AUSTIN (Sp) — Texas' 36th Infantry Division trains next year at North Fort Hood from July 12 through July 26, division headquarters here said Saturday.

Foreign Commentary

"The Soviet army, which crushed the Hungarian revolution seven years ago, plans to leave Hungary in the next few months, diplomatic sources said today."
—UPI news dispatch from Moscow.

It was 8 o'clock in the morning on Nov. 4, 1956, and over Budapest Radio came the desperate cry:
"Help Hungary! ... Help us ... Help us!"

Just before that had been the playing of the Hungarian national anthem, and before that an announcement by Premier Imre Nagy.

"... Soviet troops attacked the Hungarian capital with the open purpose to overthrow the legal government," he said. "The Hungarian troops are in combat. This is announced to our people and to the world."
Story Of Courage

The following days were a story of human courage raised to incredible heights, of treachery compounded, and, in the West, a time of agonizing indecision.

The reappraisals and the harsh recriminations for what might have been would come later.
On that morning in the blasted streets of Budapest men, women and children hurled their home-made Molotov cocktails beneath the treads of Russian tanks, or threw themselves bodily against tank portholes.

It was an unarmed population against 200,000 Soviet troops and four to five thousand Soviet tanks, and before it was over more than 20,000 Hungarians were to die.

These were some of the memories evoked by the dispatch sent from Moscow seven years later.

Announces Withdrawal
This had been the sequence of rapid-fire events:

Oct. 27-28 — Nagy announces Soviets had agreed to immediate withdrawal of Russian troops from Budapest and negotiations for withdrawal of troops from the whole of Hungary.

Oct. 29-30 — Nagy ends single party rule, forms an all-party government and promises free elections. The new government

includes Janos Kadar.
Nov. 1 — Nagy repudiates the Warsaw treaty and proclaims Hungary's neutrality.

Nov. 3 — On this night, on a Soviet guaranty of security, Hungarian military leaders meet with the Soviets to negotiate withdrawal of Soviet troops. The Soviets arrest the Hungarian leaders and launch their attack. It was the same treachery which had been employed against Polish military leaders in 1945.

Nov. 4 — Joseph Cardinal Mindszenty takes refuge in U.S. legation in Budapest (where he still remains). Soviets recognize turn-coat government of Kadar. Nagy takes refuge in Yugoslav Embassy.

Nagy Tricked
It was on Nov. 22 that Nagy was tricked from the Yugoslav Embassy and June 17, 1958, that his executioners announced his death.

There were other far-reaching results. India, quick to condemn the Israeli-Anglo-French invasion of Egypt, finally came to realize the brutality of the Soviet attack on Hungary. President Tito of Yugoslavia condemned the Soviet action as a "mistake" and a new period of coolness resulted between the Soviet Union and Yugoslavia.

