In the Mothers March tonight, the city has been divided into school districts with block workers assisting captains in each city block. Mrs. R. A. Mack is general chairman.

Clyde Carruth, Gray County chairman, is directing the overall effort.

Indian Troops Reach Outskirts Of Kolwezi

ELISABETHVILLE, Katanga, The Congo (UPI) — An advance column of U. N. Indian troops reached the outskirts of Kolwezi today without opposition, a spokesman reported.

Provincial President Moïse Tshombe, who once vowed to de-

fend Katanga to the last man, had arranged to surrender his last major stronghold of Kolwezi to the United Nations today.

The U. N. spokesman said the spearhead crossed the Delcommune dam, about seven miles from Kolwezi, and found it intact. Tshombe at one time had threatened to destroy vital installations in the area.

Tshombe agreed to meet U. N. military commander Maj. Gen. Prem Chand at a small village 15 miles from Kolwezi and take him into the mining center with a small U. N. escort.

The takeover of Kolwezi would virtually end the military phase of the U. N. Congo operation although there were reports of troop action Sunday in the Kongolo area and at Baudouville on Lake Tanganyika.

A Katangese communique Sunday night said Tshombe and his ministers probably would return to Elisabethville within two or three days.

Longshore Union Accepts Offer To End Dock Strike

By United Press International Longshoremanship accepted a presidential board's recommendations in the long, costly Maine-to-Texas dock strike late Sunday, but there were no solutions yet in other major labor disputes.

The International Longshoremanship's Association (ILA) accepted a proposal for a 39-cent package increase over a two-year period. But the New York Shipping Association said the waterfront employers would make no decision until after its members meet Tuesday afternoon.

More than 100,000 longshoremen and maritime workers have been idled since the lengthy dispute erupted into a walkout 29 days ago. It was reported the longshoremen originally asked a 55-cent wage increase and were offered a 23-cent package.

The weeks-old newspaper strikes in Cleveland and New York continued.

Khrushchev Raises Hope For Test Ban Agreement

Billie Sol And Dr. Dunn Pray For Each Other

PECOS, Tex. (UPI)—Pecos surgeon Dr. John P. Dunn and the man he claimed to have turned in to the FBI, Billie Sol Estes, embraced in the church of Christ at Pecos Sunday.

The controversial duo prayed together, then Estes led the congregation in prayer for Dunn.

Dunn claims to have been the first man to alert the federal government about Estes' business dealings.

"As far as I know, there is no enmity between us," Dunn, 35, said. "We've always been friends."

Suggested Inquiry Dunn wrote the FBI in February of 1961 and suggested an investigation of Estes' dealings in anhydrous ammonia fertilizer tanks.

Dunn said Estes telephoned him early Sunday and asked him to come to the First Church of Christ, where both are members. Estes is a former lay minister of the church.

The Dunn and Estes families took up a great part of the church. Estes brought his wife and five children. Dunn was accompanied by his wife and four children.

Dunn came into prominence Jan. 2 when the Reeves County Hospital Board fired him from its staff. Dunn was quick to say he thought his part in the Estes case had no bearing on his dismissal.

Knew Too Much Rather, Dunn said, he was fired because he knew too much about "corrupt elements" in Pecos. Estes is appealing an eight year prison sentence a state court (See ESTES, Page 3)

Soviet Boss Offers Limited Inspection

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Cautious hopes for a nuclear test ban agreement with Russia were raised today in the unexpected change of position by Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev.

The Soviet leader, in a Dec. 28 letter to President Kennedy made public Sunday night, offered to accept limited international inspection on Soviet territory to check against sneak nuclear tests.

He also said he would permit "foreign personnel" to piece up to three unmanned, automatic monitoring devices, called "black boxes," on Soviet soil, provided measures were taken to insure that such trips were not used for espionage.

Khrushchev offered to permit "two to three" inspection teams a year to visit Russia to check on earth tremors which are hard to distinguish from underground nuclear tests without on-the-spot inspection.

This was actually a return to a position Russia abandoned in November, 1961, when it suddenly refused to discuss any inspection at all.

U. Of Mississippi Jury Probe Due To Wind Up Today

OXFORD, Miss. (UPI)—A federal grand jury investigating racial rioting at the University of Mississippi was expected to issue its final report today. A source close to the panel said there probably would be no further indictments.

The grand jury is considering charges against former Maj. Gen. Edwin A. Walker and four other persons. They are charged with contributing to the violence that claimed two lives and left scores injured during the 14 hours of rioting Sept. 30 when Negro James Meredith entered the school.

Walker, a 53-year-old ex-war hero who commanded federal troops which enforced school integration at Little Rock, Ark., was charged with rebellion, insurrection and seditious conspiracy.

In an interim report issued last week, the panel indicted four persons on charges of forcibly resisting federal marshals and obstructing them in performance of their duties.

Meredith, meanwhile, faced two end-of-term examinations today which he hopes will bolster his shaky academic standing at the university.

For the first weekend since he entered the school four months ago Meredith remained on campus, closeted in his dormitory room with his books.

A good showing on the finals might give the 29-year-old Air Force veteran the boost necessary to remain at the school he has threatened to leave because of constant harassment from fellow students.

Warm Trend Moves Into Panhandle Area

By United Press International An unexpected warming trend swept across Texas during the night.

Warmer weather was forecast for today and Tuesday in the Top O' Texas area with today's high expected to reach the mid-50s and the low for tonight near 30. The high forecast for yesterday was in the low 20s, but a warming trend moved in Sunday with the thermometer reaching 45 in Pampa. The high anticipated for tomorrow is also in the mid 50s.

Forecasters warned, however, that another surge of cold air may hit the state about mid-week.

Although it was much warmer, most of the state still got a hard freeze. Only the extreme lower Rio Grande Valley area escaped sub-freezing temperatures.

The upper Valley was hit hard, however, as temperatures tumbled to 22 degrees at Rio Grande City and ranged upward to 35 at Brownsville, 100 miles to the southeast.

Heavy frost was reported in the middle and upper Valley, threatening (See WEATHER, Page 3)

Connally Gets His First Test

AUSTIN (UPI)—Final passage of Gov. John Connally's \$217,000 Emergency Appropriations Bill up before the House today should bring the first test of strength for the new Governor's young administration.

Connally asked the Legislature last week to give him the funds immediately in order to get started with his study of higher education needs, and to give his office and the Attorney General's office more funds.

