# Mine Rescue Efforts Are Slowed Sharply

# Still No Word Legislation Designed to Avert Rail From Third Man Strike Okayed by House Committee

SHEPPTON, Pa. (UPI) - Drilling operations slowed down sharply today in the effort to rescue two rugged coal miners who have been buried 308 feet underground two weeks. Estimates of when they may reach the surface ranged from late afternoon to late at night.

Rescue workers bored past the 250-foot mark without a major hitch in the final stage of reaming out an existing 12inch hole from the surface to the spot where the two were trapped when a mine shaft collapsed.







Are Human Beings

Naturally Lazy? By GXORGE BOARDMAN, Ph. D.

Every so often I hear a man say "Well, I'm just naturally lazy like everybody else." The remark is usually made in connection with an apologia due to an acceptance of stolen goods via our fascist-socialist system of government, and if you prefer to call it a socialist-fascist system, I will not argue with you.

Because I am becoming more and more involved in the study of individualism, I find it difficult to let such remarks go unchallenged. I do not believe laziness is a natural state for individual human beings but then I define laziness as a state of mind which opposes any physical or mental exertion, whether it's work or In this, my fifth year of writing

newspaper columns, I am faced with the fact that this activity has always involved a lot of work for me. My two-fingered attacks on typewriters can never be classed as a form of enjoyment. The standard operating procedure goes something like this; First I select an idea. Then I may sit on the edge of the bed in the middle of the night for a couple of hours. thinking out the column. Finally, at some time during the following day, I make a sandwich of white paper and carbons and begin banging away. If I am a human being and naturally lazy, why do I involve myself with this activity? There's the fact of thinking I have something to say which needs saying. There's the fact of needing to earn an untaxable income which cannot be earned if I do nothing and a buck, even a hugely inflated buck, is still a dollar. Finally, there is also the occasional encouragement from readers who agree with what I have to say. I could, of course, achieve an

untaxable living by becoming a welfare case. This would make it possible for me to sit in the sun. stare off into space and do nothing. As a matter of fact, when a man talks about the natural laziness of human beings, I expect him to find ways and means to exist at the expense of others, before long.

Criminals, generally, are inclined to believe that all other human beings are also criminal - minded. They will tell you that the fear of being caught is the only thing which prevents all humans from stealing from every other

human.

We find, then, that the man who is willing to accept the stolen goods believes that everybody else is equally lazy. The criminal . who steals the goods insists that all human beings are criminally inclined and politicians believe all human beings are plagued by a lust for power over all other human beings. I, on the other hand, believe human beings are capable of rising to levels of creative effort and inventive genius never before accomplished. I believe that people who persist in standing in the muddy swamp of abysmal mediocrity do not reflect a natural attitude.

Obviously I may be wrong. I realize that my opinion of human beings has climbed in direct relation to the deliberate limiting of our close association with human beings during the past three years. But, history is on my side. Human beings have not been horse-whipped into creative and inventive efforts. Writers and sculptors and artists and actors and industrialists and humans involved in the healing arts have not waited for rulers and tyrants to spur their efforts. They have invented and created despite all efforts of tyrants and rulers who would have them believe they are worthless and lazy, by nature. Of course, the members of the

socialist conglomerate would like us to believe human beings are a bunch of lazy, good-for-nothing bums. As a matter of supreme right, then, they separate themselves from all of the lazy, goodfor-nothing bums and hope that none of us will ever realize that socialists are parasites. They want their hosts to move only on command, for fear that they, the parasites, will become lost. Let the lazy speak only for themselves.



# **Thalidomide**

Sweden counted 153 deformed births up to the end of 1962, with 111 confirmed as born to "thalidomide mothers." Holland had 16. Norway 19. Austria . Switzerland "possibly" 10. Belgium 26.

Only France, Spain and Portugal reported no "thalidomide ba bies." for those three countries the drug never had been put freely on the market.

So far as public records show, no "thalidomide babies" have been born in Europe in 1963. The last such births to receive public attention were at Reading, England, on Sept. 27, 1962, and in Sterling, Scotland, on Nov. 18,