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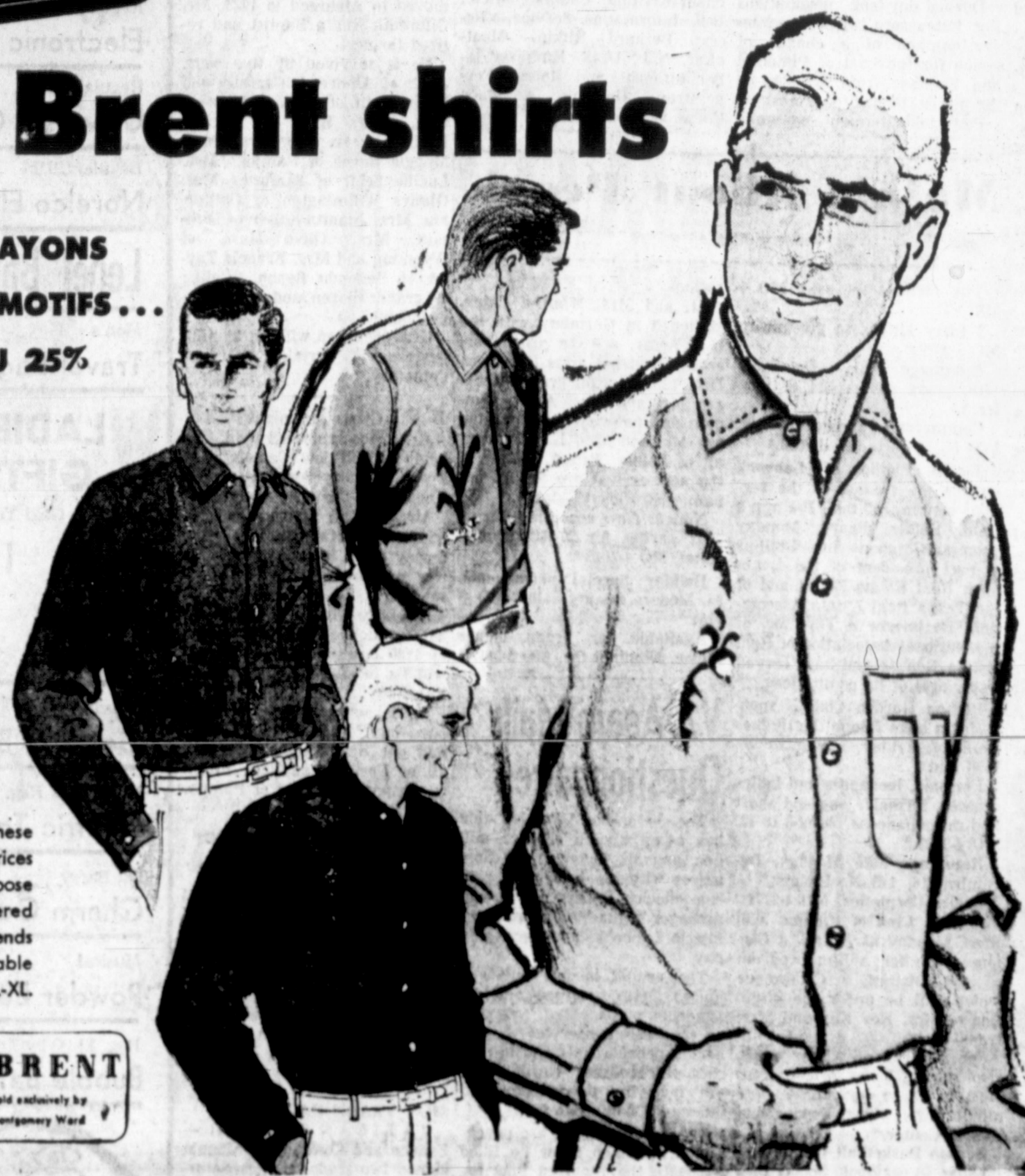

Johnson Names Texan Latin American Chief

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson Saturday selected Thomas Mann, U.S. ambassador to Mexico and a fellow Texan, to be the overall boss of his Latin American policies and assigned him unprecedented authority.

Johnson announced that Mann, 51, would be nominated as assistant secretary of state for inter-American affairs, succeeding Edwin M. Martin. The latter, the White House said, would be given a major ambassadorial post in Latin America "as previously planned."

Press Secretary Pierre Salinger made it plain that Mann would be given an extraordinarily free hand to shake up Latin American operations.

He sidestepped a question whether the Mann appointment signified Johnson's dissatisfaction over the conduct of Latin American affairs, particularly the Alliance for Progress program.

"I wouldn't make that statement," Salinger told a questioner.

No mention was made in the announcement of Teodoro Moscoso who served under the late President John F. Kennedy as U. S. coordinator for the Alliance for Progress.

Asked if Moscoso was slated to go, the White House replied that Mann would confer on his

new assignment with Johnson, Secretary of State Dean Rusk and Foreign Aid Director David E. Bell.

It was the first significant administrative change announced by Johnson since he succeeded Kennedy on Nov. 22.

The White House made clear that Mann would have a broad assignment covering economic, military and political aspects of U.S. policy in the Western Hemisphere.

"It's the President's intention to place Ambassador Mann in charge of the over-all policy coordination of all aspects of Latin American policy under the direction of the President and the secretary of state," the announcement said.

