Shamrock Goes Irish As There's Something Irish In Those Texas Hearts

SHAMROCK (Sp) — Irishmen of all nationalities had their day in the sun (and the wind) here yesterday as thousands of persons from the Texas and Oklahoma Panhandles flocked into town for Shamrock's 17th annual St. Patrick's Day celebration.

There were two outstanding events among more than a score of activities during the day and night.

Miss Joyce Thorne of Canadian was crowned Miss Irish Rose from among 30 candidates for the title at coronation ceremonies at 3:30 p.m. in the National Guard Armory.

Only Pampa group to place in the various parade divisions was the Leather and Lace Club which won third award among the riding clubs.

Alva Clark of Shamrock, a 25-year-old entrant, took first place in the Donegal Beard contest with his two-month growth of red whiskers.

The Old Fiddlers contest was won by Texas Shanty of Dallas. Mrs. Ida Gregg carried off the honors for the oldest area resident on hand. She came to Shamrock in 1889. W. L. Martin, 91, of

Red Planes Invade U.S. Territory

Fort To Ask Commission Hold Up Action On Rates

City Commissioner L. P. Fort said Saturday he will make a motion at Tuesday night's commission meeting that consideration of a proposed water and sewer rate increase ordinance be suspended until further study is given the contract existing between the City of Pampa and the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority.

Fort said he has just finished reading the contract for the first time, and after reading it came to the conclusion that the people of Pampa "have been taken."

After studying the contract, Fort called it "a multi-million dollar booby trap which a big majority of the people voted upon us all."

The commissioner said he was preparing a statement to read at Tuesday night's meeting.

He indicated he will show that Pampa now is being charged interest for a project four years in the future and one that it is possible may never be completed.

Fort said he construed the contract to read that if funds are not appropriated by Congress or war comes or something else stops construction when it is only 25 per cent short of completion, the city, in the face of the Communist menace,

"As long as Russia occupies Cuba we cannot concentrate on the urgent task of improving the economic and social conditions of the Latin American people," Oduber said Saturday. "The presence of the Soviets in this hemisphere poses an imminent threat of subversion and military action should be a scarcity and the Authority felt rationing was necessary."

Costa Rican Says Reds In America Defeat Alliance

SAN JOSE, Costa Rica (UPI)—Costa Rican Foreign Minister Daniel Oduber said Saturday the Alliance for Progress cannot prosper in an America infected by Cuba-sponsored Communist subversion.

There were indications this theme will be driven home to President Kennedy when he meets here Monday with the six Central American presidents. Kennedy's Central American colleagues have made clear they want action, not just words, in the face of the Communist menace.

Jet Fighters Chase Soviets From Alaska

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Two Soviet reconnaissance planes violated U.S. territory over Alaska Friday but flew back to Russia when American jet fighters were sent up after them, it was disclosed Saturday.

The United States protested sharply to the Kremlin, demanding the Soviet Union "take all necessary measures to prevent any repetition" of the air violation, the first of its kind.

The Defense Department said the invaders penetrated 30 miles inside U. S. territory. They were over American soil for about a half an hour and set off a "scramble" by U. S. fighter-pilots at Alaskan bases.

The Pentagon said that F-102 jets "intercepted" the planes but no shots were fired.

Asked why the U. S. fighters did not fire on the Russian planes, a Defense Department spokesman said:

"When the interception was made, the Soviets were clearly on a course which would take them out of U. S. air space."

The F-102 "Delta Dart" fighters used in the interception are supersonic, and could fly at twice the 460-mile-an-hour maximum speed at which the department said the Russian planes flew.

No Description

There was no description of the Russian planes other than that they were reconnaissance types. This would usually imply that they were not heavily armed.

Radar tracked the Soviet aircraft streaking back to Russia.

A State Department spokesman told newsmen it was "the first clearly established incident of a Soviet overflight of the United States."

There have been reports that Russian planes from Cuba have flown over Southeastern United States but Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara has emphatically denied all such claims.

A Defense Department spokesman said the Russian planes were spotted on radar approaching southwestern Alaska. They came in from the west southwest over Kuskokwim Bay, about 200 miles north of the Aleutian Islands. They flew at an altitude of from 17,000 to 35,000 feet and at speeds of 300 to 350 mph.

U.S. Chamber Says \$4.5 Billion 'Not Essential'

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The U.S. Chamber of Commerce Saturday recommended slimming down President Kennedy's \$5.8 billion budget by dropping \$4.5 billion which it claimed was not essential.

Chamber President Ladd Plumley said the proposed cuts would increase the chance of getting a tax reduction through Congress this year. He said resistance to tax cuts stemmed from opposition to Kennedy's current spending proposals.

The proposed budget revision was prepared by the Chamber's board of directors. It was documented with a 37-page line-by-line explanation showing where the chamber feels the budget should be cut and why.

"This wasn't a hacking proposition," Plumley told a press conference. "This was a serious study."

