## No Letup Expected For Next 48 Hours

Pampa was in the griup of winter's worst cold wave today and forecasters said there is no letup in sight for the next

The mercury hit 2 below zero for a low in Pampa at 10 this morning and the outlook for tonight is zero to 5 below after a high of around 8 to 10 above this afternoon. The icy blast brought with it some snow which whirled

to 35-mile per hour north winds. The forecast for tonight and tomorrow indicated the possibility that Pampa and the Top O' Texas area could get a one to two-inch snowfall by tomorrow morning.

The cold wave cut down on the number of shoppers in the downtown area. Walking for more than a block or two was an arduous task as pedestrians bucked the wind and zero temperature.

#### Proves Self-Government Does Work Every Day By GEORGE BOARDMAN, Ph. D.

PRIVATE ENTERPRISE

Those who fight for their own slavery, the millions who persist on hanging on to government apron strings, rarely fail to state a case which is based upon nothing but superstition. "Because of the evil nature of man he must be controlled by government. Self - government just will not work." Of course, the initial error in this line of thinking implies that a man who becomes but a god. Nothing could be further from the truth. Man, as a ruler, does not become more than a man but a great deal less. Men, usurping imaginatively a state of omnipotence, becomes a tyrant. But look at the examples of self government all around you.

to go into the grocery business, he formed a self-governing body of one. He decided when his grocery store would be open for business and when it would be closed. He decided upon prices for his goods and rules for credit, for cashing checks, for not cas' ing checks. As an individualist, Mr. Jump decided to buck the trend for self-service and cash and carry. He decided to provide service, to accept telephoned orders and to deliver groceries to his clients. Mr. Jump also made decisions

When James P. Jump decided

about holidays and vacations and various wholesale suppliers. His private life was adjusted in consideration of his business life, As a small, private enterprise retail merchant, Mr. Jump decided to operate their small business without additional employes but Mrs. Jump willingly agreed to the terms of her partnership with her husband and she became an integral part of a small self - governing entity. She understood the rules of self-government and agreed to them on a voluntary basis.

True, formal government intrudes into the private life of every small business but government does not create such enterprises. Except for government intrusion, private enterprise endeavors are, in fact, classic examples of self - government at

Tyrannical government, of course, has intruded into the private lives of private business to a ridiculous degree and this is forever the way of tyrants. In some instances government controls prices, the hours during which a business may operate and generally makes a complete nuisance of itself. Until government is stopped cold it will continue to exert more and more control upon business of every kind because government's intolerable lust for power is unthink-ing and unwavering.

When government - and alalways remember that government is composed of men - sees business in a self-governing, selfrespecting and self-responsible manner, a vast hostility gathers force. How dare individuals be decent, self governing human beings without control of government? Government cannot stand competition and it will not. It goes into action, making laws and rules for the operation of business activities which came into being through the individual efforts of basically self-responsible men and women. In return for this rape of individualism, government also levies taxes, creates control and licensing bureaus and screams that business must suffer confiscatory taxation because of the services demanded by business, when busi-


