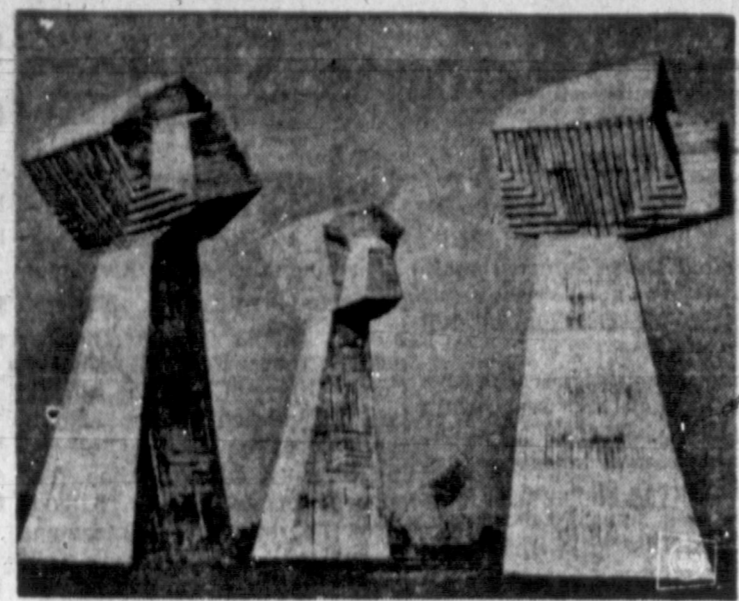
All Willis, who lives across the street from the foundry, said closing of the street would damage his property.

Patient Gone 2 Weeks Discovered in Closet

HOUSTON (UPI)—Officials of Ben Taub Hospital admitted today that a patient who had been missing two weeks was found in a hospital broom closet. Whether he spent all that time there was not known.

He was weak and in poor condition, but was being treated.

The case came to light today when the hospital notified police missing persons officers that Obadiah Reed had been found.

Reed's mother, Mrs. Mary McDonald of Houston, said she visited Reed almost daily since he was admitted to the new charity hospital Oct. 21 for a nervous condition. She said he was not there when she went Oct. 27. She said nurses and hospital officials told her they could not find him and considered him dismissed because they thought friends had come for him or he had walked away.

Mrs. McDonald said he was too frail to walk far. She searched the woods in the area

to no avail.

After hospital officials found him in the broom closet, they said he most likely left the hospital and had returned to the closet only one night or so.

But Mrs. McDonald said she asked her son upon his return "and he said he spent all the time in a closet. He said he hid out there because he was afraid of another patient. He told me he skipped out sometimes for a drink of water. But he had nothing to eat all the time he was there."

Jurors Hit By Comedian

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Night club comic Lenny Bruce has asked that jury complaints be filed against some members of a jury that convicted him of narcotics possession, he said Wednesday.

Bruce, known for his so-called "sick" jokes, contended that some of the jurors who heard his case last May have committed perjury by saying during pre-trial examinations they did not know he had been arrested as a narcotics user.

He said he had hired a private investigator who learned that at least six jurors later said they did know of his arrest.

At this point the jury was required to the jury room while the attorneys and bench discussed matters, the prosecution deemed irrelevant to the case.

The jury was retired for approximately 90 minutes before it was recalled. Sheriff Adams was questioned briefly along the same line of questioning and was dismissed.

Judge Cole then adjourned the proceedings.

Mrs. Sanders was born and reared in Dumas, Moore County. She has been married 28 years and has nine children, seven in school, and one grandchild, all living at home. Her household chores entail preparing meals for 36 persons daily and laundering and ironing 50 white shirts a week. As well, she is circulation manager for her husband's newspaper; supervising 32 paper boys who deliver their paper to 5,500 homes twice a week. She also assists in the publication of the paper. As a sideline she manages a 16-bed hotel. Mrs. Sanders accepted the crusade chairmanship in April 1963 of the newly formed Moore County unit. Within three weeks she organized a campaign which raised over 300 per cent of the amount raised in 1962.

Mrs. Sanders was instrumental in establishing a loan closet for cancer patients and developed a publicity program which brought the services of the unit to the people of Moore County.

Apparatus Controls Body Temp

Science Today

NEW YORK (UPI)—There is now a complicated machine for doing elaborately what the body, when in health, seems to do simply. It controls body temperature precisely, indefinitely and automatically.
To have your temperature

controlled by this mechanical marvel you lie between two of its parts, a blanket and a mattress. They're made of continuous square plastic tubing embedded in plastic foam and are identical.

