OIL PRODUCING AREA

BLACK GOLD FROM THE REDS-A vast underground network is being built in the Soviet Union-a network of pipelines carrying oil from Russia's rich fields to the rest of the world. Soviet production increased more than 28 per cent between 1959 and 1961, over twice as fast as the non-Communist world's 12-per cent increase. The Soviets have now edged Venezuela out of second place next to the United States. Soviet oil expansion is cause for alarm in the West, because Soviet price-fixing allows them to undersell Western oil in many instances, thus weakening Western economic ties.

Some observers say a general strike may be in the offing unless the government switches tactics. The nationalized workers are angry about De Gaulle's efforts to keep production costs down by dustries below the average of private industry.







Answer: Yes, all commercial radio stations are required by law to be licensed by the Federal Communications Commission.


The theory behind licensing of

radio stations is that the various wave lengths must be allocated to prevent two or more stations from broadcasting on the same wave length.

It is true that in the early days of commercial radio there were some stations which overlapped and caused confusion. There was also the celebrated case in Kansas City, Mo., of stations operated by the Kansas City Post and Kansas City Star jamming each others' programs.

However, once the government undertakes to license any business. it will control it. At the time the licensing was started, there was no indication that there would be any effort to regulate the material which was to be carried over the air waves.

But, typically, the government now treats radio and television stations as if it were granting a special privilege when it awards a channel or wave length to a station. There is even a law which requires a station to give "equal time" to a political opponent, when one politician is permitted to express an opinion, or even when a station editor undertakes to give an editorial opinion.

fornia congressman took a look at the situation and didn't like what he saw. He proposed a law which would provide a low rate of remuneration for those who had been pressed into involuntary servitude. He was unable to get the bill off the ground. In recognizing the immorality of the withholding law, the former congressman, Gordon McDonough, exhibited a great deal more courage than has been shown by his colleagues before or since.

I have discussed these aspects of involuntary servitude by mail, during telephone conversations and in person with politicians, socialists, republican socialists,

socialist democrats, conservatives, members of the John Birch Society and a few people who actually believe in freedom. The wildest left winger I've ever talked with ran around this subject as if he was being chased by a mad bull. The most specific remark I ever received from a politician was that withholding laws were in the best public interest whether they violated the prohibition included in the Constitution or precepts of morality or not.
