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Restaurant Owners Say Income Tax Ruling is Hitting Them Hard

(EDITOR'S NOTE — The new income tax regulations governing expense account spending have now been in effect for more than six months. What they mean to effect, many restaurant and hotel operators predicted their businesses would suffer. The following United Press International survey reports on what has happened in the first half year of the expense account issue.)

A Washington attorney named Tom Power got up at 6 o'clock recently and pleaded for \$30,000 to fight the income tax settlement.

In a way, he was asking for a campaign fund to launch the 60-page spender again.

Power is counsel for the National Restaurant Association.

He went to Cincinnati last July 20 to launch a campaign against the restrictions on expense account spending put into effect by the Internal Revenue Service this year.

He said the rules on what is and what is not tax deductible "will cost the national restaurant industry \$1 billion in revenue this year and \$1,000 next year."

Power's Cincinnati pitch was the first of a series of meetings in which he hopes to raise \$30,000. The money will pay for a series of full-page newspaper ads in major cities urging a public letter-writing campaign. The ads will be timed to coincide with the start of House committee hearings in Washington on a bill to repeal the expense account regulations.

A United Press International survey of top restaurant, night club and hotel in the nation's larger cities indicated Powers will get a sympathetic reception from them.

Business has fallen 15 per cent or more since the start of the year, many reported.

Salie Zebert of Zebert's Restaurant in Washington said "people are really scared. They don't know what they can charge as they don't come in as much as they used to."

Robert Cobb of Hollywood Brown Derby said "a lot of pretty good operators closed their accounts and we haven't seen them coming back yet."

Some major hotel operators were even unhappy. In addition to losing money in their restaurants and night clubs, they said, the good old days of convention business were trailing off.

Thomas J. Hase, vice president and general manager of the Waldorf-Astoria in New York said "in many cases men have not brought their wives to a meeting or convention as they did in previous years."

In general, all conventions are being less attended instead of sending 10 over to a conference, an organization will send half that number. Thus, a convention that formerly brought 1,200 to the city now will bring 600 or less.

It was the same story at Washington, Boston, Dallas, Los Angeles and San Francisco hotels.

To make matters worse for the hotel and restaurant entrepreneurs, there was a nagging suspicion that lots of businessmen were finding they could get along without expense account spending.

To Dan Soderstrom, special assistant to the general manager of the Ambassador Hotel in Los Angeles, it seemed that companies which found they could cut back on expenses during the first six months of the new regulations "now feel they got along without it so why should they start spending again?"

Restaurant and hotel men found some consolation in the belief that the worst was over. The big pinch came in the first months of the year, they said, when businessmen had distorted views of what the laws were about and stayed away accordingly.

A spokesman for Restaurant Associates, operators of New York's fashionable Four Seasons and the Forum of the U. S. Capitol, said, "It was very bad in January and February. They (the regulations) scared everybody. We're OK now."

Perryton Ready For Visitors at 3-Day Celebration

(PERRYTON (66) — Residents of Perryton and DeWitt County are preparing to welcome thousands of visitors from a five-state area during the Wheatheart of The Nation Celebration, Aug. 22-24, marking the 44th birthday of Perryton.

Included in the festivities are the authentic Indian dances of the Kosharee of La Junta, Colo., the Wheatheart of The Nation, beauty pageant, free barbecue, three rodeos, dances featuring Billy Grey and his band and a full day of entertainment Saturday, Aug. 24.

More than 30 girls from five states are expected to enter the contest, sponsored by 10 counties, the Chamber of Commerce and civic clubs. Present Wheatheart of The Nation, who will crown her successor Aug. 24 in Perryton, is Miss Jan Cooley of Livingston, New Mexico. Pampalony in the contest is 18-year-old Ruth Anne Guthrie.

Rodeos will be held each night of the celebration. Thursday night will feature a Little Britches Rodeo, in which all contestants are fourteen or younger. Friday and Saturday nights bring full-scale, seven-event rodeos, with purses of \$30 and \$25 plus fees for the winners.

Saturday events include the Old Timer's Rodeo, at which more than 300 long time residents of DeWitt and surrounding counties are expected to register, the old fiddler's contest, free barbecue and the Wheatheart parade.

