

Navy Has Model Of Future Sub

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Navy has an 18-foot model of a lituristic submarine that some day may be able to resist the pressure of water at the milemad-a-half depth at which the nuclear-powered Thresher was lost last April.

Built in The Netherlands at cost of \$100,000 the model has rotating propellers powered by electrical motors outside the hull. The hull itself is of solid construction like the gondola of the deep-diving bathyscaphe Tri-

The submarine model was extibited Tuesday at the David Taylor Model Barn in nearby Maryland. Hydrodynamic tests are to start next week.

Wall Street In Review

NEW YORK (UPI) — "There is no sign of a letdown in business and corporate earnings and the dividend outlook for the current quarter and early 1964 looks very good," say Kenneth Ward of Hayden, Stone & Co.

"However," he adds, "although dozens of individual stocks still indicate higher levels, common sense dictates that the next week or two of action should be examined very carefully to determine if some of the prosperity being forecast and the benefits to be derived from the long delayed tax cut have not already been discounted rather too generously."

Colby & Co., Inc., says it believes that the current crop of corporate earnings are a stronger pull on stock prices than anything else. However, it advises clients to remain cautious until they are sure that the market high hasn't already been reached.

Bache & Co. says that although the Dow-Jones industrial average is only a shade below its all time high, new lows frequently outnumber new highs. "However," Bache adds, "this is typical of the action to be expected in a prolonged consolidation phase."
