An unidentified person reported to the cab company that Daniels was dead and police were summoned by a cab employe shortly after 10 p.m.

Patrolmen C. L. Wallace and Don Avcock found nothing to indicate foul play, according to Police Chief Jim Conner. Deputy sheriff Jim Bowers also assisted with the investigation.

Daniels had a fresh skinned spot on his forehead, probably from falling, Conner reported.

One of the persons questioned by the police. Raymond A Smith, was partially able to shed light on the death

Carlier in the evening, Smith, who lived in one of the Russell Apartments, and the deceased were watsching television in Smith's apartment. Daniel left for the apartment house.

Sometime later Smith found Daniels lying in the hallway of the apartment house

Smith later reported the death to an unidentified person who notified the cab company employe.

Smith was taken into custody by investigating officers and charged with intoxication

Daniels' body is at the Duenkel-Carmichael Funeral Home where funeral arrangements still were pending today.

"may deem appropriate." Is this America? Thoughful citizens will ask that question and wonder what has happened to this republic in the light of this presidential action that can only be described as dictatorial.

The edict is sweeping in nature. It threatens every builder or anyone financially associated with a builder who does not wish to sell property to anyone who applies. The caution with which some segments of the home-building industry have greeted the presidential edict is evidence that it has resulted in what Mr. Kennedy wanted - namely fear. It is a tragic and ugly thing that one man should be able to

usurp the law of the land, to act as imperial legislator as well as chief executive. Senator John Stennis of Mississippi rightly describes the edict as "audacious usurpation of power." Senator A. Willis Robertson of Virginia has correctly called it "unconstitutional.'

The effect of the edict will be sweeping. It is estimated that a quarter of all new home construction in the United States

## Khrushchev May Soon **Reveal** Counter-Moves By ED DELANEY

**TRUTH FORUM** 

Nikita Khrushchev's counter move to regain the prestige he lost when forced to withdraw from Cuba may soon be revealed in Berlin. It is announced he will visit East Berlin the middle of January, presumably for a rally of Communist Party minions. More than likely it will be to lay plans for a squeeze play on West Berlin. There are many reasons for Khrushchev's worry over the situation there. Despite the almost impenetrable Wall of Hate

through Berlin and some 40,000 miles of first, second and third rows of barbed wire barriers strung from the Baltic Sea to the borders of Czechoslovakia, no few escape from that vast prison, to the freedom of the West, Word of this reaches the others behind the barriers and is heartening to them. The detestation of the communist regime in the Soviet zone is mounting. Their inhumanity was again displayed at the Christmas season. Efforts were made to permit some 2,000 children in the Soviet zone to be reunited with their parents who had escaped into West Germany. The pleadings of the parents and the West German authorities were rejected. Most of these children were left with relatives in the East zone when their parents fled to the West. They ran the hazard of losing their own lives but did not wish to expose small children to the same danger. They hoped that, eventually, their families could be reunited. But the communist officials

made it clear that the children may be regarded as hostages. They may be ransomed by the parents only when they return and face penalties for what the communists regard as illegal departure from their prison. Should they return they would swell the small army of political prisoners now working in various capacities for the Red regime. Within the past few days several more of the communist border police, in full uniform, escaped to the West. Several civil-

is annoying to the communist chieftains. But economic problems are now adding to Khrushchev's alarm over the East German situation. Years ago, cameras, optical goods, precision instruments and other articles were made in what is now the Soviet zone. That brought revenue in the way of foreign currency. But that is ended. Many foreign buyers will not now accept communist made goods. Moreover the articles that are presently being made there, many at least, are of such poor quality that even the East German authorities in charge of exports, refuse to permit them to be shipped abroad. That situation is the direct result of 17 years of communist blight. During those years some 3 million people escaped to the







Within the Constitution. one section sanctions the participation of the state in corporate and other business activities in competition with private enterprise. Despite the fact of the present governor being a former business man, he has shown no hesitancy in making state government more and more intrusive. The fact that he just won reelection and is now serving his third term indicates the degree to which he has succumbed to the urge for power over his fellow men.

Taxes are relatively low because this particular area is not developed. The usual motley crew of planners are busily working behind the scenes to involve themselves with every facet of living, even the leisure time planning boys are looking over the

Because government is 25 miles away and comparitively small, it is easy to pretend it doesn't exist. We do what we must do as law - abiding citizens and then boycott government, government employes and politicians politically, socially and personaly. We can do this more easily here because this has never been formalized community and here is no village government or rustees, no mayor or council. This is not Utopia. We were not looking for Utopia but for a place where taxes were low and government inconspicuous. Our goal was a condition in which we might be able to get by with an untaxable income and in this particular area it would not be easy to earn a taxable income I do not urge others to move to Arizona or to any other state. I cannot imagine a circumstance which might cause me to want to become involved with a corporation for profit in this state. We would like this ghost town even better if we had it all to our selves.