Mann, a native of Waco, Texas, conferred with President Johnson late Saturday on his new assignment.

"It is also planned to submit at the forthcoming session of the U.S.S.R. Supreme Soviet somewhat the military spending of the budget for the next year," Khrushchev said.

"These peace-loving steps of ours are a new contribution of the Soviet government to the process of easing international tension, an impetus to which was given by the conclusion of a treaty on the partial banning of nuclear tests."

Some cuts in the Soviet military spending had been predicted as result of the \$46.2 billion expenditures — half of the Soviet Union's annual budget. Western observers predict cuts in the space program and other forms of rocketry.

But Khrushchev warned, "The Soviet Union has everything necessary to curb any aggressor, to ensure the security of our people and the peoples of the socialist states."

To this he coupled a warning to the United States to keep hands off Cuba.

"Encroachment upon the freedom and independence of Cuba would be a gross violation of the United Nations Charter, interference in the home affairs of revolutionary Cuba, aggression against a sovereign state," he said.

"Such an aggression would affect all countries, including the Soviet Union.

"What is more, the Soviet Union had definite commitments with regard to the fraternal Republic of Cuba. We have repeatedly stated and state again that revolutionary Cuba will not remain defenseless if she is attacked by the aggressive militarist quarters of the United States."

Miners Bow to Threat; Agree To Release 21 Held in Bolivia

LA PAZ, Bolivia (UPI) — Leftist Vice President Juan Lechin, spokesman and leader of pro-Communist miners who have held 21 hostages including four Americans for a week, bowed to the threat of federal force Saturday and announced the hostages will be freed "to avoid a blood bath."

Federal troops early Saturday encircled Catavi, where the hostages are held, and the accompanying mine site of Siglo Veinte. The hostages have been held as pawns for the release of two Communist labor leaders.

Lechin announced the miners have accepted the demands of President Victor Paz Estenssoro to free the hostages from their dynamite-mined improvised prison.

The three-stage plan called for by the president provides in sequence:

—Release of the hostages to an intermediary, probably a Roman Catholic priest, to conduct them out of the mining zone to freedom.

—Withdrawal of federal troops now encircling the zone.

—A government guarantee of a fair trial for Communist union chiefs Ireneo Pimentel and Federico Escobar.

Charged With Murder
Pimentel and Escobar are charged with murder, sedition and embezzlement of public funds. The 21 hostages were seized to force the government to release them.

Lechin's announcement of acceptance of government demands, a virtual unconditional surrender by the insurgent miners, came after Paz Estenssoro threatened to use force if necessary to gain the hostages' release.

Lechin did not say when the hostages will be freed.

Lechin made his announcement of acceptance in a statement handed to Msgr. Abel Antezana, archbishop of La Paz, who has been mediating in the miners' government dispute which threatened to explode into civil war.

Lechin first talked with union leaders in Catavi by radio and got their promise of acceptance.

The only government concession was the promise of a guarantee of a fair trial.

Paz Estenssoro said the federal troops will not be pulled away from Catavi and Siglo Veinte until the hostages are free. He had promised earlier that if there is a peaceful settlement there will be no punitive action against the leaders of the miner revolt.

Lechin Anti-U.S.
Lechin, widely regarded as pro-Castro and anti-American, said in his statement the government's settlement proposal was accepted "to avoid a blood-

...bath."

The miners had been prepared to resist with arms issued to them as militia members, and with dynamite. An estimated 3,500 to 4,000 troops surrounded them at a distance of 10 miles.

During day-long negotiations Paz Estenssoro rejected a miners demand of a change of venue for the trial of Pimentel and Escobar from La Paz to the leftist hotbed of Potosi.

Paz told foreign newsmen

"we will exhaust all pacific means to resolve the problem, but, if necessary, the government will make its authority tell."

The four Americans held with 17 other hostages were Thomas M. Martin, New York, and Michael Kristula, Cadillac, Mich., U.S. Information Service officers; Bernard Rifkin, Montclair, N.J., U.S. Embassy labor attaché; and Robert Ferguson, Honolulu, a Peace Corps volunteer.

