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

TRUTH ABOUT CHANGE

Among the most important things for young journalists to acquire are a critical eye and a critical ear. The capacity to distinguish between truth and cant is essential in a world in which propaganda and special pleading passes for information or even education.

This thought comes to mind in reading a news report of an address made to student journalists at Washington & Lee University in Lexington, Va. Marya Mannes, a staff writer for The Reporter, a magazine of liberalism, discussed "fear of change" before a meeting of students attending the Southern Interscholastic Press Association. "Now fear of changes does

srange things to people," Miss

Mannes said. "It closes their eyes, it ties their hands, it stops them from thinking or questioning." Then she gave some examples of her beliefs: "Fear of change makes some people yell 'socialism' when any plan for the public good is proposed and Carrie people year committeed when a limitation of private enterprise is suggested. The fear of change that makes Americans resist integration has done more to help the communist cause throughout the world than a dozen Castros." She suggested that Americans should examine "coolly" the communistic and socialistic political systems in the world rather than reject everything "immediately and violent-

A number of interesting questions arise from this talk. First of all, public school officials and community leaders in the South may justifiably ask how, why and who invited a speaker who urged students not to "immediately" reject everything in the communist system. This was a very strange comment for Miss Mannes to make. Offhand, one can't think of

a thing in the communist or socialism systems that doesn't warrant immediate and total rejection by right-thinking Americans. But leaving that aside, let's look at her comments on change. In one sense, her remarks con sist of knocking down a straw

man. Few resist change itself. Life, as everyone knows, is one change after another. American society isn't a stone block that never alters its shape. Rather, it is public discussion concerned with the direction of changewhether it results in good or evil. Change for the good is always welcome. Change that lends a person or country backward is to

Maybe it is Miss Mannes who fears change! Maybe, as a convinced "liberal," she fears the healthy growth of contemporary conservatism, with its strengthening of the free enterprice society. Maybe she is afraid that the monopoly which radicals enjoy in some intellectual circles will be lost if conservatives are given a forum for their views.

Some of the change that Miss Mannes welcomes can hardly be justified by any kind of logic. For example, she told the student journalists that the West must accept an "unsatisfactory disarmament treaty." Now, why should any sober citizen went his country to accept what is "unsatisfactory," simply to have Khrushchev's name on a scrap of paper? That kind of change would only produce in the thoughtless a sense of we'l-being that the realist knows to be ab-

This remark by Miss Mannes

touches on much of the foolishness about change. Change for the sake of change defies intelligence in life. She cites the case of integration. Well, good citizens want members of the nation's colored community to progress and enjoy more of the fruits ef the national life. But good citizens don't want change that substitutes high-powered agitation for customs that provide a harmonfour frame for gradual progress. They don't want communities torn apart to satisfy the revolutionary ambitions of a handful of group leaders who live on strife. Nor do sensible citizens want change that make a group of people believe government owes them rights and privileges and that they don't have to practice selfreliance and earn their own advancement. Likewise, thoughtful citizens don't want big government to strip from them the liberties that their forefathers fought for, including the liberty of personal association without centralized government compulsion.

On the national and international scenes, Americans want only those changes that promote the strength, security and wellbeing of the United States and its historic freedoms. Change that gives this country false security or that threatens the fabric of our society is the kind of change that leads to national dissolution, not national health.

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

Letters and phone calls revive old wounds and make them seem fresh. Fond memories make things hard to comprehend.


Any girl would, keep asking "Why?" She would be distrubed when she heard from the boy, even though she didn't love him now.

Summer Home Ec

June is practice month for girls enrolled in home economics in high school and junior high schools. The girls apply at home what they have learned in classes.

Course Is Offered

Each girl in the project plans a project which she carries out with the help of her mother and her home economics teacher. The girl fills out a temporary plan and keeps an accomplishment record. The teacher visits the girls in their homes periodically to help with their projects. At the end of the month, the student evaluates

what she has accomplished after

visiting other girls and seeing

their projects. The June work is an outgrowth of the girls' learning experiences during school. During the school year many projects are carried out but often many are unfinished because of limited time. For this reason the girls receive a half credit toward graduation by participating in the program which is the equivalent of one semester's

work in school. Some of the girls choose home improvement projects in which they redecorate their own roomsor other rooms in the home, make decorative accessories to help brighten the home, re - upholster furniture, refinish or antique furniture, landscape yards and do gardening.

Other projects are: care of the sick and injured, child care, pre paring and planning meals, marketing, clothing construction and repair, budgeting, personality improvement, personal grooming, and family relations. Some even take over the management and responsibilities of their homes during the absence of their mothers. All the projects emphasize time and money management.

Uranium Ore Buying Station Is Completed

OKLAHOMA CITY - Kermac Nuclear Fuels Corp., a wholly owned subsidiary of Kerr - McGee Oil Industries, Inc., has completed the construction of a uranium ore buying station six miles west of Bowman, North Dakota. The company said that personnel at the station has begun to receive uranium-bearing lignite ore. In addition o production from company operated mines, the station will purchase ores from independent producers. A number of independent reserve owners have already committed their reserves to Kermac's operations.

The company began test mining of its lignite reserves last fall. The successful completion of these tests resulted in the excavation of several open pit mines which are now in operation.



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


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
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
