## Train Explodes, Residents Are Evacuated From Nearby Town

EL DORADO, Ark. (UPI) — A train carrying highly volatile chemicals rammed a gasoline truck and burst into flames today at nearby Norphlet. Police began evacuating the 1,200 town residents and specialized chemical firefighters rushed to the scene.

First reports said at least three persons were injured.

A Missouri Pacific Railroad spokesman said there was no indication how long the tiny Arkansas town would be imperiled by a burning carload of volatile ammonium nitrate fertilizer on the train.

The El Dorado fire department and special chemical fire fighting units from Monsanto Chemical Co. and American Oil Co. sped to Norphlet, eight miles north of El Dorado.

Highly Explosive  
Ammonium nitrate was the cargo aboard the SS Grandcamp when it exploded in the harbor at Texas City in 1947, killing 312 persons and injuring 3,000.

Mrs. George B. Huckabee, who lives one-half block from the collision point, said, "I heard that train wreck all right. I thought it was a tornado hitting us. I ran outside to see what happened.

"It looked awful to me. The train and the truck were burning a fire a city block long. It wasn't long until they issued a call for everyone to evacuate, to get out."

## U.S. May Know Soviet Plans By Spring, JFK Says

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy says it should be apparent by springtime whether Russia is willing to agree to a nuclear test ban.

But the President told newsmen Thursday it would be an error to try to set a deadline for progress in the negotiations.

At his news conference Kennedy touched on a wide range of subjects, from the New York newspaper strike to the attack on a U.S. shrimp boat by Cuban fighter planes.

Kennedy said he "would hope that we would have progress by April 1st" toward a test ban treaty.

He said "by springtime we should know whether the Soviet Union is willing to make those arrangements necessary for a test ban. But Kennedy added, "I wouldn't put down the date any say by this date we will know finally."

Keep At It  
The issue is so critical, Kennedy said, that "we are going to keep at it if not by April 1st, beyond April 1st."

"I think people who attack the effort should keep in mind always that the alternative is the spread of these weapons to governments which may be irresponsible or which by accident may initiate a general nuclear conflagration."

Kennedy, at his news conference said: "He had ordered the Defense Department to move against any Cuban ship or plane attacking any American vessel or aircraft."

—The New York newspaper strike has "passed the point of public tolerance." He sharply criticized union leader Bertram Powers and suggested both sides should submit their differences to "independent determination of some kind."

## Morton Talks Against "Alcof" Government

ATHENS, Ga. (UPI) — Sen. Thurston B. Morton, R.-Ky., warned Thursday against a "government of the Kennedys, by the Kennedys, and for the Kennedys."

Morton said the United States cannot abandon its goal of government by the people for an all-powerful executive branch.

In a speech to the Georgia Press Institute, Morton warned the executive machine was making news and legislation obsolete and "fully automated."

"The presidency is fast becoming a party unto itself," he said, "aloof, alone, lordly, and disdainful of the individual."

"Rule by machine has been a disgrace in some of our major cities," he said. "But rule by machine is becoming a crisis in our capital."

—He is opposed to the 35-hour week even if it is negotiated by collective bargaining.

—Most of the public opinion polls taken abroad of U.S. prestige can and will be released. But there are some which involve personalities and policies of other countries and their release might cause "diplomatic embarrassment."

## Parking Problem Solution Sought

## Protests "Flagrant" Violation Of Law

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The United States disclosed today it has demanded a "prompt and unequivocal explanation" from the Cuban government of the Wednesday attack by Soviet-built MIG fighters on a disabled American shrimp boat in the Florida straits.

The State Department released the text of a note delivered to Premier Fidel Castro's government protesting in strong terms "this flagrant and deliberate violation of international law."

The note was delivered by the Swiss embassy in Havana, which has handled U.S. affairs in Cuba since the breakdown of relations between the two countries two years ago.

Military officials considered courses of action to carry out an order by President Kennedy to make swifter moves to protect U.S. lives and property in the event of another attack of this sort.

