Oil Company Merger Set For Next Year

HOUSTON (UPI)—The merger of Texas Gulf Producing Co. and Socomo Oil Co. is expected to be completed sometime next year.

The disclosure of merger negotiations was made over the week end by Texas Gulf chairman Gordon W. Reed at the annual meeting.

Reed explained that the high cost of doing business was behind the move. "In the 22 years that the present management has headed the company," he said,

the cost of producing oil has gone from 10 cents a barrel to \$1.75. At the same time, he said, the price of oil has dropped about 20 cents a barrel in recent years.

The oil official declined to go into details about the merger talks other than that the company is seeking a tax-free exchange of stock.

Reed estimated Texas Gulf earned \$2 million or 50 cents a share in the first quarter, up from \$1,550,000 or 38 cents a share a year earlier.

Television In Review

By RICK DU BROW HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — Last year, this viewer recorded an obvious fact, which was that Dick Clark's daily teenage dance show on ABC-TV is a tasteless horror.

It was chilling—rather than funny—to learn that almost 100 letter writers disagreed.

What most of these correspondents, even the literate ones, failed to note in said column were these sentences: "The paradoxical and almost pathetic thing is that although it is easy to dismiss the show, it is not so easy to skim over Clark, who is an intelligent and literate fellow, yet just riding-again. He is now rich enough and clever enough to venture into the adult world. He proved that with a fine performance in the movie 'The Young Doctors'."

Monday night, Clark ventured into the adult world on ABC-TV's "Stoney Burke" series as a tough, non-herc, non-bravado cop who runs a big city youth center for rough youngsters. The hour drama, "Kincaid" (his fictional name), was a test film for a projected series about the same character if public reaction is good.

Holds His Own

It was good to report when Clark's dance show was cut almost in half last fall, and it was even better to report recently that this same ugly daily cavorting is out altogether next season, though it may be revived for once a week on Saturdays. But it is most satisfying to report after Monday night's performance that as suggested last year, Clark can more than hold his own on a worthwhile level.

"Kincaid" was about as light-weight as Ross Hunter is to Federico Fellini. It centered simply around the story of a punk who tries to frame another in a robbery at the youth center. But Clark, no matter what his personal detractors may feel, was nothing less than excellent at his task. His terse, low-key performance, like his portrayal in "The Young Doctors," never struck a false note. At times, it was admirably and excitingly reminiscent of the workmanlike quality Alan Ladd and Dick Powell once gave to simple but good detective movies.

Hard Work Shows

Those who worked on "Kincaid" worked hard on it, and it showed in the production qualities. Though an obvious piece, its instincts were good. Clark is a personality, and naturally the script was geared to show he understood misunderstood young stress, his stock in trade. But it was not at all offensive, he made it convincing.

It is probably too much to expect a full series to maintain such a consistently unaffected approach, but if it could, and if "Kincaid" were scheduled properly, it could be a pleasantly businesslike series for relaxation and a smashing success commercial. It is certainly better than punk singers who need tonsillectomies and a change of diapers.

The Channel Swim: An hour-long special about the New York repertory company of Lincoln Center, which is America's newest major theatre group and is in its formative stages, will air on ABC-TV May 5. Director Ella Kazan is the narrator, and those appearing include Marlon Brando, Anne Bancroft, Jason Robards Jr., Paul Newman, Joanne Woodward, Arthur Miller and Jane Fonda. Construction of the company's temporary theatre home has been delayed by a rental dispute and difficulties over a building permit.

