President Asks Congress For \$55 Million for ACDA

US Hopes To Step Up Arms Pact

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Johnson asked Congress today for increased funds to step up U.S. efforts in the disarmament field.

Administration officials said Johnson would continue to press the Soviet Union for agreements to curb spread of nuclear weapons to more nations, limit certain military production and broaden the nuclear test ban.

In a special message to Congress the President asked for a four-year authorization of \$5 million to run the U. S. Arms Control and Disarmament Agency (ACDA).

Congress gave the agency \$9 million for the current year, although the administration had requested \$15 million. The new funds would be for fiscal year 1966, which begins next July 1, through fiscal 1969.

Johnson's message was in the form of a letter to Sen. Carl Hayden, D-Ariz., president pro tempore of the Senate, and House Speaker John W. McCormack, D-Mass.

The President said the United States must remain "vigilant to danger" but also must be "vigilant for opportunities for improving the hopes for peace."

Officials said one of the major benefits of the increased funds would be to permit the arms agency to conduct more research into what kinds of new disarmament proposals might be made and how they could be safeguarded.

The agency conducts research projects in fields ranging from how armaments could be inspected and counted to the effects of how closing of defense plants would affect a nation's economy.

Many of the research projects are contracted with private firms. Officials said the research program suffered when Congress cut the agency's budget last year.

Johnson said he was requesting the additional funds "because it is my purpose to intensify our efforts in this critical area" of disarmament.

Sir Winston Seriously Ill In Hospital After Stroke

LONDON (UPI) — Sir Winston Churchill, Britain's 90-year-old great statesman, suffered a stroke today.

His doctors said he is seriously ill.

A medical bulletin said he suffered a cerebral thrombosis—or a blood clot on the brain. This was complicated by a circulatory weakness.

Members of his family rushed to his bedside.

The aged statesman, who as prime minister rallied Britain and the Western world to victory in World War II, was stricken at his home in London's fashionable Hyde Park Gate section.

He has been ailing with the problems of age. But when he turned 90 last Nov. 30, he appeared at the window of his home and appeared chipper as he gave his famous V-for-victory sign to a cheering crowd outside.

The medical bulletin issued just before 3 p.m. (9 a. m. CST) today said:

"After a cold Sir Winston has developed circulatory weakness and there has been a cerebral thrombosis."

"A further bulletin will be issued at 10 o'clock (4 p.m. CST) tonight."

The bulletin was signed by Lord Moran and Lord Brain, two of Britain's most distinguished medical men.

Blocks Circulation

A cerebral thrombosis is the formation of a blood clot that prevents circulation of blood in a blocked area of brain tissue. The old statesman had been

Vietnamese Give Communist Air, Navy Power Show

SAIGON (UPI) — Units of the South Vietnamese air force and Navy have been attacking military targets in Communist North Viet Nam, reliable sources said today. The raids are reported to have been made with American air and naval cover.

Military informants said the strikes thus far have been carried out by propeller-driven fighter-bombers and PT boats. These were described as "quick" raids which could be expanded at any time.

It was disclosed that the actions have been coordinated with the U.S. Air Force and the U.S. 7th Fleet.

(In Washington, the Defense Department had no immediate comment on reports of the attacks.)

Some military observers said the attacks may be intended more to demonstrate firm American intentions to frustrate a Communist takeover in South Viet Nam than to cut the maze of supply routes feeding the Viet Cong guerrillas.

Communist North Viet Nam has made repeated charges that U.S.-supported South Vietnamese commandos have attacked targets in North Viet Nam. Radio Hanoi has claimed to have captured several members of such raiding parties.

The Communists charged in December that South Vietnamese naval units shelled the island of Con Co off the North Vietnamese shore.

On Aug. 5, carrier based U.S. planes attacked North Vietnamese PT boat bases in a retaliatory raid ordered by President Johnson. Those attacks followed Communist PT boat raids against American warships in the Gulf of Tonkin.