Each of these systems of tubing has both inlet and outlet. These are connected to a circuitry of pipes around which a fluid is pumped. In the circuit are both a refrigerating unit and a heat exchange. To one side is an independent heating circuit, to be cut in or cut out. These control the temperature of the fluid. There are short cuts in the circuitry, to be opened or closed, which make it possible to change the temperature of the fluid from very cold to very hot in a jiffy.

Hooked to Computer
Presiding is a miniature computer. A probe is in the person between blanket and mattress through which the fluid is now circulating. The probe is hooked up to the computer which makes minute-to-minute calculations of the temperatures of the fluid and of the probe.

It has been set in advance to whatever temperature the doc-

tor wanted, and when the probe signals that temperature has been reached it holds it there to an accuracy of a hundredth of a degree (F) without fuss or bother.

This newest of medical-surgical devices was developed at Duke University Medical Center, Durham, N.C., and described in a technical publication of the American College of Surgeons by Drs. Robert L. Fuson and C. Ronald Stephen.

"The problem of temperature control in a patient is as old as medicine itself," they said. But now it isn't necessarily the normal body temperature which is desired. For some kinds of surgery a steadily maintained temperature much below normal is wanted, and for a few treatments a higher than normal temperature is helpful.

Permit "Drift"
To reduce temperature for surgery and maintain it at the lower level, ice bags and immersion in ice water have been generally used. These methods permit a "drift" in body temperature which is potentially dangerous, Fuson and Stephen said. "Drift" in their machine

is never more than four-tenths of a degree and usually is less.

They've designed tube-filled blankets in varying sizes and shapes. The smallest is intended to wrap around an arm or leg, to cool (or heat) it independently of prevailing body temperature. Another is a head mask shaped something like football helmet which will cool only head-and-neck.

Or a stomach can be "frozen" and kept that way, (in the treatment of ulcers) while general body temperature is maintained at normal. There are a number of safety devices built into the machine which prevent any damage to tissue either by freezing or burning.

"The apparatus has been employed in more than 200 patients and has proved to be accurate, efficient, and labor-saving, as well as trouble free," the surgeons reported.

Court Rooms Stages For Rights Clashes

Courtrooms are serving as backdrops for the latest civil rights struggles.

Justice Department attorneys appeal to the U.S. 5th Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans today for a temporary restraining order blocking an Alabama grand jury investigation. A Federal District Court judge Tuesday refused to grant such an order.

A grand jury at Selma, Ala., is investigating the free government transportation given Negro leader Martin Luther King Jr. last month from Birmingham to a civil rights rally at Selma. The Justice Department contends the probe amounts to harassment of federal officials.

At Clinton, La., Tuesday state Judge John Rarick, in defiance of a federal order, renewed an injunction against racial demonstrations by the Congress of Racial Equality (CORE).

School board attorneys asked a federal court at Greensboro, N.C., Tuesday to dismiss a desegregation suit by more than 100 Negroes on grounds Cabarrus County schools will lower racial barriers in September. The Negroes are seeking immediate desegregation.

The Mississippi Supreme Court ruled Tuesday that former Marine Byron De La Beckwith was mentally capable of standing trial on a charge of slaying Negro leader Medgar Evers at Jackson, Miss., last June 12. The court, in a 6-3 decision, said Beckwith could not be forced to undergo a mental examination against his will.

Elsewhere in the nation: Macon, Ga.: A key witness was expected to testify today in the trial of Miss Joni Rabinowitz, a 21-year-old New Rochelle N.Y., white woman charged with giving false testimony to a federal grand jury.

Lexington, N.C.: A police official testified Thursday that one of three Negro youths charged with second degree murder admitted shortly after his arrest that he fired several rifle bullets into a crowd of whites during a June 6 race riot. It is alleged that one of the bullets killed mechanic Fred Link, 24, and another wounded Art Richardson, a photographer for the High Point Enterprise.

Truck Driver Says He Warned Lawyer on Trial

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn. (UPI)—A St. Paul truck driver testified Wednesday that he once sent word to Tilmer Eugene Thompson to stop "bothering my wife."

The testimony, by blond, curly-haired Ronald D. Olesen, was a bombshell opening of the state's attempt to prove that the St. Paul criminal attorney was involved with a mysterious "other woman."

Olesen's wife was called to testify immediately after he left the stand.

