By United Press International Alabama and the federal government today appeared headed for a showdown over integration.

A federal judge Tuesday refused to delay the ordered admission of two Negroes to the University of Alabama and Gov. George Wallace immediately vowed to "bar the entrance of any Negro" attempting to enroll In the racially segregated institu-

Another federal judge holds a hearing today in Birmingham on a petition seeking the reinstatement of 1,081 Negro students who skipped school to participate in racial demonstrations. Birmingham has been relatively quiet since the bloody rioting of May

Elsewhere, racial unrest continued in North Carolina and Negro leaders promised an "all out expressed concern over Mayor Allen Thompson's "apparent unwillingness" to name a committee to hear Negro grievances.





The Emmys are trivia. Tuesday night's effort, "The Kremlin," was another NBC landmark in the development of a unique and important television art form, the "living history" documentary, in which not actors-but agile cameras, sound and lighting-create the impression that "you are there." Though cautious television is still in the stone age of the equally important editorial documentary, this other area is nothing to sneeze at; is, in fact, a more overall work of creation. And Tuesday night's program was a worthy successor to the same network's "The River Nile" and "Shakespeare: Soul of an Age." Interesting Background

"The Kremlin" has an interesting background. It was shot with the cooperation of the Soviets before two NBC-TV documentaries -"The Death of Stalin" and "The Rise of Khrushchev"-caused the Russians to kick the network out of the U.S.S.R., news bureau and all. NBC is still banned from the Soviet Union, which may well explain why the Russians, after cooperating, now protest the showing of "The Kremlin" on American video. It might have been even more embarrassing if NBC's vain attempt to land Madame Khrushchev as guide of "The Kremlin" HIGHLAND GENERAL .had succeeded.

.. The color program was stunning in its vibrant capture of the Kremlin's Western-Asiatic flavor, the stark government buildings and the rounded gold domes. It offered news and a touch of mystery at the same time. For part of the show, NBC correspondent Frank Bourgholtzer toured with Lt. Gen. Andrei Vedenin, commandant of the Kremlin and an authority on its history. It was a non-political hour. We saw, from paintings, real-life and art objects, a tracing of Kremlin history from the 12th Century-and NBC cameras recorded the preserved jewels and grand halls.

Remarkable Religious Tone Concentrating on the pre-Bolshevik times, there was a remarkable religious tone to the St. hour, indicative of the days before official atheism. There were also several remarkable "re-enactment" scenes. In one, Napoleon's burning of Moscow was re-created at the Kremlin; it was staged at Christy 2 o'clock one morning during the Cuban crisis in October. In another reenactment, we "saw"through lifelike camera, sound and technics-Ivan the Terrible killing his favorite son, though no one was on the screen.

We also saw Lenin's austere apartment, And throughout the hour, the narration was clear and concise, and the music distinguished.