The attacks reported today followed disclosure that U.S. Air Force fighter-bombers destroyed several bridges on a main Communist supply route in Laos Wednesday. The raid was described as the largest yet launched.

In an apparently unrelated incident today, two Americans and a Vietnamese were killed when a U.S. Army helicopter hit a power line and crashed in flames northeast of Saigon.

The dead Americans were the pilot, an officer, and the gunner, an enlisted man.

The officer co-pilot received multiple injuries and was flown to the U.S. Navy hospital here. The enlisted man gunner was less seriously hurt.

General Assembly Vote Due on Soviet U.N. Pay

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (UPI) — The United States is preparing for a confrontation with Russia on the U. N. financial issue and is lining up support for a General Assembly vote, informed sources said today.

U. S. Ambassador Adlai E. Stevenson met for two hours Thursday with the 21-nation Latin American group. The meeting's chairman, Sergio Sepulveda of Chile, said he discussed the crisis and the "grave and serious" consequences if the Soviets continue to refuse payment of their U. N. debts.

The sources said Stevenson told the Latin Americans that the United States is ready to confront the Russians in the General Assembly "in order to assure the future of the world organization — its moral and financial solvency."

U. S. officials would make no comment on the possibility of a confrontation or the degree of backing the United States could expect if it tried to force the Soviets to choose between payment of their U. N. debts or loss of their General Assembly vote.

But there was a growing movement among other delegations to head off such an East-West collision. Many diplomats feared it might cause a Soviet walkout and signal the breakup of the United Nations.

Many smaller nations were backing a plan to adjourn the General Assembly shortly after it reconvenes Monday. A few items of necessary business would be transacted first. Then the whole business of the United Nations would be put off until September.

By that time, these delegations feel, the United States and Russia should have come to some agreement on the debt issue, which stems from the Soviet refusal to pay for U. N. peace-keeping operations it considers illegal. In the United States view, such refusal must be penalized by loss of vote under Article 19 of the U. N. charter.

Soviets to Realign Non-Aggression Pact

LONDON (UPI) — The Soviet Union intends to revive a plan for a non-aggression pact between its European satellites and NATO nations, diplomatic sources reported today.

The idea is believed to be one of the reasons behind the convocation of the Warsaw Pact's political consultative committee in the Polish capital next Tuesday.

Tass, the official Soviet news agency, announced the date for the meeting today.

Diplomatic sources said the session will seek to realign Russo-East European policies in preparation for the projected series of high-level meetings between Soviet and Western leaders in coming months.

East European member nations of the Warsaw Pact have been increasingly restive over the West — projected establishment of a multi-lateral nuclear force.

They were said to be seeking firm assurances from Russia that the Kremlin will oppose the creation of any such force—either the American — proposed mixed manned nuclear fleet (MLF) or the British alternative for an Atlantic nuclear force (ANF).

The East European satellites are asking Russia for some similar set up, in the event a multi-national Western nuclear force is created which they fear would give West Germany access to nuclear weapons.

Russia, earlier this week served notice on Britain that she is opposed to the British ANF project as well as to the MLF.

The Poles have been pushing lately with increased emphasis a plan for a nuclear arms freeze in Central Europe.

Their political fears were said to have been revived by the latest diplomatic discussion in West Germany of the explosive Oder-Neisse frontier issue.

Police Hunt Caller After Torch Suicide

COLUMBIA, Mo. (UPI) — The daughter of a university professor, described as beset by personal problems, drenched herself with gasoline in a lonely barn, struck a match, and erupted in flames in a Viet Nam-style torch suicide Thursday.

Police hunted today for a mysterious telephone tipster who warned them ahead of time that Ann Atherton, 26, was planning to kill herself.

"He said he'd read about it in the paper if she did and if she didn't, he'd see her tomorrow," said police Capt. J. C. Smith.

