### Men! Don't Whistle At Girls in Rome, It is Now Illegal

ROME (UPI)—A ruling by the Italian Supreme Court that it is illegal for men to whistle at pretty women had little effect today on "girl-wachers" along Rome's via Veneto. Girls walked along the street, and men admired them—but perhaps a little less noisily.

The court reversed a lower court decision holding that two teenage boys who whistled at two girls five years ago in the town of Bari were innocent of violating a law stating that such acts were "vulgar." The law is a misdemeanor, calling for a 10-day jail term. However, amnesty for all misdemeanor convictions was decreed some years ago.

### Plenty of Room For Football Fans

DALLAS (UPI)—Ben H. Douglas, president of the Dallas Hotel and Motel Association, today said that despite football weekends with as many as three major games, Dallas has plenty of rooms to accommodate football fans.

The big game weekend is Oct. 11-13, when Navy faces SMU on Friday night, Texas takes on Oklahoma Saturday in the big game of the year for both teams, and the Dallas Cowboys meet the Detroit Lions in a National Football League game Sunday.

### AFL-CIO Adopts 'Hands-Off' Policy

UNITY HOUSE, Pa. (UPI)—The AFL-CIO high command has refused to endorse the Aug. 28 civil rights march on Washington despite appeals by two union leaders who called for organized labor's backing of the mass demonstration.

A "hands off" policy toward the march was adopted by the AFL-CIO Executive Council over the protests of Auto Workers President Walter P. Reuther and Negro union chief A. Philip Randolph.

George Meany, AFL-CIO president, said he felt most of the council members concluded there was grave doubt about whether the march would hamper passage of civil rights legislation.

The council's statement said AFL-CIO unions were free to join the march if they wished. But it added that the labor federation would stick to lobbying on Capitol Hill and moving against discrimination at the grass roots level.

### REPORT INCREASED PROFITS

NEW YORK (UPI)—Second quarter profits of International Paper Co. rose to \$18,020,370 or 42 cents a share from \$16,383,494 or 39 cents a share last year, the company reported yesterday.

