

Wall Street In Review

NEW YORK (UPI) — E. F. Hutton & Co. says it would appear that some pause in the new year stock market advance is now more than overdue and that some allowance should be made at this time for a consolidation of the recent market rise.

Noting that some of the most active stocks have tended to close lower in recent sessions, the brokerage house says this would seem to suggest that selling pressure is on the rise.

Bache & Co. writes that the market appears poised to scale the 900 level and beyond in the Dow-Jones industrials. Bache says that the stock market should be given a lift by the President's budget message expected to be delivered in about a week. It notes that this statement in the past has had a 'stimulative effect on various areas of the economy.'

Thomson & McKinnon says that new highs for the Dow Jones industrial average can be expected but a broad, extended upswing is not. The Wall Street house says stock prospects do not shape up as uniformly favorable for all major and secondary industry groups.

International Statistical Bureau writes that "across the board purchases of railroad stocks can no longer be suggested." It cites the "impressive" advances made by these issues in 1964. It also says that 1965 earnings of Class 1 carriers 'will do well to equal the estimated 1964 level.'

Clementine Keeping Constant Vigil Beside Stricken Husband

EDITOR'S NOTE: Sir Winston Churchill's wife, Clementine, has maintained an almost constant vigil by his bedside for the past week. The following dispatch, by UPI correspondent Harry Ferguson, examines the pressures which have been brought to bear on Lady Churchill since the great warrior was stricken.

By HARRY FERGUSON United Press International LONDON (UPI) — Somebody once asked Ernest Hemingway to describe the chief attribute of a gentleman, and he replied: "He has grace under pressure."

And so it is with gentlemen, too. And so it is, specifically and particularly, with the lady at No. 28 Hyde Park Gate. Clementine Churchill is a lady with both a small, and a capital "L." She was born the first and she acquired the second when her husband was made a knight of the realm.

In the last week the pressure on Lady Churchill has seemed to be almost unendurable, but always there has been grace in abundance. The door bell rings steadily with messages from the ends of the earth. Members of the family come and go through the day and night. The phone buzzes with calls from important persons. Food must be ordered, cooked and served. She even faced up to the ordeal of making funeral arrangements for a man yet dead.

Serene During Trouble
Through all this tension and trouble Lady Churchill has moved serenely. As she moves from room to room supervising

the housekeeping chores at No. 28 Hyde Park Gate, sorrow walks always beside her. She lives in the dread knowledge that any moment of the day or night there may be a knock at the door and the name of the caller will be death.

The public has seen little of her since Sir Winston was a stricken. Occasionally she leaves the house to go for a brief drive with one of her daughters, and as the car turns out of Hyde Park Gate you can see a dignified, white-haired woman who sometimes manages even a faint smile of greeting to onlookers.

In the first days of Sir Winston's illness Hyde Park Gate was in turmoil as reporters and cameramen assembled to cover a news story of world importance. Sir Winston needed quiet and at this point Lady Churchill displayed grace under pressure. A telephone call to Scotland Yard would have brought platoons of police to clear the street, but that is not the way Lady Churchill does things.

Sends Message
Instead she sent this message to the newsmen: "Lady Churchill expresses her true thanks to members of the press who have shown kindness and restraint. However, she would be most grateful if the press, radio, TV and film representatives would withdraw from Hyde Park Gate."

Reporters and camera men are a hardy breed. Nobody can shove them around when they are on a big story. You can ask them to do something but they are the judges of whether they will comply. There was some electricity in the air as they listened to a reading of Lady Churchill's request. Then a long silence, finally broken by a command from the boss

Backstairs At The Whitehouse

By ALVIN SPIVAK WASHINGTON (UPI)—Backstairs at the White House:

Compared to all the furor that surrounded his lights out campaign last year, President Johnson's war on file cabinets has gotten off to a doubtful start.

If, as the President has forecast, his ban against government purchases of new file drawers saves the taxpayers, "at least \$5 million a year," this will be a far bigger economy boon than the dimming of lights.

The President doesn't seem to have generated much excitement with his Jan. 13 order to all federal departments and agencies to make do with their existing file cabinets—even if it means throwing away old, useless documents.

Some filing clerks in the bureaucracy probably are distressed, but there hasn't been even a peep of a complaint from Congress.