Thompson, 35, is accused of masterminding the "murder for hire" of his heiress wife. The prosecution has charged that he begged his mistress to give him 11 months so that he could get money enough for them to start a life together.

Mrs. Thompson's life was insured for more than \$1 million when she died.

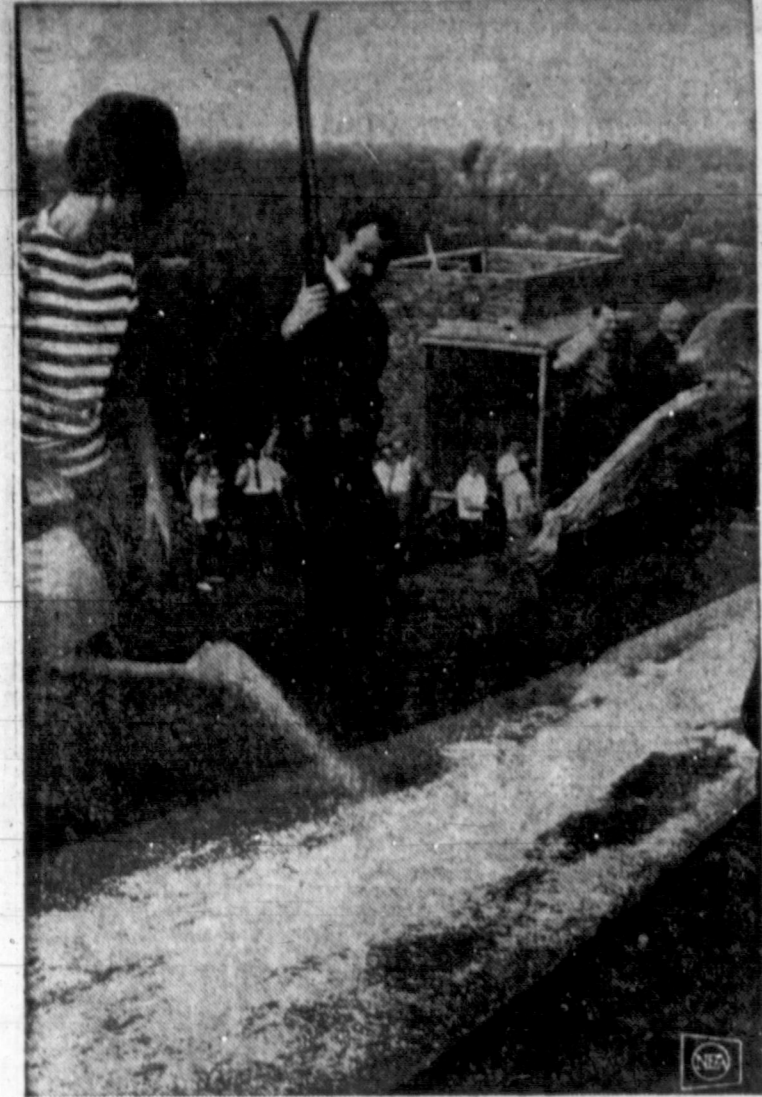

Court Ruling Favors Trio On Claim of False Arrest

AUSTIN (UPI) — The 3rd Court of Civil Appeals ruled Wednesday in favor of three Temple Negroes suing the Pay Less Shoe Store for false arrest and ordered a trial.

In reversing 146th Dist Judge W. A. Messer's summary judgment for the shoe store, the appeals court said allegations by the Negroes—warrant a full hearing on whether "they were involuntarily restrained of their physical liberty."

The three, Mrs. L. C. Browning, Rosie Young and Martha Wilson, were accused by the store of stealing six pair of shoes from the self-service displays. They went to the Temple branch of the store on March 16, 1960 to purchase three pair of shoes, which were put in lay-away for \$1.

Store employees believed six pair of shoes to be missing as the three women left, and called police. A search failed to turn up any stolen shoes but the Negroes were taken to the police station by officers.

They asked damages of \$8,500 each for "agonizing hours" spent in custody.

The appeals court, in an opinion by Associate Justice Robert G. Hughes, said "since nothing was proved stolen and the fact that appellants were in custody from the time they left the store until released by police and no shoes were found on them weighs heavily in favor of their innocence."

Navy Has Model Of Future Sub

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Navy has an 18-foot model of a futuristic submarine that some day may be able to resist the pressure of water at the mile-and-a-half depth at which the nuclear-powered Thresher was lost last April.

Built in The Netherlands at a cost of \$100,000 the model has rotating propellers powered by electrical motors outside the hull. The hull itself is of solid construction like the gondola of the deep-diving bathyscaphe Trieste.