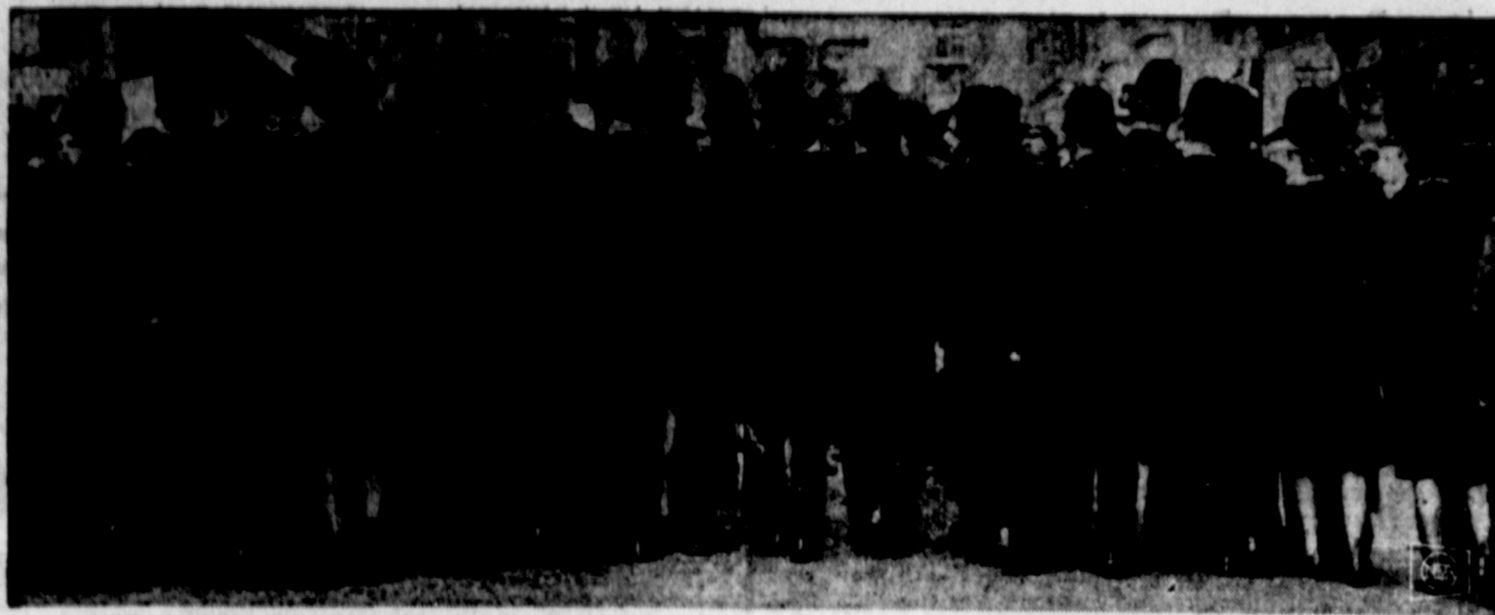

**Foreign Commentary**

PARIS (UPI)—The six-months-old French-German alliance is taking a heavy beating.

Many Frenchmen are asking seriously if much of it is left at all. The treaty was signed at the Elysee Palace here on Jan. 22 by President Charles de Gaulle of France and West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer. It was sealed by a kiss between Europe's two "grand old men."

Its aim was to end centuries of bloodshed between the two nations that had been pinpointed by history as the "traditional enemies" of Western Europe. In place of fighting each other they were to work together in future as close allies.

But the ink was hardly dry on their signatures when De Gaulle began to find the treaty was not everything he had hoped for.

**Didn't Support Veto**  
Adenauer made no secret of the fact that he did not support De Gaulle's veto against Great Britain's admission into the European Common Market.

When Kennedy visited West Germany and West Berlin in June he received an overwhelmingly spontaneous ovation from the German people that made De Gaulle's visit to Bonn soon afterwards something of a letdown.

**Germans Won't Help**  
Then the Germans refused to cooperate with the French in production of an European tank. In-

stead, they agreed to a joint tank development program with the United States.

Last weekend Adenauer punched still another hole in what was to have been his solid policy front with De Gaulle. He decided to sign the Moscow nuclear test ban pact, although De Gaulle has refused to do so and had urged him not to.

The conservative Le Figaro noted glumly that, whenever it is a question of choosing between the United States and France the West Germans will not hesitate to side with Washington.

**Portugal to Hold African Territories**

LISBON, Portugal (UPI)—Premier Antonio de Oliveira Salazar has pledged Portugal's determination to hold on to its African territories despite mounting pressure from Western Allies and independent African nations.

In a nationwide radio and television broadcast, the 74-year-old premier said Portugal will defend "to the limit of our human and material resources" its position in Angola, Mozambique and Portuguese Guinea. It was Salazar's first major policy speech in more than a year.

**Jimenez Faces 'Speedy Trial'**

MIAMI (UPI) — Marcos Perez Jimenez, who once ruled Venezuela with an iron grip, waited in a jail cell yesterday for extradition to his homeland on charges he embezzled \$13.5 million from the national treasury.

A Venezuelan plane arrived in Miami yesterday with a delegation of 15 government officials to escort the one-time dictator back to his homeland and a "speedy trial."

Secretary of State Dean Rusk ended Perez' long fight against extradition Monday when he ordered the former strongman extradited at the request of Venezuelan President Romulo Betancourt.

It was not immediately known if a paternity suit against Perez would delay the plane's return, but one Venezuelan official said he did not see how a state court suit could supercede the federal ruling.

Perez, the bespectacled major general who ruled Venezuela from 1952 until his overthrow in 1958, had to post \$300,000 bond for the mother and child in the event of his extradition.

**House Committee Approval Urged On VA Hospital**

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Rep. Henry Gonzalez, D-Tex., urged the House Veterans Committee yesterday to approve the veterans administration's (VA) selection of San Antonio as the site of a new hospital for South Texas.

Gonzalez filed for the record of a subcommittee, which surveyed sites in South Texas, his support of the San Antonio location. The subcommittee was headed by Rep. Robert A. Everett, D-Tenn. "It is the purpose of this hearing, and rightly so, to determine whether there is a need for a new Veterans Administration hospital in South Texas, and if there is such a need, whether the site selected in San Antonio is suitable for the purpose of building such a hospital."

"My personal feeling on each query is a positive—even emphatic—yes," Gonzalez said. The congressman then filed population statistics to support his contention that San Antonio was the best site.