Even the staunchest Republicans have been silent. Last spring, they ridiculed Johnson's attack on electric bills by calling him "Light Bulb Lyndon." But how does one fashion a nickname out of a steel chest of drawers?

Nevertheless, just as "lights out!" was the battle cry in 1964, the new clarion call was sounded when Johnson said: "We declare a moratorium on the purchase of new file cases for use in the fifty states and the District of Columbia."

Dogs Host Pampa

The Pampa Harvesters, with second-round win number one under their belts, go after number two tonight when they visit the up-and-down Borger Bulldogs.

Although the Dogs have shown little this year, Harvester coach Terry Culley warns that Borger will have three goals going for them tonight that should make them very tough indeed. One is the mere fact that they are playing Pampa, another is the homecourt advantage, and the third is that anyone likes to knock off a winner. Add to that a desire for revenge for their 67-44 defeat at the hands of the Harvesters in the first round and it sums up to strong goals for a possible upset.

While Pampa has compiled a 20-3 season record, and shares the first-half crown with a 7-1 mark, winning their first second round game over co-champion Lubbock, Borger has shown little this year, principally due to a lack of height and some hot and cold performances on the part of several players.

Borger is 5-11 on the season and finished low down in the first-half race with a 2-6 district mark. The Bulldogs dropped their second-half opener to Monterey, 57-32, and were beaten by Tascosa Tuesday night, 60-47.

Best of the Bulldogs is 6'4" Jerry Cooper, brother of Frank Phillips cager Ronnie and a standout college prospect. Cooper is the top Big Red rebounder and is averaging 17.1 points per district game.

Showing fine improvement are Borger's two backcourt men, 5-10 Bryan Hanna and 5-11 Pete Loftis. Loftis scored 11 points against Monterey and Hanna, son of coach Tex Hanna and coming along well as a ball-

handler and playmaker, hit 10 against the Rebels.

Sporting Sidelines

THIS YEAR'S sport switches are getting thicker by the minute, with coaches being shifted around like the eight-ball in a billiard parlor. Latest switch has Gene Mayfield of Borger going to Odessa Permian, leaving the Borger job wide open, while Carl Spoonemore left Lubbock to go to Harlingen and Fred Akers left Edinburg, just a few miles away, to move to Lubbock. Burl Bartlett went from Amarillo High to a college post while Warren Harper did the reverse.

MAYFIELD'S MOVE was a rather surprising as the highly-successful Bulldog coach was supposed to have turned down a dozen better offers, including colleges. Borger sports editor John Shields says the only rea-

son he can give is that Odessa is a larger and growing city, while Borger is smaller and its growth is static. Don't know who the new Bulldog coach may be, but he will have a hard time matching Mayfield's great record. A possible candidate might be Norman Phillips, who is a Borger boy originally. Phillips is also believed to be considered for a coaching post in one of the Lubbock schools, and also in the Houston area. A former Shocker said that he hoped that Phillips went South, the thought of facing him across a district rival field was rather frightening.

IN THIS reporter's humble opinion, after many years spent in the Rio Grande Valley as a resident and a sportswriter, "Spoony" is taking on more than even he can handle. I don't think Harlingen will ever have a winning football team again. It was a one-industry town, supported by Harlingen Air Force Base, one of the biggest in the country, which was closed several years ago. While the base was there, Harlingen had consistently good teams, but when the base closed, they lost an irreplaceable number of future players. Also, the rest of the Valley towns are growing by leaps and bounds while Harlingen, minus its chief industry, goes nowhere.

AKERS WILL provide a very tough opponent for district 3-AAAA schools, based on what I saw down there. Edinburg had never had a winning football team 'til he took over and have been consistent winners ever since. Lubbock will be trouble from here on.

OTHER RUMORS fly thick and fast. Sports reporter Ronnie Oler insists that Joe Kerbel will leave West Texas to go with the Denver Broncos. As long as Kerbel leaves, I'll be happy wherever he goes. After the withdrawal of the heart of the Buffalo basketball team this week, one wonders about the prospects of Jimmy Vramontes. The insistence of an area newspaper that four players quitting at the same time was just a coincidence is too much of a coincidence to swallow.