The submarine model was exhibited Tuesday at the David Taylor Model Basin in nearby Maryland. Hydrodynamic tests are to start next week.

Colby & Co., Inc., says it believes that the current crop of corporate earnings are a strong pull on stock prices than anything else. However, it advises clients to remain cautious until they are sure that the market high hasn't already been reached.

Bache & Co. says that although the Dow-Jones industrial average is only a shade below its all time high, new lows frequently outnumber new highs. "However," Bache adds, "this is typical of the action to be expected in a prolonged consolidation phase."

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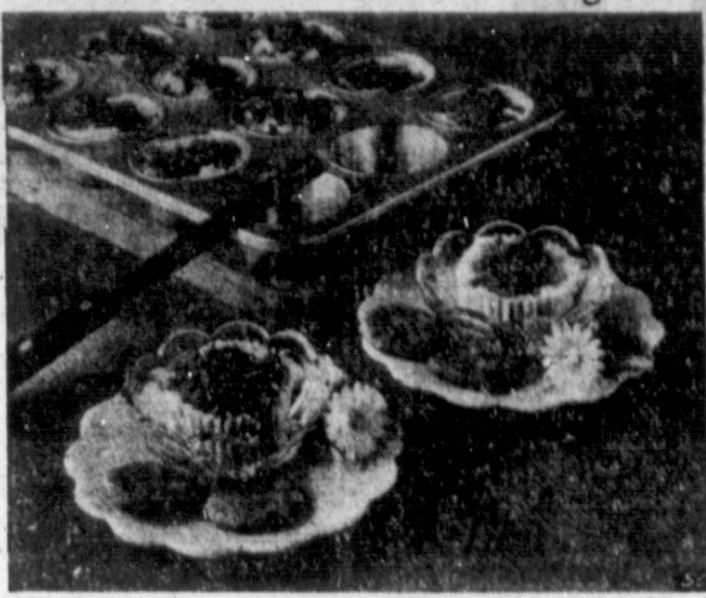
Do The Traditional Foods Have Value?

Q — Everyone eats cranberries, pumpkin and squash at Thanksgiving time. But I want to know, do they have any genuine food value?—Mrs. K. M.
A — Yes. They not only taste good but are also nutritious. Cranberries contribute some vitamin C to the diet as well as several other vitamins and minerals. The squashes are an excellent source of vitamin A. They supply other nutrients, also.

Q — I'm confused. What is the difference between whole grain, restored and enriched cereals?—Miss R. C.

A — Whole-grained cereal is one that contains the three principle parts of the cereal — the inner germ, the endosperm and the outer bran layer. STUFFED FRESH MUSHROOMS

(6 servings)
12 large whole fresh mushrooms
2 cups finely chopped mushroom stems
1/2 cup finely chopped celery
2 tablespoons finely chopped fresh onion
4 tablespoons butter or margarine
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper
1/2 cup mild shredded Cheddar cheese
1 tablespoon mayonnaise
1/4 cup buttered bread crumbs
Wash mushrooms and remove stems, leaving the caps intact. Saute mushroom stems, celery and onion in 2 tablespoons of the butter or margarine 5 minutes or until vegetables are tender. Add salt, black pepper and cheese. Stir until cheese is melt-

ed. Add mayonnaise and mix well. Melt remaining butter or margarine and brush over the entire surface of mushroom. Fill with the cooked mixture. Arrange on buttered baking sheet. Top each with 1 teaspoon buttered bread crumbs. Broil until brown, about 5 minutes.

SAVORY TURKEY STUFFING

1-3 cups hot water
1/2 pound butter or margarine
1 can (8-ounce) chopped broiled mushrooms
2 cups shredded carrots
2 packages (8-ounce each) herb seasoned stuffing
In a large skillet or Dutch oven combine water, butter and mushrooms, including broth. Add carrots and bring to a boil. Add both packages of stuffing all at once to the liquid, tossing lightly with two forks until stuffing is thoroughly moistened. This makes enough stuffing for two 5-pound roasting chickens, two 6-8 pound Beltsville turkeys or one 12-14-pound turkey.

New Touch Added To Old Customs

The Thanksgiving menu need not always follow the traditional menu completely. Here is a slightly different recipe to add a new touch to an old custom. The spirit is still that of thanks and feasting.

