

Overseas, the developing countries of Africa, Asia and Latin America present the United States with foreign aid problems very different to those of Europe

But U.S. objectives remain essentially the same: To help these countries become economically independent and self - supporting enough so that one day aid programs to them might be ended.

Bell said Marshall Plan aid to Europe lasted for five years and helped Europe restore the mighty capital plant that was destroyed during the war and rebuilt its

In Africa, Asia and Latin America, the problem today is to help needy countries build a capital plant, to educate their people and to provide necessary technical as-

sistance in many areas. Many countries receiving aid from the United States and other free world countries are doing all that could be asked of them to achieve economic independence, Bell said. He singled out India, Pakistan, Nigeria and Colombia

for special mention. Some Countries Unwilling Some other countries, however, are either unable or unwilling to help themselves, Bell said.

Viet Nam for example, has had to give priority to other, more urgent questions in its fight against Communist guerrillas. Korea, on the other hand, is not responding to aid, certainly not as fast as the United States would like, Bell

The United States, he said is doing all it can to persuade Western Europe, Japan and Australia to increase their foreign aid programs. Expressed as a percentage of their gross national products, their aid programs already compare favorably with that of the United States, he said.

The total of free world foreign aid programs is \$6 billion of which non-American countries contribute approximately \$2.5 billion and the

United States the rest, Bell said. A main U.S. objective, he said, is to get other countries also to reduce the terms on which they made aid available - long-term loans at low rates of interest, for example.

Bell said several countries had a record almost as good as that of the United States. France was even better, however, because it made a large part of its aid available in the form of grants.

Britain to Stay Aircraft Carrier For Some Time

LONDON (UPI)- Britain will causes genetic damage. for many more years to come with an imminent new American air strike buildup this side of the Atlantic.

into operation on a growing scale. Stroger than Ever

American atomic strike fighters will play an important part in this new U. S. move. Current assessments in London are that by Oct. 1 depleted American bases will be back to their former strength, probably even with their striking power increased.

The fighters will, at least partly, take over from the long range B47 strategic bombers which are to be gradually withdrawn.

Supersonic fighter bombers with operational ranges of more than 1,000 miles are held less vulnerable than the B47-apart from serving additional purposes.

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
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



There are copious, indisputable records of how the U.N. waged war against Katanga without the slightest legal or moral justification. But Tshombe was anticommunist and pro - Western, so he had to be destroyed and his country subjected to U.N. dictates because Moscow decreed it. The records also show that as far back as 1936 Ralph Bunche praised "the principles of equal-

More inaccuracies of Bunche: the U.N. has achieved much since the admission of the African states into that organization, he said. What has it accomplished? Those so-called states have no stable governments, no knowledge of how to make profitable use of what natural resources they have. Without financial and technical aid from Europe or America they will revert to the primitive state in which they were before being developed by non-Africans.