# 'Space Shuttles' for Orbiting Laboratories

VALLEY FORGE, Pa. (UPI)—Scientists here are working on a big space problem that will have to be met after man lands on the moon.

After Project Apollo — the moon landing now scheduled for around 1968 — serious consideration is being given to orbiting a space station around the earth as a laboratory and a stepping off platform for manned probes into deep space.

To carry men, food and equipment, "space shuttles" would zip back and forth between the earth and the orbiting station.

Docking these "space shuttles" on a platform that is itself rocketing at speeds up to 18,000 miles per hour is one of the most complex problems to be solved.

To perfect techniques of the intricate docking maneuver, General Electric engineers at the Valley Forge Space Technology Center have built a jet-propelled, land-based "space shuttle" that simulates a landing on an orbiting vehicle. The simulator is built to carry two astronauts plus supplies, weighs 1,000 pounds is 7½ feet high and 5 feet wide.

The supporting structure is mounted on air cushions — metal discs constructed so that air is expelled at supersonic velocities below them — causing the simulator to lift off the floor. This creates a frictionless environment and is a close approximation of the state of weightlessness beyond the earth's atmosphere.

Test pilots operating the device can pitch, roll, twist and yaw the vehicle as they go through rendezvous, approach and connection to a space station docking port. The shuttle pilot "flies" the simulator by using two hand controls that govern gas jets, enabling him to keep his vehicle balanced as he practices a docking maneuver.

The shuttle also can be operated remotely, to simulate a supply mission in which the vehicle would be unmanned and controlled by a pilot in the space station where it would be docked to deliver its cargo.

From research conducted on the Manned Docking Simulator, the GE space experts will gather information applicable to design of such shuttles. This would cover direction and speed of the supply vehicle in making the docking, fuel consumption and the time and relative difficulty astronauts will have in carrying out the docking and undocking maneuvers.

## School Bells Spell Extra Traffic Toll

CHICAGO (UPI) — School bells will signal danger of death and injury in traffic accidents for the 43 million young Americans headed back to classrooms.

The National Safety Council reports that accidents cause more deaths among children 1 to 14 than the five other leading causes of death combined. In 1962, 4,322 children in the 1-14 age group died in traffic accidents across the nation.

Among high school and college students, more than half of the accidental deaths are due to mishaps.

What can the average driver do to halt the resumption of the slaughter on the roads? The safety council recommends a three-point program.

—Be ready for the unexpected whenever you see a group of children in a schoolyard or near a street. Baseballs, basketballs, and footballs take strange bounces, and make children forget about oncoming traffic.

—Give yourself an even greater margin for safety in rainy or winter weather, when streets are slick and it becomes much harder to stop quickly.

—Whether schools are in session or not, keep your car in top mechanical condition. Be sure it will respond to your command.

In addition to its campaign for

the prevention of deaths in traffic accidents, the council has urged better fire protection in schools, more school bus control and safety, and continued expansion of driver education courses in the high schools.

The council urges all school districts to install automatic sprinkler systems as well as fire extinguishers and fire alarms. As the result of an extensive testing program the council found that no fire alarm system was universally satisfactory.

Nearly 43 million children will use school buses daily this year. School officials stress that the students' safety depends much on the behavior of passengers. Pupils should board buses without delay, but without crowding or pushing. They should be urged to follow the driver's directions promptly and willingly.

### CAR CARE

NEW YORK (UPI) — The family car is being pampered more than ever.

John Sierks, chief architect for Levitt and Sons, Inc., reports that about three quarters of all houses being built nowadays have at least a one-car garage. As recently as 1950, he adds, less than half of new houses had garages.

## Good Eating Programs Are Vital

In the rush of back-to-school days, don't let your youngsters lapse into the bad eating habits that cause almost half the nations teenagers to suffer from malnutrition in the midst of plenty.

Dr. Evelyn B. Spindler, nutritionist for the U.S. Department of Agriculture, estimates six out of ten teenage girls and four out of ten boys have poor diets and serious nutritional deficiencies. Poor eating habits among these youngsters result in lowered resistance to illness, frequent colds, skin eruptions, irritability, lack of energy, and unusual fatigue.

