Governor Tells Negro Voter Group Education Not All That Is Necessary

AUSTIN (UPI)—It is not enough that every Texas child get the opportunity for an education regardless of creed or color, Gov. John Connally said Tuesday night. Every child should also have the chance to put what he has learned to work.

Connally addressed a banquet crowd of 500 persons at the first state convention of the United Political Organization (UPO), a group dedicated to unification of a potential one million Texas Negro voters.

Connally joined the UPO in honoring eight Negroes who have been named to state boards and

other positions in recent months. He said they were not appointed because they were Negroes, but because they had the intelligence and integrity which any person serving in a high state office should have.

Citations were presented to George Allen, chairman of the Texas Southern University Board of Directors and board members Joe Scott, Rev. M. C. Griffin and Joseph A. Chatman.

Also cited were Dr. Vernon McDaniel, a member of Connally's committee on higher education, the Rev. C. A. Holliday, the first

Atty. General Comments On Spy Ring Break Up

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy said today that the Communists are stepping up their spy activities against the United States.

Kennedy made the statement in commenting on the arrest of a Soviet U.N. employe, his wife and another couple on charges that they conspired over the past six years to steal U.S. military secrets for the Kremlin.

Kennedy Back Home, Starts Catching Up

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Kennedy returned to a business-laden desk at the White House today, convinced that his 10-day trip to Europe strengthened his hand in forging a more powerful Western defense alliance and in dealing with Russia.

Kennedy scheduled a Cabinet meeting at the White House after an 11-hour flight from Naples, Italy, to Andrews Air Force Base outside the nation's capital. His plane made a refueling stop in the Azores but he remained on board in bed and asleep.

He landed here at 1:33 a.m.

Nikita Leaves West Hanging

BERLIN (UPI) — Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev left the West guessing today as to whether he really is serious about signing a nuclear test ban treaty.

Western diplomats doubted an effective test ban agreement could be achieved if Khrushchev makes it conditional on the signing of a non-aggression pact between the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) and its Communist counterpart, the Warsaw Pact alliance.

NAACP Has Mock Court At Meeting

CHICAGO (UPI) — Negro witnesses testified in a mock court at the convention of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) Tuesday night they had been bombed, beaten and attacked by vicious dogs in their quest for civil rights.

The witnesses, mostly from the South, sat before a board of Negro lawyers to "testify from their own personal experiences regarding bigotry and injustices."

Humor Stamp First in 116 Years of Mail

The Post Office Department today announced five new commemorative postage stamps, one of which will appeal to people who like to see a bit of whimsy on their stamps, according to O. K. Gaylor, Pampa postmaster.

It is a stamp designed by Norman Rockwell to mark the 100th anniversary of the inception of City Mail Delivery. An 1863 letter carrier, umbrella aloft, walks stoically in the rain, flanked by a small boy and his dog—who are happy in the downpour. In 116 years of stamp production this is the first "humor" stamp.

Other stamps announced are: Sam Houston, hero of Texas independence.

Cordell Hull, Secretary of State under President Franklin D. Roosevelt.

John Muir, American naturalist. In the fine arts series, a John James Audubon painting of birds will be issued to round out the Post Office Department's 1963 stamp program under the 15-a-year policy.

The 5-cent Cordell Hull stamp will be placed on sale on October 3, 1963, at Carthage, Tennessee, his home.

Dates and places of issue for the other four stamps have not been set.

\$25,000 Suit Settled Out of Court Here

A \$25,000 damage suit was settled out of court Monday for the sum of \$3,000.

Lena Sanders filed the suit in 31st District Court Monday naming the Fort Worth and Denver Railroad Co. as defendant.

The suit involved a car-train collision on Dec. 6, 1961, one mile west of Lefors, which took the life of Artema Sanders, husband of the plaintiff.

IKE BACK "HOME"
ABILENE, Kan. (UPI)—Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower arrived here Tuesday by train for an informal visit to his boyhood home.

It was Eisenhower's first trip to Abilene in two years and the first purely informal visit since he became famous as the commander of Allied forces in Europe in World War II.

A city ordinance requires that all dogs be licensed whether they are at large or penned up. It is an additional violation for owners to allow dogs to run at large.

