





BIRDS ARE SMART

Use Both Wings -Not Left or Right By GEORGE BOARDMAN, Ph. D.



Birds find it necessary to use both wings to fly in a straight line. A great many humans prefer to grow just a single wing, with which they always wind up at their starting point after wasting much time moving in a cir-

You have just read the history of political action condensed into a single paragraph and a reply to a man who asked if I consider myself to be a right-winger. The answer is no! I much prefer to try to use both sides of my brain.