What are the reasons for this, and what can be done about it? Dr. Spindler blames teenage undernourishment largely on skipping breakfast and filling up on snacks made up mainly of "empty calories" — foods full of sugar, fat and starches, but very little protein, minerals and vitamins.

A good way to encourage your teenagers to adopt better eating habits now that school is back in full swing is to keep your refrigerator well stocked with nutritious foods and beverages. If your present refrigerator is already overloaded, you'll need one of the roomy new electric refrigerator-freezers to hold nourishing snack-time extras.

You'll find that the nutritious foods you keep in your electric refrigerator-freezer for after-school snacks will disappear just as quickly as the "empty calorie" ones like cookies, cake, candy and soda pop. Nutritious substitutes to have on hand include hard-boiled eggs, cold cuts, hot dogs and hamburger meat, ice cream, cheese, fresh fruits, and crunchy raw vegetables.

For health-giving drinks, provide lots of milk and a variety of juices such as apple, prune, grape, tomato, orange, and grapefruit.

## Those School Crosswalks Can Be Made Safer Easily

Special traffic signals, painted crosswalks and school zone signs are used to make bike riding or walking to school safer — but more can be done, especially if the PTA cooperates with city officials to create a zone of safety throughout the entire school area.

In Indianapolis, Ind., for example, the PTA has worked with police and traffic authorities in a special School Traffic Coordinating Committee. Committee members are from the Indianapolis PTA, public and parochial schools, the Indianapolis police and the Bureau of Traffic Engineering.

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# Health Check-Ups Spot Hearing Loss

School bells will soon be ringing loud and clear throughout the land, but well over two million school age children will not even hear the bells.

According to the Hearing Aid Industry Conference, from five to seven per cent of all school-age children have some degree of hearing loss. The impact of a neglected hearing problem on a child's development is underscored by the fact that children with a hearing difficulty repeat grades four times as often as children with normal hearing.

The longer a hearing loss goes unrecognized, the longer and more difficult will be the period of rehabilitation and the more serious the set-back to the youngster's development. Neglect in these cases is truly tragic because according to the Hearing Aid Industry Conference at least 60 per cent of all hearing impairments among young children can be corrected if action is taken at an early enough age.

Although periodic hearing tests are conducted in many up-to-date school systems, a hearing loss may have occurred since the child's hearing was last tested. Therefore, parents are advised to arrange for annual check-ups through the family physician, who, in turn, if he suspects a hearing loss will recommend a visit to an otologist (medical hearing specialist). The otologist, in turn, will be able to advise on the proper method of correction — through medical treatment, surgery or the use of a hearing aid.

Impaired hearing might be a result of last winter's illness. The common cold is responsible for about 40 per cent of all impaired hearing in children. Enlarged adenoids and tonsils are

additional factors which cause a temporary loss which may lead to infection and permanent loss.

Even a summer of swimming presents the possibility for a hearing loss to occur. An infection might have been contracted from swimming in polluted water. Or the ear drum might have been damaged from diving too deeply or from ocean breakers hitting the ear.

In many cases, neglected hearing loss is interpreted as a behavioral problem, or inability or slowness in learning. Unfortunately, these are side effects of hearing loss. A child who cannot hear the teacher, not only misses the lesson, but cannot focus his attention on the class. Because a child who does not hear properly feels "left out" and neglected, he may resort to tantrums and disruptive behavior in an effort to assert himself and attract attention.

Even one year in which a hearing loss is neglected can seriously damage a child's development. Therefore, parents are urged to include a hearing check-up as a vital part of their children's back-to-school preparations.

Early recognition and professional correction — through medical treatment, the use of a hearing aid, or both can help overcome a serious handicap.

## Student's Living Area Should Be Carefully Checked

No doubt about it, going to school is hard work. The day-in-day-out schedule of classes, extra-curricular activities and nighttime homework is fatiguing.

That's why it's a good idea for the parents to check the youngster's room to make sure he will benefit from the best combined study and rest environment.

Here are a few check points:  
1. Work space should be adequate for reading and writing assignments. Set aside a study corner in the student's room, including perhaps a classroom desk, so that he can get his work done in privacy, rather than combat distracting "family noises" in other parts of the home. Rugs, draperies help to cut down the noise.

2. Pay careful attention to lighting. Try reading in the room yourself, and if the light seems inadequate to you, protect the youngster's eyes — and increase his study efficiency — by adding to or arranging the available light for best results.