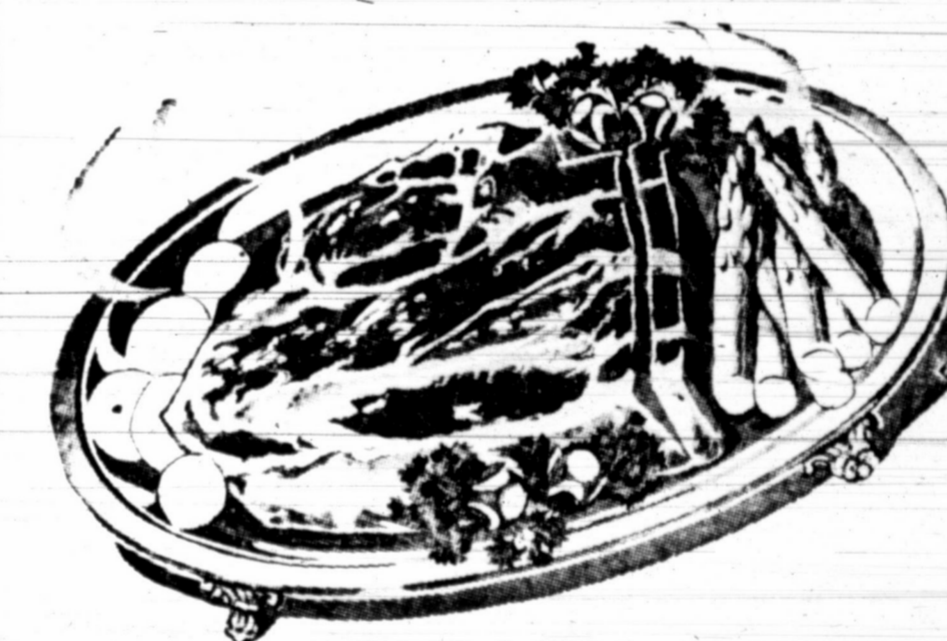

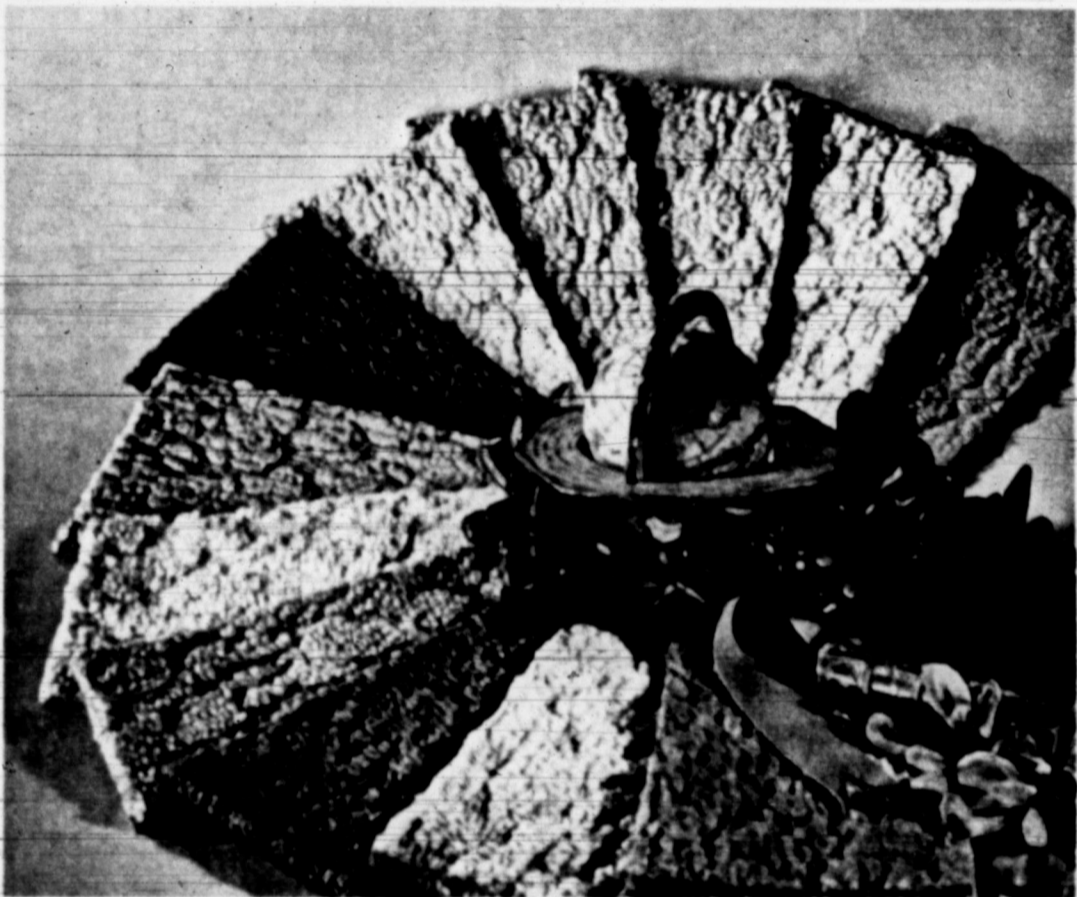
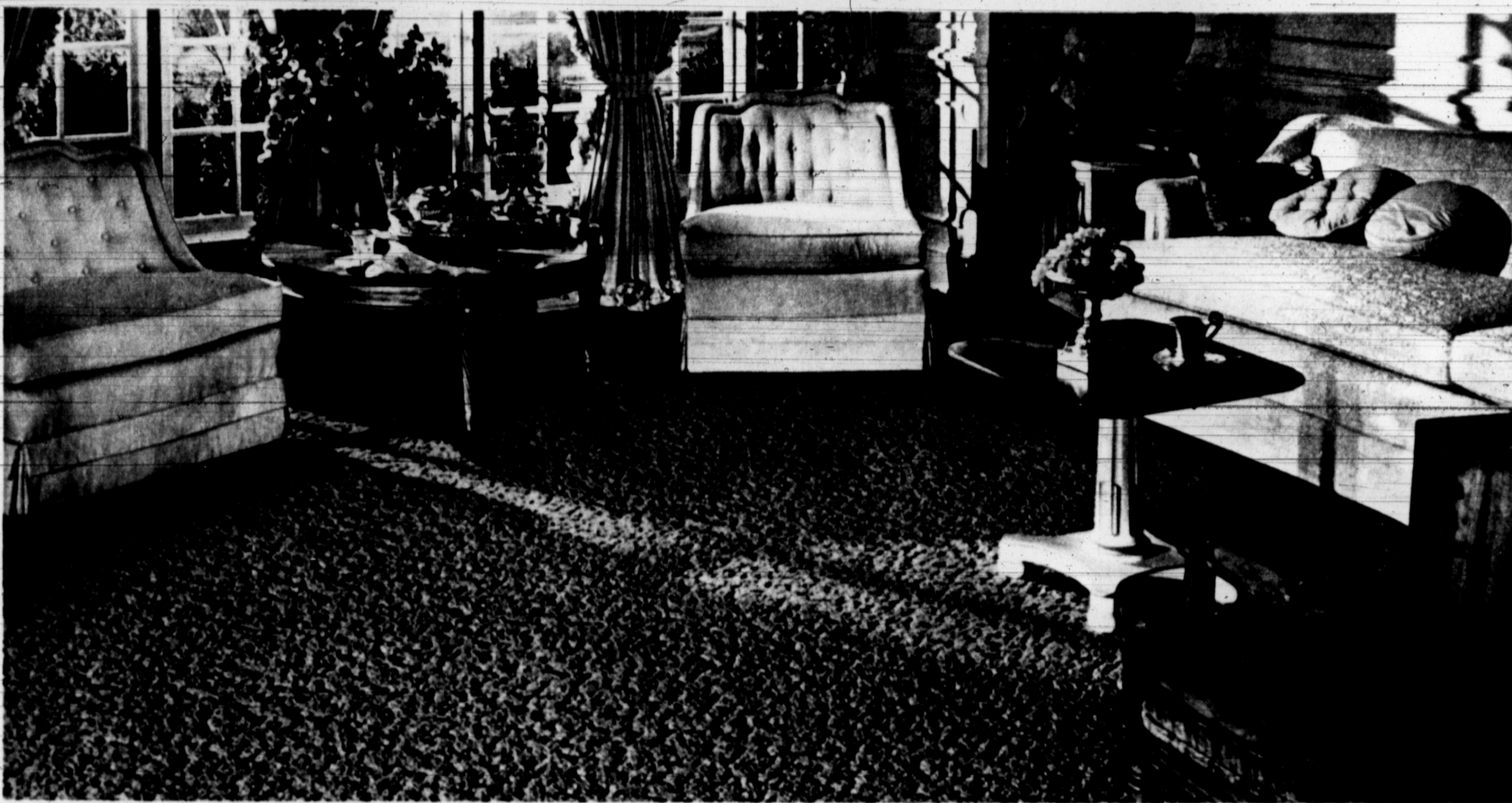

Atty. General Asks Exiles to Get Together and Talk

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy wants badly splintered Cuban exile groups to get together so the government can hold discussions with them about dealing with Castro. The attorney general said that television program Sunday that unification of the Cuban refugee groups in this country is "the most important thing that could be accomplished" in coping with Cuban communism. He also joined his brother, President Kennedy, in denying that the chief executive ever promised exile leader Jose Miro Cardona that this country would launch a second invasion of Cuba. Kennedy said persons who talk about the number of Soviet troops in Cuba without offering proof of their statements do "a disservice to the United States and make the President's position far more difficult."