Cut New Spending

The Chamber's plan actually would lop off \$9.1 billion of the \$107.9 billion in new spending authority requested by the President in his budget for fiscal 1964.

About half of the proposed spending cuts were in defense, foreign aid and space programs. The chamber also suggested jacking the President's \$1.2 billion request for aid to education.

Houston, up for debate in the House, would give cities extra-territorial powers over surrounding strips of land varying from half a mile for cities under 5,000 population to a five-mile area for cities over 100,000.

The question of how much control to give cities over the nearby areas has split House members. Rep. Bob Eckhardt of Houston rose on personal privilege last week to criticize parts of the bill which he called "special interest sections extending time for a tax-ride to industry."

Appropriations Pass

This past week the House moved out, after a single day's debate,

a record \$3.08 billion appropriations bill.

Sen. Grady Hazlewood of Amarillo, chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, said the upper chamber's version of appropriations may be sent to the floor this week.

If the Senate hastily approves its bill, a conference committee will start working out an omnibus appropriations measure, perhaps within a week.

Several House members complained that the bill passed this week was inadequate. It did not allocate funds for the Texas Maritime Academy at Galveston and several schools had their requests slashed.

But Rep. W. S. Healy of Paducah, chairman of the Appropriations Committee, was able to ward off changes by reminding members there were not any more funds available.

Midwest Hit By Worst Storm Of Winter Season

A late winter blizzard hurled the worst storm of the season on western South Dakota Saturday, stranding motorists and forcing dairies to make emergency milk deliveries.

The storm, described as "dangerous and intense" by the U.S. Weather Bureau was expected to move from Nebraska and the Dakotas into Minnesota by Sunday morning.

Tornadoes were forecast for portions of several south-central states.

Cold wave warnings were posted for much of the Midwest and heavy rain fell to the south of the storm system. Another large storm whirled southward off the Washington coast to central California.

In South Dakota, Interstate 29 became clogged with snow drifts four- to six feet high and the Highway Department dispatched a snowplow and rescue vehicles to aid stranded motorists. Dairy firms in Rapid City said they would make emergency deliveries of milk.

Police and fire vehicles capable of plowing through the drifts were commissioned to get emergency workers such as nurses and doctors to work.

Winds of 40 to 60 miles an hour whipped through the northern Nebraska panhandle and western South Dakota, resulting in zero visibility at times.

Up to 20 inches of new snow fell at Mount Coolidge, north of Custer, S.D. Custer and Rapid City reported 10 inches and more snow falling.

Most roads in the northern Nebraska panhandle were closed by noon and travel was not recommended in any of the area expected to be hit by the blizzard later in the day.

Mid East Nations May Federate

CAIRO, U.A.R. (UPI) — Egypt, Syria and Iraq have reached agreement in principle on a federation of the three nations, it was announced Saturday night.

A communique said there was "agreement on points of view" of such a federation and that the Syrian and Iraqi delegations would go to their respective capitals Sunday to consult their governments.

The two delegations have met with U.A.R. President Gamal Abdel Nasser most of the week.

The communique said after consultations with their governments at home the Syrian and Iraqi delegations would return here to conclude the talks.

Informed sources said the three were expected to announce a "high powered" committee to draft the unity project for submission to voters in all three countries.

"In Amman, Jordan's King Hussein pledged "unlimited" cooperation with such a federation. He said he was confident Jordan would join an Arab-unity plan and added, "we hope this unity will take place as soon as possible."

(Hussein also denied reports Jordan's stability was threatened.

NEW YORK (UPI) — Richard T. Leahy of J. W. Sparks & Co. says that while the rally from the lows of the previous week was encouraging in that the market showed respect for an indicated support level, volume considerations were highly dubious.

Leahy further believes that unless there is a noticeable increase in volume on any additional near-term rally, the list may again test the 655-60 support area.

Certainly, says Indicator Digest, no important buying should be attempted unless the market is able to overcome present technical difficulties and prove its ability to penetrate last month's highs.

The Fitch Survey says barring the unexpected, it looks for further consolidating action over the nearer term, with any downside tendencies limited by the good underlying support frequently demonstrated in the past.

Moody's Investors Service says that though there is no basis for expecting a severe decline, stock prices seem more likely to be weak than strong in months to come.

