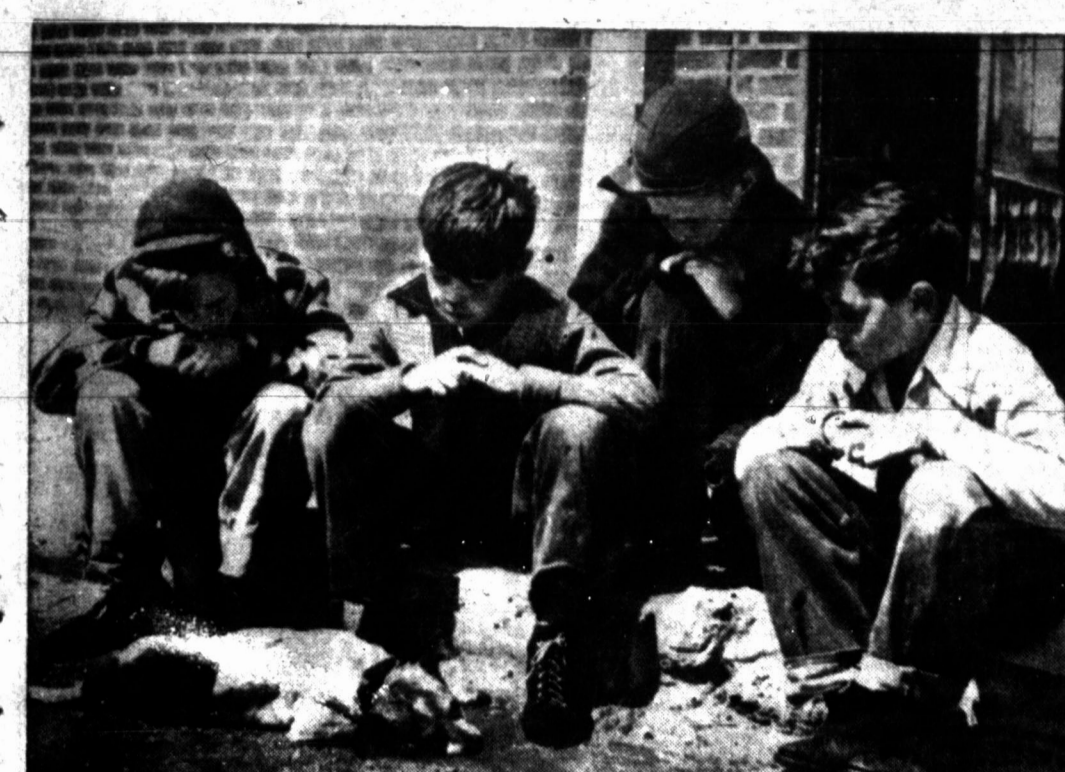

Dr. Cutshall Speaks At Methodist Church

Dr. E. Guy Cutshall, speaking for the "National Temperance Movement" with headquarters in Chicago, spoke at the First Methodist Church Wednesday evening.

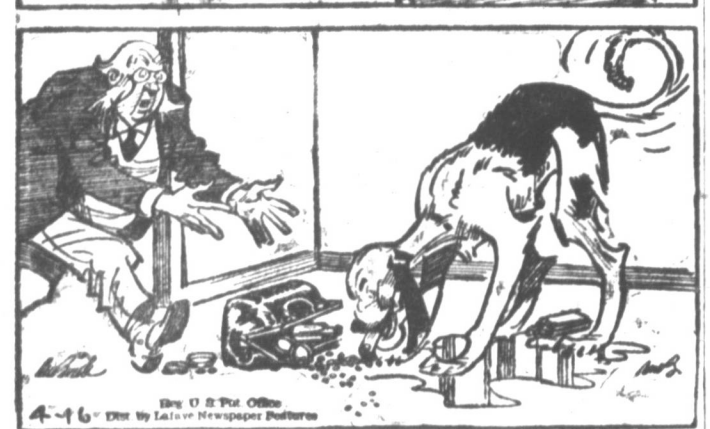

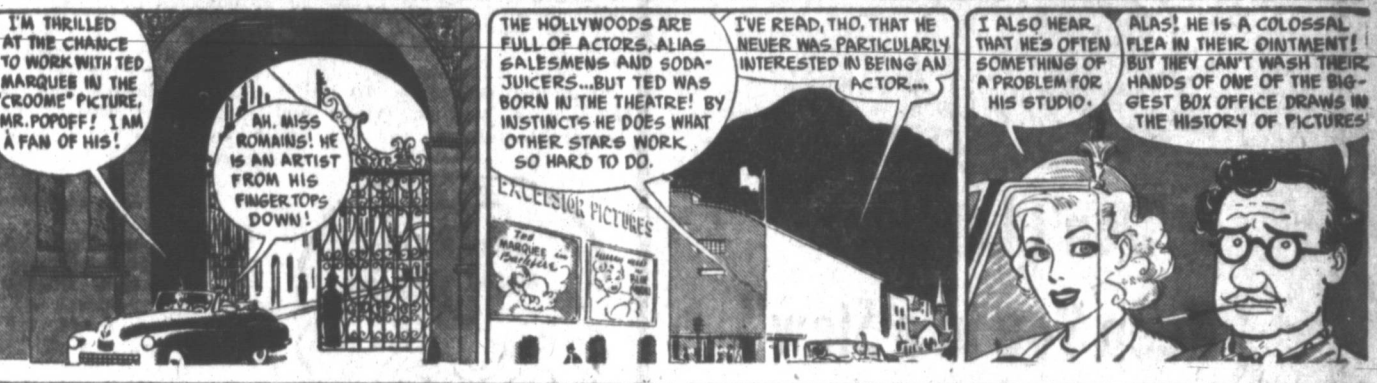

Gems From "We the People"

I want to quote a few more gems from "We the People" by Nathan Boone Williams.