"We're hoping he'll step forward and identify himself."

Miss Atherton's charred body was found in an abandoned barn on the west edge of Columbia. She was the daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Lewis Atherton. He is a history professor at the University of Missouri.

Dr. Richard Johnson, Boone County coroner, described the death as "definitely suicide," and said the dead woman "has had personal problems for a number of years" and had been under psychiatric care.

Johnson said the girl reached the barn by taxi, which first took her to a filling station to purchase a five-gallon can of gasoline. She told the cab driver she needed the gas for her stalled car.

Smith urged the anonymous caller to give his name "if he was a friend of the girl."

The Chief Executive and First Lady got there shortly before midnight CST after a three-hour jet flight from Andrews Air Force Base, Md. to Bergstrom AFB, Tex. They flew by helicopter from Borstom to the ranch, 55 miles away.

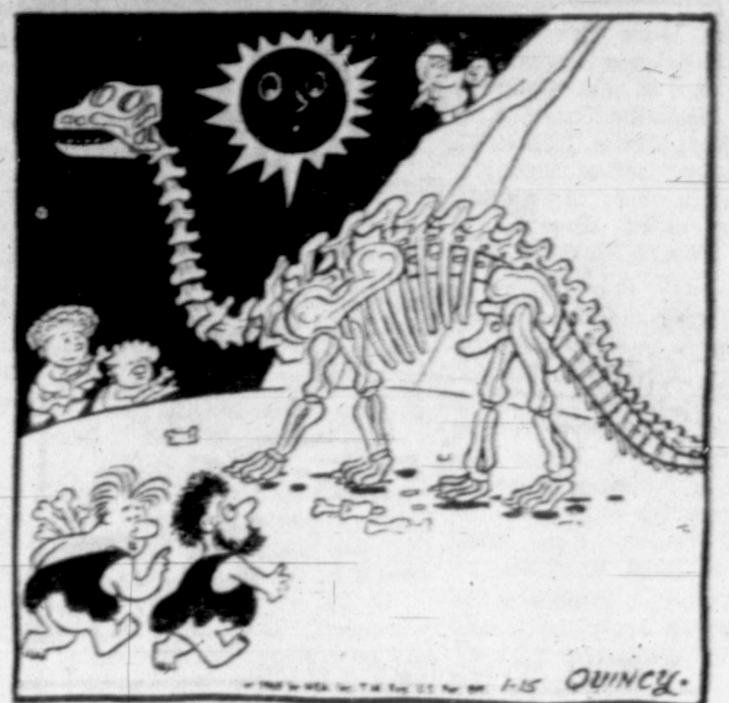

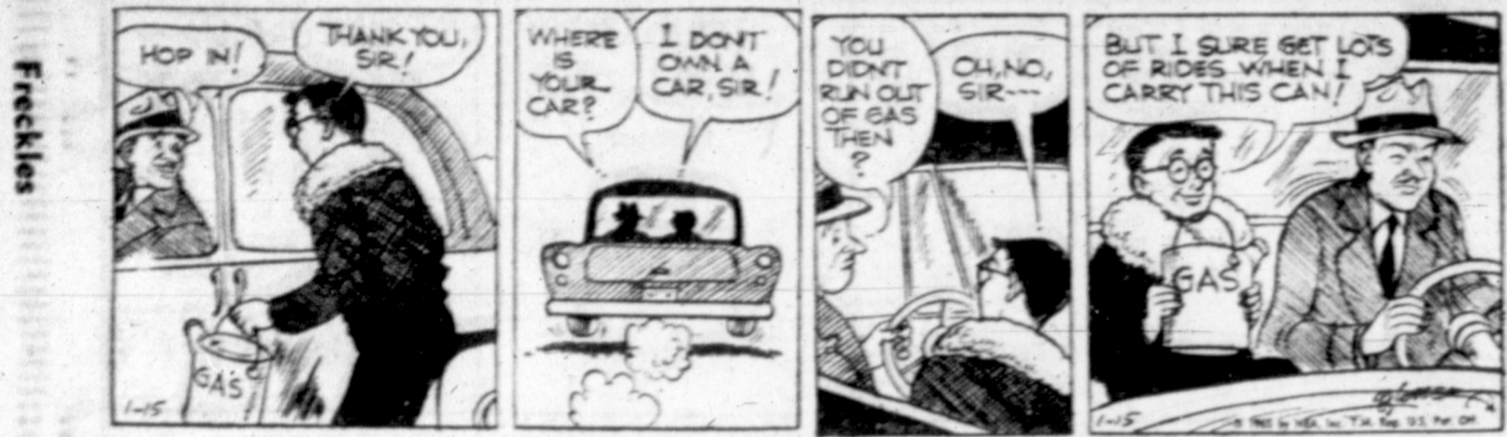
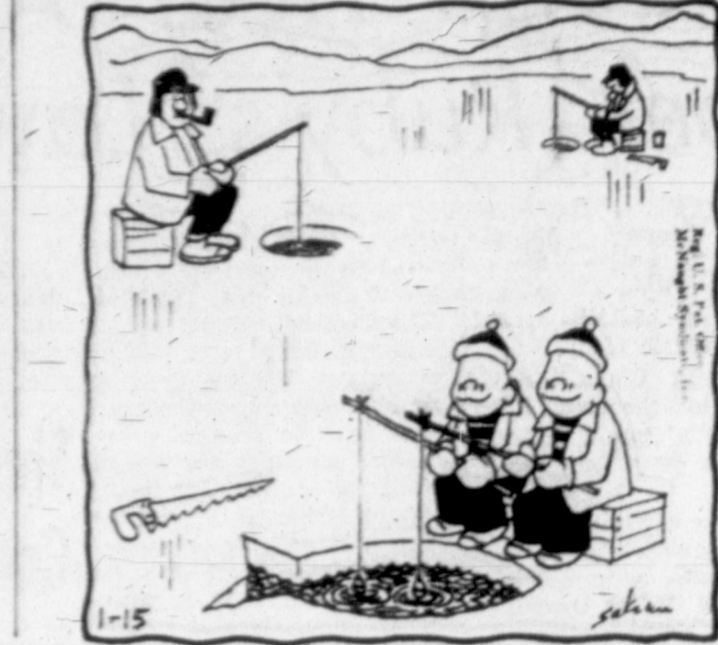

DEAR MRS. LAWRENCE: What punishment can I give my boy, 9, to stop him running off with other children? I can't keep an eye on him all the time. I have tried to explain the trouble he causes me by running off with other boys without telling me where he is going but he goes right on doing it. I have to telephone the neighbors to find out where he is or go and look for him.

ANSWER: I cannot tell you how to punish your child. I can not tell you because I know nothing about your child's past experience of you. It is that past experience of us which makes our punishments effective or ineffective.

A parent in your situation might decide to punish his child by depriving him of his friends for two days.

If the child has been given cause to trust our respect for his possessions, depriving him of his friends for two days would be effective punishment. It would be effective because this deprivation would so contrast

ALL FOLLOWERS OF JESUS ARE HIS AMBASSADORS

"So we are ambassadors for Christ, God making his appeal through us." Corinthians 5:20.

Much of the tragedy of our times is linked with the fact that we are not willing to listen, but even more are they linked with the fact that man is not willing to witness. Many are trying desperately to hoard the saving grace of God given through Jesus Christ. Few there are who will be true ambassadors by witnessing to the One who calls mankind to salvation.

If a man were being tried for murder and I happened to possess evidence that the one accused is worthy of acquittal in a higher court, I am not free to withhold such evidence. Should I do this I am myself a murderer, destroying a life with my silence. To say the least, failure to witness in such a case is a highly immoral act.