3. Check the mattress to determine whether it's past its useful life.

## Modern Play Equipment Aid to Physical Fitness

The need to develop school children's bodies has been recognized as a major problem by the President's Committee on Physical Fitness. And now schools recognize that they must contribute increasingly to the child's physical, as well as his mental, development.

Psychologists and educators have joined with manufacturers to create outdoor play equipment that will enable youngsters of various ages to exercise their bodies as well as their imaginations and social attitudes.

These designs are not just an assortment of items. Their construction is based on modern knowledge of children's physical development, ability to coordinate and growth patterns.

Permanent installations in the school yard include a plethora of steel castle towers, squirrels' nests, spider's nets and an assortment of climbers.

Today's parents may not recognize from their own youth much of the equipment their youngsters enjoy. There's the tubular steel twirler swing. Adjustable in length, it spins or swings to suit a child's fancy. The four-seat whirl-wind is a modern self-propelled version of the merry-go-round. The rock-it is a seesaw that accommodates three children,

the third seated high in the center. With so many of our urban or even suburban children deprived of wood, streams and other natural play settings, parents should remember that the time spent in a school playground with proper facilities is an excellent investment in good health — for limited tax dollars.

If he puts up a "yap" at being left behind, he'll need to be schooled in the ABC's of living close to neighbors who won't appreciate the barking of your dog. ## First Shoes for School Wear Should Be Bought with Care

A first grader needs a first class shoe to get his school career off on the right foot. A youngster with uncomfortable feet encased in ill-fitting or poorly constructed shoes fidgets, loses contact with school work and soon becomes a disciplinary problem.

A mother taking her child for his first pair of "school shoes" will protect his foot, health — and contribute to better classroom performance — by following five basic rules. (Parents of veteran scholars in the second grade and up should also take note.)

1. Buy no shoe unless it fits perfectly. The tip of the shoe should extend three-quarters of an inch beyond the end of his longest toe. Have the child walk about the shoe store for several minutes while you look to see that there is no gaping at back or sides and he makes sure it's comfortable.

2. Choose sturdy all-leather shoes. Foot specialists and pediatricians recommend supple leather upper that bend and stretch with active, growing feet. A tough

leather sole gives protection to tender feet while it provides controlled elasticity that helps the shoe hold its shape. A smooth leather lining covers rough seams and prevents red and irritated feet.

3. Recently issued government "shoe guides" provide that shoe parts which look like leather, but are not, must be labeled. To insure you get leather, check the label.

4. Provide a change of footwear. Like adults, children should not wear the same shoes all the time. Your youngster should change to play shoes after school. They

should be of the same substantial leather construction to protect his feet from constant pavement pounding. Leather, which "breathes" through millions of natural pores, keeps the feet dry and "air-cooled." Sneakers should be worn only on soft ground or gym floors for limited periods.

5. Beware of false economy. Hand-me-downs and attempts to get "one more month" from a pair of outgrown shoes are all "penny-wise, pound-foolish" practices. The few dollars you save now won't make up for deformed feet, pain or doctor bills later on.

# Instrumental Music Study Helps Students in Other Basic Areas

Many important educators have climbed on the band wagon for instrumental music in basic education, a major reason why the number of school-age musicians has increased more than 300 per cent during the past 15 years.

According to the American Music Conference, school-age musicians are growing in number at a rate five times the rate of the total school population. . . and now total 10,500,000.

Dr. Maxwell Rafferty, superintendent of public schools in California, is one of music-making's strongest supporters. He says,

"The Greeks and Romans believed music instruction was a basic academic subject, and so do I. Music itself even helps with simple arithmetic."

Instrumental music is generally recognized as a contributor of more than just pleasant sounds, particularly in areas of thought-discipline, mathematical precision, perseverance and cooperation.

Rev. Joseph Mytych, director of music instruction for the Catholic Archdiocese of Chicago, has said, "We have found in schools having a solid applied music program that achievement and I.Q. ratings

are very decidedly elevated."