"A Cuban radio broadcast monitored in Miami Thursday night charged the United States had 'invented' the MIG attack to cover up sorries against Cuban shipping by anti-Castro exiles in this country."

The President told his news conference Thursday that the Defense Department had been ordered to make any necessary revisions in standing orders to insure action against any attacking craft.

He declined to say whether this would involve adoption of the doctrine of "hot pursuit," in which Cuban aircraft would be chased back to their home bases under U.S. gunfire.

## USSR Vetoes Negotiations For Big Three

GENEVA (UPI) — The Soviet Union today vetoed Big Three nuclear test ban negotiations and insisted the issue must be thrashed out by the entire 17-nation disarmament conference.

Soviet delegate Vassili V. Kuznetsov said the Kremlin, despite Western and neutral appeals for Big Three talks, wants the test ban issue handled along with the entire subject of general and complete disarmament.

Western diplomats said the Soviet move crippled prospects for serious nuclear negotiations soon and obviously dampened President Kennedy's hopes for progress to a nuclear treaty by April 1.

Kuznetsov reaffirmed the Soviet stand that it will allow no more than three annual on-site inspections of its territory to police a test ban. This is five to seven less than the West insists are necessary to make a policing system foolproof.

Blunt Warnings  
"Those who ask too high a price may end up losing everything altogether," Kuznetsov told the conference.

Western diplomats interpreted Kuznetsov's statement as a warning that unless the West accepts the Kremlin's terms, the Russians might "draw their 'concession' for any on-site inspections at all."

It was only recently that the Russians relented on their total opposition to on-site inspections and agreed to permit two or three a year.

Western and neutral delegates have been pressing the Russians to discuss the inspections issue and other related items in the nuclear subcommittee, consisting of the Soviet Union, Britain and the United States. But the Russians, who broke off nuclear talks in Washington Jan. 31, have refused.

## Soviets Warn U.S. On Cuba

MOSCOW (UPI) — The Soviet Union warned the United States today that any attack on Cuba would start World War III.

Defense Minister Marshal Rodion Malinovsky made the threat in a strongly worded speech marking the 40th anniversary of the Soviet armed forces.

"We want to admonish the aggressive circles," he said, "that an attack on the Cuban republic would mark the beginning of a third world war."

He said that in the event of any such attack, the Soviet Union would be in the forefront of those to help Cuba.

One-Hour War  
"It is impossible to intimidate us," he said. "We have the power to burn up the aggressors in the first hour of attack."

He also charged that American submarines were menacing Soviet ships in the Caribbean.

## Congress Tables Medicare Program

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Congress today consigned to a quiet pigeonhole President Kennedy's new medicare program which would boost Social Security taxes above \$200 a year for every worker earning \$100 a week or more.

The controversial plan will not be pulled out for many months. The House Ways & Means Committee may dust the legislation off for public hearings next summer. But the showdown vote probably will be put off until next year.

The program, outlined by Kennedy in a special message Thursday, would raise Social Security and railroad retirement taxes to finance hospitalization and nursing home benefits for 35 million persons 65 and older, starting Jan. 1, 1965.

The same benefits would be provided for 2.5 million other elderly persons not covered by Social Security and railroad retirement. Their coverage would be paid for by the U.S. Treasury.

When the battle finally is joined in Congress the outcome will depend on how individual members of the House judge the strength of the sentiment, pro and con, among the voters back home.

For many months, the struggle will be fought outside Congress. The White House and the AFL-CIO, spearhead of the supporters, and the American Medical Association, leader of the opposition, will intensify their efforts to influence "grass roots" sentiment.

The conservative-tipped Ways & Means Committee has served as the burial ground for similar proposals for the last six years. But the committee membership was liberalized last month.

As a result, Kennedy aides now are confident that when — and if — they can demonstrate that a majority of the House will support some version of the legislation, the committee will clear it for a vote.

