuts have been made) "... Congress shall not levy taxes on personal incomes, estates, and - or gifts."

Over thirty more states will consider it this year. The time for action is now - the opportunity to defeat socialism has never been greater.

The Doctor Says

Household Remedies Usually Stop Nosebleed

By DR. WAYNE BRANDSTADT A sudden nosebleed in a child may be a very frightening thing both to the child and to the mother.

Nosebleeds are rarely seen in the newborn, but in children of school age they may be very common. Sometimes it is triggered by the child's becoming overly excited or by maintaining a position for a few minutes with his head lower than the rest of his body.

A handkerchief or facial tissue should be held gently in front of his nose. If the bleeding cannot be checked in 15 or 20 minutes you should call your doctor.

When so few people have bothered to read our own Constitution, it may seem a little ambitious to suggest a reading of the Constitution of the Soviet Union.

Robert LeFevre, Editor of the Colorado Springs Gazette Telegraph, has produced an excellent small book containing the Soviet Constitution, together with brief explanatory comments.

A reading of the Soviet Constitution produces two striking conclusions. First, as the author points out, "Americans are prone to suppose that because they have a constitution, republican in character, they are insulated against the political evils of the world."

Second, although the author calls attention to the similarity in the two constitutions, there is a basic, and very valuable, difference in direction.

Mr. LeFevre demonstrates, that our Bill of Rights relates to the concept that each right is a "privilege granted to the people by the government."

In this respect, the Soviet Constitution is closer to the United Nations Charter or the UN Declaration of Human Rights, in which "Irings benefits" are granted to the people as a humanitarian gesture.

Mr. LeFevre has done an excellent service by hunting up an English translation of the Soviet Constitution, and then adding his crisp explanatory comments.

For here is big government extended to its ultimate and logical conclusion. It should be a warning to us to reject the idea that a beneficent government can solve our problems.

Latest Russian Missile Firings Impressive; Comparisons Show U.S. Still Behind

WASHINGTON - Soviet scientists have put on an impressive missile shooting display over Novaya Zemlya during their present series of nuclear tests in the Arctic atmosphere.

More than a dozen missile firings, ranging from ICBMs to anti-missile-missiles, have been detected by the National Security Agency's long-range rocket tracking facilities.

In one of the tests, three Russian intermediate-range ballistic missiles were destroyed by a single nuclear blast from the warhead of what U.S. officials believe is the newest Soviet anti-missile missile.

Launched in a single salvo, the three missiles traveled 900 miles before being hit by an atomic explosion at a height of more than 200 miles.

Army scientists are hoping to close the gap next month. They have asked President Kennedy for permission to use a "live" nuclear warhead in their next missile-against-missile test.

SHOOTING THE STARS - Some of the other Soviet missile tests detected by NSA rocket trackers are almost as sensational. One experiment involved the firing of two ICBMs at an orbiting Russian satellite.

The nuclear warhead from the first ICBM exploded at the right altitude but about 200 miles ahead of the satellite. Its nuclear fallout caused the satellite to malfunction.

The second ICBM passed within 50 miles of the satellite but there was no detectable explosion. U.S. officials believe the missile's nuclear warhead failed to detonate or there was no nuclear charge in the missile.

Other missile firings included a series of anti-missile missile warheads with explosive charges ranging from a few kiloton up to two megaton.

NOTE: By far the most secret satellite developed by the U.S. to date is the Ferret. This exotic new satellite can eavesdrop on communication transmissions over any area it passes.

NO POLICY CHANGE - President Kennedy is planning no radical changes in U.S. policies toward Russia or any of the Communist nations, including Cuba, during the coming year.

The policy of trying to change these nations by "evolution" and not "revolution" or "liberation" will be continued as before the Cuban crisis.

That's the frank report Undersecretary of State George C. McGhee has been making in "background briefings on foreign policy to business and community leaders calling at the State Department."

"Our policy toward the Communist nations will be the same during the coming year as it has been the past two years," McGhee told one visiting delegation.

