


MAN INTO SPACE - The all-important beginning steps in astronaut Gordon Cooper's Mercury flight are shown in this drawing by an NASA artist. Pilot and capsule must be precisely injected into a "keyhole" in space about 100 miles high above Bermuda, 500 miles downrange from Cape Canaveral, Fla. If the aim and speed are wrong, the capsule will fail to go into orbit or may orbit too high. The Mercury and its Atlas rocket are first faunched vertically from

Cape Canaveral. As the booster rockets drop off and

the sustainer engine takes over, the vehicle tilts into its planned trajectory. Next, the escape rocket tower is jettisoned. The Mercury, still attached to the burned out sustainer engine, now coasts at a speed of about 17,500 miles an hour. If the aim has been correct, the capsule blasts free and goes into orbit. The pilot then maneuvers the capsule to face blunt end forward. Ground radar on Bermuda, connected with the tracking center at Goddard Space Flight Center, Md., confirms that so far the mission is A-O.K.
