The Soviet leader landed at The Soviet leader landed at East Berlin's Schoenefeld Airfield at 2 p.m. (9 a.m. EDT) to of the 70th birthday of East German Communist party boss Walter Ulbricht and perhaps to hold an Eastern Red bloc summit Thought Failure

In a welcoming speech, Ulbricht charged that Kennedy's visit to West Berlin was "directed against the interests of the German people."

"I am in full agreement with the remarks made by comrade Ulbricht about the Kennedy visft." Khrushchev said in a sixminute reply.

Khrushthev's speech other wise consisted almost entirely of thanks to Ulbricht and other East German Communist leaders. Part of his statement was drowned out by a Russian jet plane tak-

ing off. Khrushchev flew here directly from Moscow aboard a whitepainted, four - engined Russian *IL18 turbo-prop transport, amid reports that other Communist leaders from Poland, Czechoslovakia, Romania and Hungary also were on the way.
