Harriman Confers With Top Officials

MOSCOW (UPI) - U.S. presidential envoy W. Averell Harriman met for 31 hours with Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev here today in a dramatic bid to save the peace in Laos. He said Khrushchev declared he still supports a 1961 accord with President Kernedy to preserve a free Laos.

Harriman presented Khrushchev a personal message from President Kennedy during the extraordinary conference that took place in the Soviet leader's Kremlin office. Before seeing Khrushchev, Harriman met with Foreign Minister. Andrei Gromyko.

Americans Admit Attack on Capital

MAMI (UPI) — A twin-engine plane, piloted by Cuban exiles, dropped several bombs on the outskirts of Havana Thursday night, reliable refugee sources here reported today. The plane, described as a "commercial-type" craft, flew over Havana looking for a specific target. The target, was not

City Manager Harold Schmitzer today sent a letter to the consultant engineering firm of Forrest & Cotton in Dallas asking that a representative be sent back to Pampa to explain to new city commissioners, recommendations for the city's sewer system improvement as contained in a recent sur-. vey by the company.

The Forrest & Cotton recommendations called for a new sewage treatment plant, modification of the existing plant and for new sewer lines, all for a total expenditure of \$660,000.

The city manager said in his letter to Forrest & Cotton that he wanted to have the three new city commissioners briefed on the water and sewer study report, especially with reference to the sewer system improvements.

"Since the city commission has postponed action on the water and sewer rates," Schmitzer said, "1 feel that we should get started on the sewer improvements so that general obligations bonds can be issued for this work."

The city manager pointed out that the sewer program was one that needs immediate action from a health standpoint.

Schmitzer said that twice recently he has had complaints about the septic condition of the effluent below the treating plant.

Upon investigation with Public Works Director R. B. Cooke and City Water Supt. E. S. Lowry, the city manager stated, conditions were found to be much worse than
