

The Class "C" tournament will be held basically according to AWSA rules and regulations and will require a second class rating to enter competition.



New Private Schools Bring Competition

and controlled compulsuple of letters from people who scamed to think I wanted all socialized schools closed tomorrow or the day after. The letter writers envisioned millions of little kids standing around on street corners trying to get into trouble as if not a single responsible parent existed in our country. Of course, I do not advocate the closing of sociatized schools. am not an advocator. I detest ocialism and everything it means and am doing what I can to withhold support of anything socialistic. I do not ask anyone else detest socialism or commuism or fascism. From time to time I have suggested that encouragement of private schools will spell the eventual downfall f socialized schools, even with government clinging to the backs of those who operate private schools and getting in the way.

Within the last month I have received word of two new and private colleges. One of them for the project. The other acquired the land a few years ago. Organization and building will probably require from two to five years in each case but this is real accomplishment and I find encouragement in such news.

The minute one of these private colleges begins to enroll students, it will be in competition with socialized schools. It will also begin to compete with other private schools. When a sufficient number of private schools provide real competition to socialized schools, the government owned ind controlled schools will be on the way out. When government gets off the backs of the private schools, unwillingly, private chools will be able to compete n the market place instead of beoming corporations not for prof-

I have written my opinion of the philosophy of freedom as being evolutionary. Gains may he made on a step-by-step basis. progress may be achieved on a person-by-person basis and the socialist conglomerate may be de-

For the most part schools for profit are usually trade schools and the fact that trade schools and correspondence schools do continue to operate at a profit despite taxes and other intrusions by government which increase the cost of doing business, is important. It indicates that other private institutions of learning should also learn how to operate on a

profit - making basis. Personally, I will continue to do anything I can to encourage private schools. I believe I canaccomplish more by trying to provide encouragement for prirate schools than I can by trying to do something to improve a system of compulsory education which depends for financial support upon a basically immoral premise in the first place. I to not believe I have any right to try to force my ideas about education on others. I oppose the thought of anyone else trying to orce their ideas upon me, at my

Any political agency which owns and controls schools could probably find ways and means to offer the schools or a system of schools to the highest bidder. While this procedure would mean bute 10,000 tulips to pedestrians. that a government agency was willing to relinquish some of its power and the record indicates this is not likely to happen, stranger things than this have happened under strange and unusual circumstances. It is at least a physical possibility. In the meantime, more and more private schools will mean more and more competition for socialized schools and I don't believe socialism car stand competition now or ever.