APPLESAUCE PIE

(One 9-inch pie—serves 6)
1/4 cup butter or margarine melted
1 package (7 ounces) moist toasted coconut
1 can (1 pound, 1 ounce) applesauce
3 tablespoons lemon juice
1/4 teaspoon salt
3 tablespoons Cream of Rice quick-cooking rice cereal
2 tablespoons butter
1/2 cup brown sugar
1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg

SHERRIED SPICED

1 cup sour cream
Blend together 1/4 cup melted butter with coconut, reserving 1 tablespoon of the coconut to sprinkle over top of pie. Press coconut evenly over bottom and sides of ungreased 9-inch pie pan and chill until firm. Mean while, combine applesauce, lemon juice and salt in top of double boiler and bring to a boil. Sprinkle in rice cereal and continue to cook, stirring constantly, for 5 minutes. Stir in 2 tablespoons butter, brown sugar and nutmeg and cover. Place over gently simmering water for 5 minutes. Remove from heat and allow to cool then fold in sour cream and pour into pie shell. Sprinkle with remaining toasted coconut. Refrigerate until pie is thoroughly chilled.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—When Gordon Leech invited me out to his place for an elephant dinner, I half expected him to add "you bring the elephant."

What with all the elephant jokes that have been making the rounds lately, I have some difficulty taking elephants seriously.

But Leech was on the level. He issued the invitation on behalf of the Anteaters Association, a local group of wild game fanciers.

As the association's founder, host and vice president in charge of bicarbonate of soda, Leech arranges a series of lunches each autumn at the National Zoo Restaurant. This year he sort of outdid himself.

His Finest Hour

I thought that he had experienced his finest hour last fall when he served the association barbecued hippopotamus. But the piece de resistance at the first lunch this fall was roasted Rhodesian elephant.

To my taste, a hippo isn't in the same jungle with an elephant. Friends, this was roast elephant just like mother used to make.

There is, however, one thing about eating elephant that troubles me. You can never be sure which part of the elephant you are eating.

Leech went to a great deal of trouble to acquire the ingredients for this year's repast. After the menus were already printed it appeared that the wild game agent with whom he was dealing would default on delivery.

Rare Opportunities

And the opportunities to use a menu like that are rather limited.

"The agent finally came through but it taught me a lesson," Leech said. "An elephant in hand is worth two in the bush."

My friend Sam Free-loader, who was also a guest, said he would have enjoyed the dinner more if the side dishes had been less fancy.

"I'm strictly in elephant and potatoes man myself," Free-loader commented.

The meal started with elephant soup, but Free-loader sent his back. He claimed he found a peanut shell in it.

Leech bought 1,600 pounds of elephant meat for the association, but I doubt any of it will go to waste. It's kind of like Chinese food. You eat an ele-

phant dinner and you're hungry again in two weeks.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Congress heard Wednesday that Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson summoned postmasters from several large Texas cities to his ranch in June to discuss promotion of Negroes to supervisory jobs in their post offices.

Assistant postmaster general Richard J. Murphy testified today that former Postmaster General J. Edward Day attended the meeting. He said it occurred soon after three Negroes were promoted over whites in the Dallas Post Office.

These promotions kicked up a storm of protest about "discrimination in reverse" and were subsequently vacated by the department.

Murphy was called before a House Post Office subcommittee to explain the promotions and the subsequent demotion, which was announced on Oct. 25. He revealed the meeting at the LBJ Ranch in Texas while under questioning by Rep. Joe Pool, D-Tex.

Murphy said Day told him about the meeting. He insisted that no instructions were issued to give Negroes promotion preference.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Press Club Foundation of Dallas Wednesday announced \$6,300 in grants to nine state colleges. The money was raised in a Grid-iron show May 26.

Tom Simmons, foundation president, said the money went to Arlington State College, Baylor University, East Texas State College, North Texas State University, Southern Methodist University, Texas A&M, Texas Christian, Texas Woman's University and the University of Texas.

