> The Postmaster listed these points of particular concern: 1. Approaches to rural mail boxes must be kept open by

2. Obstructions to delivery of mail on rural routes should be

removed or minimized to the fullest extent possible. Where rural boxes pose a problem, the carrier may leave form 4056 "Your Mailbox Needs Attention," a notice to keep box approaches clear by promptly removing all obstructions, including snow, which may make delivery difficult or impossible.

Unless approaches are cleared it may be necessary to temporarily withhold delivery of mail, the Postmaster pointed out,

Rural carriers are not required to perform service on foot when roads cannot be traveled with the vehicles normally used, but they are expected to make every reasonable effort to serve as many of their patrons as possible without physicial exertion or added financial cost, he explained.

If excessive detours are necessary to effect delivery of mail, customers should temporarily relocate their boxes on the new line of travel, arrange to receive their mail through other patrons boxes, or make other arrangements for their mail until travel on the road affected can be resumed.





Wall Street In Review

NEW YORK (UPI) - Wright Investors' Service believes the last stage of the great bull market of 1963-64 was signaled in November 1964 when the Federal Reserve Board raised the discount rate to its highest level since 1959.

The firm says that although the move was made to restrain the outflow of U. S. gold, the effect will "inescapably be to limit any further advance in stock prices. However, it does not expect a major bear market to begin until late spring and possibly not until October-

Bache & Co. believes that the numerous uncertainties overhanging the market will lead to a see-saw action in the months ahead and stresses that selectivity is highly important at this time.

Edward F. Underwood of Mitchum, Jones & Templeton Inc. says that despite all the pronouncements that the British pound will recover and the monetary situation is sound, he would continue to buy gold stocks on minor weakness.

... (Ezekiel 36:26) " A new heart also will I give you, and a new spirit will I put within you; and I will take away the stony heart out of your flesh, and I will give you an heart of flesh."

... If you should ask a man what his greatest need is, many times the answer would be money. Another may say good health, long life, a good education; and various other things may be listed as man's greatest need. 