A receipt is required to show that a dog has received a rabies vaccination within four months from the date of application for the dog license. The tag cannot be issued without the vaccination receipt.

Licenses may be obtained at the tax collector's office in City Hall. When dogs are picked up, notices are posted on a bulletin board in the City Hall lobby with a description of the dogs held at the city pound.

The dogs are kept at the pound for three days and owners may retrieve them by paying a pound fee and obtaining a license tag. Unless the dogs are claimed they are exterminated by asphyxiation.

Crime Seminar Held In Pampa

Twelve area law enforcement officers were present at the Top O' Texas Crime Seminar held yesterday at the Coronado Inn.

According to Sheriff R. H. (Rufe) Jordan, the attendance at the meeting was somewhat hampered by the district meeting of Texas law enforcement officers held in Lubbock yesterday.

"The officers present participated in a two-hour discussion on crimes and burglaries committed in the Top O' Texas area recently," Jordan said. "The officers participate in the seminar meet once a month and share any knowledge of crime prevention they have learned. Main topics of discussion are burglary, thefts and forgery," Jordan said.

Garber, Baltch. The FBI said these were not their real names, but it did not disclose their true identities. It said the real Baltch is a Roman Catholic priest and is a spy ring member.

Name Two Others
FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover said that two other conspirators in the spy ring were Aleksei Ivanovich Galkin, 45, former first secretary of the Byelorussian U.N. mission, who left the United States May 10, and Petr Egorovich Maslennikov, 43, first secretary of the Soviet U.N. mission who returned home a week earlier.

The FBI complaint identified Galkin and Maslennikov as officers of Soviet military intelligence. It said that the defendants conspired to transmit to Russia "information relating to the national defense of the United States, and particularly information relating to military installations, naval installations, troop movements, shipyards and military waterfront facilities."

Among the information reported sought was the location of U.S. intercontinental ballistic missile sites.

Woman Fights Arrest
Egorov and his wife were apprehended at their Flushing, Queens, residence after a scuffle with FBI agents. Mrs. Egorov, who put up "considerable resistance," was carried out of the building.

Egorov and his wife were arraigned in Brooklyn federal court late Tuesday night and ordered held without bail for a hearing on July 16.

In Washington, FBI agents kept the "Baltchs" in their 390-a-month apartment for more than four hours while they apparently questioned the couple and searched the premises.

The two accused spies were taken before U.S. Commissioner Sam Wirtleb shortly after midnight and were ordered held without bail for two weeks to give them time to consult with an attorney. Wirtleb also continued for two weeks a hearing on a government motion for their removal to New York for arraignment.

FORMS JOINT VENTURE

CINCINNATI, Ohio (UPI)—DuBois Chemical Inc., announced formation of a joint venture company with a major English firm to manufacture and market its line of industrial cleaning and sanitary compounds in the United Kingdom and Ireland.

The capital in the new firm, known as Honeywell-DuBois Ltd., will be invested equally by DuBois and Honeywell & Stein Ltd., a unit of the Distillers Co. Ltd. British manufacturer of chemicals, distilled spirits and other related products. Headquarters will be in London, with marketing operations scheduled to begin this fall.

didates or political issues. Networks officials, FCC officials, officers of the National Association of Broadcasters and members of both Houses of Congress will be heard in the meeting according to Rep. Rogers.

He said that when Newton Minow, former chairman of the Federal Communications Commission, suggested that the airwaves be used for such programs, broadcasters tried to comply, but they were groping in the dark, risking the loss of licenses, because there were no guidelines.

"My personal belief is that the basic laws—or guidelines—should be on the statute books. Some hold, however, that the FCC can deal with the necessary rulemaking. We will have to see what the hearings develop," Rogers said.

He commented also on the recent bill which will permit television "debates" between the "legally qualified candidates of major political parties."

This bill sets aside the "equal time" provisions of the Communications Act for the 75 days immediately preceding the 1964 general election. "We instructed the FCC to develop materials and records which will show whether the plan serves the general good," Rogers said.

"Therefore, the 'temporary' bill, as was the bill which we used in the 1960 elections.

