Sandbags were used in some sections to retard flooding but late reports said the water was receding.

In a park-like setting in Bonn stands a three-story residence of clean, white lines and quiet elegance. It is called the Palais Schaumburg.

In its withdrawn setting only the soldiers of the West German Republic standing at the gates give it the appearance of more than passing importance.

But it is, in fact, the official residence of the West German chancellor and from it to a degree whch would have been deemed impossible 25 years ago radiates an influence over the decisions of every major western power.

It may be the force which determines whether President Charles De Gaulle of France decides to seek a second term.

It, more than France, will determine the future course of the European Common Market.

And in these days of cautious hope for a world more at ease with itself, the United States willtake careful soundings of opinion at the Palais Schaumburg before proceeding further in any effort to reach agreement with the Soviet Union beyond the present partial nuclear test ban treaty.