The bill first ran into opposition when House members were asked to suspend rules last week and take it up immediately. Members agreed to suspend the rules, but warned more time to study the measure before a final vote was taken.

The vote was 113-24 to advance the emergency fund bill out of order, indicating weak but determined opposition.

Ulbricht Again Chosen To Head East German Commies

BERLIN (UPI) — Walter Ulbricht won re-election as Communist boss of East Germany today shortly after a mysterious explosion rocked an East Berlin area in which he has his home.

The re-election of the goateed Ulbricht had been expected. It came at the final meeting of East Germany's Communist party congress.

The vote was unanimous to re-elect Ulbricht as first secretary of the party's central committee—the nation's highest post.

As Ulbricht's selection was announced, Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev, sitting next to him, stood up and shook his hand. Both grinned broadly.

Showdown Looms In Fight On Rules

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Mounting impatience of many senators to get down to work loomed as a major factor today in pushing the Senate toward a showdown this week in its rules change fight.

The battle over the anti-filibuster rule has blocked virtually all other business and Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield said committee reorganization probably would be impossible until the issue is settled.

He boasted that the fact the Soviets had withdrawn 40 missiles from Cuba only meant Americans could count on "a couple of more seconds" before being hit in any nuclear war.

Asks For Income Tax Reduction By July 1

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy today forecast moderate business gains this year and appealed to Congress to give the economy an added stimulus by cutting taxes. The President said in his annual Economic Report that he wants his proposed reduction in individual income taxes to take effect next July 1.

He also asked the lawmakers to cut corporate tax rates from 30 to 22 per cent on the first \$25,000 of income, retroactive to Jan. 1. A bigger corporate tax reduction will be proposed later.

As he did in his State of the Union and Budget messages, Kennedy emphasized his tax cut plan. Without it, he suggested, there might be a recession and the \$11.9 billion deficit projected for fiscal 1964 might go even higher.

Reaction Split Initial congressional reaction to the Economic Report generally is split along party lines, with Republicans accusing Kennedy of fiscal irresponsibility and Democrats praising his proposals.

House Republican Whip Leslie C. Arends, Ill., said cuts in federal spending could be made "without damaging national security." Rep. Gerald Ford, R-Mich., leveled the charge of irresponsibility and said domestic spending

should be cut back to the 1962 level. Senate Democratic leader Mike Mansfield, Mont., hailed Kennedy's program as necessary to continue economic recovery and avoid another recession. Senate Democratic Whip Hubert H. Humphrey, Minn., said the tax cut would stimulate purchasing power and thereby employment.

The President's tax cutting proposal — as a device for stimulating economic growth — has generated considerable congressional criticism. In his message today, Kennedy appeared to be trying to reassure the skeptical, convert the adamant and whip up more support from the man in the street.

Chairman Walter W. Heller of the President's Council of Economic Advisers said a 1963 tax cut would be "insurance" against a recession. He said that while the President (See KENNEDY, Page 3)

Senators Leaders Express Doubt On Tax Cut In '63

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Senate leaders believe the chances for a tax cut this year, as proposed by President Kennedy, are doubtful.

Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield, Mont., predicted Sunday it will be 1964 before Congress completes action on a new tax program.

He differed with Kennedy by insisting that any tax cut be accompanied by revenue-producing reforms in the tax system. Kennedy has urged that a tax cut be enacted now as a stimulant to the economy and that tax law reforms be considered separately.

GOP Senate Leader Everett M. Dirksen, Ill., appearing with Mansfield on the AFL-CIO's weekly radio program, said a combined tax cut-reform bill would be difficult to pass. He said government spending should be reduced if a tax cut is enacted.

Although the President has not yet sent his tax proposals to Congress, he has announced he will ask for a \$10 billion net tax cut. Kennedy's tax message is scheduled to go to Congress Thursday.

Senate Democratic Whip Hubert H. Humphrey, Minn., in a separate radio-television interview, supported the President and predicted a tax cut would be approved this year.

Appropriations Committee Chairman Seeks \$12-Billion Slash In Budget

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Chairman Clarence Cannon, D-Mo., in effect asked his House Appropriations Committee today to trim President Kennedy's record \$98.3 billion budget by \$12 billion.

As the committee began the first of its session-long money hearings, Cannon declined to pinpoint possible cuts or pick a specific dollar objective for savings. But he told a reporter the committee's goal should be "at least" to balance the budget.

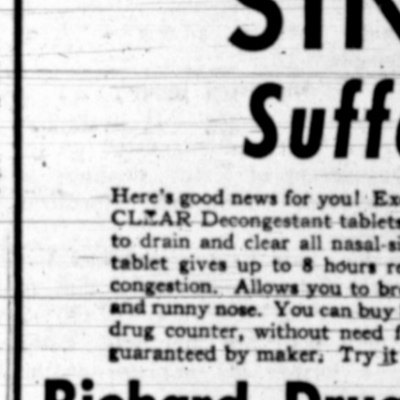

200 Reported Hurt In Wreck

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) — A Reading Co. commuter train jammed to capacity because of the city's transit strike crashed into the rear of another crowded commuter train today on elevated tracks near the heart of the city.

A railroad spokesman estimated the number of injured at "close to 200."

Two persons were trapped in the wreckage of the rear section of a six-car train. It was struck by a four-car train placed in operation during the seven-day transit strike which has affected approximately one million daily riders of buses, trolleys and subways-elevated lines.

The four-car train, a shuttle operating between the center-city terminal and suburban Jenkinton during the strike, sustained little damage.

The crash occurred at the height of the morning rush hour. Earl T. Hunter, superintendent of Reading's Philadelphia division, said the preliminary estimate of the number of injured was "close to 200."

Many received only slight injuries, received treatment and were released.

(Continued From Page 1) U.S. Soviet test ban talks in New York last week. These talks will be moved to Washington Tuesday with Britain also taking part.

Though U.S. officials were "encouraged" by Khrushchev's move, they cautioned that Russia has many times in the past come fairly close to a test ban agreement without actually getting there.

The Soviet Communist party newspaper Pravda printed all three letters in today's edition.

In London, the British Foreign Office described Khrushchev's acceptance of the principle of "on-site inspection" as "obviously important development."

"The time has come now," Khrushchev said, "to put an end once and for all to nuclear tests."

He added that "a certain relaxation of international tension" since the Cuban missile crisis should "facilitate this."

President Kennedy, in his Dec. 28 reply to Khrushchev, said, "I am encouraged that you are prepared to accept the principle of on-site inspections."