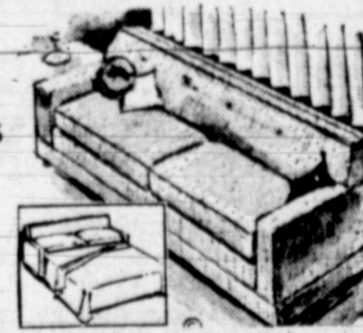

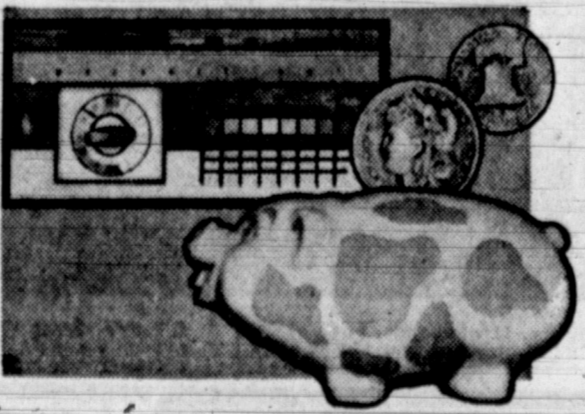

OUR TEXAS HERITAGE

At this time each year we Texans mark two fateful events in the history of our great State, the Declaration of Texas Independence and the immortal sacrifice of the Alamo defenders. Independence on March 2, 1836, as delegates to a convention to replace the quarreling Provisional Government were in the second day of their meeting at Washington-on-the-Brazos, some 150 miles to the east of the tiny mission town of San Antonio de Bejar. The delegates were still in session when Col. James Barret Travis and his heroic band of 183 Texas patriots fell March 6 to the massed onslaught of Santa Anna's army.

The ringing words of the Texas Declaration of Independence have been memorized by generations of Texas school children: "We, therefore, the delegates, with plenary powers, of the people of Texas, in solemn convention assembled, appealing to a candid world for the necessities of our condition, do hereby resolve and declare that our political connection with the Mexican nation has forever ended, and that the people of Texas do now constitute a free, sovereign and independent Republic."

Names on our Panhandle land reflect those glorious days of Texas history. All 28 counties of the 18th-Congressional District bear the names of distinguished sons of Texas, men whose sacrifices shall forever earn the respect of their countrymen. As we remember the Alamo again this year, we remember GEORGE WASHINGTON COTTLE, one of the Alamo defenders, who gave his name to Cottle County. As we mark the Independence anniversary, we pay our respects to nine signers of the document whose names were later to be given to Panhandle counties: GEORGE C. CHILDRRESS, who as committee chairman was the principal author; JAMES COLLINSWORTH, later to become the first chief justice of the Republic of Texas; DR. JUNIUS WILLIAM MOTLEY, killed a month later in the Battle of San

Jacinto; SAMUEL P. CARSON, secretary of state for the Republic in the cabinet of the first president, David G. Burnett; ANDREW BRISCOE, who fought at San Jacinto; and ROBERT POTTER, JOHN S. ROBERTS, MARTIN FARMER, and JAMES G. SWISHER, four others among the 59 signers of the Declaration. When Collingsworth and Motley counties were established by an Act of the Legislature Aug. 21, 1876, careless writing of the bill added a letter "a" to James Collinsworth's name and dropped a letter "t" from Motley's. Despite these errors, many residents of Collingsworth County omit the "g" in pronouncing the name of their county and in Motley County you'll never hear a resident call it "Mote-ly." The pronunciation the spelling error might indicate to a newcomer. The proper names live on.

Other counties in the 18th Congressional District are named for men who played important roles in the days of the Republic of Texas. ERASTUS (DEAF) SMITH was commander of Sam Houston's scouts. COMMODORE EDWIN WARD MOORE led the Texas Navy. WILLIAM BECK OCHILTREE served in the cabinet of the Republic. SIDNEY SHERMAN was an officer with Houston at San Jacinto. JUDGE ANDERSON HUTCHINSON was a district judge in the Republic. WARREN D. C. HALL was adjutant general under President Burnett. HENRI CASTRO was a native of France who came to America, established a colony in Southwest Texas, and later served the Republic as consul to Paris. ABNER S. LIPSCOMB was secretary of state under President Lamar. JUDGE JOHN HEMPHILL, whose great nephew, Robert W. Hemphill, is a colleague of mine as a Member of Congress from South Carolina) was chief justice under the Republic of Texas and U.S. Senator after annexation. These are other men whose names our counties bear: ROYAL T. WHEELER, chief justice of the Texas Supreme Court in the

1830s; OLIVER C. and RUFUS HARTLEY and JOHN M. HANSFORD and JAMES W. DALLAM and STOCKTON P. DONLEY, pioneer Texas attorneys all; GEN. HORACE RANDALL, killed in the Civil War; WILLIS SIMPSON OLDHAM, member of the Confederate Senate from Texas; ARMSTRONG County, in the words of the 1876 Act, was named for "several early Texas pioneers of that name." PETER GRAY, for whom my home county was named, was a member of the first Texas legislature.

In 1836, the population of Texas was about 40,000, including Indians. The American armed force that wrested Texas from Mexico numbered the 183 men who died at the Alamo, some 400 men massacred at Goliad, the 783 who triumphed at San Jacinto. There were probably no more than 2,000 other Texans under arms between the Colorado and the Sabine. Against them was a Mexican force numbering 10,000 to 25,000 men. It is no wonder that the victory of Texas is of continuing inspiration to all America.