VA Again Mails Questionnaires

The Veterans Administration has again mailed some 2-million annual income questionnaires with the November pension checks, Robert W. Sisson, manager of the VA Regional Office in Lubbock, announced today.

The annual income questionnaires go to veterans and dependents of deceased veterans on the VA's nonservice-connected pension rolls and to parents of deceased veterans who are receiving dependency and indemnity compensation.

The questionnaires are punched cards which must be filled out with the required information and returned to the VA before the usual deadline — January 31 — or payments will be suspended, Sisson said.

Veterans and dependents receiving pension under the law in effect prior to July 1, 1960, are required to report only their annual income.

Benefactor's Portrait Placed in Library

There has recently been hung in the Lovett Memorial Library a reproduction of a painting of Thomas D. Cabot, formerly president of Godfrey L. Cabot, Ltd., and now chairman of the board of the Cabot Corporation. This portrait was presented, at the request of the library board, by Louis Cabot, president of the Cabot Corporation.

During the time that the library was being built by the trustees of the Fannie Lovett estate, Cabot, who was known for his many philanthropies, was approached for a contribution to the library in the form of an endowment fund, the interest from which would be used for the purchase of books and other reading material.

Cabot made such a contribution, to the extent of \$60,000, as a trust to be administered by the trustees of the Lovett estate. The capital investments in this trust have a present market value of over \$80,000. In addition, the original \$60,000 has earned in dividends and interest an average annual amount of \$3,200 which has been used for the purchase of books.

Highway Deaths High Over State

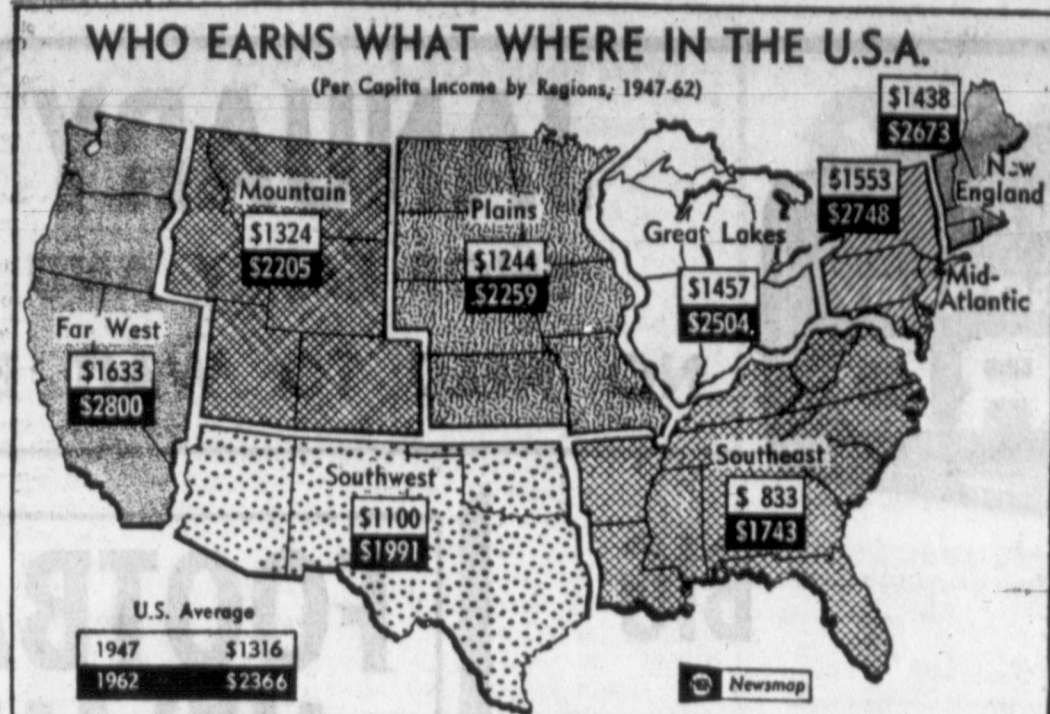

Cattlemen Endorse Present Testing Law

Cattlemen at the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association meeting in Fort Worth last week endorsed a move to obtain a state animal disease diagnostic laboratory. They recommended that testing for Brucellosis on female cattle consigned to Texas markets be continued at present.