Not Enough
But Kennedy said two to three inspections a year would not be enough.

Kennedy also said Khrushchev's proposal on unmanned monitoring stations was "helpful but it does not seem to me to go far enough."

The President said the locations Khrushchev proposed for the black boxes—Kokchetav for central Asia and Yakutsk for far eastern Russia, were all outside common earthquake areas.

In his reply on Jan. 7, Khrushchev offered to relocate two of the stations.

4 Persons Lose Lives In Fire At Galveston

GALVESTON (UPI) — Authorities today searched for clues to the identities of two of four persons charred Saturday in a fire that destroyed a near-downtown apartment house.

Fire officials said the blaze probably would have taken a more tragic death toll had it not been for the actions of Lyle B. Fleming, a 63-year-old retired cook who ran through the blazing frame building alerting the occupants to the early morning fire.

Two of the dead were identified last night. They were Mrs. Meta Shoemaker and Mrs. Anna Jenkins.

Two occupants of the apartment house were unaccounted for. They were Thomas (Blackie) Barham, 62, a handyman who lived on the

top floor of the three-story structure. The other was V. C. Shortt, 40, who lived on the first floor.

Fire officials said they had no idea what touched off the fire. Six persons remained hospitalized today. One, Walter Eaton was in "extremely critical" condition.

Mrs. Johnnie Lou Davisson, five months pregnant, broke both legs in a leap from the second-floor window.

The last body was taken from the ruins at about 2 p.m. yesterday.

The fire broke out suddenly shortly before 6 a.m. Firemen were fighting another fire just two blocks away. But the building was doomed before fire equipment could get in position.

A light freezing drizzle and 20-degree temperatures hampered firemen.

(Continued From Page 1) dent's forecast of moderate business expansion in 1963 was not contingent on tax reduction, it could be affected by it.

Heller told a news conference that a tax reduction this year could speed up the growth rate of the economy in the final months of 1963 and result in a better record than Kennedy forecast.

If Congress turned down the tax plan, Heller said, "the let-down that would come might be so strong that it would heighten the chance of a recession."

The President argued in his report that the July 1 tax reduction would pump a needed blast of vitality into the economy. He said it would increase by \$5 billion the annual rate of disposable after-tax income in the last six months of 1962. The net effect, on a half-year basis, would be \$2 billion.

Predicts Gains
Kennedy predicted the nation's total of goods and services produced this year — the gross national product (GNP) — would rise to a record \$578 billion. This would be about \$16 billion more than in 1962.

"The outlook for continued, moderate expansion in 1963 is now favorable," he said.

Kennedy said he did not fear a recession in 1963. He is more concerned, he said, about the "five years of excessive unemployment, unused capacity and slack profits that constitutes the urgent case for tax reduction and reform."

The President said that if Congress didn't get moving on tax reduction, his unbalanced budget might be jolted.

"If we were to slide into recession through failure to act on taxes, the cash deficit for next year would be larger without the tax reduction than the estimated deficit with tax reduction," he said.

The President favors reducing individual rates in three stages from the present range of 20 to 91 per cent to a new scale of from 14 to 65 per cent. Additional details for implementing the plan will be given to Congress Thursday.

Winter Unleashes Fury Across Much Of Nation

By United Press International — brought out wind machines and smudge pots. Householders strung electric light-bulbs to warm the plants.

The harsh weather endangered for a while the multi-million-dollar citrus and winter vegetable crop in Texas' Rio Grande Valley and in Southern California. Overheated stoves touched off fire after fire in the Midwest.

There were treacherous driving conditions, caused by freezing rain or drifting snow, from New York to South Dakota.

Georgia and Florida cleaned up after a barrage of tornadoes and howling winds.

There were more than 60 dead across the land from weather-related causes.

It was 28° early today at Atlanta, Ga. Other readings in the 20's were common in the lower Mississippi Valley and the Southern Plains. At International Falls, Minn., it was 20 below.

Extended temperatures in the 20s would cause severe damage to citrus crops in the Rio Grande Valley but an unexpected warming trend early today kept temperatures in the low 30s.

Last weekend's freeze ruined tomatoes, sweet peppers and other crops. The valley suffered an estimated \$50 million loss in January of 1962.