Sen. Kenneth B. Keating, R-N.Y., frequently has spoken out on the troops issue. Recently he said that there still are 17,000 Soviet personnel on the island, the same number that were there at the time of the October missile crisis.

Love Story Has Happy, Horsey End

ANTLERS, Okla. (UPI) — An Oklahoma cowboy's horseback ride to California has ended in Palo Pinto, Tex., where a widow who loves horses proved too much for the rugged rider.

Jessey Hearn left Antlers on March 30 for the long trek West. Things went smoothly until someone stole his horse at Grand Prairie, Tex., just outside Dallas. The thieves rode the horse hard and by the time Jessey found him and resumed the trip, his mount was pooped. So was Jessey.

It seems the day before the ride began, Hearn underwent the worst possible type of surgery you can experience before such a ride.

Stops at Farm
Hearn got as far as Palo Pinto before he stopped at a farm house owned by Mrs. Opal Ince, who has lived alone since her husband died last January.

"I'm not in the habit of taking in travelers," Mrs. Ince said. But she checked with Hearn's sponsors in Antlers and was impressed with his credentials. Bill Introduced to Cut TRC Regulatory Powers

AUSTIN (UPI) — Rep. Henry Grover of Houston today introduced a bill in the House to cut the regulatory powers of the Texas Railroad Commission. Grover's bill, which required permission by two-thirds majority for introduction this late in the season, would create a state commerce commission to regulate the transportation industry in Texas. He said creation of a new commission would allow the Railroad Commission more time to handle affairs of the oil and gas industry. Grover said his bill was not intended as a "slap" at the rail-

road commissioners "personally or in any other way." He said recent events, including slant hole wells, pointed up the need for creating a new commission. No Relationship
"There is no real relationship between regulation of the oil and gas and the transportation industry," he said. His bill, which was referred to committee, would leave transportation of oil and gas by pipeline under Railroad Commission regulation.

Senate consideration of the House-passed \$33 million tax package was scheduled today, another move towards ironing out a spending bill for the next two years.

The painting is a view of the brightly-lit Perth skyline from across the Swan River. It was done by Frank North, head of the Perth Art Gallery.

DeGaulle Wants Monroe Doctrine For Europeans

NEW YORK (UPI) — French President Charles de Gaulle aims at a "Monroe Doctrine for Europe," Joseph W. Grigg reported. Grigg, chief European correspondent of United Press International, came here from Paris for an address at the annual breakfast for UPI regional editors and publishers associations.

The representatives of UPI subscribers, meeting at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel, also were told that "unknown years of struggle" are in prospect in South Viet Nam, where the United States has thrown in 12,000 fighting men and is spending more than \$1.5 million a day.

ANPA Meeting Starts
That was the report of the UPI Sagon bureau manager, Neil Sheehan. The two foreign correspondents came to New York to report on two widely separated areas of news interest. The UPI breakfast was the opening of the annual convention of the American Newspaper Publishers Association.

Merriman Smith, UPI White House reporter, was master of ceremonies. The guests were welcomed by Mims Thomson, UPI president, and Earl J. Johnson, vice president and editor.

Grigg said a member of the French government told him recently that De Gaulle was today not so much interested in making plans for 1963 or 1964 as for 10 or even 20 years from now—for his successors.

"As the same member of the government put it, the vision is one of a 'Europe for the Europeans,'" Grigg said. "Or, to put it in different words, one of a sort of 'Monroe Doctrine' for Europe."

Difficult Days Ahead
"People close to De Gaulle say this does not mean he is basically anti-American, though I do believe relations with him are going to be difficult for quite a time to come."

Sheehan said that "the United States for more than a year now has been engaged in a war in South Viet Nam. The eventual outcome, most observers feel, still is uncertain."

The authoritarian regime of President Ngo Dinh Diem has so far shown little sign of winning popular support, Sheehan said. "It is ironic," he added, "that the most vocal defenders of the Diem regime are Americans. Very few Vietnamese, even those who work for it, privately support Diem's government."