Action on the Brucellosis testing stemmed from a Texas animal health commission rule which requires that female cattle over one year of age, consigned to Texas markets from a non-certified area, be tested for Brucellosis before leaving the

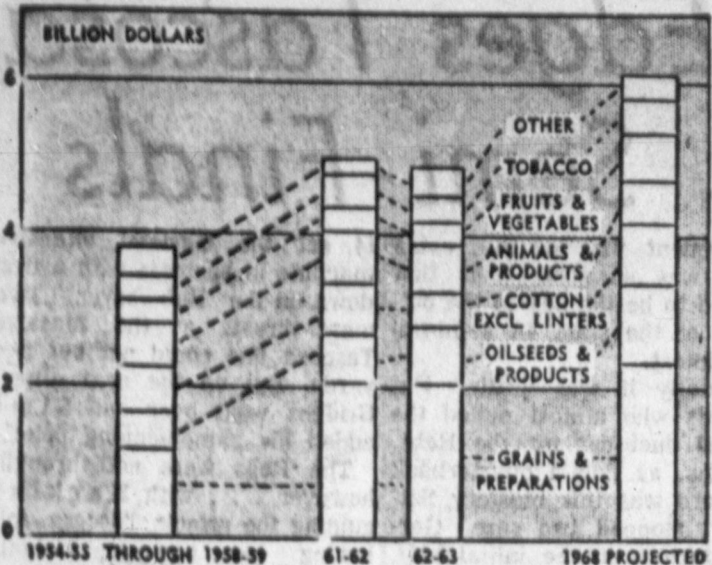
market, unless they are moved to immediate slaughter or to an approved feed yard.

A group of livestock market operators had asked that this rule be changed. The TSCRA said it felt retention of the rule would speed the Brucellosis program. The cattlemen pointed out that unless the existing federal Brucellosis program is implemented by Texas as fast as possible, the transportation of livestock from Texas to other states will be severely hampered and curtailed.

The report was made by Dolph Briscoe Jr., of Uvalde,

chairman of the TSCRA animal health committee. He pointed out that a subcommittee under the chairmanship of Frates Seeligson of San Antonio, had made a thorough study of the situation.

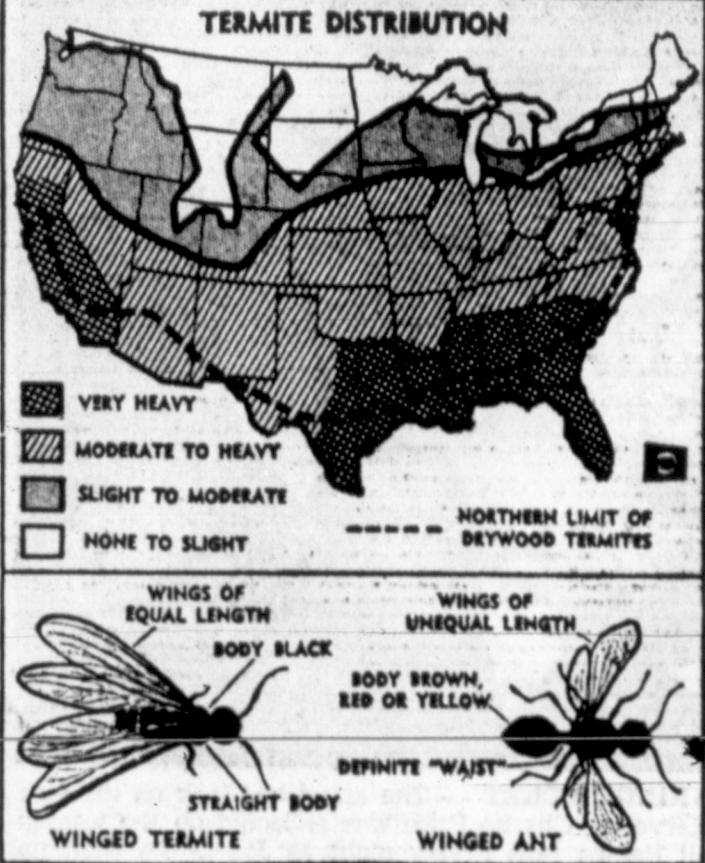
Joe Fletcher, TSCRA secretary-general manager, said that the Association is making an all-out effort to help solve the beef import problem; that the Association's cattle theft control work recently resulted in the apprehension of a "theft ring" which had stolen more than 100 head; and that membership in the Association now stands at an all time high of 13,131.