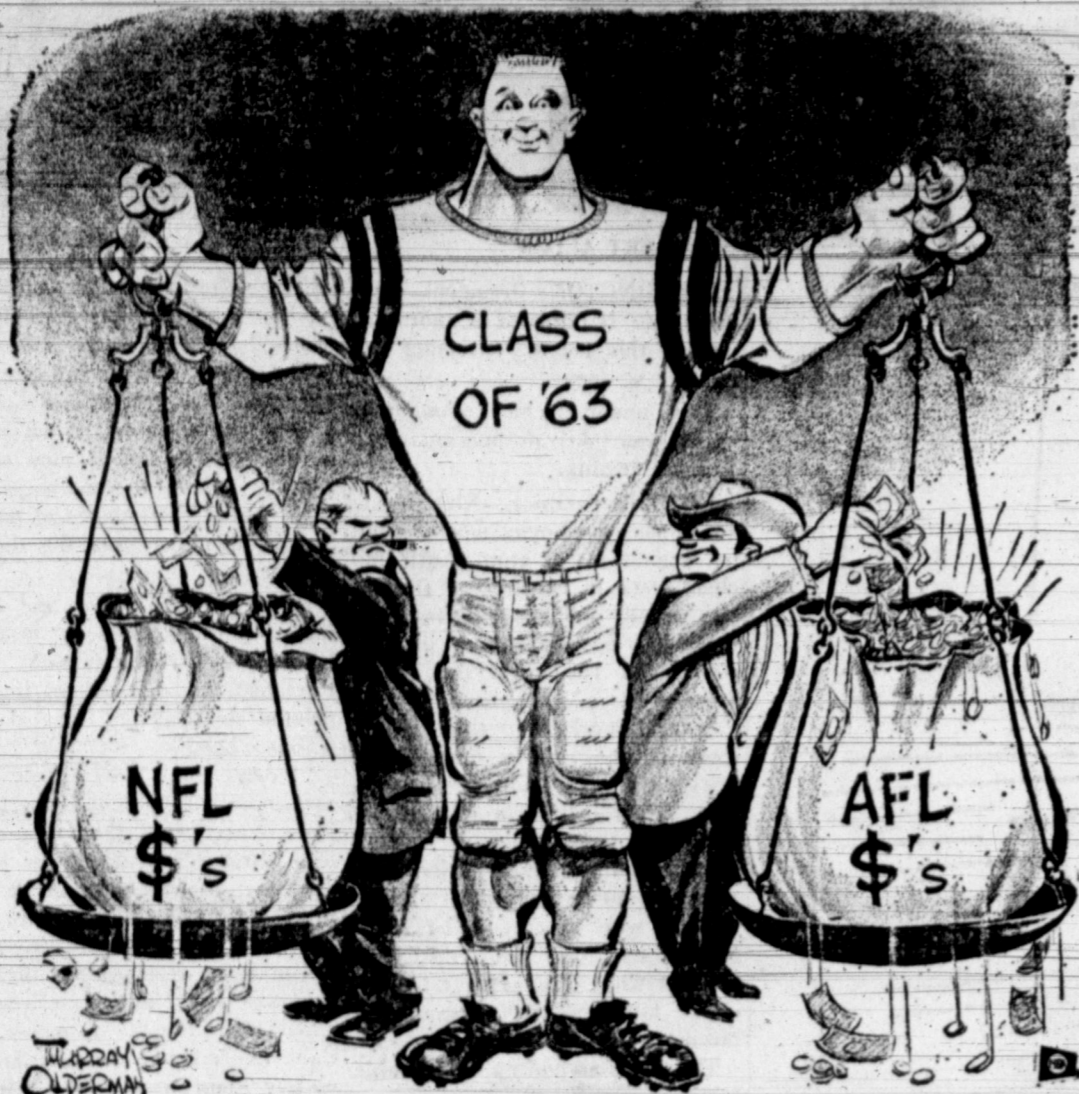

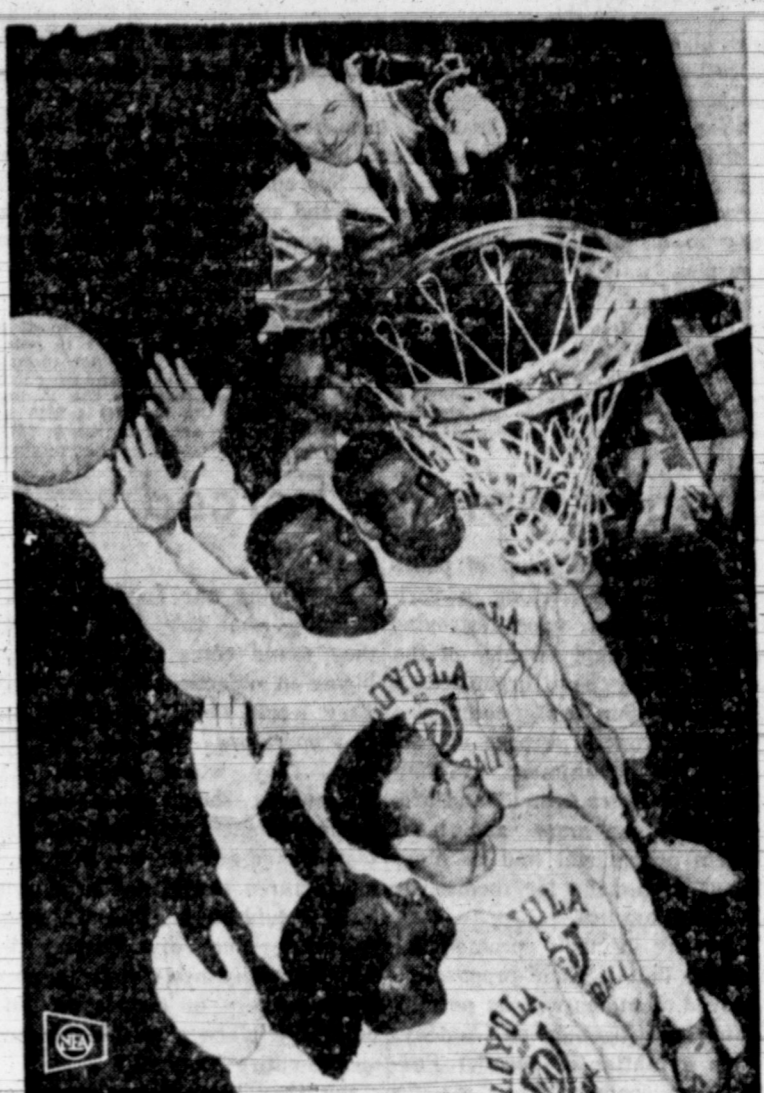

Should Not Be Forced

A well-financed group of political advocates is working in various states bent upon destroying both freedom and sanctity of the Sabbath. They have organized a "Save Our Sundays" committee with the avowed purpose of enlarging the government, granting it further powers over us and providing still one more method wherein people will find it more difficult to provide for themselves and their families.

They say in their promotional material that if their proposal is approved, families will be permitted to stay together on Sunday. Is this a matter of permit? Possibly if government grows a trifle bigger we will all have to take out a permit if we wish to spend a day together as a family.

The SOS people say that their proposal will not prohibit work on Sundays. So their pretense of trying to "save our Sundays" is a measly-mouthed sham. They still want people to work. They note specifically that retail selling of items they feel are "necessary" to protect and safeguard health and welfare will be "permitted."

Of course they are going to decide what is "necessary."

And again they point out that their proposal will not prevent the sale of recreational items, items related to tourism, entertainment, restaurants or athletics.

What is this about, then?
The reason for the proposal is obvious. It would act in restraint of trade to limit and eliminate certain kinds of competition. That is all.

If "saving our Sundays" was actually what they had in mind, they would come out like honest bigots in objection to all work. They would object to filling station operators working on this day. They would declare that housewives should not work to prepare dinner; that athletic contests should not be held; that moving pictures should not be shown. They would argue that all radio and television broadcasting be stopped, daily newspapers banned from delivery or production, and otherwise place a total stringency on the entire populace.

But they know better than to make any such rash proposal. The promoters are people being paid by special interests out to limit competition.

Incidentally, they say that their proposal is backed by merchants, organized labor, professional men, housewives, church groups and retail employees.

The truth is that a small number of persons in each of these groups has been led to believe that things will be better if more legislation restricting freedom can be passed and enforced. But, in the main, there is no such general endorsement as the backers want you to believe.

We'd like to suggest that we should campaign for a program to keep every day in the week, including Sunday, for the use of people. And we should ban government intrusion against any of us on any day.