Since most people, judging from their attitude towards labor unions, think that if their group works simultaneously and do not use physical force they are not using violence to gain their own ends, this following quotation from this book is timely.

"The incidence of demagogues is generally the cause of ruin in democracies. First, they calumniate the wealthy, and rouse them against the government, thus causing opposite parties to unite against a common danger. Next, they produce the same result by stirring up the populace and creating a sense of insecurity. Nearly all the tyrants of old began with being demagogues. In the lower middle class, besides strict observance of established laws, it is especially necessary to keep close watch upon little matters. For a great change in the people and making himself usually, just as a small expense often incurred runs a large fortune. Next, let men be on their guard against those who flatter and mislead the multitude; their actions prove what sort of men they are. Of the tyrant, spies and informers are the principal instruments. War is his favorite occupation, for the sake of engrossing the attention of the people, and making himself necessary to them as their leader. An unbridled democracy is exactly similar to a tyranny. Its objects and instruments are the worst, and both are equally served by the tyrant and the demagogue. It is always anxious to lord it as a sovereign; it therefore has its flatterers in the shape of demagogues. Ancient customs must be done away with; ancient laws, civil and sacred, must be broken; everything must be changed according to new and false theories; and the result is an assimilation of democratic to tyrannical government, in its habits and its actions."

Trustee ship

This book emphasizes the fact that everyone, whether he is working for the government or working with a private employer is a trustee. He is a trustee of the public. He is a trustee of the customers and users of his product or service, and to those whose genius or savings he has produced the machines and plant from which goes the common contribution to American progress.

The author of the book quotes from John Ruskin to show the importance of trust as compared with merely talking or wars. I quote: "The public... will find that the most important occupation which gentlemen will every day see more need to engage in, rather than in the business of talking to men or slaying them; that in true civilization, it is necessary to admit the idea of occasional voluntary loss— that sixpences have to be lost, as well as lives, under a sense of duty; that the market may be impulsive, and trade its heroes, as well as war."

Mr. Williams then tells how this country was based on the idea of each man padding his own canoe, and he quotes Justice Brandeis as saying: "The makers of the Constitution... sought to protect American in their beliefs, their thoughts, their emotions and their sensations. They conferred, as against the Government, the right to be let alone—the most comprehensive of rights and the right most valued by civilized men."

I now want to quote a statement that this column has been using time and time again as evidence that tax-supported education is incompatible with the Declaration of Independence. I quote: "Sound principles and policies of government can be no different than correct principles of individual conduct."

How very far we have gone away from that principle. How can anyone then contend that since he as an individual has no moral right to use force or coercion to compel any other individual to help support his ideas of education that he can transfer to the state the right to do a thing that is immoral and wicked for him to do as an individual? The basis of this government was the moral basis of an individual. It was based on a single standard of morals that a group or a state to do a thing that is wicked for an individual to do.

WASHINGTON — Despite Harold E. Stassen's recent primary gains, Republican leaders here for the Gridiron festivities and the annual convention of American editors remain skeptical toward the Minnesota's chances of winning either the presidential or vice-presidential nomination on the GOP ticket. They figure he has made too many enemies within the national organization and among the chief contenders for the prize.

It is generally believed that Governor Thomas E. Dewey of New York and Senator Robert Taft of Ohio, between them, will control almost a majority of the delegates at Philadelphia. They and favorite son candidates can probably staminate the balloting long enough to force the bigwigs into a backroom session for selection of a compromise candidate. And it may be there that the Viking will be eased out of the picture.

POST — Mr. Stassen has antagonized both Mr. Taft and Mr. Dewey to such an extent that their endorsement of him would be a repudiation of their own principles, not to mention their personal reaction.

UNBALANCE — The improvement in Senator Arthur H. Vandenberg's presidential stock may also operate against the Minnesota entry, for a ticket consisting of two men from virtually neighboring states would represent a geographical unbalance abhorred by practicing politicians. It is the consensus of important visitors to Washington in recent days that the Senate's president pro tem stands near the top of Republican possibilities.

SACRIFICE — Justice Douglas has almost no backing except for a few friends among the original clique of Roosevelt New Dealers. His principal booster is "Tommy" Corcoran, whose huge legal fees now permit him to return to politics as a backstage operator. Although Mr. Douglas enjoys this publicity, he has told friends that he does not care to quit the court right now. He also realizes that he would have almost no chance of winning, and he has no desire to be a mere sacrificial candidate.

OPPOSITION — Despite Mr. Stassen's triumph in Wisconsin, which indicated that the Middle-west has abandoned an extreme isolation stand, there are underground reports that several important delegations would oppose