RANDY MATSON will not enter the Lubbock Indoor Track Meet Jan. 30, thanks to the squabble between the AAU and the NCAA. Lubbock used to hold an open meet, but decided to go just with collegians after the two organizations refused to let their athletes compete against each other. Since Randy left Texas A&M to enter the Olympics, and since he does not return to school until Feb. 1, technically the Pampa Giant is under the aegis of the AAU until that date, and the meet officials do not want to get mixed up in the middle of the feud. The withdrawal of Matson, the meet's biggest drawing card, as well as the non-appearance of AAU stars leaves the meet with little of the attraction that it formerly had.

Wichita Shockers Shocked

WICHITA, Kan. (UPI) — A big question mark hung over Wichita's third-ranked basketball team today.

Fans of the Shockers were themselves shocked over the abrupt dismissal Thursday of 6-foot-10 center Nate Bowman and reserve pivot Gerlad Davis. Speculation raged on whether Bowman, a pillar in Wichita's success, and Davis will get back on the team for the second half of the season.

The Shockers are currently 12-2 for the season and 5-0 in the Missouri Valley Conference.

Coach Gary Thompson, who had not yet returned from scouting a high school basketball tournament at nearby McPherson, was not available for comment. "Neither was Bowman and Davis."

Thompson stuck to a statement announcing the two dismissals. He would only say the two "have been dismissed from the squad for failure to meet obligation for the first semester's work."

"Until these obligations have been met they will not be allowed back on the squad."

Austin Drops Pampa Twice

Western Upsets Utah State

United Press International Utah State's basketball Coach Ladell Andersen learned an important thing about college basketball Thursday night — it's not how often you make a shot that counts, it's how many shots you get.

Andersen's Aggies hit an impressive 62 per cent of their shots from the floor but lost to Texas Western 68-62 as they were held to only 39 shots.

The stingy, ball-hawking Miners played an excellent ball control game in achieving victory. They outrebounced the Aggies 40-28 and managed 52 shots from the field, connecting on 41 per cent. Texas Western also connected on 26 free throws to only 12 for Utah State.

The Miners managed to bottle up high-scoring Wayne Estes, who entered the game as the nation's second-ranked scorer with a 32.7 points per game average. Estes was held to 26 points but still managed to take game scoring honors.

Orsten Artis topped the winners with 17 points.

The nation's leading scorer, Rick Barry of Miami (Fla.), had an equally rough time putting the ball through the hoop against Florida.

The big forward, who has an average of better than 36 points per game, could manage only 26 against the Gators as his team bowed 86-69.

Unknown, Doug Ford Tie For Crosby Lead

PEBBLE BEACH, Calif. (UPI) — A second-hand putter purchased in a pawn shop, and a new "will to win" propelled handsome Dave Ragan and the veteran Doug Ford into the lead today in the \$84,500 Bing Crosby National Pro Amateur golf tournament.

Ragan, who hasn't won a tournament since 1962 and who was 68th on the money winning list last year; and Ford, a 42-year-old campaigner who was 77th, each fired a 66 in the first round of the celebrity-loaded event.

As the second round got underway today, that put them six shots ahead of Jack Nicklaus; seven in front of Masters champion Arnold Palmer; three ahead of PGA king Bobby Nichols and five ahead of British Open champion Tony Lama.

And believe it or not, fifteen (15) shots ahead of National Open champion Ken Venturi, who had a dreadful 81.

Given Old Putter Ragan, who hasn't won a nickel on the \$3 million tour this year, was given an old, hickory-shafted blade putter by a PGA official, who purchased it 20 years ago in a hock shop, after he three-putted 11 greens and finished two shots out of the money in the San Diego Open last week.

"It worked out so well," he said, "that I think I'll use it again today."

Ford, who won only \$8,063 on the tour last year despite the fact he is one of the all-time money-winning greats on the tour with \$341,160 to his credit, credited his success to a new attitude.

I just have a new will to win," he said, after birdieing four holes in a row at the shore course of the Monterey Peninsula Country Club.

Backstage Washington
Will Jenkins Testify?—New Objections Seem Likely To Derail Scheduled Grilling

WASHINGTON — It's far from certain that Walter Jenkins will testify before the Senate Rules Committee when it resumes its on-again-off-again Bobby Baker investigation.

Lennox McLendon, committee counsel, has let it be known the former long-time close assistant of President Johnson has been "alerted" to appear next week.

McLendon's admission to newsmen that he doesn't know whether Jenkins' doctor will allow him to come before the committee. Several months ago the doctor barred that on the ground Jenkins had not recovered from the "acute exhaustion" that followed his sensational arrest on a morals charge.