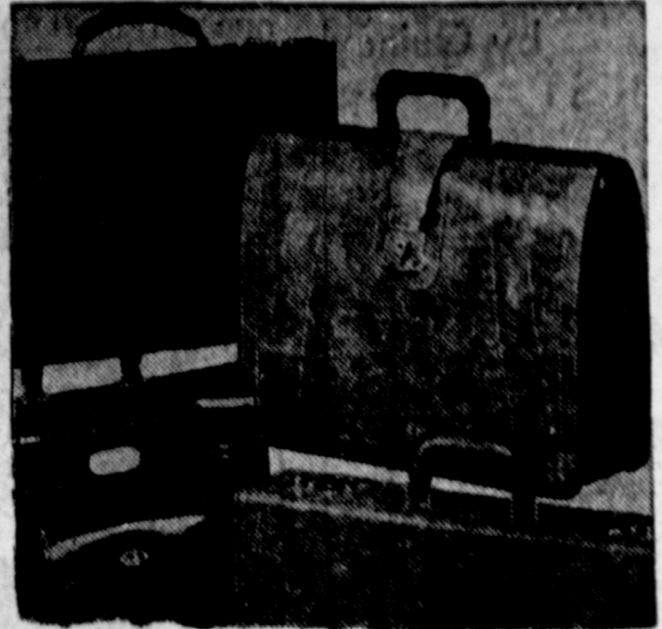
The phrase "full development of the student" is included or implied in most educators' endorsements of music's place in the curriculum. Dr. Ralph W. Lanz, assistant superintendent of Los Angeles public schools, says, "The discipline children learn is transferable to other subjects, often making them all-around better students."

Interestingly, music studies in Space Age curricula don't end at the door to the music room. Sometimes they go right into the science lab, further emphasizing a link between science and music.

As part of a study of sound waves, seventh graders in White Plains, New York designed their own music instruments. Guided by the science instructor, they learned the basic principles of sound and acoustics of modern orchestral instruments, using, among other things, paper-tube trombones, glass and straw clarinets, and oilcan banjos.

A New Trier High School in Winnetka, Illinois, students became interested in the electronics of hi-fi equipment and sound production through a desire to record their own jazz sessions.

A survey by AMC of scientists and deans of technological institutes further emphasizes the compatibility of music and science: 32 of 46 respondents agreed that music helps lay a foundation for scientific thinking.

## Here are Safety Rules for Riders on the School Bus

An estimated 13 million of the 43 million school-age children will use school buses daily this year, according to the U.S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare.

Many of these youngsters will be riding school buses for the first time this year. Many others may have forgotten some of the rules they learned last year.

Even before school starts, parents should make sure their children are ready to accept their part in making buses safe, the National Safety Council says.

Pupils should leave their homes early enough to reach the bus stop in time for the bus, but without undue haste. At the same time, they should not be so early that they have a considerable wait.

When it is necessary for the children to walk along a road, rather than a sidewalk, to reach the bus stop, they should walk on the left side — facing traffic. They should keep as far to the left of the shoulder as possible. If there is no shoulder, or if it is narrow or wet and slippery, they should not walk more than two abreast. Single file is better, and a group should never spread out over a major part of the roadway.

The pupils should board the bus without delay, but without crowding or pushing. They should take their seats promptly, and remain in them until the bus has reached its destination and has completely stopped.

The children should be taught how to cross highways at the proper places and with full consideration of traffic. Nearly all states have laws requiring motorists to stop for school buses taking on or discharging passengers in rural areas. But not all motorists observe these laws.

In most communities, pupils are directed to step in front of the bus after leaving it and to wait until the driver signals that it is safe to walk — not run — across the highway. The children should not rely entirely on the driver's signal, but should observe the traffic themselves. It should be emphasized that this procedure is used only with school buses.

Many schools organize school bus patrols — usually two students per bus whose job is to help the driver and the passengers. Passengers should follow their directions.

Children should be taught not to put their heads or arms out the windows. They should not throw things about inside the bus or out of windows or doors.

They should understand the use of emergency doors, but should not tamper with them during normal travel.

According to the researchers of The Encyclopedia Americana, the expression "toe the mark" stems from the early days of our country when few school children wore shoes and they literally did "toe" along the crack in the flooring.

## Phono Records Help Students In Their Studies

One advantage this generation has over its elders is the stimulation (and the fun) study sessions can get from today's recordings.

In school and at home, recordings serve as a wonderful introduction to drama, poetry, novels, essays, language. Far from stultifying, they make for exciting listening for students and their parents. Most important, according to Dr. Arthur Luce Klein of Spoken Arts Records, they encourage further reading; reading because it is fun, not because it is an assignment.