An ambassador does not hesitate to represent and speak for the one or ones who appointed him to such a "high calling." Have you ever thought to yourself as a representative of Christ? Phillips Through At Pampa High

Pampa track and B team coach Norman Phillips said today that this would be his final season at Pampa.

Phillips told the News in an exclusive interview that Eural Ramsey, new head football coach at Pampa, told him yesterday that he would not be needed as a coach after the coming track season.

"I was told that I would not fit in with the program nor would the program fit in with me," Phillips said.

Phillips is the oldest coach at Pampa High in point of service, having come here in 1954. He was head B team coach for three years, and assistant track coach. For the past three years he has been head track coach and assistant B team coach.

During his tenure with the B team, the Shockers only had one losing season. As a track coach, Phillips has been generally acknowledged as one of the finest in the Panhandle, despite being the only track coach in a 4-AAAA school in the state without a cinder track to work on.

Phillips has developed three state finalists, Olympic medal-winner weightman Randy Matson, sprinter Ralph Palmer now at the University of Oklahoma and miler Mark Westbrook.

Westbrook, as a junior last year, was third in the state and is the pre-season favorite to win this year. Phillips has also coached such present college stars as high jumper Bill Martin now at OU, dashman Curtis Fletcher of McMurry and hurdler Kenny Hebert of Houston.

Phillips also was active in summer amateur track, having been the coach of the Pampa Track Club, which sent Matson on to win the USITF title in

1963 and place in the National AAU trials.

Phillips reported that nothing had been said about renewing or not renewing his teaching contract which expires in June, but that he was told he would not be used as a coach after this season.

The tall pipe-puffer said that he intended to remain in high school coaching.

Phillips had also been mentioned as a candidate for the head coaching job when Oris Holliday resigned last month.

Although Ramsey has reported no hirings or firings except the acquisition of first assistant coach Lloyd Kelly from Shamrock, it has been reliably reported that coach Ray Howard has been relieved of his coaching duties; that only one member of the former varsity and B team staff will be retained, and that at least one, and possibly three of the junior high coaches will be relieved of their duties.

Maryland Makes Cage Self Felt

Maryland's basketball team is finally beginning to make its presence felt in the Atlantic Coast Conference, but Terrapins' Coach Bud Millikan is probably wishing that his boys would try and make it a bit easier on his nerves.

The Terps won their fifth straight conference clash Thursday night as they tripped Wake Forest 83-85, but it took them two overtimes to achieve the victory. That in itself wouldn't be so bad, but it marked the second time in the last three conference games that Maryland has had to go to double overtime to win. Last week, the Terps edged Clemson in a second overtime period.

Thursday night the two ACC teams battled to a 76-76 tie at the end of regulation play and found themselves knotted again at 80-80 after the first overtime.

The score was tied once more at 84-84 in the second overtime period, but then Maryland's Jay McMillan took charge and led a surge that put the Terps ahead to stay. McMillan paced the Maryland scoring attack with 31 points, but Wake Forest's Bob Leonard tossed in a career high 37 points to take game scoring honors.

There was very little action elsewhere but two games of importance were played among Southern Conference teams.

Ninth-ranked Davidson attracted most of the attention as it turned back West Virginia 86-77 and Virginia Tech tripped Richmond 68-58.

The Wildcats upped their conference mark to 6-0 and increased their overall win streak to 12 by downing West Virginia. High-scoring center Fred Hetzel was again the hero for Davidson as he tossed in 25 points to spark the victory.

The Mountaineers' Buddy Quertinnont shared game scoring honors with Hetzel with 25 points.

Richmond - outshot Virginia Tech from the floor but a flourish of points by Tech's big guns John Whitesell, John Wetzel and Ron Perry in the final five minutes of play enabled the Gobblers to pull out the victory.

In other action, Texas Western downed Howard Payne 79-77, Wyoming defeated Denver 81-76, and Florida toppled Mississippi State 74-59.