"With sufficient material at hand, hearings in 1965 can establish whether this plan should be made a permanent part of the Communications Act."

Wall Street In Review

NEW YORK (UPI)—Bache & Co. believes that, taking into consideration the outlook for corporate profits and the fact that many issues still are reasonably priced, the market should be able to absorb any near term selling and eventually work higher.

The firm continues to believe the major trend is upward and that recent setbacks are only minor corrections necessary in "healthy bull market."

The Alexander Hamilton Institute says that although there has been no indication of important liquidation of good quality stocks, investors appear hesitant about making further commitments until earnings justify materially higher prices.

Gilbert M. Kiggins of Hemphill, Noyes & Co. feels the current high valuation of stocks calls for an attitude of caution rather than pessimism and that stocks which seem to have relatively small risk with reasonable potential are probably the most suitable investment at this time.

Don't Forget The Fourth

We don't know whether you remembered to fly a flag on Flag Day (June 14th) or not. But July 4th is tomorrow and your sins of omission can be rectified in dramatic style if you care to rectify them.

We hope that if and when you remember the day and the significance of it, you will keep in mind not just the color and style of the flag but the symbolism it was designed to contain.

The American flag, in a real sense, is symbolic of the greatest hope for individual freedom ever permitted to blossom in the world. It came into being during the dark days of the American conflict with King George III, our own monarch. It is a revolutionary piece of bunting signifying that no king or potentate of any kind or description may with impunity flout his will on Americans.

We heard an interesting story from a father in another town a couple of weeks ago. It seems that his son had gone out to work on the drive for selling flags just ahead of Flag Day.

The son, filled with enthusiasm, and carrying his promotional and demonstrational material, began calling on various people in hopes of encouraging them to buy and display a flag.

As we understand it, the flags cost \$1.50 and was a pretty reasonably sized flag well worth the small sum involved. The boy met with some fairly stiff resistance, which is part of the game and something we are all acquainted with.

But apparently at one point, the boy's sales efforts were treated to such scorn and derision that the lad was nearly reduced to tears. A young man of college age took it upon himself to heap scorn and abuse upon the flag, the lad himself and any and all public displays of sentiment related to the American heritage.

Now we certainly support the right of anybody in this country not to buy a flag or anything else he does not want. And we also support that person's right to refrain from any public display if it is embarrassing to him.

But we cannot quite see the merit of ridicule relating to the desire on the part of others to do these things. And, if the facts as reported are indeed facts, there is someone around who didn't learn much courtesy or consideration in his formative years. And this, of course, is too bad.

We presume that there are plenty of people around who are fairly disgusted with the present administration in Washington and the somewhat inept handling of various issues that have arisen in recent years. It would be difficult to find even the most ardent Kennedy supporter who felt that the President had batted 1,000 ever since he took office.

As Americans we are firmly committed to the concept of human rights; the concept of individual dignity and worth; the concept of human liberty and the idea that government, no matter how big or how long enduring, has only a confined and temporary power.

If you missed Flag Day, don't miss the Fourth of July. It is our most important day of remembrance as Americans. You might also keep in mind tomorrow the "Bells for Freedom" idea that has won wide endorsement. A flag and a bell and a thought of human liberty seem in order for July 4th.

And Away We Go - one of the important measures of fuel quality - is up to 93, as a result of scientific research and improved technology. As for price, today's gasoline, before taxes, costs the motorist three per cent less than the fuel of 40 years ago.

Overdoing It The trip to Ireland, to the ancestral seat of the Kennedys in Dunganstown, was, perhaps, a happy thing for the President - even restful, perhaps. But we still wonder about this latest Grand Tour.

Flood Seeks Special Captive Nations Study

For more than two years Rep. Daniel J. Flood (D. Penn.) has labored zealously for the establishment in the House of a Special Committee on Captive Nations. His resolution asking for such a committee was first introduced in March 1961 and reintroduced in the present 89th Congress as H.R. 14. His efforts and those of a scattering few colleagues in both the House and the Senate brought about the first national observance of Captive Nations Week, which was proclaimed in 1959 by President Eisenhower.

It will be interesting to note President Kennedy's proclamation of Captive Nations Week this year. In last year's proclamation there was the true mention that Congress has requested that the President call attention to the plight of the people in the captive nations and that we should hope for their eventual liberation.