Now, the population of Texas is more than 10,116,000 persons, according to the July, 1962, estimate of the Census Bureau. And my friend John Lyle, former Congressman from Corpus Christi, points out that Texas people are still outnumbered by Texas cattle. He reports that the Texas Cattle and Livestock Service in Austin claims a total of 10.3 million head of cattle in Texas.

Texas history has always been an inspiration to me. I often wonder why it isn't taught in other States. Recent Visitors included Mr. and Mrs. James E. 'A WORD FILTY SPOKEN'

What a strange place the world would be if there were no conversation at all! Some may feel this would be a good thing, for then we would have a sort of paradise without and angry word, a bitter taunt, or a verbal abuse to mar the peace. However, conversation as a means of communication is vital to our way of life. And so the important thing is what we say, and how we say it.

Sometimes it seems difficult to hold back the angry retort we feel is justified or the sarcastic rejoinder when we are smarting under rebuke or defeat. We may, however, say things we deeply regret, which cause hurt and bitter feelings. John Lyly, a sixteenth century writer, put it this way: "We may knit that knot with our tongues that we shall never undo with our teeth."

Sometimes, too, we may chide ourselves for withholding the kind things we might have said in someone's hour of need. In the Bible the writer of Proverbs makes this apt comment (25:11): "A word filty spoken is like apples of gold in pictures of silver."

Since the spoken word can cause wars to begin or cease, since it is often the medium best for communicating both the best and the worst in our life, how can it be properly governed in conversation?

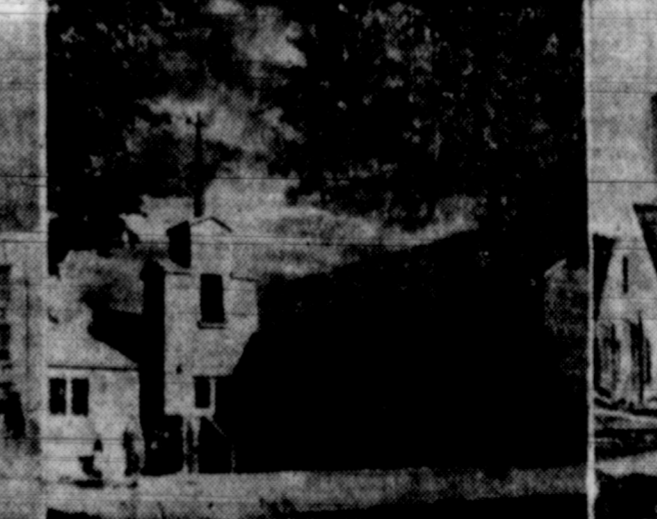
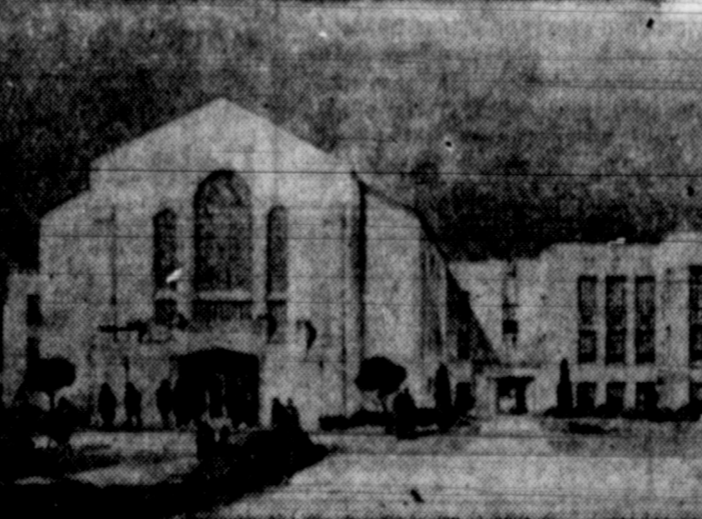
The Bible places great stress on the need of controlling the tongue. The Psalmist prayed thus (Ps. 19:14) "Let the words of my mouth, and the meditation of my heart, be acceptable in thy sight, O Lord, my strength, and my redeemer."

Our conversation mirrors our thoughts. If our thoughts are right our conversation is good. If our thoughts are confused, our conversation is untidy and meaningless. Thoughts of God give our conversation the right impetus.

Stumbling blocks to good conversation are thoughts of fear, doubt, resentment, willfulness, criticism. These negative traits result in conversation that is clumsy and often hateful. But we can stop this harmful practice right at the source by keeping in thought the perfect nature of man in God's likeness.

Christ Jesus provided the matchless example for all conversation. He allowed nothing but divine Love to govern what he said and did.