Peasants in southern Italy believe that all governments are bad by nature. Americans, by a large margin, believe that elected governments are intrinsically good, despite violations of the public trust by occasional dishonest officials.

Lately, there has been quite a bit of news to make usually-confident Americans nervous. One official, irritated because of criticism of his advocacy of "managed news," further commented that it was a government prerogative to lie outright when the bureaucrats deemed it in the national interest to do so.

"Jake "the Barber" Factor, longtime associate of the Capone mob and more recently convicted of mail fraud, has been granted a Presidential pardon for no stated persuasive reason, and is revealed as a \$22,000 "angel" of Democratic campaign funds.

These are not instances of individual officials who have strayed and who may expect to be punished, or fired. These are instances of dubious morality carried on by officials while no voice of protest is raised in the Administration.

Can raise hell all over the world through satellites and fifth columns and stop the U.N. from inquiring into it.

THE NEW YEAR AHEAD

As we begin a New Year in the United States, the times are full of both peril and opportunity.

The year ended with a mixed bag of good and bad news for Americans. Tremendously encouraging to patriotic citizens was the conviction in federal court of the Communist Party, USA, for failing to register as agents of the Soviet Union.

Good Americans have been hoping for such a conviction ever since the 1920s when the menace of communism became apparent in this country. If the Supreme Court upholds the decision, the judicial finding will represent the most powerful blow ever struck at the Reds who seek to subvert this land.

With this decision firmly established, authorities then will be able to crack down hard on the innumerable front groups active today.

Nevertheless, however, the situation is gloomy. President Kennedy is sending a military mission to the Congo and State Department informants speak of troops being dispatched there as a possibility.

If there were a real Red menace in the Congo and the troops were to be used to destroy that menace, it would be one thing. But even the most naive citizen can see that the troops would be used against the anti-communist government of Katanga.

Moreover, one can be certain that any U.S. troops sent to the Congo would be put under United Nations control. This would mean that American soldiers would have to take their orders from the pro-communist or neutralist U.N. officials who are bossing affairs in the Congo.

Thus the United States would be in the mad and outrageous position of using its armed forces to break down the one center of anti-communist resistance in all of black Africa.

Another grim prospect is that the Kennedy administration will begin a massive aid program to India. While no one wants the Chinese Reds to gain another inch of ground, India is a poor bet. Already the United States has poured approximately \$4 billion down the Indian rat hole, with no apparent good effect.

The Indian army is a mess and so is the Indian economy. To pour more millions into India would simply add to the colossal waste and deplete the resources of the United States when a truly serious communist attempt may be made in Berlin.

Further, if India gained modern arms at U.S. expense, in all likelihood she would use them for her own imperialistic schemes against Pakistan or other pro-Western nations. India, with its socialist and neutralist leadership, simply cannot be trusted.

The best way to deter Red China is to give military assistance to the free Chinese on Formosa, who want to conduct raids against the Chinese mainland.

This has been the conservative position all along, and it is the correct one.

In these schemes to send men and munitions to India, the Congo and South East Asia, one sees a dangerous dispersal of U.S. fighting strength and a bleeding of the U.S. economy.

Being weakened by these unfounded adventures in faraway places, and sometimes it seems as if those who plan such schemes must actually wish a weakening to occur. Otherwise, as someone has said, once in a while our State Department would make a mistake that is in our favor instead of the enemy's.

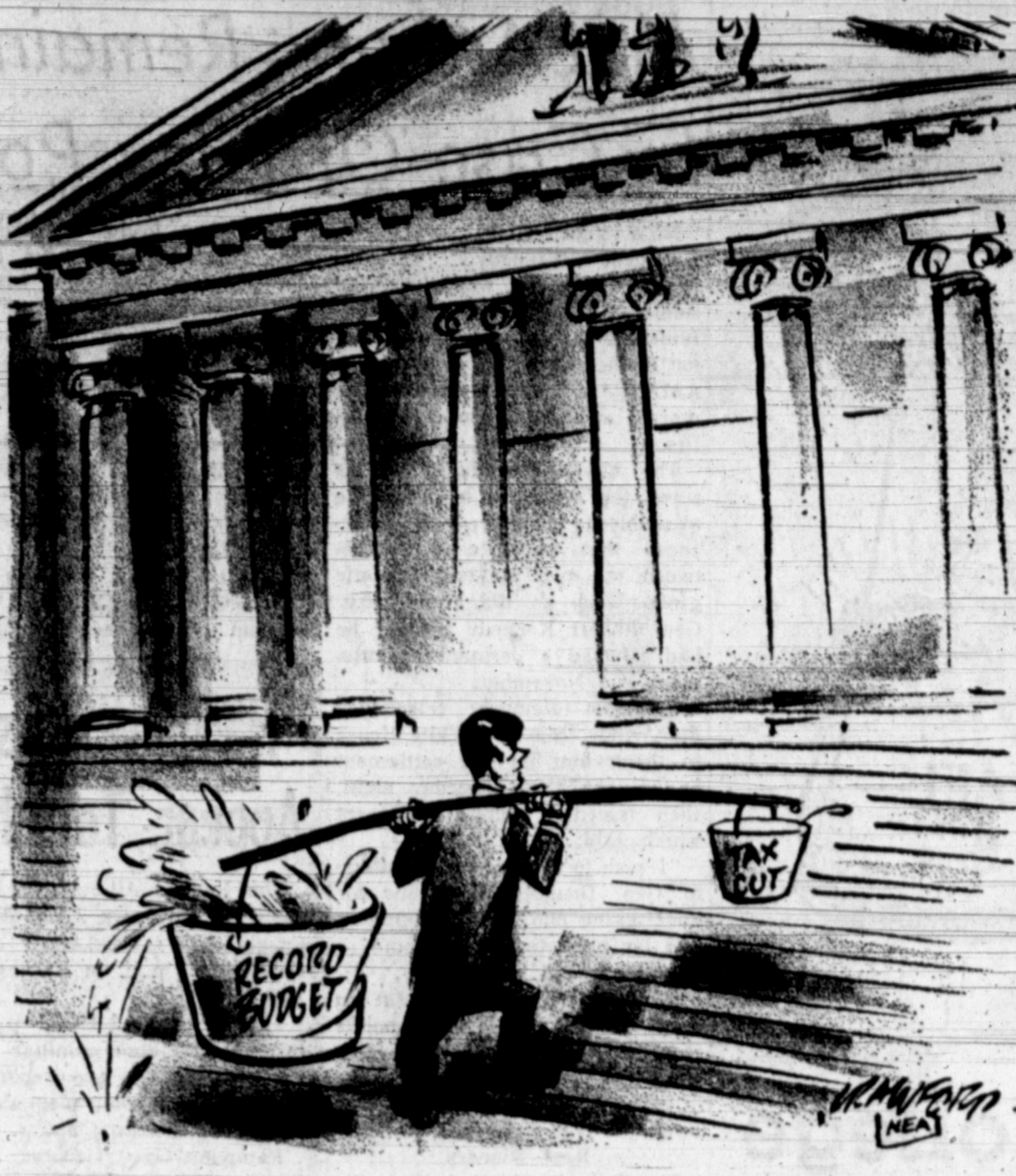
But the darkness of the situation overseas may help Americans understand the need for reform in our government policies. The rising number of casualties in South Viet Nam may arouse our people to anger. The staggering cost of fighting little wars that our officials do not even pretend to want to win may bring home to the taxpayer the criminal folly of policies that we have been following these last two years.