## Former Mayor Of White Deer Dies In Pampa

Funeral services for B. R. Weeks of White Deer are planned for 2 p.m. Saturday in the First Presbyterian Church in White Deer with the Rev. Edgar Hubbard, pastor, officiating.

Mr. Weeks, former mayor of White Deer from 1948 to 1950, died at 3:45 p.m. Thursday in Highland General Hospital, where he had been a patient for nine months.

He was born April 24, 1908 in Wingo, Ky., and moved to White Deer in 1928 from Elk City, Okla.

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Press coverage of White House social events was "in abeyance" today as a result of a brief uproar that elicited charges of snobbery from a Republican congressman.

It all began when the White House announced a clampdown on coverage of presidential social events. A few hours later the statement was reversed and the matter left open.

But in the meantime, Rep. Abner W. Sibal, R-Conn., became irate.

"The Kennedys are not the owners of the White House," he said. "They just have a four-year lease. The American people own it and are interested in who is being wined and dined there by the First Family."

"This is 1600 Pennsylvania Avenue, not Buckingham Palace. There is no place in America for a royal family. The White House is not a private residence—it is the center of social entertainment for the entire nation... a shrine that belongs to all of us."

Pamela Turnure, Mrs. Kennedy's press secretary, first announced that there would be "limited" press coverage of a Kennedy reception for the diplomatic corps Thursday.

The limitation applied to the practice of allowing reporters to mingle with guests. Miss Turnure said it was felt the reporters interfered with the guests' freedom to meet the Kennedys. She said newsmen would not be allowed to mingle.

But later she said she checked with Press Secretary Pierre Salinger and learned she had "misinterpreted" the situation. She said the position of the White House was that the matter was in "abeyance" and "no final decision has been made on press coverage for the diplomatic reception."

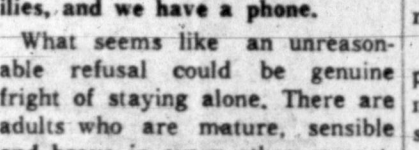

# Safety Program Features Racing

Don Freeland of Torrance, Calif., an eight-time competitor in the Indianapolis 500-mile speedway classic, will be in Pampa Monday afternoon as a feature of the award-winning Champion Highway Safety Program.

The program is making its fourth appearance in the Southwest with one of the stops at 1:15 p.m. Monday at Pampa Junior High School under sponsorship of the Dixie Parts & Supply Co., 417 S. Cuyler.

Freeland made several attempts to qualify a car for the 1962 Indianapolis 500, however, he was unsuccessful. In three of his eight previous appearances Freeland finished among the first ten. He has also ranked in the top ten of the national standings three times. His driving skill has earned

him membership in the world's most exclusive club, the Champion 100 Mile-An-Hour Club, reserved for those drivers who complete the 500 miles without relief at an average speed of more than 100 miles an hour.

Freeland is one of eight nationally-known race drivers presenting the Champion Highway Safety Program. It was launched in 1954 with only one driver, however, success was immediate and the number of requests for the program made it necessary to add more driver-lecturers.

Twice, the National Safety Council has presented its coveted Public Service Award to the Champion Spark Plug Company for developing and maintaining the program. Other recognition has come from the Public Relations Society of America and the United States Auto Club.

Commenting editorially, the Saturday Evening Post said, "The only trouble with this program is that these missionaries can't possibly cover more than a minority of the thousands of secondary schools that need them."

Mr. Freeland will point out in his appearance here that if drivers on our nation's highways used the same degree of courtesy and alertness as race drivers and if they would keep their car in good mechanical condition, the nation's highway fatality list could be cut considerably.

Drawing from experiences gained in 16 years of automobile racing, Mr. Freeland makes interesting comparisons between race track and highway driving, dramatically establishing the fact that excessive speed requires skill and controlled conditions such as exist only at race tracks.