Saturday night entertainers will show between the Wheatheart of The Nation Pageant and the final go-round of the rodeo camped by western dancing to the music of Billy Grey's Band.

Ministers, priests and rabbis are marching alongside Negroes in non-violent demonstrations against segregation. Some have gone to jail.

In Washington, Chicago, Detroit and many other communities, tri-faith councils have been established to promote equality of opportunity in employment and housing.

Dr. Carver Will Be in Pulpit At First Baptist

Dr. Douglas Carver, Pastor of the First Baptist Church, Pampa, will be in the pulpit for both worship services Sunday. He has chosen "Everybody Has an Enemy" for the 11 p.m. sermon.

The presiding bishop of the Episcopal Church has appealed to all Episcopalians to walk picket lines, give money to Negro organizations, and otherwise demonstrate the church's "identification with those who are victims of oppression."

The United Presbyterian Church has created a "Commission on Religion and Race" to stir Presbyterian laymen into emulating the example of their chief executive officer, Dr. Eugene Carson Blake, who was arrested July 4 for participating in a protest against segregation.

LIFE'S THREE BASIC ATTITUDES

LUKE 10:25 — 37

In the story of the Good Samaritan Jesus brings into the open life's three basic attitudes — Malicious ill will, Self-centered indifference, and Positive, aggressive good will. Word for word, this is the story:

And behold, a lawyer stood up to put him to the test, saying, "Teacher, what shall I do to inherit eternal life?" He said to him, "What is written in the law? How do you read?" And he answered, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your strength, and with all your mind; and your neighbor as yourself." And he said to him, "You have answered right; do this and you will live."

But he, desiring to justify himself, said to Jesus, "And who is my neighbor?" Jesus replied, "A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, and fell among robbers, who stripped him and beat him, and departed, leaving him half-dead. Now by chance a priest was going down that road; and when he saw him he passed by on the other side. So likewise a Levite, when he came to the place and saw him passed by on the other side. But a Samaritan, as he journeyed, came to where he was; and when he saw him, he had compassion, and went to him and bound up his wounds, pouring in oil and wine; then he set him on his own beast and brought him to an inn, and took care of him. And the next day he took out two denarii and gave them to the innkeeper, saying, 'Take care of him; and whatever more you spend, I will repay when I come back.' Which of these three, do you think, proved neighbor to the man who fell among robbers?" He said, "The one who showed mercy on him." And Jesus said to him, "Go and do likewise."

Here then, as I see it, are life's three basic attitudes:
I. MALICIOUS ILL WILL. This attitude is clearly seen in the action of the robbers. They way-laid this helpless man, robbed him, took his clothing, beat him up, and left him there to die. This is the attitude of all criminally-minded people of our community and of the entire world. Their motto might well be, "Live." These anti-social men and women are out to "live" with no regard whatever for the welfare of others. By their actions they say, "What's yours belongs to me." To them, nothing on this earth is sacred, not even human life itself!

II. SELF-CENTERED INDIFFERENCE. What was wrong with the priest and the Levite? They were good people. But they had no love, no pity, no heart, no mercy, no concern, no compassion! Their motto seems to be, "Live and let live." They say, "What's mine is my own." Some good business men seem to pride themselves in holding this attitude. But this attitude is un-Christian. Practically all the great condemnations of Jesus were upon good people who were good-for-nothing!

III. POSITIVE, AGGRESSIVE GOOD WILL. Down the road comes this foreigner, half-breed, this despised and "segregated" Samaritan dog, with whom the so-called "faithful" would have no dealings. But this man had a heart! He was moved with compassion! (Now, compassion is the strongest form of divine love. It is love in action. Even Jesus our Lord and Savior, was moved by compassion!) So this man asked no questions! Kneeling down by the dying man he bound up his wounds. Then on his own beast took him to an inn and all through the night he took care of him. The next morning, before leaving, he not only paid all the expenses, but left extra money for the care of this wounded stranger. His motto seems to be "Live and help live." By his actions he would say, "What I have belongs to the Lord, and I will share it with those in need." This attitude is Christian! It puts a man on that road which leads to life eternal.