"Diem has so far shown little sign of making the political and social reforms which the United States has been attempting to persuade him to enact since we became fully committed in South Viet Nam in October, 1961."

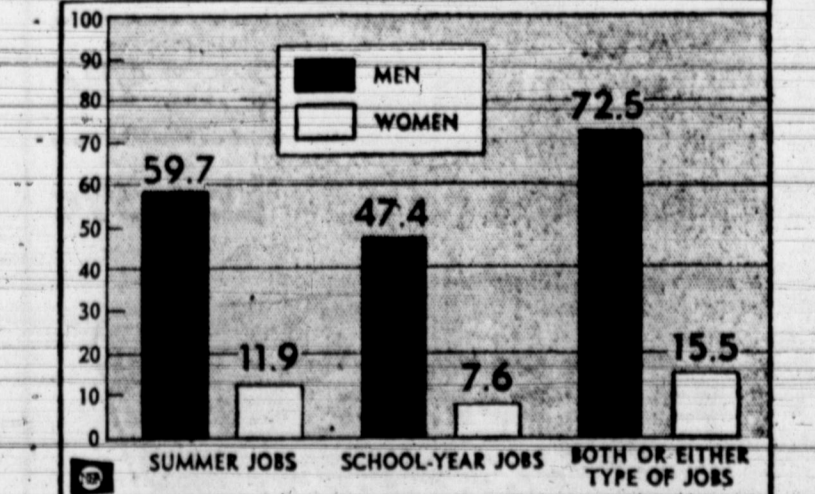

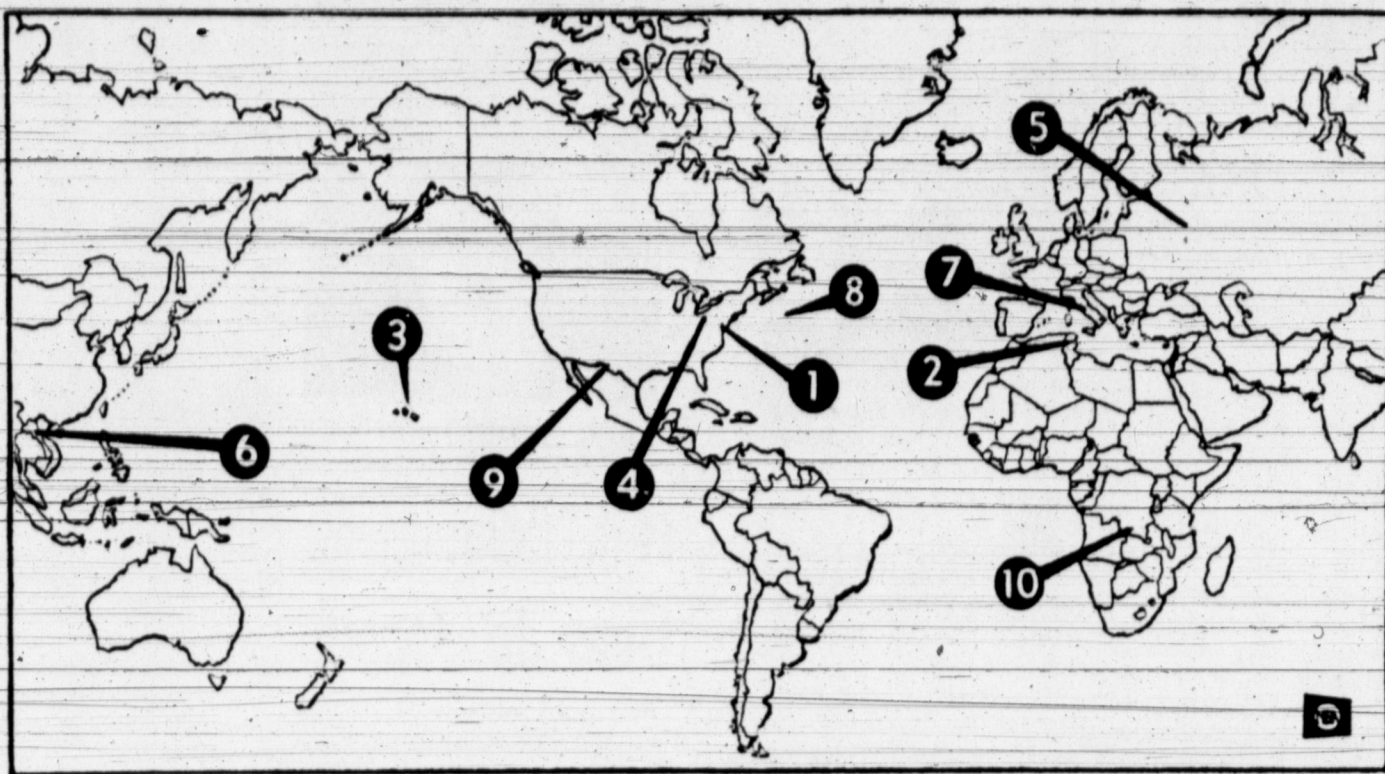

Emphasis on 'Men' Growing In Men in Space Programs

DALLAS (UPI)—Astronaut Scott Carpenter said today that the man in the space vehicle will play a more important part in the U. S. space effort from now on.

Carpenter spoke today in the first meeting of a three-day American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics manned space flight meeting. Carpenter made the second orbital flight of the Mercury space program last May 24.

Gordon Cooper will make the sixth and final flight of the Mercury program next month. Of Cooper's flight, Carpenter said: "Gordon will take advantage of the experience we have gained with drifting flight to stretch the

spacecraft fuel supplies to cover the 30 hours he will be in space. "Gordon will continue the modest program of research which John Glenn and I began by taking special photographs for the Weather Bureau to determine the relative clarity of cloud formations in the infra-red spectral regions.

"Further, photographs of the earth's limits and the night air glow are also planned, together with the study of the visibility of a flashing light which may be used as an aid in making rendezvous in our future space programs, Gemini and Apollo."

Carpenter noted that the first manned Gemini rendezvous in space flights will be made in 1964. In another talk at the meeting today, James A. Chamberlin, senior engineering advisor to the director of NASA's Manned Spacecraft Center, noted that the astronauts themselves will complete by

