Hopes Dimmed For Early Settlement

United Press International GENEVA (UPI) - Top Soviet negotiator Vassili V. Kuzentsov left the Geneva disarmament conference Saturday, apparently for good, on the eve of the return from Washington of the U.S. delegation chief, William C. Foster.

Diplomats said the departure for Moscow of Kuznetsov, first deputy Soviet foreign minister, dimmed hopes for early progress on a nuclear test ban treaty.

Kuznetsov's departure obviously caught other delegations unaware. There had been Lloyd Simpson no signs the U.S. or British delegations had been told of his plans Not To Run by the Soviets.

No Comment The Soviet troubleshooter declined to make any comment before his airliner left for Moscow via Paris, less than 24 hours before the scheduled return of Foster, who had been reporting to President Kennedy in Washington on the Soviet-stalled negotiations

If they are definitely getting larger see your doctor again. If not, your son should try to ignore them. Q - I have read that extreme nervous tension can cause many physical ailments. Could it cause anemia?

A - The answer is "no" but severe anemia can lead to serious changes in the nerves themselv-

Q-I am 68 years old and don't eat much. I feel full all the time. What causes this?

A-Poor appetite may be caused by many things, some serious and some not so serious. Chronic diseases of the kidneys or heart, tuberculosis and cancer are among the causes for which a thorough examination and early treatment are essential.

Excessive use of alcohol or tobacco has ruined many an otherwise serviceable appetite. Some aging persons, especially if their teeth are poor or if they live alone and have to cook their own meals, just seem to get tired of eating. In any case a thorough physical check-up should be the first step toward solving your problem.






