When thieves fall out and begin to fight among themselves, we will do well to make sure we do not take sides. In our state there is a thing called the Arizona Power Authority. In Washington there is the Federal Power Commission and there is also Interior Secretary Stewart Udall. The Secretary of the Interior has asked the Federal Power Commission to reverse an EPC examiner's award to the Arizona Power Authority to construct what is called the Marble Canyon Project on the Colorado River. Here we have yet another example of government at its worst. A state authority goes to a federal authority and asks permission to build a dam in its state. The federal authority consents but a cabinet member now asks the federal authority to reverse its

The esimated cost for the project if built by the state authority is 154 million tax dollars. The federal government estimates the cost if built under its guidance at 212 million tax dollars and that's the way the interior secretary wants it. The brief filed by the department headed by the interior secretary states among other things, "Proper coordination of the project at the Marble Canyon site with federal developments at Glen Canyon and Boulder, Canyon can only be achieved by federal construction, operation and maintenance of the Marble Canyon project". Here we have another example of federal government insistence upon increasing the cost and the size and the power of government. We also have the example of a state authority preferring to increase its cost and size and power. In any case, if there is a necessity for the project, if it is economically logical, private Industry - can construct, operate and maintair the project on a profit making basis or else the project is economically unsound and should be abandoned.

In my estimation only a large corporation with an important legal staff, a potential crook or a fool will permit himself or herself to become involved with fascism




