U. S. CELEBRATES HAPPIEST CHRISTMAS

ASKED BY SPANISH **FASCISTS**

PARIS, Dec. 24 (A)-The key to war or peace in Europe was Chancellor Hitler's decision whether to send 60,000 German soldiers to Spain, foreign office officials indicated tonight.

Foreign Minister Yvon Delbos awaited Hitler's word on the request of Francisco Franco to send troops to aid the Spanish Fascists.

Delbos conveyed to Count Johannis on Welczeck, German ambassador, go to the aid of Madrid-Valencia Socialist government, reliable advices said.

Foreign office circles said they had reports five German army divisions were fully equipped and for immediate service in Spain, if the Reichsfuehrer should command.

Officials who charged Germany thus far had sent only technical experts or aviators to aid the Spanish insurgents admitted the decision would be a difficult one for Hitler because "if men are not sent, Franco will probably lose the war.'

WAR AND HUNGER ARE STALKING OVER WORLD

By The Associated Press The age old salutation of "Merry Christmas" and its religious message of "peace on earth" rang today around a world that presents contrasting picptures of peace and prosperity, war and hunger.

The happiest Christmas in the United States since the golden days of the late 20's was presaged by a rising tide of prosperity. The outpouring of millions of dollars in bonuses, dividends and wages was reflected in a gift buying spree that all barometers agreed surpassed anything the nation has witnessed

in many years. Germany's Christmas leader was curtailed as wartime regulations on

rationing food was decreed. Christ's disciples of many creeds began their celebration of his birth in Bethlehem, ancient city of the nativity, as soldiers guarded the streets, a grim reminder of the six months of terror accompanying the Arab strike against the Jews.

Few pilgrims came to watch the traditional observance which will reach its joyous climax when the patriarch carries an image of the infant Jesus into the grotton of St. Catherin's church and the bells of Bethlehem ring out their message of "on earth, peace, good will toward men.

A smiling, happy President led the nation in its Christmas observance. President Roosevelt got off to an early start last night when, while children and adults listened carefully, he read again from Dickens' story of Tiny Tim and

Wheat Insurance Plan Is Explained

WASHINGTON, Dec. 24 (A)-Here is the federal crop insurance com-mittee's explanation of how its proposed wheat insurance plan would

"At or about the time of seeding, a Wheat farmer, if he desired, could apply to his local committee for a crop insurance policy. The committee would determine from past records of his farm the amount of insurance in bushels per acre to be grant-ed, and the premium to be charged.

"The committee would check the acreage planted and the quality of land in wheat as compared with land that had been in wheat in base (previous) years. Immediate payment of the premium would not be required if a lien on the crop or other security were given."