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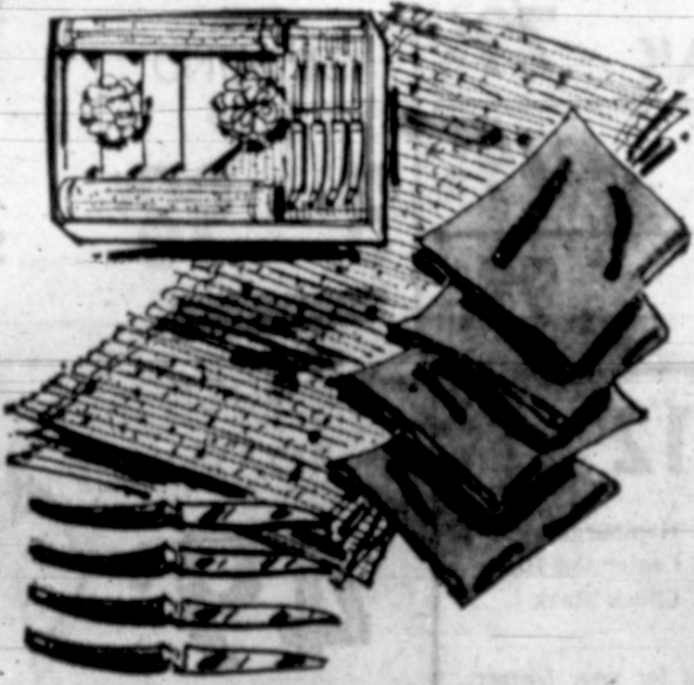

Gonnally's Office Confirms Request for Sale of Tickets

AUSTIN (UPI)—Gov. John Connally's office confirmed Wednesday the governor had asked the Texas congressional delegation to sell from 100 to 250 tickets each to the Nov. 22 fund-raising dinner in Austin for President Kennedy.

Members of the State Democratic Executive Committee also were assigned a number of tickets to sell, but the exact number was not known. The tickets were mailed last week by the state Democratic office in Austin along with letters signed by Connally.

"Therefore, every Democratic Texas officeholder has an important stake in the success of the dinner," he said. Some congressmen in Washington expressed surprise. Rep. Omar Burleson of Anson said he did not know where he would be able to sell his since party members in his district also were given allotments.

An aide to Connally said this procedure had been used often in the past. "This is normal operational procedure for this type of fund-raising dinner," he said. The Nov. 22 "Texas welcome" dinner will climax a two-day swing through Texas by Kennedy and Johnson. They will visit San Antonio, Houston, Fort Worth and Dallas before coming to Austin.

"This is standard procedure," a spokesman for Connally said. "The tickets have to be sold. Who else should be more interested since the money will be used to help them win re-election next year?"

The tickets for the dinner, to be attended by the President and his wife and Vice President and Mrs. Lyndon B. Johnson, are priced at \$100 each. Each Democrat in the state legislature also was sent tickets to sell, the spokesman said. House members were assigned five each and state senators 10 each, it was believed.

Yarborough Gets Bundle
U. S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough, D-Tex., who is up for re-election next year, was sent 250 tickets to sell. Rep. Joe Pool of Dallas was given 200 since he is congressman-at-large, and other Democratic congressmen

from Texas were given 100 each. "There are other Democrats who are not ordinary. One condition that makes them so is Cambodia's location bordering upon South Viet Nam, Laos and Thailand. But the circumstances are not ordinary. Cambodia's location bordering upon South Viet Nam, Laos and Thailand. A pro-Communist Cambodia would open up a new privileged sanctuary for the Communist attack on South Viet Nam and add to Communist pressures on Thailand.

A further circumstance centers upon Prince Norodom Sihanouk, Cambodia's 41-year-old saxophone-playing chief of state who since 1955 has been a maverick in Southeast Asian politics and whose policy of "positive neutrality" has taken a number of twists and turns.

For instance, in 1955 he renounced his title as king so that he could take an active part in Cambodian politics against the spread of communism. The decision to renounce U.S. aid also was taken, he said, to halt a swing to the left.

Railroads Use New System To Weigh Cars While Rolling

CHICAGO (UPI)—Two railroads put into operation Wednesday a revolutionary new weighing system that will weigh freight cars while coupled and in motion.

The system, developed by International Railroads' Weighing Corp., Northfield, Ill., said it would relieve the perennial shortage of freight cars in the future.

While old-fashioned static scales can weigh three cars in eight minutes, the new system can handle 75 cars in eight minutes. Spokesmen said many more hours would be saved by elimination of delays in weighing.

The system was put into use by Western Maryland Railroad in its Baltimore, Md., freight yard and by Reading Railroad in the Reading, Pa., yard.

12 Accidents For October Over County

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 12 accidents on rural highways in Gray County during August, according to Sgt. J. W. Wilson, Highway Patrol supervisor in the Pampa area.

These wrecks accounted for 11 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$11,705.

The rural traffic accident summary for Gray county from January through October of 1963 shows a total of 132 accidents resulting in seven persons killed, 94 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$104,440.