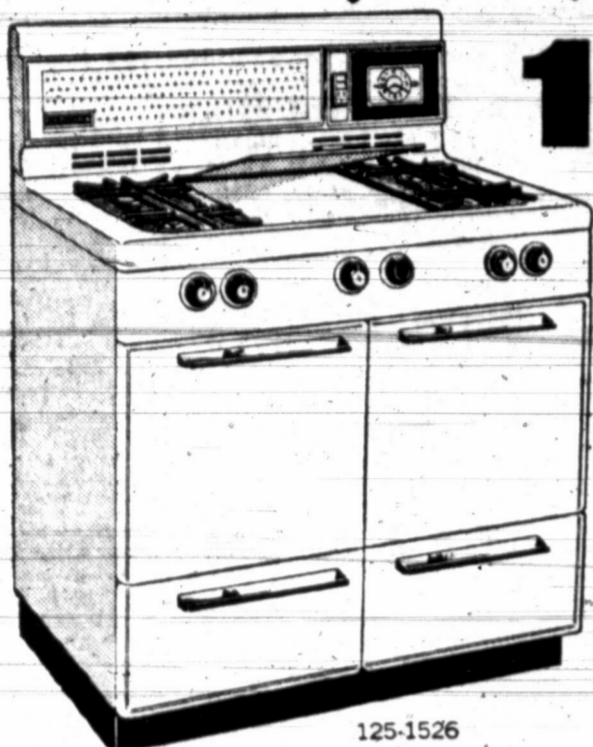
This policy, according to McGhee, has two main purposes: "First, to deter Communist efforts to harass or frustrate the community of free nations.

"Second, to hold out to Communist nations the prospect of sharing increasingly in the useful work of this community if they will abandon their aggressive tactics."

To accomplish the second objective, McGhee reported that "the U.S. is prepared to offer the Communist rulers incentives to cooperate with, instead of trying to destroy, the community of free nations."

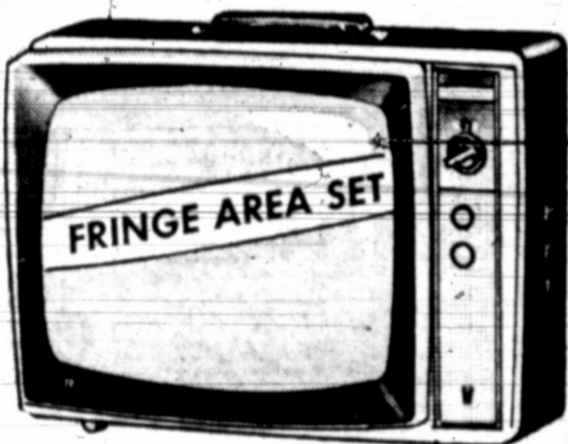

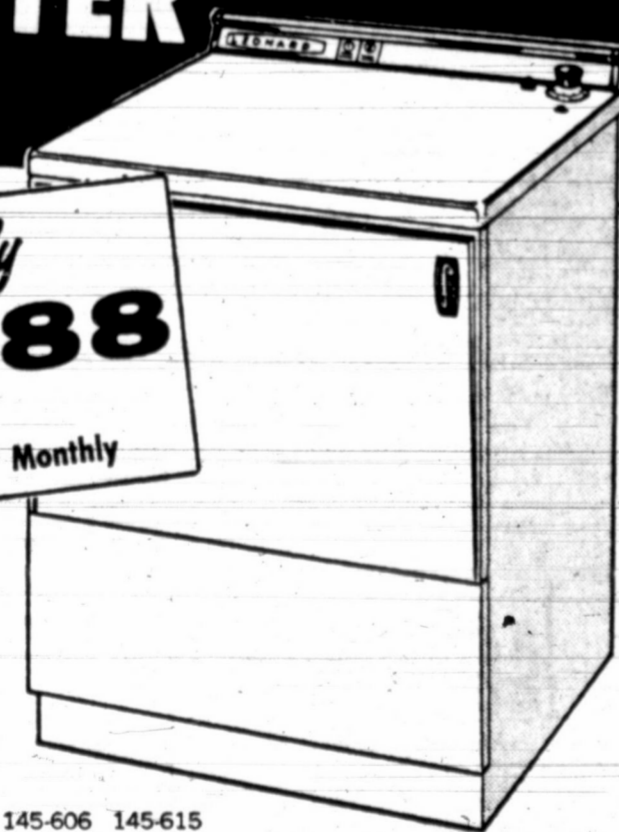

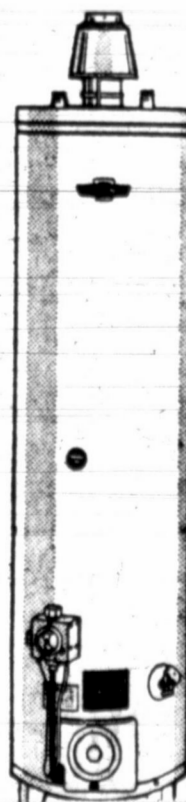