The American people are not neutralists. They want a "win" policy over communism. And if they have the facts presented to them clearly and forcefully they have the capability of reacting with vigor. Much has happened since the end of the last session of Congress. With Congress out of Washington, there wasn't any rallying point for good Americans who oppose "no win" policies.

But when the Senators and Representatives return to the capital, an organ will exist for subjecting the administration to the closest scrutiny. Means will exist for cutting off funds that are spent in ways hurtful to U.S. security.

The Congress stands in our public life in this country as a tower of independence. At least, it should be that and is that at its best. Therefore it should be the New Year resolution of every responsible Congressman to be independent of the pressures of Big Government.

1963—YEAR OF OPPORTUNITY

As we begin 1963, we continue to be burdened by the same old problems — too much government, increasing UN control, and the aid supplied to the Communists by our own government.

This year, however, holds greater promise for freedom than any in the last half century.

For many Americans have apparently decided to quit complaining about these problems — and are now determined to do something about them. This determination is indicated by the widespread support being given to three major proposals:

First, the Liberty Amendment appears to be on the verge of a great breakthrough. As you know, it will eliminate all federal expenditures that aren't authorized in the Constitution — and utilize the savings to repeal the income tax.

The Amendment has already been approved by six states, and will be considered by at least 24 more states this year. This is an extraordinary opportunity to promote freedom.

Secondly, the latest assault by the United Nations against Katanga has served to increase support for Congressman Ull's bill—H.R. 3567 — to get the U.S. out of the U.N.

Lastly, the Cuban prisoner ransom and the flood of Communist imports into America have pointed up again the amazing amount of help we are giving the Communists. In fact, it is becoming increasingly obvious that it is our help that keeps the impractical Communist regimes alive to threaten us. As a result, demands are being made to cut off all relations with the Communist governments.

Victory
Enactment of these three proposals would solve the major problems facing America. If we keep our eyes on these targets, we can destroy the international Communist conspiracy and restore the American concept of minimum, limited government.

Our greatest danger today is that we may be distracted from these three jobs by other, less important, issues that may be raised. Why should we, for instance, allow ourselves to be drawn into brushfire battles against various big-government proposals — when passage of the Liberty Amendment will automatically cancel all such proposals?

Completion of our three jobs will bring victory for America. So why be concerned with anything else?

Determination
Let's ignore all of the phony issues and distracting tactics of the enemy. For no matter what the enemy does, our objectives are still the same. Our goal is not to prevent him from carrying out his program — but rather it is to carry out ours.

Let's throw all of our determination and resources into these three great endeavors. Enough Americans have been awakened to the problems of communism and socialism. The big job now is to bring about the three much-needed solutions.

Let's pass the Liberty Amendment — get the U.S. out of the U.N. — and compel our government to break off all relations with the Communists. If we stick to these three great tasks, we can take full advantage of 1963 — our year of opportunity!

Question Box

(We invite questions on economic and the proper functions of government which will not injure anyone.)

Question: "What is the practical solution for strikes?"

More and more people are beginning to understand that strikes are harmful to everyone, and are wanting a practical solution as to how to handle them. Many people think the government ought to try to solve the problem, but the government cannot solve any moral, ethical problem.

Strikes are the result of government interference with men's rights to make individual contracts. It is an interference with some men having the right to help establish values as to wages and prices. Strikes are the result of discriminatory laws.

The solution is to repeal all laws that have to do with labor contracts. Let each and every individual make an individual contract or have an agent make a contract for him, but that would not give his agent the right to interfere with any other individual making an individual contract that he believes will be most beneficial to him.

Since the government is the primary cause of strikes being such a problem, it is absurd to think that it can solve the thing that it brought about.

The thinkers of the ages are pretty well agreed on the solution to our human relations problems. Remember, Jesus said: "Seek ye first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you." And it is, certainly anything but righteous to keep any individual from having the right to be wise or to be foolish, so long as he doesn't interfere with other people having the same right.

Albert Jay Nock's book, "Our Enemy The State," points out that our trouble comes from government. And Herbert Spencer had the same idea — that our trouble comes from government interference. Sir Ernest Benn, the Englishman who founded the Society of Individualists, wrote a book "Our Enemy The Government."

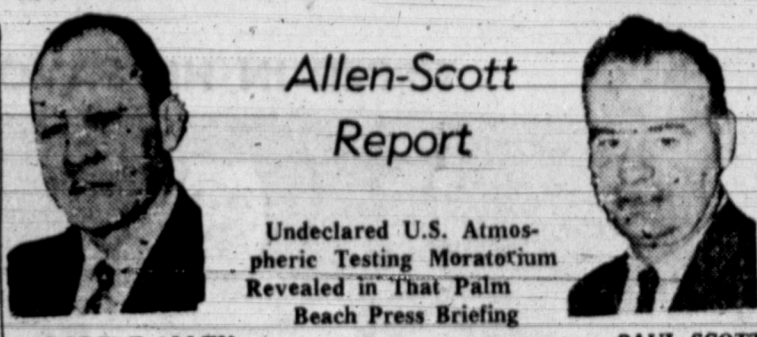
And one of the most moral men who ever lived was Henry D. Thoreau. He was so conscientious that he was willing to go to jail rather than pay taxes to help catch slaves to be returned to their masters. He wrote "Civil Disobedience," and begins it with this paragraph:

"I heartily accept the motto — 'Government is best which governs least'; and I should like to see it acted up to more rapidly and systematically. Carried out, it finally amounts to this, which also I believe, — 'That government is best which governs not at all; and when men are prepared for it, that will be the kind of government which they will have.'