"Don't walk yourself to death," Sergeant Wilson said, "that is a slogan we would like for you to remember for the rest of the year." November and December are noted as dangerous months in traffic and especially for pedestrians.

"During these last two months of 1962 in Texas there were 65 pedestrians killed and 768 injured in collisions with motor vehicles.

There are many reasons for this, he stated, including longer hours of darkness, bad weather, pedestrians not visible to drivers, holidays and lack of drivers and pedestrians concentration.

Friendswood Couldn't Hire Professor Einstein

By WILLIAM CLAYTON FRIENDSWOOD, Tex. (UPI)—If the late and great scientist Albert Einstein had applied for a job teaching school in Friendswood he would have been flatly rejected because he smoked a pipe.

The school board of this predominantly Quaker community voted 3-2 Monday to keep in force a rule requiring that school teachers must neither smoke nor drink.

Friendswood, a tiny community near Houston, was founded about a half century ago by the Society of Friends (Quakers). There are sizable numbers of Baptists and persons of other faiths in the community now, however.

The no-smoking, no-drinking rule for teachers has been in effect since 1940.

Quakers Say 'Nay' Board president C. W. Cline and trustees Leon Brown, and Wayne Kellum agreed that teachers should neither drink nor smoke. All three are Quakers.

Brown said he did not want his children taught by teachers who smoke or drink and if the rule was dropped Friendswood would get a majority of teachers who do both.

Cline felt the rule was good "from the health standpoint."

"It has been proven these things have a harmful influence on children."

The other two board members voiced opinions against the rule.

Joe Taylor said he thought the board had created a situation in which "people think of us as a bunch of nuts or a bunch of close-minded people."

He said times are changing and predicted that the majority of the community will want to

change the rule in the future.