Jackie's Newest Plans, for the White House - A 'Guest House' on the South Lawn. WASHINGTON - Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy has come up with another striking White House innovation - that could become as heatedly controversial as the famous Truman balcony.

The First Lady, while awaiting her third child next month, has been quietly cogitating the possibility of building a "guest house" on the south lawn of the historic executive mansion.

Close friends with whom Mrs. Kennedy has discussed this unprecedented idea stress that she has reached no decision. But they add she is most enthusiastic, and has consulted a number of authorities, among them at least one prominent architect.

In these talks, the First Lady has emphasized that the proposed "guest house" must be so constructed as not to change the view and grounds of the White House.

The size and other details of this unique addition and how it would be financed are not known. Mrs. Kennedy has explained to intimates that her thought is that the place would be used by relatives and friends of the presidential family and not as a substitute for Blair House where visiting foreign notables are lodged.

So far as can be learned, President Kennedy as yet has taken no position on this project. However, up to now he has opposed changes in the White House that might arouse controversy - as did the balcony former President Truman had installed when the executive mansion was extensively reconstructed in his second term.

Southern senators headed by Senator A. Willis Robertson, D-Va., chairman of the Banking Committee, have written the President bluntly asking why Home, one of the most popular administration officials with Congress, is being ousted.

Particularly, the senators are inquiring about a report that he is being shifted to another job to make way for former Senator Benjamin Smith, D-Mass., a college roommate of the President.

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The Doctor Says:

Learn to Make Most of Our Air-Conditioning By DR. WAYNE BRANDSTADT

We are in the season when those who have air conditioners turn them on and when all of us find ourselves going in and out of air-conditioned stores, offices, restaurants and theaters. How will this affect you?

Some persons sleep better in a room that is air-conditioned while others, especially if they use a single-room unit, may prefer to get the room comfortably cool before retiring, and then turn off the machine. In either case, a good night's sleep in hot weather will greatly improve your spirits.

In summer when the relative humidity is high, bringing air into the room from the outside and cooling it will increase the relative humidity and hence the chilling effect.

Many houses in areas near large bodies of water are kept comfortable throughout the summer by means of a dehumidifier in the basement. This requires that the windows be kept closed to exclude the warm, humid air.

When air conditioning was first introduced, there was a tendency to bring the indoor temperature down too drastically.

It is now recognized that people are more comfortable if the temperature is reduced to only 10 to 15 degrees below the outside official temperature (the official temperature is always taken in the shade), provided the humidity is also reduced. This holds true even for the hottest days.

Edson In Washington Capital Civil Rights March Could Be the Biggest Ever

WASHINGTON (NEA) - A Negro march on Washington scheduled for Aug. 28, to influence passage of civil rights legislation would be the third such capital demonstration in American history.

The march of "Coxey's Army" of 500 unemployed during the 1893 depression was first. The marchers were led by Jacob S. Coxey, later mayor of Massillon, Ohio. Coxey had what was then considered the silly idea that the government should authorize a \$500 million bond issue to finance public works which would give the unemployed jobs.

He failed to influence Congress, which rejected his notion as a proposal to print \$500 million in paper money to give to the unemployed. Coxey himself was arrested. His army dwindled to 300, and finally faded away in despair.

Just how "silly" Coxey's idea was may be indicated by the fact that last year Congress appropriated \$400 million for President Kennedy's accelerated public program to relieve unemployment. This device was also used by the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt to create jobs during the depression of the 1930s. Coxey was simply 40 years ahead of his time.

Shortly before Roosevelt's election in 1932 came the second march of the unemployed on Washington. This was the Bonus March of 5,000 unemployed veterans. They demanded that their adjusted compensation insurance certificates of 1924 be paid in cash on demand, instead of 20 years after issuance or on the death of the insured, if that came first.

There were several bitter riots in Washington until federal troops drove the Bonus Marchers across the Potomac to a camp on what is now Pentagon grounds.

Congress then passed a bill giving the marchers 75 cents a day and railroad fare home. They were finally cleared out at a cost to the Veterans Administration of \$77,000. It was not until 1936 that Congress settled the veterans' grievance by making the adjusted compensation certificates transferable into government bonds, which could then be cashed on demand.

