Phil Hatcher of Randalett, Okla., walked off with top money last night as the 19th annual Top O' Texas Rodeo which ended last night before an overflow crowd that watched the final perform-ance of the second RCA accredited rodeo at Recreation Park.

Hatcher's share of the \$3,500 purse plus entry fees was \$705.98.

Second in line for the all-around title was Tater Decker of Clayton. Okla., just \$30 behind the winner.

In the final rides of the bareback bronc event, Freckles Brown scored 173 points. Buddy Peak came in second with 172 points and a 3-4 split was won by Paul Mayo and Clyde Vamvoras with 171 points each.

Winning the bareback bronc riding championship of the 1963 TOT Rodeo was Buddy Peak with a high score of 342. Second in the event was Freckles Brown with 341 points and sharing a split 3-4 position was Guy Weeks and Roy Barrington with 335 points each. Wanda Bush placed high in the

race with a time of 17.4 seconds. Boots Tucker placed second in last night's ride with a time of 17.5. Nancy Stockstill of Pampa placed third in her final ride with a time of 17.8. Johnny Reynolds placed fourth with 17.9 seconds.

Winning the second go-round in calf roping was Phil Hatcher with a time of 12.2 seconds. Second place went to Rex Loftis with a time of 12.7 seconds. In a 3-4 split, Lefty Wilken and Sam Brown each tied their calf in 12.8 seconds. Winning the steer wrestling of roping event was Richard Walker

with a total of 24.8 seconds. Tater.

Decker took second place with a total of 27.2, with third going to Junior Vaughn with a time of 27.3 seconds, and Sam Brown taking fourth place with 27.8 seconds. Winning the show in the barrel racing event was Wanda Bush her fourth rodeo in a row to win the girl's barrel race. Boots Tucker took second place winnings and Nancy Stockstill, Sis Newsom and Mary Ann Stockstill split a three way 3-4 position with 53.8 seconds.

Tater Decker won first in the steer wrestling event with a time of 6.4 seconds. In second place was John Rose with a 7.6 seconds timing. Sharing in a 2-3 split. John Rose and Billy Joe Deussen each had a time of 7.6 seconds.

Winning the steer wrestling of the Top O' Texas show was Phil Hatcher with an average of 14.7. Second place went to Tater Decker with 15.4 seconds. Don Huddleston came in third with an time of 17.2 and Nathan Haley placed fourth with a 17.4 seconds time.

George Williams scored a high 178 points to win the saddle bronc riding event in the second goground. Standing second in a 2-3 split with 174 points each was Dennis Coulson and Bill Martinel-

li. A split in fourth place found Leonard Nelson and Guy Weeks with 173 points each. Bill Martinelli won the show with a total of 347 points. Second place went to George Williams with a 346 mark up and a 3-4 split put Larry Kane and Guy Weeks sharing a time of 344 points.

'Serious Setback' Slows Rescue Workers

Monday Is Set As Target Date

HAZELTON, Pa. (UPI) - Efforts to rescue two miners trapped for 12 days in a damp, chilly chamber 308 feet underground received a "serious setback" Saturday because of technical problems,

Weary rescue crews worked to correct the difficulties and set Monday as a target date for bringing the entombed men to the surface. Drilling operations also continued for a third miner, trapped in a separate cubicle 18 feet away who has not been heard from since Tuesday.





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

In many of the popular hay fever remedies they are combined with an older remedy - epinephrine. The adrenal cortical steroid hormones are also useful in some persons with severe hay fever. Preventive measures include avoidance of the causative pollen. When indoors hazards are greatly reduced by air-conditioning, since it effectively traps pollen in its filtering system. Since few persons can remain constantly indoors with the windows closed, community efforts should be encouraged to eradicate ragweed, the chief offender, by cutting it before it pollinates or by the use of weed killers.

If desensitization is started about six weeks before the pollen season begins, it can be a very effective way to avoid trouble. The old system of injecting small doses of the allergen at frequent intervals has been replaced in some clinics by prolonged - action injections.

The allergen is given in an oil emulsion which allows it to be absorbed slowly. Although this method is less bothersome it is not foolproof. It carries an increased risk of abscess formation. For this reason, many doctors still prefer the older method.

Hay fever is still an annoying ailment. But with modern methods of treatment most victims can get through the season in relative comfort.



> TOKYO (UPI) - Former British Prime Minister Lord Attlee said here Saturday the human race faced danger of destruction through "human folly."

Lord Attlee sppke before 2,163 delegates who attended the opening session of the 11th congress of the Association of World Federalists.

The former premier said that the association held the key to human survival in the atomic age. Attlee, who is vice president of the association, warned that "without the rule of law, the human race will perish."

The conference, held under the slogan of "one world without war." was opened by Dr. Hideki Yukawa, Japanese Nobel Prize winner for physics and president of the WAWF.

Yukawa called on all nations to renounce war as a means of resolving disputes.

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LONDON (UPI)-Scotland Yard tried to set a trap in Italy Saturday for a thrill-seeking British race car driver known as "The Weasel"-a prime suspect in the \$7.3 million robbery of a royal mail train.

The Yard dispatched an urgent message to police in Rome askng them to find and arrest "The Weasel"-28 - year - old Roy John James and two other suspects. Bruce Richard Reynolds, 41, and James E. White, 43.

Reynolds is an antique dealer. White owns a London coffee house. When last reported seen, James was driving a souped-up Brabham Ford at a race track in Goodwood, England. That was last Thursday when he was clocked at 95:79 miles per hour during trial heats for a race scheduled Saturday.

Track officials said James drove away Thursday in another sports car and was believed headed north. They said he bought the racing Ford for \$5,600 and also owned an expensive Jaguar.

One of his racing friends said, "Roy lives for kicks. He gets them by moving fast. He can get out of a tricky situation quicker than anyone I know. He never loses his nerve. He likes danger."






