

WASHINGTON (UPI) - The touchy railroad work rules dispute appeared today to have been dumped back in the lap of a reluctant Congress.

Secretary of Labor W. Willard Wirtz announced Tuesday night the collapse of collective bargaining talks he had been holding with union and rail negotiators.

Both Senate and House Commerce committees, which had been considering President Kennedy's proposal that the work rules impasse be settled by the Interstate Commerce Commission, suspended action pending outcome of Wirtz' attempt to get the parties to settle it themselves.

Collapse of the talks indicated pressure would be back on Congress to step into the situation.

(Continued From Page 1) have to decide at a meeting to day whether to stay around in hopes the new deadlock could be broken or return home.

#### Appeals To Both

Wirtz appealed to both sides to consider again changing their positions and said prospects of settlement depended entirely on one side or the other making a concession.

But J. E. Wolfe, chief railroad negotiator, said flatly that "a negotiated agreement is hopeless." H. E. Gilbert, president of the firemen's union, said Wolfe was saying "no settlement on other than our (railroad) terms."

If Wolfe's statement is final, Gilbert said, the five unions have no choice but to prepare for a nationwide walkout the minute the work rules are posted.

Wolfe said the railroads had agreed in imposing the new work rules to "protect those now working" and to accept the principle that jobs would be eliminated by attrition - normal retirement or resignation - but charged that the union would eliminate jobs at a rate lower than attrition.

A union spokesman charged that the unions answered Wirtz' request for a fresh statement of its views during the talks but "we didn't get anything back from the railroads."

When it is necessary for the children to walk along a road, rather than a sidewalk, to reach the bus stop, they should walk on the left side - facing traffic. They should keep as far to the

left of the shoulder as possible. If there is no shoulder, or if it is narrow or wet and slippery, they should not walk more than two abreast. Single file is better, and a group should never spread out over a major part of the road-

The pupils should board the bus without delay, but without crowding or pushing. They should take their seats promptly, and remain in them until the bus has' reached its destination and has completely stopped.

The children should be taught how to cross highways at the proper places and with full consideration of traffic. Nearly all states have laws requiring motorists to stop for school buses taking on or discharging passengers in rural areas. But not all motorists observe these laws.

In other words, when socialists do not want something for nothing, they are no longer so-

When I refused to buy the supposedly "hot merchandise, the peddler said: "Well if you don't want to go for a good thing when you have a chance, you must be nuts." If I appear to be belaboring the greediness of socialists, good. The point requires belaboring, I be-

lieve. When you set the machinations of the socialist conglomerate down on paper, the confidence game appears too ridiculous for comment; The socialist thrives on stupidity but wants his victims to be happy, and for a very good reason. An unhappy victim may begin to think and when the victims of socialism think they decide not to be victims.

"Don't you want to free all of the people of the world from want?" the socialist asks. Only rarely does he receive a thinking answer: If all of the people of the world are free from want, they will obviously want nothing, in which case socialism will be in

trouble and so will we. "I'm sure you will agree that everyone deserves a living wage." the socialist states. If I EARN nothing and accept \$3,000 in the form of an untaxable dole from government, the socialist conglomerate says I am deserving of this. ### Accidents On Bicycles Can Be Cut

Where's the most likely place for a bicycle accident? Are rural children safer than city children, or are boys safer on a bicycle than girls? At what age is a child most likely to have an accident? Natonal Safety Council studies show surprising aspects in the answers to these questions. Children in rural areas have as many, or more, accidents as city children. A child is more likely to be injured or killed after he's home from school than he is while riding to or from school.

Accidents are most likely to happen on a Saturday and least likely to happen on a Sunday, the NSC says. Boys are far more liable to have accidents; a 42 state survey showed that 86 per cent of the children hurt were males. Most accidents involve children in the 5 to 14 age bracket. Intersections in cities are the most dangerous areas.

Night riding is the most dangerous. While 70 per cent of accidents occur during daylight hours, four out of five deaths occur in the late afternoon or evening. It's not recommended. , .that children ride bikes at dusk or after dark, even If the bike has a headlight, taillight or reflector. If night riding must be done, for whatever reason, the bike should have proper lighting equipment, the rider should wear light-colored clothing and the bike should have reflective tape showing to the rear. The Veterans of Foreign Wars has been carrying out a national program of applying reflective tape, which is visible at night from as far as 1,500 feet, to bicycles. The VFW also has been inspecting bikes to check their operating condition and to see that the rider has knowledge of proper riding habits.
