



The last public report in any detail by the administration on Soviet military strength in Cuba was made by President Kennedy at a news conference April 3. Kennedy said the "rough calculation" of the number of Russian troops in Cuba at the height of the October missile crisis was 21.000 to 22.000. He said an estimated 5,000 were withdrawn in November when the Russians pulled their long range missiles out of Cuba, and an estimated 4.000 more were withdrawn by April

At another news conference April 24, Kennedy said 4,000 or 5.000 had. left since January. The figures-depending on which ones are used, indicated 11,000 to 13.-000 troops remained in April. At that time administration officials also told newsmen there was no evidence any of the 5,000 to 6,000 combat troops included in the totals had left.

Fourteen years of fruitless disarmament negotiations with Russia have shown the utter failure of a policy of conciliation with an implacable foe. The nuclear test ban negotiations are additional proof that the Communists se such maneuvers to promote hope that these problems can be settled peacefully. Their main effort is directed toward building up their own strength, while mentally disarming the West. Those who formulate our foreign policy do not seem to understand the real nature of communism. It would be far better for these officials to read fifty books on that subject than to walk fifty miles. It might enable them to understand the utter folly of continuing to finance our enemies and to back Communist policies in and out of U.N. No wonder no one trusts out anti - Communist leadership. Actually, our efforts promote the communization of the world. Our man standing between them and actions speak so loudly that no one can hear our feeble anti-Communist words. Our State Department has said that we must not encourage indigenous anti - Communist activity in the Communist lands. protest against this foolish policy. We should encourage all such activities with every means available to us. We should make increasing propaganda against the Kremlin Communists for not keeping their promise to hold free elections in Germany and the satellite countries in Eastern Europe, for the purpose of reuniting the former and setting up governments in the latter in accordance with the wishes of the people. We should not let the world forget these promises and we should continually insist that they be kept. Our country continues to finance the pro - Communist propaganda rolling from U.N. and its subordinate agencies, designed to overthrow freedom, to promote Communist ideology and lead us gradually into communism. 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
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