sight the final phases of rendezvous in space. Radar will be used to bring a manned vehicle and an unmanned vehicle "close" enough in the Gemini project for a junction of the two vehicles to be completed by the two astronauts in the manned capsule.

Gov. John Connally of Texas welcomed delegates to the meeting, the second to be held in Dallas.

He recalled the role of Texas in aviation, noting that within 30 miles of Dallas—28,549 aircraft were produced, 22,638 in World War II.

Connally said the state is now aiming at similarly important role in the space program. Astronaut Virgil Grissom and space expert Dr. Wernher Von Braun also were scheduled to appear on today's program.

Probes Upper Atmosphere

PHILADELPHIA (UPI)—The stainless steel satellite, Explorer XVII, now orbiting the earth, is expected to remain aloft two to three months and double the amount of information now available on the upper atmosphere.

The 410-pound spacecraft is leak-proof and contains instrumentation for precisely measuring the density, composition, pressure and temperature of the upper atmosphere—something no other satellite has achieved to date.

The satellite, built by the Budd Company which also jointly designed the structure with the National Aeronautical and Space Agency's Goddard Space Flight Center, was made leak-proof to prevent contamination of the space atmosphere with earthly gases. The 22 access ports in the 25-1000ths inch thick mirror surface of the satellite shell are fabricated so precisely that they will "leak" only about one cubic inch of helium every 100 years.

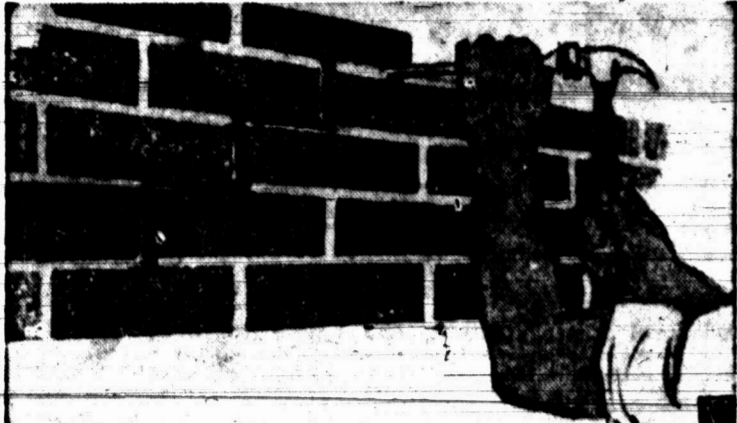

Repairing Loose Mortar Joints



Loose or cracked mortar in brick or block work permits water to enter and cause interior wall damage. In time, this damage can be severe, so it's wise to make repairs when the defects first appear. Fortunately, you can do the job quickly, easily and inexpensively—thanks to ready mixed materials available at most hardware stores, lumber and building material dealers.