Washington Window

United Press International WASHINGTON (UPI)—A gambling man would have to bet that the politicians will put the tax reductions where the votes are. The votes — or most of them — lie among those 42.7 million citizens each of whose gross adjusted income is less than \$10,000 a year. Among these are included the Common Men selected by the politicians. Nearly 23 million of them are under \$5,000 a year. These are the Jews with wives and mortgages and jalopies, occasional unemployment and, sometimes, catastrophic illness.

When these little guys aren't having income taxes, they're laying it on the line in excise taxes (Federal) and sales taxes (local) on automobiles, tires, gasoline, telephone trunks for the little woman, food sometimes, clothing, tobacco. You name it and the little guy is paying taxes on it.

Little Guy
The little guy wouldn't stand for the federal, state and local taxes that beat him into the ground for the comfort of a delusion that what he is paying is just peanuts.

He thinks the big guys, with big ears and fur collars on their coats, really are carrying the tax load for the likes of him.

This is a delusion, as my Blaine peddler by the politicians to keep the little guy happy, they otherwise might be. The big guys are belted by taxes. Of course, at rates graduated upward to the point of taxation. These high bracket rates are imposed on the big guys by the little guys because the little guys have the votes in Congress and in the home precinct in so.

The high rates do not have much relation to revenue, but are more a punishment for having it so good. The big guys pay very large taxes individually. Collectively they are pikers. The 42 million taxpayers — incomes of less than \$10,000 a year paid in 1960 \$21.6 billion, nearly half of the total personal income tax take. The \$10,000 to \$50,000 guys, who are big but not the biggest, average \$13.4 billion. The \$50,000 to \$100,000 group paid \$2.7 billion. The biggest guys each with incomes of more than \$100,000,

paid \$2.1 billion.

At \$3.50 a copy, this paperback is a bargain for anyone who wants to know where government money comes from and where it goes.

ILLEGAL CUBAN VISITS

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Chairman Francis E. Walter, D-Pa., said Thursday the House Committee on Un-American Activities has learned that about 100 Americans have gone to Cuba illegally via Mexico. Walter said the committee will hold hearings in an effort to close the door to Cuba for American citizens. Walter said he was concerned that the travelers violated American laws and "served as propaganda agents for the Communist Castro regime after their return to the United States."

