## 'Harsh' Statement Charges Distortion

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The Kennedy administration racked down today on what it called Cuban exile efforts to drag the United States into war over Cuba.

In an unusually harsh statement, the State Department accused Dr. Jose Miro Cardona, president of the Cuban Revolutionary Council, of "gross distortion of recent history."







## Estes Takes 15 Year Sentence

EL PASO, Tex. (UPI)- U.S Dist. Judge R. E. Thomason sentenced bankrupt fertilizer king Baby Boy Randall, 729 Bradley Billie Sol Estes to 15 years in prison Monday for committing mail fraud and, conspiracy "in one of the most gigantic swindles in the history of our country." The 38-year-old Estes took it

calmly "I have not entered in a conspiracy and have not intended to

defraud anyone," Estes said in the first words he uttered in his mail fraud and conspiracy trial. Estes remains free in \$100,000 bond. Judge Thomason rejected defense motions for a new trial and delay in passing sentence.

A jury of 10 men and two women convicted him of four counts of mail fraud and one of Mrs. Minerva Osborne, White conspiracy March 28 in a trial that lasted almost three weeks. Mrs. Sally Bowsher, 1541 Willis- He was acquitted on nine other counts of fraud.

A state court at Tyler, Tex., had previously sentenced Estes to eight years for swindling a farmer. Monday's sentence means that he now faces a total of John J. Merrifield. White Deer 23 years in penitentiaries and 32 state and federal counts against him remained to be tried.

Scolded by Judge "You perpetrated one of the most gigantic swindles in the history of the country," 83-year-old Judge Thomason told Estes, in summarizing the case.

He told Estes that his swindle, involving mortgages worth \$24 million on non-existent anhydrous ammonia tanks, could not have been perpetrated wthout the help of Superior (tank) Manufacturing Co. of Amarillo, Tex.

Three officials of Superjor Coleman D. McSpadden, Ruel 729 Bradley Dr., on the birth of a Alexander and Harold Orr - were indicted with Estes. They pleaded guilty to five counts of what was at first a 29-count indictment and have been sentenced to 6-10 year terms in the penitentiary.

Judge Thomason mentioned that Estes was active in church and charities, was well known in business and was a good family man with five children.







For people in almost every country, a capital city is a source to be - and usually is - the showcase of the nation. "hus all overseas tourists want to see Paris, the capital of France, and London, the capital of the United Kingdom.

But what about Washington? How many Americans, who are informed about conditions in the District of Columbia, are proud of the situation there? Only a few weeks ago, the press carried the news that school groups are showing declining interest in the annual senior visit to Washington. The reason is that school authorities and parents fear for the safetional capital.

This is a scandalous situation. have been exposed time and again. Last fall, a terrible riot took place after a high school football game. Even Negro leaders in Washington, who usually are inclined to sweep under the rug all charges against their community, admitted that the riot was shameful. The head of Washington's school system, who had been saying for years that everything was all right in the district, finally admitted terrible disciplinary problems in the schools and requested permission for teachers to resort to compulsory punishment. Members of Congress have spoken in the legislative chambers concerning the peril to the public even in the vicinity of the Capitol Building. Ironically, the U.S. Supreme Court has had to install new lighting in its parking lot and institute various police measures in order to assure the safety of em ployes of the court leaving for