## Hospital Official Appeals To Public To Aid In Problem

The administrator of Highland General Hospital today issued an appeal to the public asking for aid in solving a growing problem at the institution:

B. W. Robertson, the administrator, stated that the hospital is filled to capacity with patients and hospital workers, nurses, doctors, etc., are having difficulties with well-meaning visitors who call on patients at all hours of the day or night.

"It has reached the point," Robertson said today, "where we must ask the public to visit the hospital only during regular visiting hours."

These hours are from 2 to 4 p.m. and 7 to 8:30 p.m. daily for visiting general patients and from 3 to 4 p.m. and 7 to 8 p.m. daily in the maternity ward.

Robertson said that there is a two-fold reason for asking the public to observe the visiting hours. These include a health precaution because of the nature of current diseases which could spread to susceptible persons and also because of the hampering of service to patients."

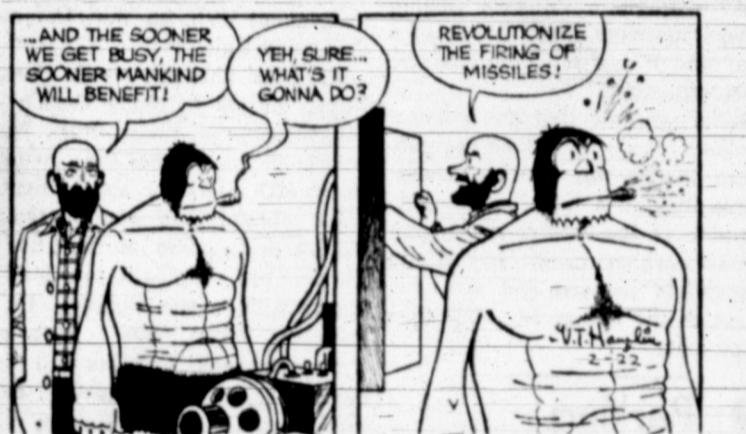
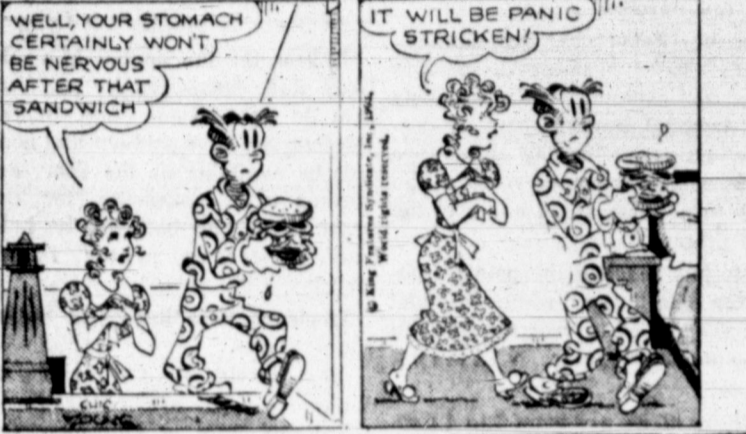

## Foreign News Commentary

"Maghreb" is a general geographic term which covers Arab North Africa from Egypt to the Atlantic and includes the countries of Libya, Tunisia, Algeria and Morocco.

At the peak of Moslem power in Africa and Europe, it also included Spain.

Politically, it generally is limited to Tunisia, Algeria and Morocco, and the idea of a united Maghreb has been pressed more or less enthusiastically since both Morocco and Tunisia became independent of France in 1955.

With the advent of Algerian independence last year, the idea took on new impetus, presumably with French support as part of President Charles de Gaulle's grand design for Africa.

### Common Interests

It would link the three in a federation held together by close association with France, and by geography, by a common religion, by common economic problems and a common interest in the Sahara.

Most enthusiastic promoter of a united Maghreb was the late Sultan Mohammed V of Morocco, who began talking it up in 1957. The sultan saw himself as a force between East and West, had no great love for Egypt's Nasser and feared Soviet penetration into Algeria.