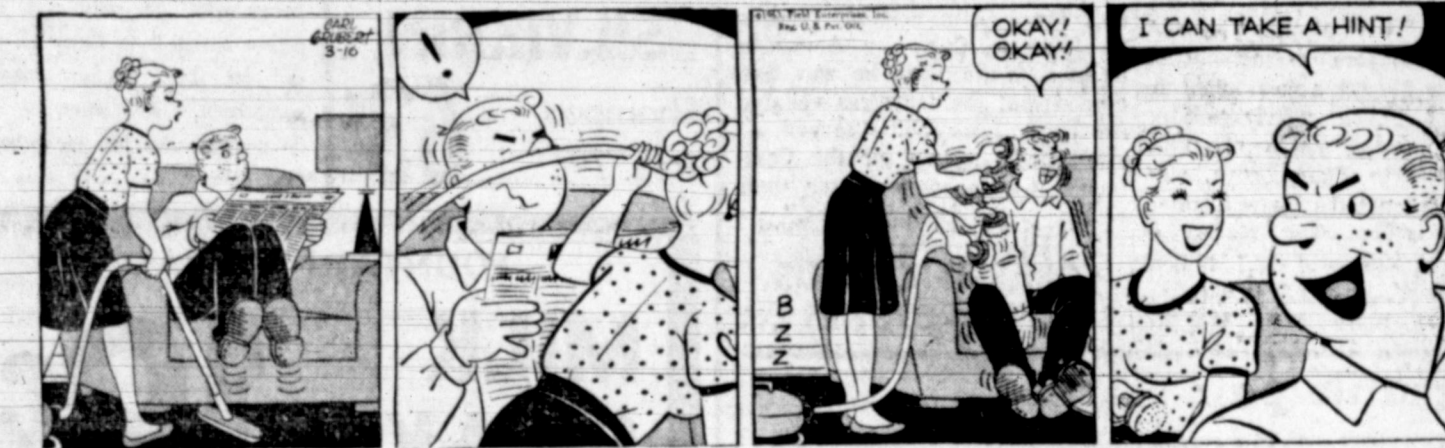

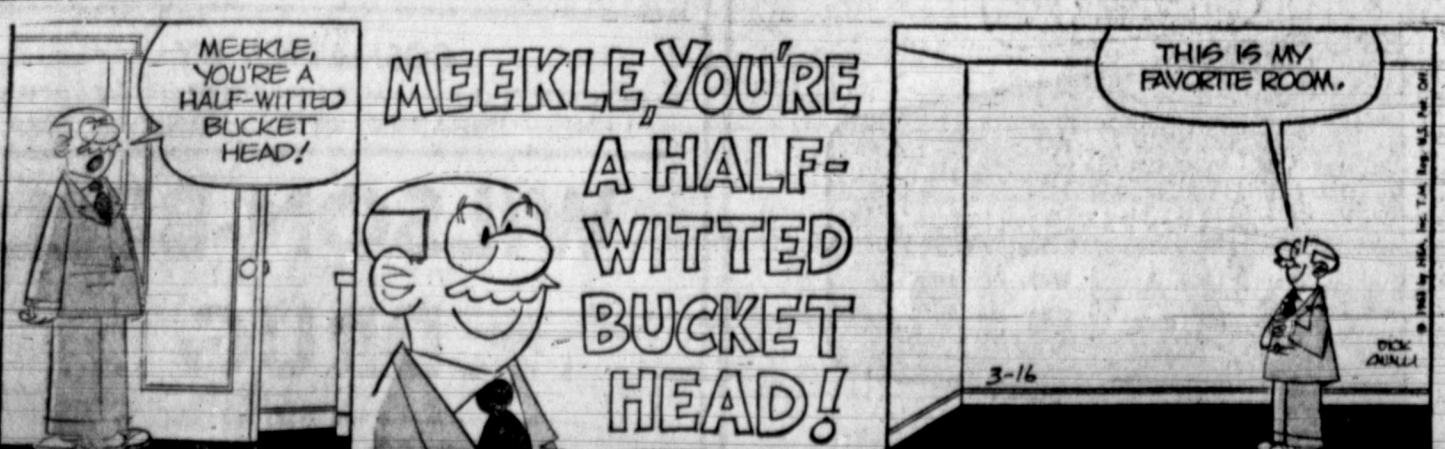

Sunday Morning Coffee Break....with d. e. w.

IT HASN'T BEEN easy down through the years to build Pampa Community Concert Association to the prestige position it holds in the community today. Sometimes it has been a discouraging, uphill pull. Culturally-minded citizens, who have served faithfully on the board... on membership drives year after year... even in the most menial jobs, like, for instance moving pianos, musical instruments, stage scenery for artist... would be first to tell you this... But it has been a rewarding job, too, all will be equally quick to tell you. Many of the fine concert artists who appeared here in the early years, did not exactly play to staid audiences. But through the perseverance of many... and sometimes only a few... the auditorium has begun to fill to capacity each succeeding year with patrons wanting to hear personalities long famous or just beginning in their fields. For the past three years, the membership drive for new patrons, which is in progress now, has enjoyed a "sold out" status. To commemorate the 20th membership drive, Connie McDaniel, who is PCC publicity chairman, dreamed up the idea to delve back into 20 years past and see how it all started. She took time out from a busy schedule to go out and chat with an equally busy lady, Icie Harrah, who was one of the interested citizens who helped to start Pampa Community Concert in Pampa. Our column today should be called "Coffee Break with Connie"... for here is the gist of her interview:

Mrs. Harrah recalled that: "In the Spring of 1944, Marion Evans, a representative of the Community Concert Association in New York, who later became first vice president of the organization, came to Pampa to see what she could do about organizing an association here. She called a number of people. Only three responded to her call: Winston Savage, who at that time was high school band director, another man, whose name escapes me for the moment, and myself. We were so excited at the possibility of having concerts in Pampa by top artists that we gave her a number of names to call and did some calling ourselves."

"The organizational meeting was finally set for a Sunday afternoon. We wanted to interest as many of our business and professional men as possible. And we were surprised and delighted with the crowd that appeared."

"Officers for the association elected that afternoon were Winston Savage, president; Mrs. Roy McKernan, first vice president; Mrs. Carl J. Wright, secretary and Floyd Imel, treasurer. I served as the first Presentation Chairman; later as president; and served continuously on the board for 15 years."

"Among the first board members were the Rev. Douglas Nelson, Knox Kinard, Father William Stack, C. P. Buckler, Mrs. Mel Davis, Joe Key, Farris Oden, Mrs. George Frihaul and Tex De Weese."

"Our very first concert was presented by Alexander Kippis. Even though he had the name of being the world's greatest bass-baritone with a phenomenal range, many Pampa people did not care for the concert. We will never forget that we paid \$1000 for that concert and we could have had James Melton for \$400, since it was his first season out! We learned a lesson: we should never pass up a young up and coming artist!"

We did not have a public place that was open after nine o'clock to which we could take the artists for late dinner. Since many of them cannot dine before they perform, we had to have dinner for them in a home after a concert. We all took turns at this. The first reception and dinner was held in the Roy McKernan home with three other hosts and hostesses. The weather did not cooperate! We had a downpour of rain!"

"Those dinners were not always easy because of the time element and the number included. At another reception and dinner in the C. P. Buckler home for Rosario and Antonio Dance Team and Company, we shall never forget

Another Pampan, who has had inspirational part in the success of Pampa Community Concerts is Mrs. Mel Davis, who served on the board for eleven years. She recalled this: "I remember driving to all the surrounding towns in those early days trying to sell memberships. I'd contact the schools and organizations, I thought would be interested in promoting these concerts, which would be available for their community."

