
Nuclear reactor, left, crew quarters, center, research vehicle, right, could form nucleus of undersea community.







They view the increase in population in their states and immediately build plans to increase the looting and snooping from which the families have fled. In a matter of just one or two years, the new families get ready to move again. To put it another way, a good many solid citizens have become less solid and they have acquired an unusual wariness. When they see the signs of increasing taxes, more gasoline taxes, higher taxes on their smoking materials, more taxes for government owned and controlled schools, they just don't bother to tell the governor or the Legislators or the officials of the county or city or town, they just pick up their possessions and move. You can save some trouble by obtaining all the information you can about any area into which

you plan to move-first. Good luck and good health to you, in Freedom.



### Television In Review

United Press International HOLLYWOOD (UPI) - It's a sad thing to see a favorite star become outdated and a relic before one's eyes, and Monday night's CBS-TV special, Arthur Channel 7 Godfrey Loves Animals, is a case in point.

Once upon a time, Godfrey held such enormous sway that it was his voice and Edward R. Murrow's which were assigned the privilege of telling us on radio about an enemy attack, in case one came. Their voices were the best-known in the country.

For years, professional intellectuals needled Godfrey as being primarily a salesman, and the best one, on the air. 