Consider just a few cases: excerpts from "Moby Dick" build up tremendous suspense, and a desire to know "what else happened?" Highly-endorsed Shakespearean condensations are performed by brilliant casts. They are exciting, understandable, and leave the listener wanting to read or reread the full versions.

Language records, in this modern series, cover the literature of the country, instead of stilted phrases. They are graded according to elementary, intermediate, and advanced study programs.

Emerson and Thoreau come alive when their wisdom is read by noted scholars. Emyln Williams re-creates his stage triumph in readings from Dickens. Sir Michael Redgrave furnishes an ideal introduction to Chekhov with three amusing and touching short stories.

In the field of modern theater, Arthur Miller, the late Moss Hart, and Marc Blitzstein discuss their craft and read from their hits. Poetry from Virgil to Dorothy Parker gains new meaning.

There are entries for the very young back-to-schooler, too: nursery rhymes, Grimm's and Anderson's Fairy Tales, Kipling, Ciardi, and a whole treasury of tales to be enjoyed over and over.

On the very scholarly level, complex topics become comprehensible when experts discourse on their fields: Dr. Edward Teller on relativity, Brian O'Doherty on art, Dr. Frank Baxter on poetry, Preston Slosson on history, and Jacques Barzun on "the care and feeding of the mind."

That last title might well sum up the goal of Spoken Arts and similar record producers. However, Dr. Klein points out, "We are interested in the care and feeding of the spirit, and the sense of humor, too!"

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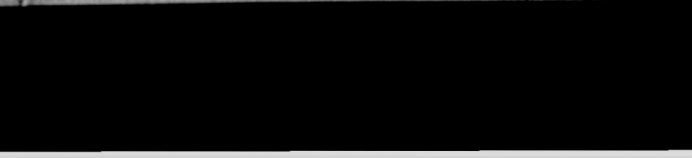

## Accidents On Bicycles Can Be Cut

Where's the most likely place for a bicycle accident? Are rural children safer than city children, or are boys safer on a bicycle than girls? At what age is a child most likely to have an accident?

National Safety Council studies show surprising aspects in the answers to these questions. Children in rural areas have as many, or more, accidents as city children. A child is more likely to be injured or killed after he's home from school than he is while riding to or from school.

Accidents are most likely to happen on a Saturday and least likely to happen on a Sunday, the NSC says. Boys are far more likely to have accidents; a 42 state survey showed that 86 per cent of the children hurt were males. Most accidents involve children in the 5 to 14 age bracket. Intersections in cities are the most dangerous areas.

Night riding is the most dangerous. While 70 per cent of accidents occur during daylight hours, four out of five deaths occur in the late afternoon or evening. It's not recommended. . . that children ride bikes at dusk or after dark, even if the bike has a headlight, taillight or reflector. If night riding must be done, for whatever reason, the bike should have proper lighting equipment, the rider should wear light-colored clothing and the bike should have reflective tape showing to the rear.

The Veterans of Foreign Wars has been carrying out a national program of applying reflective tape, which is visible at night from as far as 1,500 feet, to bicycles. The VFW also has been inspecting bikes to check their operating condition and to see that the rider has knowledge of proper riding habits.

## Gifted Jewelry For Students

If you are wondering what to give that hard-to-please teen ager on the way back to school, we have some suggestions passed on by those who make it their business to know the likes and dislikes of our young people. The jewelers of the country, reports the Jewelry Council, have been taking careful note of the preferences of teen agers for years, and have some ideas to help you.

For the young man, there are a number of different pieces of jewelry that build up his pride and wardrobe, and there is a fairly good chance that your young man is missing a few of them. He might like a set of matching cufflinks and tie tack, either stone-set or in sculptured karat gold, sterling or gold filled.

Another very popular gift these days, the Council says, is a ring, a masculine symbol of authority and achievement, perhaps with his birthstone, or an initial or signet ring.

For the young girl, there are many items of jewelry that she is almost sure to want. There is hardly a young girl who would not like to be remembered with a cultured pearl necklace, earrings or ring. A birthstone ring, a charm or bangle bracelet, a pin or pendant necklace are bound to score heavily and bring praise and admiration.
