





"Some oil and sulphuric acid tanks and tubes were perforated (by machinegun fire)," the government said. It claimed no damage from the bazooka fire which, t said, "passed over the installations without any hits."

The government said militia units "repelled" the attack and the raiders fled under cover of heavy machinegun fire from the mother ship. It described the landing boat seized as having an outboard motor and being equipped with a bazooka and two .30calibre machineguns.

Bomb Storage Tanks Earley Sunday morning an undentified bomber attacked fuel storage tanks in central Cuba and caused heavy damage with rocket fire. Previously, another unidentified aircraft dropped two bombs on a sugar mill in central Cuba with slight damage.

"The costly methods (of attack) employed by the aggressors can only be met by the CIA (Central Intelligence Agency) of the North American government," the gov ernment charged.





Congressman Raises Pointed Cuba Questions

For reasons that are understandable, the Kennedy kingdom in Washington finds it expedient omit reference to Cuba, in their various announcements about this and that. And well they may, But Rep. William C. Cramer (Fla.) has been asking some printed questions on the floor of the House which bring Cuba into focus very sharply. He wants to know what the administration and particularly our attorney general, intends to do about the scores of persons who travel to Cuba in hea violation of specific prohibition against such traveling.

One group of 59 American students under the leadership of Levi Laub of Columbia University, set off presumably for a trip to Western Europe. The tab for the plane fare from Canada to the continent, amounting to a trifle of \$30,000, was picked up by someone of dubious background in Canada. From Holland the students were flown to Prague and from there one of Castro's airliners brought them back across the Atlantic for a reception that had been arranged for them in Havana. The students were taken to the collectivist agriculture project which Castro has copied from the other communist countries and to various other show-places.

Of course the students will be prevented from seeing the poverty that has been brought about by the dictatorial edicts of Castro, They will not see the political prisoners herded in grim-walled buildings or in compounds encircled with barbed wire to which are added sentries with machine guns to prevent them from escaping into Castro's paradise. Nor will the students get a glimpse of the caves in which reputable persons assert are concealed the "defensive" weapons Khrushchev did not withdraw, regardless of the statements made to President Kennedy.

Apparently the students were carefully selected for the trip to Cuba and the brain-washing to which they have been subjected. One of the speakers at a forum that was arranged for the students is a Robert Williams, Negro writer for Castro's propaganda service. Congressman Cramer revealed that Williams is wanted by the FBI, in Monroe County, North Carolina, for kidnaping and interstate flight. Had he not escaped to Cuba, he would probably now be in prison.

The question arises: What action will the Washington administration take against these students who undoubtedly will be well primed with communist propaganda by the time they return to the United States. The Senate Internal Security sub-committee was furnished with a list of 97 U.S. citizens who went to Mexico, last year, and from there got transportation to Cuba against the ban that has been imposed by this country. Only two of those persons have, so far, been indicted. Bobby Kennedy is so occupied with civil rights cases, and furthering racas' agitation by condonation of what is usually regarded as violation of laws, that Cuban visitors appear to dely the

law with impunity.

THE EAGLE AND THE BEAR-Since the Bolshevik Revolution (or counterrevolution) of 1917, U.S.-Russian relations have varied from cool to very warm to very chilly and all the degrees between. Chart above visualizes this changeable international temperature. Cold and warm readings are arbitrary and differ between observers. Things got off to a bad start with Lenin's takeover of the Russian Revolution. American troops actually fought Red soldiers on Russian soil during the ensuing civil war. In the 1920s, much American economic and technical aid was extended to the Soviets. A high point was reached in 1933 when the United States granted diplomatic recognition to the Communist regime. Interestingly, this was partly at the urging of capitalists who hoped for increased business be-

tween the two nations. Feelings took another dip with the purge trials of the 1930s and the Nazi-Soviet nonagression pact of 1939. But Hitler's invasion of Russia heated Russo-American friendship to its highest ler's invasion of Russia heated Russo-American friendship to its highest point. This was shortlived, however, being chilled by Red coups in Europe and obstructionism in the United Nations. The Cold War has, for the most part, lived up to its name with only a few warming periods. There was a sudden plunge in the fall of 1962, but the recovery has been quick. Cordiality appears to be approaching another high with the current nuclear test, ban talks in Moscow, at the same time as Russia's relations with Communist ally China are dropping to the freezing level. In spite of the warmth directed toward the West, diplomats are not discarding their overcoats.