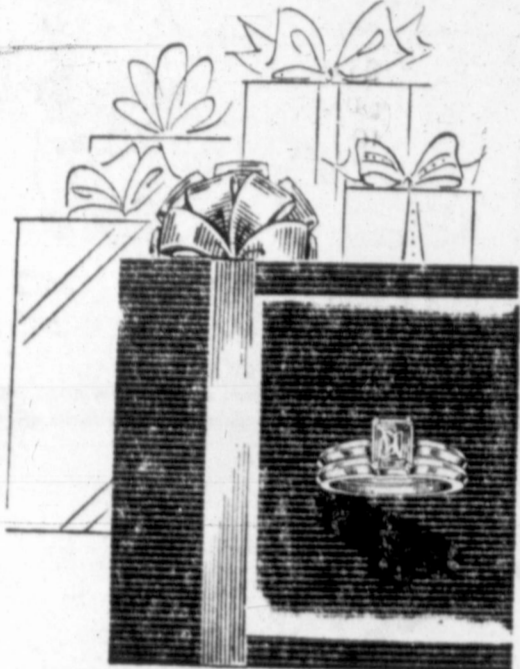

What would start out as a shelf for tiny cups and saucers would slowly fill up with miscellany such as stamps and shells and an old bill or two. It is very difficult to reform a confirmed clutterer. I happen to know from personal experience. The trick is to alleviate the situation by giving the clutterer easily accessible but hidden corners for his junk and to put his knick-knacks—or as we call them today, "collections"—on display out of reach behind glass.

There are some fine new accent pieces which might make both the clutterer and the collector happier with each other.

For example, I've seen some handsome miniature chests where a homemaker might reserve a drawer for bridge cards and let the other drawers fill up with the clutterer's treasures. One chest, for example, is only 16 inches wide and 30 inches high, small enough to fit into a narrow wall space. It is mahogany in the 18th century styling that blends with most other furniture. It also has six drawers which will hold an amazing number of assorted items.

On the other hand, for the collector, tall slender glass-enclosed cases, also in traditional styling, offer several shelves for prized pieces. Being glass walled, the cases will keep dust off the porcelain figurines as well as discourage the casual addition of unrelated objects.

So many manufacturers are making small accent pieces for

specific storage that you can and be pretty sure of finding something to fit.

Remedy that 'Slow Burn' With Newly Developed Cookware Items

Letting the unwatched pot burn is a failing that overtakes almost every homemaker at some time or another.
Some homemakers, like myself, can, after years of cooking, still scorch the lima beans every so often. The other night I managed to scorch a potful of antichokes (that took some doing, let me tell you). Besides wrecking the food, there was the pot to clean.
For the information of forgetful cooks, I am passing along some suggestions for remedying the mess. It is probably fair to say that too-high heat is the culprit behind the sad appearance of a burned cookware. Some types of cookware need special care such as copper-bottomed pans. You might keep in mind special care requirements when you shop for cookware and

suit your purchases to your willingness to spend the time on proper maintenance.
The new Teflon-lined aluminum saucepans and frying pans are light to handle and a breeze to clean, but sustained high heat will discolor them. If food sticks, soak it free. Don't scour with abrasives or you may scratch the lining which will affect the efficiency.
Glass cookware that develops brown stains from excessive high heat will usually come clean by soaking for several hours in a strong cleaning solution. A soap filled scouring pad will remove most mineral stains or burned-on grease.
Stainless steel scouring pads and soaking will help clean up the stainless steel scorched pot. If discoloration from frequent or prolonged over-heating occurs, you can return some utensils to the manufacturer. I was told, to be repolished. I plan to do this with one kettle, but to make sure, I will write the manufacturer first, to see if he has this service and what the cost will be.
Aluminum pans can be scoured, too, but alkaline foods have a tendency to stain. Stains don't affect the taste of food or performance of the pan, but they can be removed by cooking acid foods such as tomatoes or by boiling a solution of vinegar or cream of tartar in them.
To help you put more imagination into lunch box menus, keep up to date on the different types of lunch box fittings available these days.