It is the sultan's son, King Hassan II, who this week played host to a unity conference in Rabat among the foreign ministers of Tunisia, Algeria and Morocco.

But since the Arab world never has been noted for unity and Arab politics seldom are tranquil, the conference actually came down to one of differences.

### Causes for Dispute

Of recent vintage and still just below the surface was the bitter quarrel touched off by Tunisian charges that Algerian Premier Ahmed Ben Bella supported a December assassination plot against President Bourguiba.

There also were Moroccan resentment against Tunisian recognition of the independence of Mauritania and Morocco's claims against Algeria in the Sahara.

Morocco particularly has its eye on Tindouf, which it claims France artificially absorbed into Algeria. Tindouf is a oasis of a thousand date palms and a few thousand permanent residents.

Its importance rests in the fact that it is on strategic Saharan air and caravan routes and is close to one of the largest iron ore deposits in the world at Gara Djebilet. Preliminary surveys showed the deposits to contain more than two billion tons of ore.

## Wall Street In Review

NEW YORK (UPI) — With as many people as pessimistic as they are now, it is difficult to visualize an important decline just yet, says James Dines & Co., Inc.

Although massive overhead supply similarly militates against a rapid advance, odds favor the eventual upside. Never forget the basic axiom that percentages always favor continuation of a trend in motion, until that trend is clearly reversed. Don't fret about being caught in another crash, Dines says, because properly placed stops will get you out in time at minimal cost.

According to International Statistical Bureau, Inc., the outlook for the aerospace industry for 1963 is most favorable. Sales and earnings will continue to gain, although margins will not show any substantial gain from the 2-3 per cent presently recorded. Dividends, which were increased slowly in 1962, may show some significant betterment this year.

Harris, Upham & Co. believes the market is trying hard to discover its path of least resistance. A hopefully bullish attitude is retained by most market traders but, in view of the extent of gains seen since October, many are also putting in stop-loss protection.

Kenneth Ward of Hayden Stone & Co. draws several conclusions from the current market. He says a minor top appears to be forming between 680-700 in the industrial average, a temporary reversal limited to 4 or 5 per cent would be normal, but regardless of any weakness on the Dow averages, many individual issues remain in position to reach new highs.

