During a period of 16 weeks, I read this historic statement to students who ranged in age from 16 to 84, to high school and college students, graduates, teachers, high school principals, business executives, engineers, doctors, lawyers, housewives, newspaper editors and publishers and students of the libertarian philosophy and out of more than 150 people, only one recognized the quotation and the author and one recognized the theme and time, generally. The author, William Bradford, governor of Plymouth, made the statement in 1623, and our present government-owned and controlled system of compulsory "education" ignores it for obvious reasons. It is convenient to ignore the fact that a public office holder in 1623 recognized socialism for the con game it is and denounced it in no uncertain terms. Gov. Bradford's recognition of the symptom of paranoia which made men believe they were wiser than God certainly deserves no less

attention today. Politicians love to refer to some intangible thing they call the public good or the public interest or the best interest of the public, as if the politicians

were wiser than the people generally and individually. I marvel at their egotism, their delusions of grandeur, their

self assumed air of omnipotence And so "educators" must have decided it was not in the best interest of those who are to be educated to learn about what Gov. Bradford thought ism and communism in 1623. A 10-year-old child might think to ask about the system which compelled people who were not responsible for his education and welfare, to pay for his education. Yes, I believe many 10-year-old children even today, might ask such a question if they studied Gov. Bradford's History of Plymouth. Students of the history of Plymouth might also discover other interesting sidelights, for instance, John Alden was admonished to speak for himself and married Priscilla Mullins. Now take a look at what can happen if a man learns to speak for himself: The couple had 11 children. It is worth noticing that Mr. and Mrs. Alden and other inhabitants of Plymouth possessed a strong sense of responsibility. Today, our children, grandchildren and generations yet unborn are enslaved by a monumental debt which a succession of tyrants have foisted upon us and them. The majority of Americans show little concern over this fact. Gov. Bradford reported a different attitude among the older inhabitants of

Plymouth in 1639; ". . .many of them grew aged and saw many changes were likely to befall; so as they were loath to leave these intanglements upon their children and posteritie"

At this point, the elders began to try to straighten out their financial affairs. Our own politicians confidently expect to be dead before the financial wreckage they have created, drifts to shore.

Unfortunately, Gov. Bradford, despite his understanding of the evils of socialism, remained under the influence of a school of thought which demanded that some form of government was necessary for the protection of the people. He wondered why many inhabitants of Plymouth moved away from the Colony despite reputed dangers from Indians and wild animals. The inhabitants of Plymouth had journeyed far to get away from tyranny and yet, after their journey, they found no protection against government. Logically, they moved away from those who would govern, prelerring to face unknown dangers. So, too, do we have the choice

of sanctioning thievery by government or refusing our sanction by boycotting politicians personally, socially and politically. I wonder what aspects of contemporary history will be ignored. Good luck and good health to you, in Freedom.



HOW TO ADDRESS OUR LAW MAKERS