The contention that the Rules Committee, at its last meeting on December 9, did not formally vote to summon Jenkins; that this was "only an informal agreement." This is hotly denied by Senator John Sherman Cooper, Ky., only Republican present at this session, whose insistent demand Jenkins be interrogated was unanimously approved by the five Democratic committeemen.

A backstage administration plan to "transfer" the long bumbling Baker probe to a new Ethics Committee—voted last year, but still nonexistent. Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield, Mont., has yet to do anything about naming the six members—three Democrats, three Republicans. It's strongly suspected that shifting the Baker investigation to the new committee would mean further stalling and possible eventual shelving of it entirely.

In the Rules Committee's last round of Baker hearings, Senator Cooper carried the brunt of Republican representation. Most of the time he was the only one of the three GOP committeemen present.

Senator Hugh Scott, Pa., attended none of the sessions. Senator Carl Curtis, Neb., was intermittently present; but notably NOT when Cooper single-handedly raised the Jenkins issue. A Curtis staff member, in response to inquiries, said he was "unavoidably detained."

Question Box

Question: "What is an answer to those who claim advocates of a free economy, where all people are permitted to help establish values, are reverting to the law of the tooth and claw?"

But those persons who are guilty want to becloud the issue and make a derogatory remark about anyone who believes in freedom, who believes that each man has a right to do anything that each and every individual doesn't have an equal right to do, who believes the government has no right to do anything that each and every individual doesn't have a right to do.

The individual has a right to protect his property and he also has a right to join with others to form a voluntary government supported on a voluntary basis to protect each other's life and property.

Those who believe and practice the law of the tooth and claw are those using initiated force or threats of same, or fraud, to get what they obtain. They usually get laws passed to make their theft legal, but

\$200 Million State Loan For Students Proposed

AUSTIN (UPI) — A constitutional amendment providing for a \$200 million state student loan fund was proposed in the Texas House.

A resolution proposing the amendment was offered by Reps. George Hirtson of Mineola, John Allen of Longview, Nelson Cowles of Hallsville and LeRoy J. Wieting of Portland.

If approved the amendment would allow the legislature to issue up to \$200 million in general obligation bonds to make loans to students in public and private colleges and universities.

The proposal specifies that sufficient interest shall be charged to retire the bonds and pay all costs.

The amendment would be voted on at a special election in November of this year.

Another constitutional amendment proposed today would make the terms of members of the House begin on Jan. 1 following their election. The amendment was suggested by Rep. Don Hefton of Sherman.

House members' terms now begin whenever they are sworn in. This ranges from late November to early January.

Rep. W. T. (Bill) Dungan of McKinney proposed a different amendment on the same subject. His resolution calls for terms to begin Dec. 1, and for the secretary of state to call a special assembly of the House on that date to swear in members and elect the speaker.

LBJ's Education Bill Would Send \$74 Million to Low-Income Schools

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Ralph Yarborough, D-Tex., calculated today President Johnson's education bill, if enacted, would send \$74 million into low income school districts in Texas.

Yarborough made the calculation on the basis of census figures showing 386,399 children in the state, aged five to 17, in families with income of less than \$2,000 annually.

"The bill," Yarborough said, "is aimed at breaking the cycle of poverty and ignorance that hangs on for generations in low income areas."

The senator estimated other sections of the measure would mean \$5,099,000 for supplementary education centers for joint use of schools unable to provide laboratories, auditoriums and special courses in art, sciences and languages.

Yarborough added that the bill would make another \$5,373,000 available to Texas for school books.

Hearings on the bill will start next Tuesday.

YOU'RE HERE WORLDS MOST INACCESSIBLE PLACE

POSTCARDS

EXPLORERS from the University of Wisconsin are investigating the "Isle of Inaccessibility," a point in Antarctica furthest in all directions from the coast, some 900 miles from the nearest approach possible by ship. The 10-man team will study the thickness and other aspects of the icecap and the rock beneath it.

HARDENED STEEL can be cracked by molecules of hydrogen gas, reports Alloy Rods Company, York, Pa. If present in appreciable amounts around a welding arc, atoms of hydrogen diffuse through pores in the metal, then unite to form molecular hydrogen. Since hardened steel cannot stretch to accommodate the pressure, it will crack if enough gas accumulates.