## RESTFULNESS

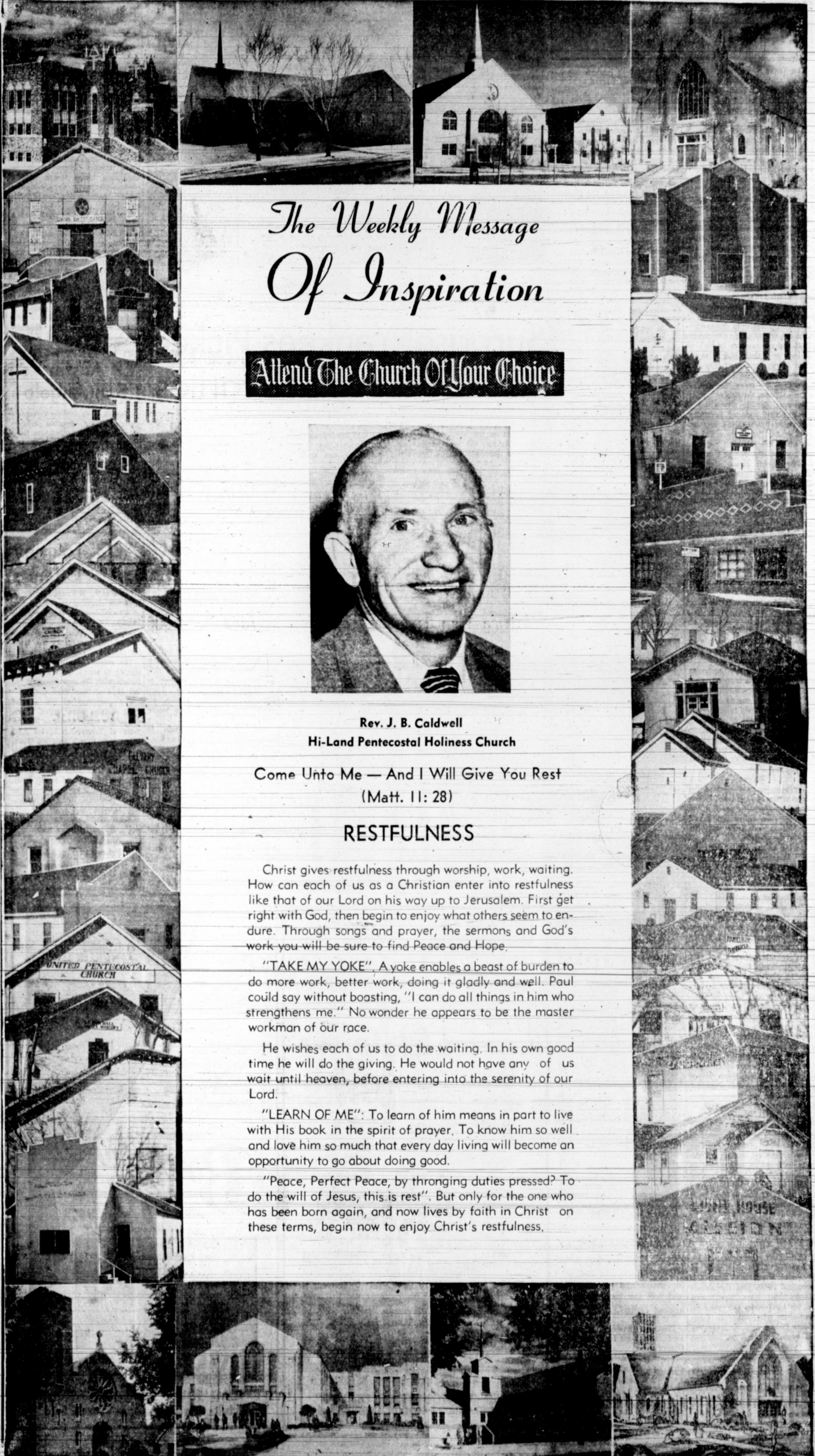

## Sporting Sidelines

The Texas Sportswriters' Association All-State ballot which we received in the mail yesterday, had the most left-handed recommendation of a Pampa player we have ever seen.

A little preliminary explanation on the TSA ballot. In order to compile an All-State team, the TSA selects one man as state chairman for each sport. In basketball, it was Sam Payne of Odessa. Sam in turn, then appoints a chairman for each district in the state, sometimes co-chairmen for large-sized or widely spread districts.

The chairmen then select the boys they think are worthy of an All-State nomination, gather statistics, recommendations of other coaches, college scouts, etc., and their own impressions.

Each district then sends their nominations to Odessa, where Sam compiles the whole thing and sends it back for the chairmen to vote upon. Sometimes the nominations are quite lengthy and detailed if the sportswriter is high on his boys or if there is a lot to say about them; sometimes they are fairly brief. But in almost every case, they are complimentary.

**Down On Kreis**  
However, for the first time I saw one that was not yesterday, concerning Wayne Kreis of Pampa. I quote: "A controversial figure. Here are pros and cons: he was nominated by Dana Campbell of Fort Worth Press. Campbell calls Kreis the best boy he had seen this year and statistics show that he led 3-A in scoring with a 19.3 average (editor's note: Kreis averaged 19.9 in district play and over 20 per game for the season). But 3-A-AAA committee men Bob St. John of Lubbock and Leo Dromgoole of Amarillo do not second the nomination. St. John conducted a poll of 3-A-AAA coaches and none mentioned Kreis as one of league's top two boys. Also, Terry Culley, his own coach is reportedly not too high on this boy and despite his high scoring he failed to make All-District team. Those are facts, you pay your money and you take your choice." End quote.

