Castro Empties Prisons of All Americans, Except One Enemy

Donovan Arranges Prisoner Exchange

HOMESTEAD AFB, Fla. (UPI) — Cuban Premier Fidel Castro emptied his dungeons of all American prisoners except one lengtime enemy Monday in exchange for four Cubans held in U.S. jails.

The bearded Cuban dictator also promised to allow 800 to 1.000 Cubans to leave his Communist island later this week as part of the deal.



Berlin Negotiations Are More Idle Words

By ED DELANEY

was another meeting between Anatoly Dobrynin, Soviet ambassador at Washington and Sec. of State Dean Rusk, presumably to indulge in more political persiflage - meaning idle words - in relation to the Berlin situation. To interested newsmen, the State Department released the information that the discussion was to ascertain whether serious negotiations on that question are possible. They are not, but apparently Dean Rusk has not made that clear to the Soviet in their many previous talks.

One of the suggestions now being advanced by Khrushchev is that 'the flags of the United States, Britain and France behauled down in West Berlin and replaced by the spiderweb emblem of the United Nations. That is tantamount to admission by Khrushchev that he anticipates no opposition from the U.N. to communist designs and expansions, either in Berlin or else-

Khrushchev knows that alf-matters of a military nature in which the U.N. is involved will be properly handled by the communist head of such operations at the U.N. He knows the history of the Korean war. He knows that it was U.N. pressure, implemented. through Harry Truman, which brought about the recall of Gen. Douglas MacArthur and denied victory which was then in his grasp. Khrushchev knows, although the U.N. announced when the Korean war began that there would be a united Korea, that this was merely verbal camouflage and that if the entire country could not be brought under the Red emblem, at least the northern part would be communist controlled. Khrushchev knows that the U.N. agreed to a coalition regime in Laos, which is infested with communists. He knows that the U.N. took no action in the Cuban situation which would embarrass the Soviet Union. President Kennedy's counsel-Dean Rusk's bailiwick, has urged that we do nothing which

> These proposals of Khrushchev, through the Soviet ambassador in Washington or their foreign minister Gromyko, are but tiresome repetitions of proposals made in the past and summarily rejected by the Western powers. The goal of the Soviet is to maneuver in some manner to gain a measure of recognition for the illegal puppet regime presently in the Soviet zone of Germany with the misnomer German Democratic Republic. In fact Gromyko himself made an error when speaking on this subject at Geneva during one of those futile conferences a couple years ago. He observed that the most equitable . approach to the Berlin problem would be to permit West Berlin the enj-yment of the "full sovereignty of the German Democratic Republic.

The world knows what kind of existence and enjoyment is the fate of those in the so-called German Democratic Republic. The world knows that in order to prevent the prisoners from escaping they have built a manamed the Wall of Shame. Yet despite the dangers involved, every week some desperate persons tunnel under or contrive to get over that wall. Khrushchev knows that the United States took no positive measure to prevent the erection of that wall. It was expected that the Western powers would prevent its building and for that reason the East German police along the demarcation line were not given ammunition for their arms that morning. There would be no untoward incident. no shooting by the East Germans. They would simply have retreated had the Western powers taken the steps necessary to halt construction of the Wall. 

Repairing Loose Mortar Joints

Loose or cracked mortar in brick or block work permits water to enter and cause interior wall damage. In time, this damage can be severe, so it's wise to make repairs when the defects first appear. Fortunately, you can do the job quickly, easily and inexpensively — thanks to ready mixed materials available at most hardware stores, lumber and

building material dealers. The first step in repairing is to clean out loose or cracked mortar with cold chisel or screw driver. Flush out the opening with hose. While joint is still damp, fill with mortar, Press

the mortar firmly to be sure no cavities remain. This is called tuck pointing and an excellent material to use is Sakrete Mortar Mix. It comes in easyto-handle sacks and is ready for use with the addition of water. After filling cavity, scrape off excess mortar and finish joint to match rest of the wall. This is easy to do with a jointing tool or a flat or rounded stick - depending on joint to be matched. Finally, after about five minutes, brush across joint to remove excess mortar then finish again with jointing tool. This is the easiest, best and most economical way to repair


