One Hundred Sixty four Texas cities are listed in the 5000 gallon category. You will notice that Pampa stands 161st on the list with \$3.16 for \$000 gallons of water. This means that there are 160 Texas cities charging more for 5000 galions of water than does Pampa. Three other Texas charge charge the same amount for 5000 gallons of water as does Pampa. The average charge for 5000 gallons of water among these 164 Texas cities is \$4.06 which is 36.9 per cent higher than Pampa's charge. The charge for 5000 gailons of water under the proposed Canadian River Water rate would have been \$3.90 which would have been a 23.8 per cent increase over the present are but still less than the average east for 5000 gallons of water for

## Man Injured In **Family Quarrel** Reported 'Fair'

city policeman Tom Rhodes, who was forced to shoot and kill a 26-year-old man Monday night, was reported in fair condition with a stab wound in his back today at St. Mary's Hospital.

Rhodes said the incident was the result of a family quarrel at a Gallup residence.

The shooting left Theodore Reynolds Jr., 26, dead.

Rhodes answered a call Monday night at the home of Edward and Florabel Nix after Nix called officers, saying his wife had threat-Rhodes accompanied Nix into

bedroom while the man packed his clothing, and Reynolds, the stepson of Nix, came up behind him and stabbed him with a sixinch butcher knife.

Sure. I know of small manufacturers who have tried to compete and some of them have worked day and night earning not 25 cents an hour before social security took its cut even. when they owed no income tax. They have persisted in pounding their own heads against the brick wall of bureaucratic stupidity and socialism until they knew they must either join the dead-head throng or quit. This is the very real tragedy and the

end is not in sight. Our own contacts do not include those who file bankruptcy petitions and the list of small business bankruptcies grows with every passing week and every one of those petitions include all of the poignant personal tragedies of the owners of another

For ourselves, we prefer not to buy products made in toreign countries even by wasc American manufacturers who were urged by government to open up plants in other countries. 



American way of life and patios are the order of the day. They're being constructed all over the country in various shapes and sizes and of a wide variety of materials. Patio blocks, made of concrete are popular because they're easy to make, stay in place, do not deteriorate, form a smooth floor and are easy to clean. Millions of patio blocks have been made by the method covered in the following para-

- 1. Make patio block forms from 2 x 2 dressed lumber. Notch so that sides fit together, yet come apart easily for re-use. Suggested inside dimension 2' x 2'. You can add interest to your patio with half blocks (1' x 2') which you can make by dividing the
- 2. Grease inside surface of form and set form on tar paper. Pour concrete mix into form. A good material to use for this is Sakrete Concrete

addition of water. It's handy because you can start and stop any time. Level the mix with a straight edged board. 3. Smooth the surface with a wood float. Move float over the surface with light pres-

ging tool. Finish patio blocks with steel trowel after concrete has set for about one hour. (Use wood float if rough finish is wanted.) As trowel is moved over surface, hold the leading edge up slightly. For best results, concrète must be moist cured for one week. Forms can be