Don't Stuff An Early Bird

Q—Is it all right to stuff the turkey the day before cooking? Would save last minute rush.—Mrs. A. C.
A—No. Most home economists warn against stuffing turkeys until just before the time to roast. They say that stuffing a turkey and refrigerating or freezing it for later use is definitely not recommended. If you use a commercially frozen stuffed turkey, do not thaw it before cooking. However, if you are using an unstuffed frozen turkey, thaw it almost completely before cooking. It should be pliable. Thaw in refrigerator in the original wrapper. But if you haven't time then thaw the turkey sealed in watertight wrapper in cold water. Do not use warm water. Change the water often. Cook the bird soon after thawing—that is very important.
Q—We all like turkey at our house, but does it really have real food value like beef and value of their birds. Turkey is a rich source of protein. A lamb?—Mrs. K. Z.
A—Don't let the turkey raisers hear you question the nutritional.

Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Set aside.

1 1/3 cups sugar
4 large unbeat egg whites
2-3 cup milk
Pink Marshmallow Frosting

Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Set aside.

Blend mace and pure vanilla extract with shortening. Gradually add sugar, mixing well after each addition. Beat in egg whites, one at a time. Add flour mixture alternately with milk. Turn into 2 well-greased, lightly floured 8-inch, round layer cake pans. Bake in preheated moderate oven (375-degrees) 25 minutes or until a toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool in pans 10 minutes. Turn out onto wire racks to finish cooling. Frost with Pink Marshmallow Frosting, sprinkling coconut over the frosting on the bottom layer only. Form a bouquet on the top with red glaze cherries. Soften angelica in hot water, cut into thin strips and use for cherry stems.

Miss Elaine Revell compiled the rules for secretaries so that they could enjoy the holiday festivities but "keep things under control to avoid regret after the parties are over."

(Miss Revell heads a firm bearing her name that each year places more than 1,500 girls in temporary office positions.)

Miss Revell said one of the most serious mistakes a secretary can make is to arrive at the office on the day of the party as though she were going out with her favorite beau on Saturday night.

Dress The Same
"Girls should dress in much the same manner as they do for a regular day at the office. A sprig of holly or some other holiday decoration would suffice as a festive touch," she said.

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Pampa's Synonym For Drugs
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'Loot Bags' Yule Project

If you have accepted leadership of a troop of little girls, as so many well-meaning but naive mothers do, you're up to your eyeballs in Christmas-oriented projects. Or should be.



In the bag, a fanciful reindeer could carry loot home from a birthday party or Christmas surprises from the girls' troop to sick children in a hospital.

Unfortunately, my criteria for happy projects do not coincide with the leadership manuals. I want projects that take a minimum of pre-meeting preparation by the leader and that can be finished by the willing hands of second-graders in one session. One of our youngsters spent two months of meetings trying to assemble nut cups from a dozen tiny cut-out pieces and gave up in boredom.

Well, help comes from unexpected quarters. An artist friend showed me her idea for a Christmas party "loot" bag—a bag that young guests at a holiday birthday party might use to carry home prizes and favors. The brightly colored bags were supposed to follow a reindeer party theme (you know, games like "pin the red nose on Rudolph"). Although it didn't look like any deer I'd ever seen, the more I looked at the bag, and the more the bag looked back at me—the eyes are hard to avoid—I realized I was looking at the next troop meeting project.

The gay, funny bags are absurdly easy to make and prove inexpensive holders for goodies for sick children in a hospital ward or for party guests. The finished effort can be packed and carried flat without damage.

age. Fill them with goodies later.