History never repeats itself exactly. But both Coxey's Army and the Bonus Marchers left lessons applicable today. Neither demonstration stamped Congress into granting the petitioners immediate relief. The reforms they sought came later, but ultimately they got what they were after.

What is being planned now, however, is not a Washington demonstration by a mere 500 or 5,000 bedraggled marchers arriving on foot. Negro leaders are talking about a pilgrimage of from 100,000 to 150,000, or probably 300,000. It is no idle dream. Over 120,000 Negro protesters marched peacefully in a Detroit freedom walk on June 24, then quietly dispersed without incident.

The march is planned as a peaceful demonstration. Negro leaders have declared that if there is to be violence the march should be called off. Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy is using his influence to have the march called off fearing that it will get out of hand and believing that it will do no good in influencing Congress for the Negro cause.

Some Negro leaders seem to think however, that if a filibuster against civil rights legislation develops in the Senate, this mass protest would help break the deadlock.

The Fourth of July

"We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all Men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty, and the Pursuit of Happiness. We declared the Representatives of the United States of America, in General Congress assembled, on July 4, 1776.

Not only did these brave forefathers of ours thereby dedicate themselves to freeing the young country from the yoke of British oppression, but also by their Declaration of Independence they laid down a philosophy of government that has been of paramount influence through all the days of the Republic.

On this occasion of the 187th anniversary of that first Fourth of July, Independence Day, let us pause a moment to remember that Thomas Jefferson and the other "Representatives of the United States of America" were declaring their intention to establish a government more in keeping with distinctly American ideals than that government which had exercised such tyrannous power over the colonies and their peoples. The founders were not declaring their intention to do away with government, to substitute anarchy for "absolute Despotism." They declared it was their "Right . . . their Duty" to be free of British Guards for their future Security."

The "new Guards" were, of course, to be a new Government. The founders of our Nation said WE will provide for ourselves as a self-governing United States, a government to be characterized in the immortal words of Abraham Lincoln, commemorating a battle fought 100 years ago this Independence Day, as ". . . of the people, by the people, for the people."

Those Americans who declared Independence and then fought to make it stick were opposing a government of such little regard for American feelings and desires that its leaders, from King George III through the Parliament, were THEY . . . and not WE.

This early-American feeling that THEY — not WE — constituted the governing authority persists in some quarters today. Despite the demonstrable fact that through history our representative form of National government has remained responsive to the will of the majority while providing protections to minority rights, there are many Americans who decline to regard themselves as members of their government as citizens holding the franchise, the right of free speech, the right of petition and other, rights assured by the Constitution.

How many times on this Fourth of July will orators remind their audiences that WE Americans control our destiny through O.U.R. voice in government, that the government is of US and is OURS. Many times, I hope, because that continues to be as true today as

when the drafters of the Constitution chose to begin its magnificent expression with the words: "WE the People of the United States."

Unfortunately, many citizens have fallen into the THEY habit in thinking of the government. On this Fourth of July, I would commend to them a re-reading of the Declaration of Independence, the Constitution, and any good, thorough history of the United States.

As a boy, like most American youngsters, I expended more pennies than I should have in buying firecrackers to commemorate Independence Day. Now, many States and most cities have enacted laws to protect citizens from the dangers of pyrotechnic celebrating. Noting this fact, and to provide an appropriate substitute, the Senate and House this week enacted a resolution declaring that "the anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence should be observed each year by the ringing of bells throughout the United States at the hour of 2 o'clock, eastern daylight time, in the afternoon of the 4th day of July, or at such other time on that day as may be determined by local authority."

The tolling of the Liberty Bell at Independence Hall in Philadelphia at 2 o'clock on the 4th day of July 1776 proclaimed the signing of the Declaration of Independence. We've had Fourth of July bell-ringing since that time and I'm glad the Congress has provided through the new resolution further encouragement of that practice.

In the Panhandle 2 o'clock eastern daylight time, will fall at noon. I hope everyone within reach of a bell goes forth to ring it proudly and that a great, if non-explosive, din will ensue.