I remember thinking "it's not worth it to me personally," but I kept thinking about our young people coming along. That we needed something cultural for them here in Pampa since it was too hard and expensive to drive to Amarillo and other cities for fine musical programs."

We are a relatively newcomer to Pampa and it is through a newcomer's eyes and point of view about a town in which we make our home that we want to express our appreciation to the ones whose names appear in this column and on the picture page... and to the many, many others, whose names and pictures do not. Within our memory are the appearances of Rise Stevens, Fred Waring, Robert Merrill... just to name a few of the established stars, who have appeared here in recent years... all of whom we have enjoyed immensely.

The "hold number" for this year, which the concert board justly feels is a feather in their respective caps, is the appearance of the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra of London, which will make its first coast-to-coast tour of the United States during the fall and winter of the 1963-64 season. The PCC board has engaged it for appearance here in November. Pampa is the only city in the Panhandle area in which the orchestra will appear. No wonder board members and drive workers are walking around on Concert Cloud Nine!

Just a word about the membership drive, which will begin tomorrow and continue for one week only... or for just a few days, until seating capacity is sold out, which has been the case in the past two or three years. A renewal drive is held the week preceding a membership drive. This enables former patrons to have priority to renew subscriptions for their families. Then the drive is open to the general public with memberships available from those who have moved away from Pampa during the year or have failed to renew their membership for the current year.

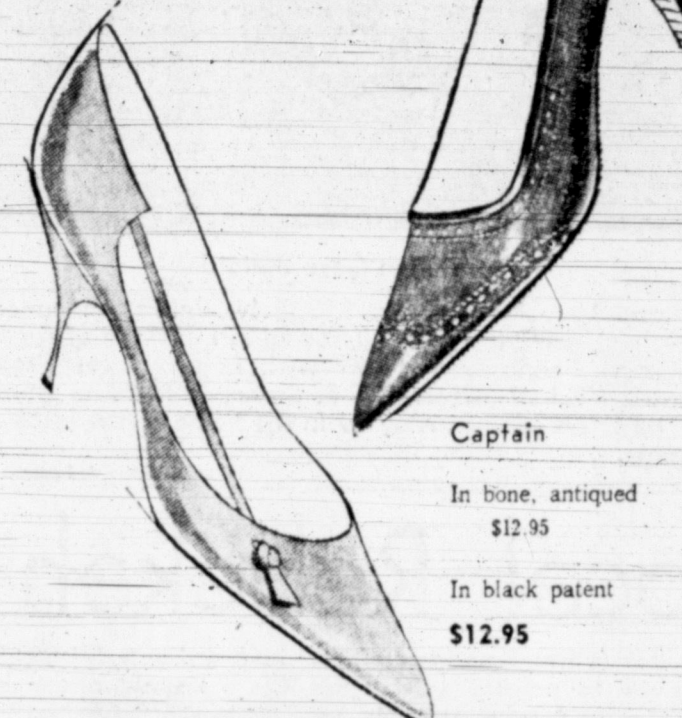

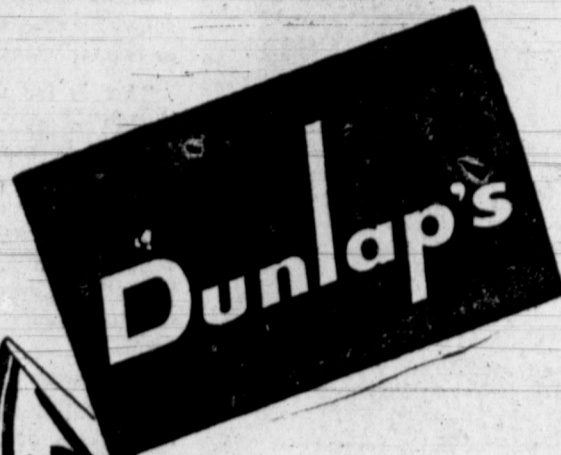

"Texas One Hundred Years Ago" Forms Topic For Varietas Club Study Meeting

Mrs. Evans described the 100-year-old city of Jefferson, once the second largest city in the Lone Star State. "Today its population has dwindled to 3,100 and its gracious streets and courthouse square are almost deserted. At one time, it was the state's second biggest inland port after Galveston."

"A natural barrier in the Red River backed water into Cypress Bayou so that it could be navigated as far as Jefferson, enabling steamboats to land from New Orleans and ports on the Ohio and Mississippi Rivers.

"Jefferson will see the day when bats will roost in its church bellies and grass grow in its streets," Jay Gould, railroad tycoon said, when the town ignored his drive for a railroad right-of-way. The Texas Pacific Railway instead of going through Jefferson went around it. Freight rates soared and shortly afterward the United States government removed a natural dam that had made Big Cypress Bayou navigable. Without its port, Jefferson was just another little Texas town."