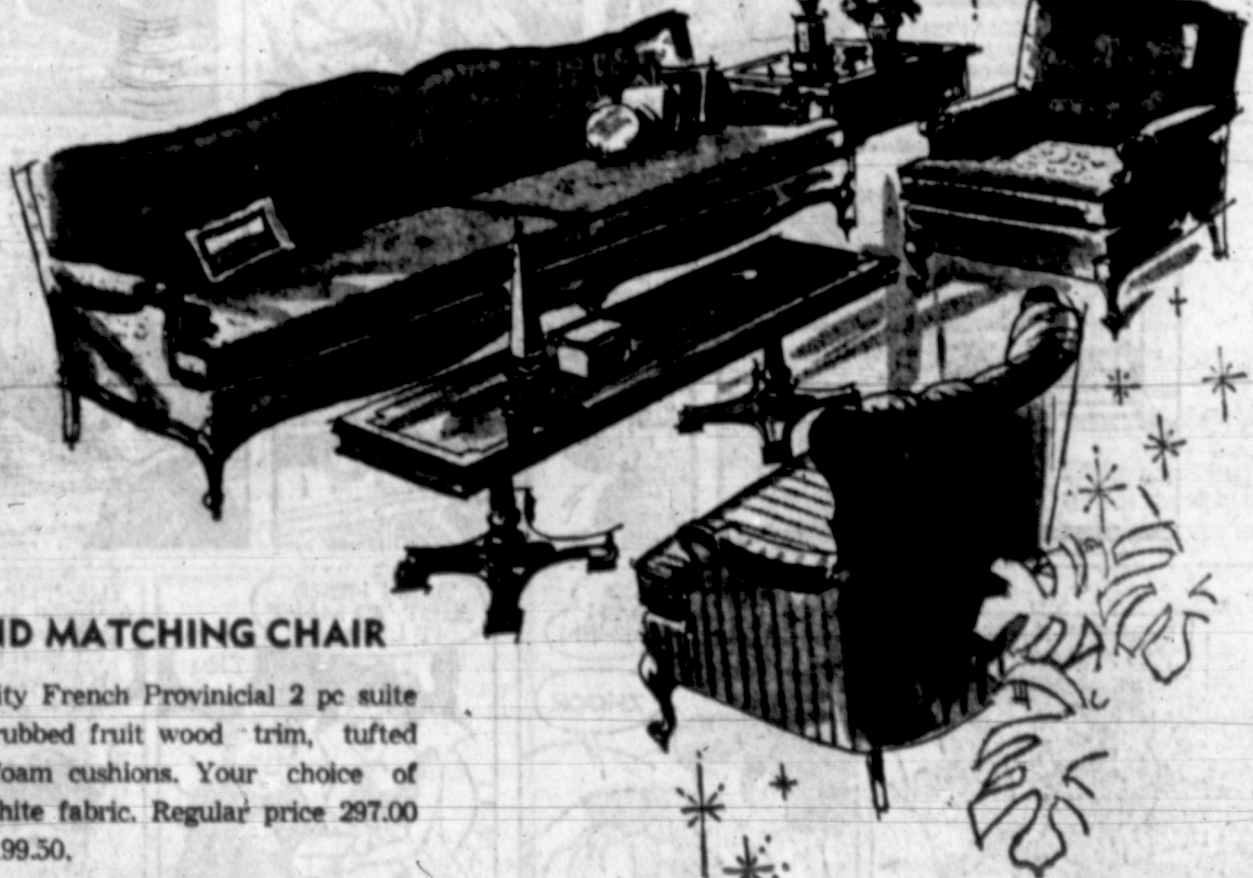

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Goldwater Says He'll Enter Most Primaries If Candidate

CHICAGO (UPI)—Sen. Barry M. Goldwater, R-Ariz., said Tuesday night that he would enter most state primaries if he becomes a candidate for president.

He first said he would enter "all state primaries" if he became a candidate, but then qualified his answer under questioning by newsmen.

Goldwater said he did not plan to enter the Wisconsin primary, because, he said, so far he has backed the "favorite son" drive for Rep. John W. Byrnes, R-Wis. He also said he would talk with the party organization in Pennsylvania before entering the primary in that state, where Gov. William Scranton is considered a dark horse possibility.

"I'm in favor of letting the states take care of their own business," Goldwater said.

"He mentioned specifically entering the Oregon, California and Indiana primaries "if it becomes necessary." It would "become necessary," he said, "if you're a candidate."

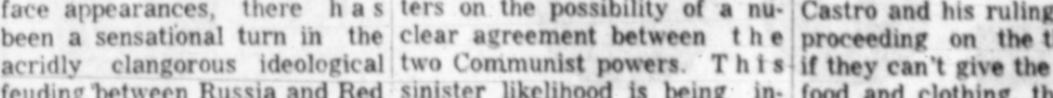
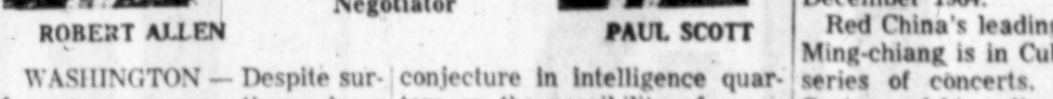

Allen-Scott Report Significant Kremlin-Peking Deals on Railroads And Nuclear Research Uncovered; Suslov Key Negotiator



WASHINGTON — Despite surface appearances, there has been a sensational turn in the acridly glib ideological feuding between Russia and Red China.

While outwardly still at bitter odds, behind the scenes the story is wholly different. It is now clear just what Premier Khrushchev meant when he tauntingly warned a group of visiting American business leaders last week not to count on a split between the two Communist giants.

U.S. and French Intelligence have definitely established that Moscow and Peking have secretly reached some far-reaching economic and other agreements.

These profoundly significant deals were negotiated by Mikhail Suslov, third-ranking member of the Kremlin hierarchy, during a six-week stay in Red China. He disappeared from Moscow in mid-September, and was variously reported as "purged" and hospitalized with a kidney ailment.

U.S. Intelligence has obtained a copy of this agreement, which calls for the following: Free movement of the goods and supplies of the two countries over their rail systems, including the Eastern European satellites; free access by Soviet bloc ships to all Chinese ports; exchange of rail personnel, including Russian technicians in China and Chinese labor in Siberia; standardization of their rail systems, and improving facilities for exchanging rail cars.

U.S. authorities are convinced this profoundly significant rail agreement foreshadows the movement to Red China of large quantities of the wheat the Soviet bloc is obtaining from the U.S. and Canada.

Another jolt — Still another sensational discovery has been made by U.S. experts compiling an exhaustive study of Red China's capabilities for producing nuclear weapons.

They have found that most of Communist China's outstanding nuclear scientists are in Russia working in their field, and playing a key role in the Soviet's nuclear developments.

The Chinese scientists are credited with some of Russia's most important breakthroughs in the last few years. Foremost among them is the concept that led to the production of the Soviet's 60 megaton (60 million tons of TNT) super-bomb and the method to test it without contaminating a vast area.

Intelligence also has ascertained that Suslov was accompanied to Peking by several of these top Chinese nuclear scientists. This fact has given rise to