The first step in repairing is to clean out loose or cracked mortar with cold chisel or screw driver. Flush out the opening with hose. While joint is still damp, fill with mortar. Press

the mortar firmly to be sure no cavities remain. This is called tuck pointing and an excellent material to use is Sakrete Mortar Mix. It comes in easy-to-handle sacks and is ready for use with the addition of water.

After filling cavity, scrape off excess mortar and finish joint to match rest of the wall. This is easy to do with a jointing tool or a flat or rounded stick—depending on joint to be matched. Finally, after about five minutes, brush across joint to remove excess mortar then finish again with jointing tool.

This is the easiest, best and most economical way to repair faulty masonry work.

Construction of Nursing Homes in Texas Increasing

Over Texas more than 100 Nursing Homes have been built since 1953. The construction upsurge is continuing.

Eldred Thomas of Dallas, past president of the American Nursing Home Association (ANHA), noted that the ranks of elderly people have grown rapidly in recent years. In 1890, the average person lived 30 years. Today's average is 70, he pointed out. The present 17,500,000 U. S. population aged 65 and over is soaring toward 30,000,000 by 1980.

The proportion of aged will keep increasing as the medical revolution that began with wonder drugs progresses. About 1 U. S. resident in 11 is now in the 65-or-older bracket.

"Two per cent of the 65 and over group requires nursing care which is difficult to give in the home and too expensive in hospitals," Thomas pointed out.

The average stay in a nursing home is 2 1/2 years, he said, and the average age is 80. Two thirds of the residents are women, reflecting the longer average life-spans of their sex.

The first national nursing home accreditation program will soon reach Texas, sponsored by the ANHA and American Medical Association. Among effects, Thomas predicted, will be higher standards and an increase in usage as more insurance companies extend health and hospitalization policies to pay for care in these places.

An accreditation program is also being developed for nonprofit homes for the aging, sponsored by the American Association of Homes for the Aging (AAHA). It, too, will soon be operating in Texas, according to the Rev. Howard W. Washburn, AAHA director and administrator of Blanton Gardens.

The big problem is still poverty on the part of most of the people needing residence care in their advanced years. As more people become able to pay the cost of adequate facilities, the facilities will be provided.

Presently, only Texas receiving state Old Age Assistance grants are eligible for the supplementary state vendor payments to help finance nursing care. A measure pending in the Legislature to extend this coverage to all 65-and-over persons who are medically indigent. An estimated 14,000 Texans would then be utilizing the federal-state nursing care assistance, about the present number of beneficiaries.

Maximum vendor payments for Texas Old Age Assistance recipients in nursing homes now range from \$75 to \$135 per month, depending upon the extent of care the person requires. Counting his OAA grant, an impoverished older receiving intensive care in a nursing home can draw up to \$217 monthly total state public assistance. Whether this is sufficient to provide adequate services is being debated.

State and local licensing, plus higher standards required of nursing homes wishing to qualify under certain Social Security provisions and be certified for vendor payments, has caused some of the small, unlit places to go out of business. More establishments will have to improve or meet the same fate.

Meanwhile, professionals in the care of the aged are experimenting with many new approaches to better their services. The era of old people in old buildings and the philosophy of "They're going to die anyhow, so why bother?" is slowly fading.

The new look in residence care homes for those up in years is one of sparkling cleanliness, of smiles, good food, attractive decor, fine medical equipment and recreational facilities to promote health and extend lives.

The lofty aim is to keep aged citizens happy, aspiring and useful, instead of relegating them to smelly, back-room dumps to suffer and die in misery.

Long overdue places in the sunshine are being prepared for increasing numbers of those who have made their contribution to our society — our healthy, frail, sick and disabled older citizens.