CONSIDER SWEEPSTAKES

AUGUSTA, Maine (UPI) — The Maine Legislature will consider a bill similar to the New Hampshire sweepstakes law passed in 1963. Under the measure, Maine would hold one or two races a year with an annual purse estimated at \$200,000 and the proceeds going towards public education.

Big Wilt Unhappy Over Swap

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Wilt Chamberlain, a shrewd businessman as well as basketball's living legend, disclosed today that he advised the Philadelphia 76'ers against the historic deal which sent him to the NBA Eastern Division club.

"I told Ike Richman, who is my lawyer as well as the 76'ers counsel, that it could be a bad trade," the big dipper said upon his return to San Francisco to clean out his Warriors' locker. "I have no agreement with Philadelphia to play next season. I might retire, which means that the 76'ers may have given up a lot just to have me for three months.

Chamberlain also indicated he was disappointed at the way Franklin Mieuili, the Warriors president, handled the transaction.

"I'm a businessman and I had an inkling that something was coming, the seven-foot, one inch center said. "Frank never consulted me and that's the only thing I know of that's against him.

Ever-cautious, Wilt only would say that he might quit basketball "for several reasons." He owns apartments in Los Angeles among his enterprises.

One of the great scorers in NBA history, Chamberlain is the only player ever to mesh 100 points in one game. He pulled the feat against the New York Knickerbockers at Hershey, Pa. in March of 1962.

To get this fire-power, the 76'ers gave up a reported \$300,000 and three players Wednesday night after the All-Star game in St. Louis. In addition to some badly-needed cash, the floundering Warriors acquired guard Paul Neumann along with forwards Connie Dierking and Lee Shaffer.

Neumann and Shaffer are slated to join the club in time for tonight's game here with the New York Knicks. But Shaffer has been holding out at Philadelphia and had not signed a Warriors pact as of Thursday afternoon.

As for Wilt, there was a certain amount of mystery as to when he would show up in Philadelphia with his \$65,000 per year contract.

Monte Carlo Rally Starts

MONTE CARLO, Monaco (UPI) — The 34th Monte Carlo automobile rally, tougher than ever even with the prospect of good weather, began from the first of nine starting points today.

A total 34 cars made the start from Stockholm this afternoon to make their way to Ystad and then across the Baltic to East Germany and Poland. Starters on the eight other routes take off Saturday to make for the complicated runs through France.

The nine routes will join up at Saint Claude for the final run through southeastern France to Monte Carlo on Monday night. The average distance from each starting point is about 4,000 kilometers (2,484 miles) and the final added stage brings the total run to nearly 5,000 (3,105 miles).

A total 255 automobiles are taking part. They consist of drivers from 23 nations, including Russia, and about 50 different makes of cars, including this year five Russian and one Japanese.

Baylor Early

WACO, Tex. (UPI) — Baylor football coach John Bridgers said today kickoff times at all home games will be moved up a half-hour for the 1965 season. The day games will start at 1:30 p.m. and the night games at 7:30.

"The earlier starting times seem to be a trend," Bridgers said, "and I saw no reason why we should not follow suit. I believe the public will like it better."

Bridgers also announced spring training will begin Saturday, Feb. 20 with the final spring green and white game set for Saturday, March 27.

NCAA Rules Group Set

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. (UPI) — The NCAA Football Rules Committee opens a three-day meeting today faced with finding a middle way between demands for free substitution and cries for a return to the old way of one-platoon teams.

"We have to decide whether to keep what we have, retreat all the way to one platoon football, go to free substitution, or make minor changes," said committee chairman Ivan B. Williamson, athletic director at Wisconsin.

First item for the full committee will be a report on proposed rule changes by a subcommittee headed by Stuart K. Holcomb, athletic director at Northwestern.

Williamson said the full committee will go into "every phase of the rules" in dealing with recommendations of the subcommittee, "but the number one thing will be the substitution rule."
