3. By printing press money. This practice is used when the 2A politicians spend more than they take in in taxes. When the federal government spends from four or more billions of dollars than it receives, it issues bonds 5 which are largely sold to banks, which issue paper money for them. This increases the amount of money in circulation. The economic laws then take over. Since there is no increase in production to balance off the production to balance of the productio circulation, there is more money bidding for products and services, thus increasing prices.