"But Jeffersonians are proud of their town and its history. Homes are filled with priceless antiques and stories of history that can never be told are in top shape.

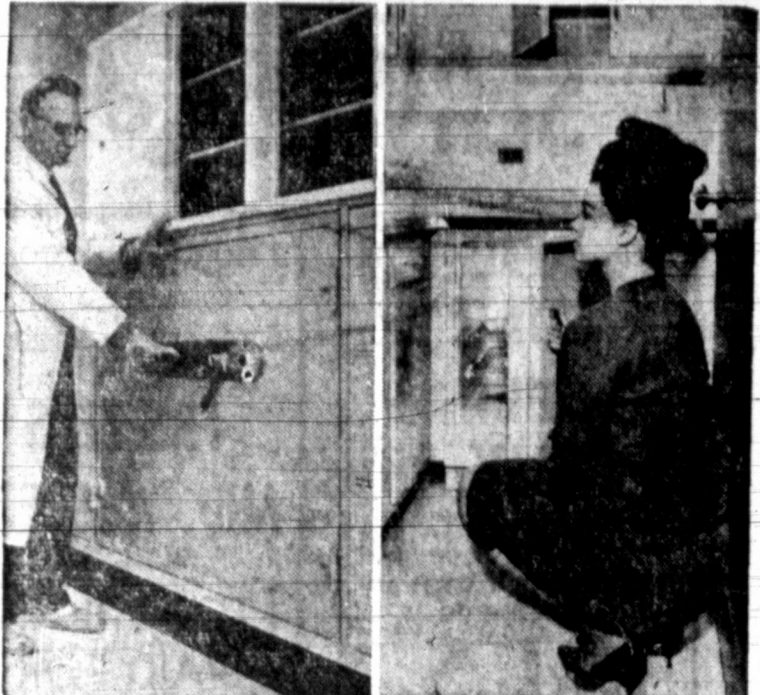

Moscow Charges Red China With Demanding Purge

LONDON (UPI)—The Moscow-led Communist camp charged today that Red China has demanded the "removal" of Soviet party leaders, apparently including the purge of Premier Nikita Khrushchev.

The charge was contained in a manifesto-type Moscow-backed policy outline, published in the current Marxist Review, the ideological organ of international communism. The publication reached here today.

"Outright attacks were leveled against the Communist party of the Soviet Union," the manifesto said. "Its leaders were accused of revisionism and cries were raised for their removal."

"In a word, a blow was struck against the (Soviet) party which now bears the main burden of the struggle against imperialism, a party which is the rallying center of all the forces fighting for socialism."

The manifesto said differences with Red China are on "cardinal issues" and "cause grave concern." It terms them "serious indeed" and warned bluntly they may lead to "a split in the inter-

Filing Continues For Panhandle School Election

PANHANDLE (SpI)—Filing for two places on the Panhandle Independent School Board have been James McCray and Alvis Tabor for re-election, John Franklin and C. L. Edwards. The persons elected will serve for three year terms.

McCray, president, is serving his second term, and Tabor, who was appointed to the board in 1959, is completing his first elective term.

Edwards, a former member of the board, served one term. This is the first time for Franklin to seek a place on the board.

Other members of the board are Phil Hawkins, O. J. Vinson, Charles Smith, Belmont Slagle and Jack Martin.

McLEAN (SpI)—Three men have filed for the two positions to be filled on the Alanreed board of education.

Jerry Tarr and Horace Bullock are seeking re-election to the board, while Brit Hathaway is the third candidate in the race.

Holdover members of the board are Buddy Hill, Sonny Bryant, John Foshee, Robert Bruce and Warner Phillips. Bullock is currently serving as president, and Bruce is secretary.

Four teachers in the Alanreed School have been re-hired for another year.

They are Eugene Dickinson, Mrs. Mary Durham, Mrs. R. B. McMillen and Mrs. Lawrence Hauck. George D. Smith was re-hired as superintendent at a former meeting of the board.

Wesley Ballard, who is teaching this year under an emergency teacher permit, will not return for the 1963-64 term. Ballard has announced plans to attend school at Stephen F. Austin College in Nacogdoches.

Mars Satellites May Come After Trip To Moon

HOUSTON (UPI)—Two Space Agency officials said Thursday that two tiny satellites revolving around Mars may be America's next space destination after the moon.

The two small satellites are called Phobos and Deimos. Phobos is about 10 miles in diameter and Deimos, five.

Maxime A. Faget and Paul E. Pruser said in a paper that a mission to these bodies would not only provide data on the satellites themselves, but would also provide an ideal site to observe Mars throughout its seasons.

Both satellites are in low orbit. Phobos is 3,000 miles above the surface of Mars; Deimos, 11,000 miles.

The scientists said Mars probably will be the destination of the first interplanetary voyage of American astronauts.