Thoreau also said that the only way the government can help business is the rapidity with which it gets out of the way of free enterprise.

Laissez faire economy came from the king having asked the industrialists what he could do to help promote prosperity. The answer was laissez faire which means "do not interfere with creative energy." On this subject, Sir Ernest Benn, in his book, "Return To Laissez Faire," says:

"For fifty years laissez faire has been discarded as a national policy

WASHINGTON—President Kennedy has re-imposed a moratorium on this country's testing of nuclear weapons.

This announced momentous action was taken despite continued Russian testing.

Last fall Premier Khrushchev announced the Soviet would end its long series of atmospheric nuclear tests in November. Despite this widely publicized declaration, there has been no let-up in Russian tests. The latest took place January 5.

Several weeks ago this column disclosed that these new Soviet tests have been most extraordinary. They include a number of ballistic missile firings, ranging from ICBMs to anti-missile missiles. In one of these tests, three IRBMs were destroyed by a single nuclear blast from the warhead of what U.S. experts believe is the latest Soviet anti-missile missile.

The U.S. has had no comparable tests.

This country's renewed unilateral suspension of atmospheric nuclear weapons testing was revealed by the President under questioning at his controversial "background-only press conference" in Palm Beach, December 31.

He was asked, "Are we headed for another round of tests?" "Not now," replied the President. "We are not going to test in the atmosphere for a while. Our underground tests will continue. We are still trying to work out a nuclear test agreement (with the Russians)."

Other than these unreported off-the-record remarks, there has been no word of this new non-testing policy.

Leaders of the Joint Congressional Atomic Committee are much disturbed by this backstage move. Officials of the Pentagon and Atomic Energy Commission will be summoned to report fully on this far-reaching decision.

THE PRESIDENT'S EXPLANATION — One of the 30-odd newsmen who took part in this year-end background press conference pointed out to the President that "you resumed atmospheric nuclear testing to maintain our edge, our technical edge, in weaponry."

"We haven't heard much about these tests," continued the reporter. "Are you satisfied we still have that margin?"

"Yes," replied the President, and then asserted that "technical margin" is becoming increasingly "less significant." Methods of delivering nuclear weapons are steadily assuming greater weight.

Following is his exposition of that view, which manifestly was decisive in his unannounced decision to reinstate this country's moratorium on nuclear tests:

"Means of delivery get to be the significant factor; whether you can put so many kilotons or megatons into a bomb of so many pounds really is not as vital a question as how much of a missile force you have and how much conventional forces, and how much transport you have, and your willingness to use all these. So the actual sophistication of a weapon is not as decisive a point perhaps."

In answer to your question, I would say that we are still ahead of the Russians in some areas, and even with them in others. They have built a larger bomb than we have, but that is because we have never felt we had a strategic requirement for it."

OUTLOOK FOR PEACE — The President balked at being pinned down on his relations with Khrushchev since the Cuban showdown:

"On whether as a result of the latter there has been a significant shift in the balance of world power, and on the outlook for peace this year.

While he talked at some length on all these matters, he carefully sidestepped definite conclusions. "It is very difficult to predict

whether Khrushchev is anxious to have a detente with the United States," the President said. "I don't know... What we are trying to do is to protect our interest and not have a war. If we suffer a major defeat, or if they suffer a major defeat, in some ways that may change the balance of power. But it also increases the danger of war."

Have the Sino-Soviet and Sino-Indian conflicts helped improve Khrushchev's relations with the President, he was asked. It was pointed out this is General de Gaulle's belief.

"I don't think we can say they are improving yet," said the President, "because I think we have been through too harsh an experience... I think it would be premature to say there is any evidence of improvement yet... I would say it is rather difficult to make any judgments really about the balance of power. I think the balance of power is still on our side; but we have a lot of problems in all the undeveloped world."

"Can you compare your estimate of the chances of keeping the peace in 1963 with what you thought they were at the beginning of 1962?" he was asked.

"Well, I would say they are slightly better," the President replied.

In response to other questions the President disclosed:

— He wants to do considerable traveling in Latin America this year. He would like to go to Japan, and make a state visit to Britain, but has no plans for either. Africa is out, because a trip there would take too much time.

— It is possible he may meet with General de Gaulle in the next few months, but "that is by no means assured."

— U.S. troops would have been sent to Laos if a cease-fire agreement had not been reached. "We couldn't permit the Communists to overrun that country," said the President, "and I think that was probably why we got the cease-fire at a time when the military balance of power was in the hands of the Pathet Laos."

— Some gains have been scored by the Alliance for Progress in Latin America, but the problems there are "staggering." It is the President's belief that "we are not doing quite enough for Latin America." He pointed out the U.S. has done a great deal more for Western Europe and is still doing much there.

FOREIGN LOBBYIST INVESTIGATION — The Senate Foreign Relations Committee has turned over to the Justice Department a number of "apparent or possible violations of federal law" by lobbyists of foreign governments.

That's what Senator J. William Fulbright, D-Ark., chairman, has informed committee members in a private report.

This three-page document mentions no names or specific cases. However, it indicates the evidence against the foreign lobbyists was obtained from income tax returns.

Fulbright plans to start hearings on his probe early next month. In preparation for them, his staff has examined Justice Department records of 250 of the 400 registered foreign lobbyists. In addition, a lengthy detailed questionnaire was sent to 25 lobbyists representing foreign sugar interests.

The so-called "sugar lobby" is a major target of the investigation. Fulbright demanded the probe following extensive lobbyist activities during Congress' consideration last year of the new sugar act.

Eleven law schools throughout the country are doing research work for the Senate committee on "legal aspects" of lobbying by foreign representatives.

Security officials are currently reviewing the records of 550-800 lobbyists for a number of years and are asking for an interview.

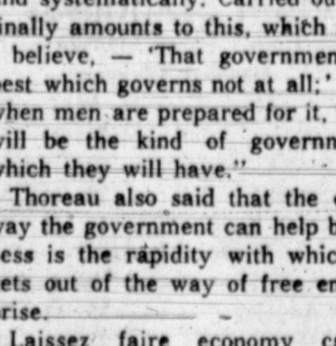

Tax Cut Will Not Affect Your Last Year's Return

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The tax cut which Congress is discussing will not affect your 1962 return, which must be filed by midnight April 15.