Rather surprised, we contacted coach Culley, who branded the whole thing as completely untruthful. "First of all, anyone who says I am down on Kreis is crazy... I think Wayne is one of the finest boys I have ever coached. He has always given 100 per cent and I think very highly of him. He is definitely good enough to make the All-State team."

**Untrue**  
"As far as no coach naming him as one of the two top boys. I don't know about the other coaches, but when St. John called me, I said that Matsen and Kreis were the best in the district. "As far as the All-District team goes, Dromgoole named him to first team all-district in his poll, and the Pampa News, Plainview and Lubbock all had him as either first or second team. "The whole story is completely untrue. I know that some sportswriters or coaches may have gotten the impression that Wayne was not a team man because he scored so much, but... not only did he average 16.4 as a junior when he made second team all-district, and 19.9 this year, he also led the team both years in shooting percentage and in assists! If that isn't team play, what is? Naturally, when you have a boy that hits over 70 per cent of his shots, you are going to feed him the ball, but when the boy also leads in assists, it shows pretty clearly that he is a team man. When Wayne is off or is being double-teamed, he will deliberately pass up scoring chances to feed a teammate."

**Team Player**  
"He is also a fine defensive player. If you will note, we won the Plainview game not on Wayne's shooting, but on his defense, ballhawking and setting up fast breaks" for his teammates. Anyone who says that I do not think highly of him or that he is not a team player is completely incorrect!"

We then called Sam Payne, who

stated that both 3-A-AAA committeemen had not wanted to second his nomination, that they did not even want him on the ballot, and if he had to be put on, they wanted their side of the story on it as well. (There only seemed to be one side!) Payne also said he had gotten no statistics except from picking them up from the Lubbock paper.

I was unable to reach Bob St. John, but contacted Leo Dromgoole. Leo said that most of the bad impressions received about Kreis and about his not getting along with his team and his coach had been passed on second-hand. However, Leo stated that he had sent a set of statistics on Kreis in that he had chosen him on his All-District team, and could be quoted as saying: "I did not nominate Kreis because I knew Dana Campbell had already done so. However, I definitely picked him on my All-District team which he would deserve just on his shooting alone. I do feel that he deserves All-State recognition and I will probably vote for him."

Something is real rotten, if not in Denmark, in the Panhandle anyway. I am afraid that this negative report on Kreis will definitely hamper his chances of making the honor squad, but one thing is for sure, he is getting my vote!

