As the rainfall moved from west to east, the double rainbow appeared in the East about 7:30 p.m. as the sun came out of clearing skies above the western



# Overland Missile Test Important, Says Scientist

Dr. Russell K. Sherburne said in an interview that a series of Three Sergeant missiles were fired overland last month.

#### Three Tests Planned

Sherburne disclosed that "more than three" such tests of the Pershing are planned. One purpose is to obtain information on the trajectory of the missiles on a west to east firing.

As in the case of the Sergeant overland tests, the Pershing misarea in the northern area of the sprawling 100 by 40 mile White Sands Missile Range

An explosive in the missile allows officials to destroy it after launch if it strays off course. But ballistic missile has virtually no chance of missing its target area and landing on populated areas that it travels over

#### More Launched Later

Sherburne said that more Pershings will be launched from the four corners area near Blanding, Utah, in late summer. They are to be followed by tests from a Green River, Utah launch site of the "Athena"—a four-stage missile combination

"Purpose of the 'Athena' tests is to look at the missile while it is coming back into the atmosphere," Sherburne explained.

Looking to the longer range future, he said there are "definitely other programs" for similar tests. Sherburne said these might include distant launches of the Atlas or Polaris missiles to impact at White Sands in the southern New Mexico desert.


"This range is the only place where such tests can be made." he said, "but the missiles have to be launched outside the range.'

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

America has three major spaceports from which it launches men and instruments:

 WALLOPS ISLAND. Oldest of the spaceports, Wallops was established by the old Na-tional Advisory Committee for Aeronautics in 1945 off the Virginia shore as a branch of Langley Research Center. Since then, over 5,000 research vehicles, mainly sounding rockets, have been launched from Wallops, more than from any other site.

Though it concentrates on short-range, suborbital flights (the first Mercury capsules were tested here), Wallops has orbited three satellites-Explorers IX, XIII and XVI-using the four-stage, solid-fueled Scout rocket developed

• PT. ARGUELLO. NASA's Pacific Launch Operations Office, located about 160 miles north of Los Angeles, is the only spaceport from which satellites can be placed into polar orbits without crossing populated areas. First land due south is Antarctica, 6,500 miles away. Most important mission for this spaceport will be the launching of seven Nimbus advanced

weather satellites over the next two years.

 CAPE CANAVERAL. The most valuable sandbar in the world, this is the largest and most glamorous of the spaceports. To be exact, Cape Canaveral is the 15,000-acre reservation operated by Department of Defense, which also maintains the tracking stations along the Atlantic Missile Range.

The civilian spaceport at Cape Canaveral-NASA's Launch Operations Center-will soon be headquartered to the north on 87,000-acre Merritt Island. From here missions to the moon and beyond will be launched.

Construction began this year on the first of 40 buildings on Merritt Island. Among them will be a gigantic 52-story, \$100 million "shed" where Saturn V moon rockets will be readied. Huge 51/2-million-pound crawler transports costing \$4 to \$5 million each will inch the Saturn and its launch equipment—400 feet high and weighing 12 million pounds-about two miles in two hours to a launching pad for fueling, final tuning and boarding by astronauts.


Again the tourist heard a call and the same scene that had taken place before him was taking form. Amezed at what happened he proceeded on his way.



NEW YORK - Nearly 40 per cent of the \$25.8 billion collected in federal highway user taxes since mid-1956 has been spent for nonhighway purposes, according to Oil Facts.

Latest government figures show that between July 1, 1956 and Dec. 31, 1962, the federal government diverted nearly \$10.3 billion in such taxes from the highway program. By the spring of this year, the total approached \$11 billion. publication said.