Neither do the much-discussed new regulations on expense-account deductions apply to 1962 returns. Both the tax cut—and the expense account regulations will be applicable to the return which you'll file next year on this year's income.

For the average person, the most significant change in the tax rules during the past year is the requirement that every return carry the taxpayer's "identification number." The Internal Revenue Service is switching to automatic data processing equipment (so-called "electronic brains") to check tax returns, and it is indispensable under this system for every taxpayer to have his own personal, permanent identification number.

Wall Street In Review

NEW YORK (UPI)—The Dow-Jones industrial average appears headed for the 675 area as the next leg of its advance, says Kenneth Ward of Hayden, Stone & Co.

Many stocks, which have been quietly rebuilding strong bases of accumulation for many months, are now taking on new bullish characteristics, breaking out of these bases on volume.

Bache & Co. believes that periods of hesitation are bound to occur from time to time as segments of the upward move are consolidated. Nevertheless, as long as technical evidence remains favorable, Bache says strong individual performances will probably occur even during days of pause.

According to Equity Research Associates the can industry is expected to continue growing at the 2 to 3 per cent annual rate experienced during the last decade. This growth has continued in spite of inroads made by competitive forms of packaging.

Ski-Nose Hope Has Had Little To Smile About During Past Months

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — Bob Hope, a man who makes millions of people laugh, has had little to smile about during past months.

They have been months of personal tragedy during which the six-nosed comedian has had to go on the old "show must go on" tradition of his profession.

In August, 1962, Hope's brother, Jack, died. Shortly after that tragedy two of the comic's closest associates passed away.

"I had a lot to get over," said Hope retrospectively. "Those last four months were the roughest."

Hope was very close to brother Jack, who acted as his television producer. Bob was also saddened by the loss of his press agent and a comedy writer, both of whom had been with him for many years.

Sapped Hope's Strength
The personal tragedies, added to the physical burden of a long picture schedule in England, sapped Hope's strength at a time when Bob was going overseas for his annual Christmas visit to military bases.

He returned earlier this month and films of the Far East trip were shown on Bob's NBC-TV show last night.

"I had enough film for three shows," said Hope at Desilu Studios where he was working on a television commercial with Lucille Ball.

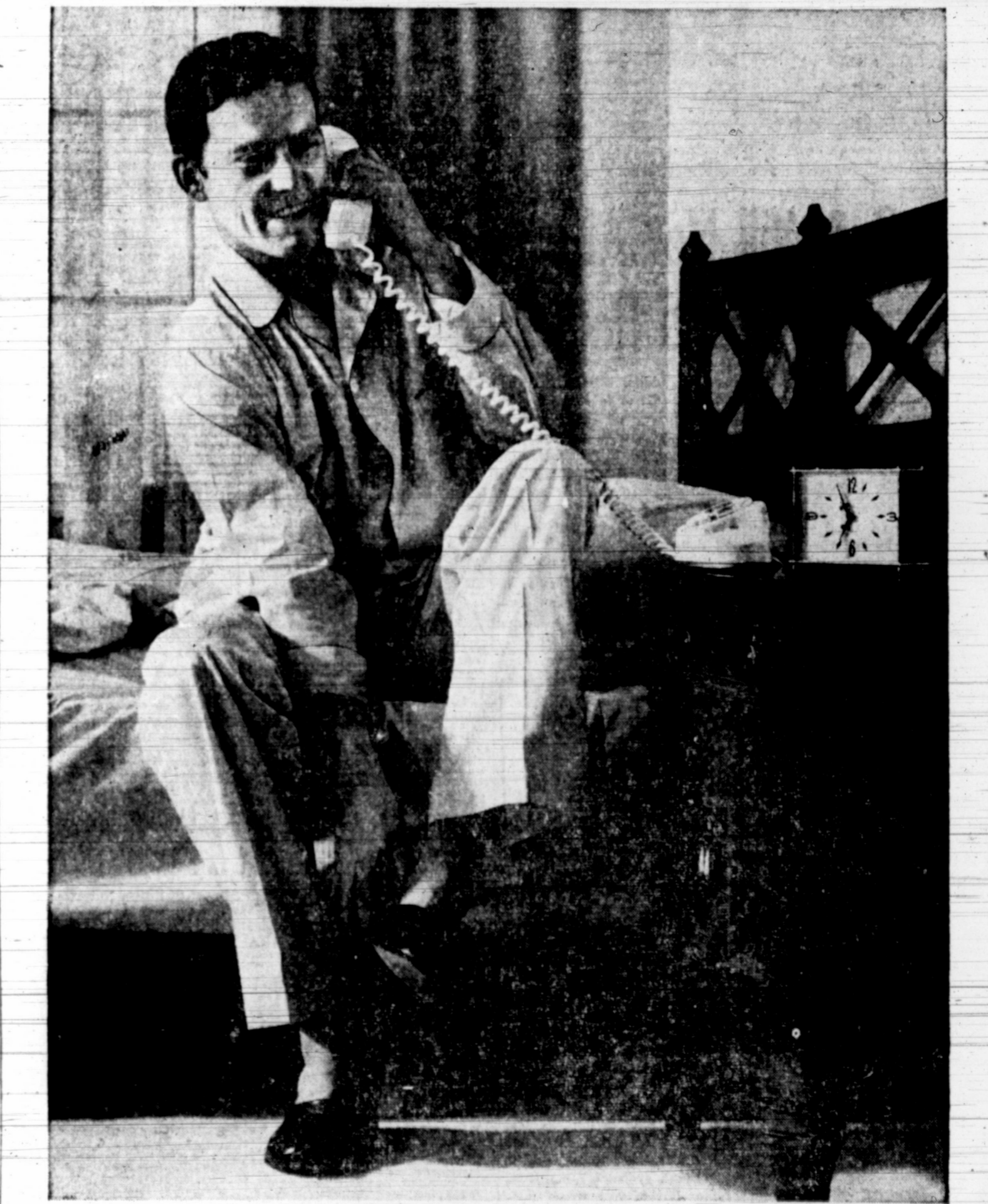
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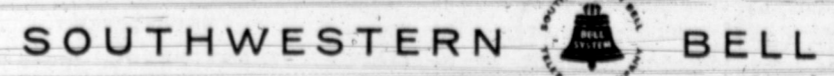