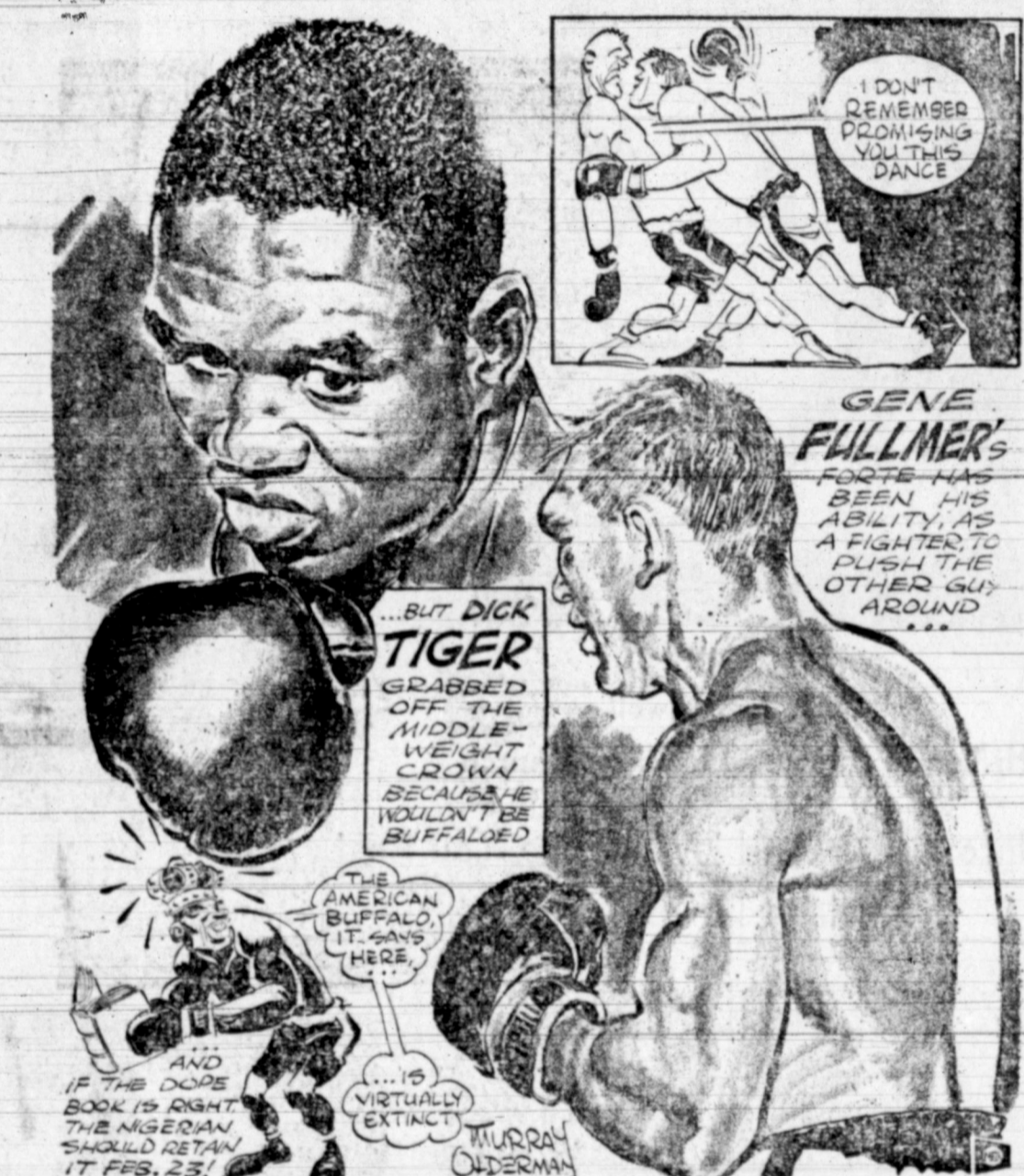

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# Fullmer In Top Form For Tiger

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (UPI)—Gene Fullmer will be in the finest condition of his life, both physically and mentally, for his return bout with world middleweight champion Dick Tiger Saturday night.

Fullmer said today that this bout rates as the most important of his career. He lost his crown to Tiger, the bruising Nigerian, in a San Francisco bout last October.

"I've repeatedly said that I'll retire if I fail to regain the title," said Fullmer. "And I have no intention of retiring. So that means I've just got to win."

It was disclosed Thursday that Fullmer was suffering seriously from dysentery at the time of his defeat—a bout in which he was rocked and socked all over the ring and rarely hit back.

Odds dropped slightly to 3-1 favoring Tiger after manager Marv Jensen confirmed the story that Fullmer had had the dysentery before the bout, still had stomach cramps just before he went into the ring and that he was weak as a kitten during the battle.

In the other camp, Tiger's handlers are just a little concerned about their charge. He has worked 95 rounds of conditioning. But after his final workout, trainer Jimmy August opined the battler "didn't look quite as sharp" as he had hoped.

Both battlers took things easy today, undergoing examinations by a doctor from the state athletic commission.

Saturday morning they will weigh in at the Convention Center and neither man expects any trouble making the 160-pound limit.

**OFFERS RAINIER CASINO TO HOLD CONFERENCE**

LONDON (UPI) — Greek ship magnate Aristotle Onassis has offered his controlling interest in the gambling casino at Monte Carlo to Prince Rainier of Monaco, the Daily Express said today.
