

## Foreign News Commentary

By PHIL NEWSOM UPI Foreign News Analyst In Washington, President Johnson in his inaugural address clearly restated the United States position on Southeast Asia, and in many respects it was a grim one.

The United States, he said, never again could stand in prideful isolation. And he add-

"If American lives must end and American treasure be spilled in countries that we barely know, then that is the price change has demanded of conviction of our enduring cov-

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Both in South Viet Nam and in neighboring Laos it was apparent that some new decisions expressing this determination already had been made.

There also were dangerous uncertainties and obvious differences of opinion.

It was equally clear that positions were hardening, which, if they were to follow their natural course seemed to point beyond the borders of South Viet Nam and Laos.

Militarily, from bases in South Viet Nam, Thailand and from aircraft carriers, U.S. warplanes were hitting supply lines through which the Communist North Vietnamese were feeding their Viet Cong allies in South Viet Nam.

Some of these U.S. planes were being shot down. It was apparent that as the U.S. had added more sophisticated weaponry against the Communists, the Communists also from somewhere had obtained antiaircraft defenses which also were more sophisticated.

It was apparent also that the last pretense had been abandoned of maintaining the 1962 Geneva accord which gave neutrality to Laos and barred the introduction of outside forces.

For the United States, the decision which led to the stepped up raids was both diplomatic

Diplomatically it recognized what long had been known as a fact-that the Communist forces North Viet Nam pever had ceased their aid to the Communist-led Pathet Lao of Laos and never had pulled their forces out of Laos, in accordance with the Geneva agreement.

Militarily, if progress was to be made against the increasingly aggressive Viet Cong in South Viet Nam, something had to be done to cut their supply lines through Laos and Cam-

bodia. Uncertainties arose from conditions both inside and out of the immediate areas of conflict, aside from doubts about the stability of the South Vietnamese government itself.

In Washington, Sen. Wayne Morse of Oregon, most vocal critic of the administration's Southeast Asia policy, attacked the U.S. air raids as reverting to "law of the jungle," inviting a massive war.

There were other problems. Among them was how the conflict was to be reported to the U.S. public. U.S. newsmen assigned to the area long have been dissatisfied under conditions which reported defeats as victories and which banned them from eyewitness accounts of events bearing heavily on progress of the conflict and the .S. involvement in it.

Part of these differences arose from the advisory role of the U.S. forces involved and the national sensibilities of both the Laotian and the Vietnamese governments.

It was necessary, of course, that security be guarded. But it also was important that the U.S. public be forewarned if it was to be drawn into a larger conflict.

Also among the uncertainties and among the most important of all was the final position to be taken by the Red Chinese and by the Soviet Union, their nominal ally. Theirs really was the final decision as to the final scope of the conflict.

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
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## Former Pampan Crowned AASP Rodeo Queen

Reviewing the history of political turmoil and a succession of governments over several years, Bundy said, "The political situation today is critical, and its resolution is central to turning the war around and restoring an independent and secure South Viet Nam.


