1.5 Million Farmers Eligible in Heated Controls Proposal

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Wheat farmers across the nation are expected to vote in record-breaking numbers Tuesday in a referendum on whether to accept President Kennedy's production control plan.

An estimated 1.5 million farmers will be eligible to vote on the issue that has generated more heat than a major political race in many farm areas. Agriculture Department officials said the turnout undoubtedly would set a new record.







A LOCAL RESPONSIBILITY

The U.S. House of Representatives has a real responsibility to insist that metropolitan areas and states handle their own transportation problems and not foist them off on the taxpayers of the

Because of the failure of the Senate to defeat passage of the Urban Mass Transportation Act of 1963, this special burden faces the House. What the Senate did was to approve expenditure of \$375 million in loans and grants to modernize transit systems in some of the nation's big cities. This sum would have zero benefit to hundreds of other communities in the county. It is special interest legislation that should

not become law. The legislation was drafted because New York, Chicago, Philadelphia and other big cities are having troubles with their local commuter rail services. In New England, for example, private rail lines, which have heavy tax burdens and the usual high costs of labor,have indicated that they cannot provide commuter service as they used to do. It is true, of course, that commuter rail service is uniquely vexing to rail lines, as the traffic rush is tremendous during the morning and late afternoon hours and business is virtually at a standstul the rest of the day. This means that bundreds of expensive railroad cars are tied up because of a demand that falls during only a brief period of the day. Because of these conditions, public authorities in New York and elsewhere have subsidized certain

commuter rail services. In the last few years, however, a great push has been made toward getting taxpayers across the country to take on a problem that belongs to only a few areas. The liberals want the federal government to gradually take over all mass transportation sys-

This bill should be cut out in the House. The basic reason is that mass transit is not a national responsibility. If private enterprise finds it unsuitable to provide the desired services in a metropolitan area, then the cities or states concerned should get together to do what should be done. It is their responsibility, and they should pay for it - not the people living in rural areas or in small or medium-size cities. If the commuter service problem is overwhelming, it most probably is because cities have failed to think ahead and plan for the futrue. The nation's tax payers should not be forced to underwrite a huge new subsidy program because of a lack of mu-

nicipal foresight. If ever there were a local responsibility, it is mass transit. The situation with commuter trains, for instance, can't be compared with the federal highway program. The new superhighways are built in all parts of the country. They are used by people who travel about the entire land on pleasure or business. But an urban mass transit system doesn't serve the nation; it serves the people of only one city or one state, at the most. Thus, it is only fair and logical that the users pay for the mass transit system, if private lines are not available. People in Alabama or texas or West Virginia should not be asked to finance commuter trains for people who work in

downtown New York or Chicago. If these arguments weren't sufficient to demolish the urban transit bill, the general condition of the federal budget should cause proponents of the legislation to admit their error. The country is heading into bigger and bigger deficits. It has been estimated that the deficit - over a four-year period-will amount to \$30 billion. If the U. S. A. is to finance mass transit for the nation's big cities, expenditures running to billions will be required. This would be a greivious blow at the financial condition to the

The Urban Mass Transportation Act of 1963 should meet its end in the House of Representatives. It's time for the conservative coalition to get to work to kill this piece of legislative folly.

In the Chinese party will be Teng Hsiao-Ping, top party secretary, and Peking Mayor Peng

It will not, however, include Mao Tse-Tung, the one man who can make the final decision.

In Moscow there is no belief that the conference will settle the deep ideological differences between the two but it is felt the meeting must be held if only to prove Moscow's good intent. Meanwhile, there will be no flirtation with the West to fur-

ther muddy the issue. Do-Nothing Attitude

To this is attributed in large measure the reason for the Soviet Union present do-nothing attitude in the 17-nation disarmament talks at Geneva.

In his most recent message to President Kennedy, Khrushchev is reported to have reiterated his position that the Soviet Union would permit no more than two to three on-site inspections annually to guard against secret violations of a nuclear test ban

He thus rejected a proposal by Kennedy and British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan that new efforts be made to reach agreement, possibly at high level.

In any event, in the present state of Sino-Soviet relations, it is certain the Chinese, intent on exploding a nuclear device of their own, would reject any disarmament agreement reached without their participation.