The bag body is simply a brightly colored sack. The children draw and cut out a triangular head from shirt or lightweight cardboard. Glue cotton batting to the cardboard for chin whiskers. Then glue the head to the sack top. Antlers are cotton swabs taped to the back of the head. Draw googly eyes with a black felt-marking pen or circles of round white paper and glue them on the head. A small bell at the tip of the nose is a nice touch. Hooves are cotton-covered cardboard oblongs. The front of the bag is tricked up with a harness made of a straight strip or two of plastic tape—one wider than the other—and a chain of beads. String the beads on thread and knot to the bag.

Instead of glass or breakable beads, the chain should be of popcorn or paper links. A few star-shaped stickers brighten the front, too. The youngsters may need help in cutting the thin cotton batting but they can do the other work.

P.S.: Glossy paper bags, lunchbag size, in strong, bright shades are usually found in party supply sections of five-and-dime, department or stationery stores.

The Mature Parent 'Fun' Ethic Is Root To Adolescent Problem

The 'fun' ethic is the root of the adolescent problem at home and in school. I was recently told by Fred M. Hechinger, New York Times education editor and author of the widely discussed book "Teen-age Tyranny." "The notion that all struggle should be removed from children's experience must be the first to go if we are to get them back on the track."

I agree with him. But remove the "fun" from children's lives? How can we? Don't we live by it ourselves?

Certainly, many teen-agers indulge in precocious sexual activity. But what about their elders who "buy now and pay later" for the fun they want—the vacations, cruises, transistor radios? Isn't this the land of the credit card—the deferred bill? Who among us grownups is willing to postpone gratification un-

til we've paid for it?

Sure, this is the country where teachers teach children that work is ordeal by saying, "O.K., you've had your fun now. Let's get back to work." But isn't this also the country of the time clock, the coffee break? Do we parents go to work with joy in the opportunity to use our energies productively? Or do we have to be hounded to it? Given our playtimes?

Unquestionably, schools have created a whole philosophy to spare children dull drill in phonics preparation for reading. But how about our devotion to "labor-saving" devices? Who among us personally strains baby's vegetables? Aren't our gadgets here to spare us dullness, too? What about our washing machines, the buttons that spare us the exertion of get-

ting up and turning the television dial?

Undoubtedly, the teen-ager dares not differ himself from the "crowd," dares not wear clothes or serve snacks other teen-agers don't wear or serve.

WASHINGTON (NEA) — "I've always been a booster for Lyndon Johnson," the new President of the United States said some months after he became vice president.

This revealing little story is recalled now as an indication of two things: The Kennedy foreign policies will probably be continued without interruption. And the new president has plenty of self-confidence to carry on the job.

Critics overlook a number of important points in maintaining that while Lyndon Johnson has plenty of savvy about American politics, he may lack international political experience.

They have not been just good will missions like his attendance of Senegal's first anniversary of independence. Nor have they been ceremonial like his presence at the inauguration of Dominican Republic's ex-President Juan Bosch.



Allen-Scott Report

WASHINGTON — The State Department is uneasily pondering what to do about admitting a new large influx of "Old Believers" — this time from Russia.

Some 1,200 want to come to the U.S. to join the 250 members of their sect who were allowed to migrate from Turkey earlier this year under a ruling by Attorney General Robert Kennedy.

Several years later, after working in various Soviet factories and marrying a Russian woman, the killer got a U.S. visa to return home. The Central Intelligence Agency is looking into information that two women and a man accompanied Oswald on his trip to Mexico last fall (September 26 to October 3), and that the man subsequently flew to Cuba.

While in Mexico City Oswald applied to the Cuban consul-general for a transit visa to Moscow. He was informed he would first have to get a visa from the Soviet.

Representative Michael Feighan, D-O., chairman of a House Judiciary Subcommittee, who opposed the original admittance, is also against this one. He has summoned Schwartz for questioning on what the State Department plans to do.

It is Vance's intention to explain all this in the so-called "fact sheet." It would point out that several years ago the Army decided to exclude graves from this choice Arlington area. But an exception was made for the assassinated President.

The Doctor Says

The Causes of Nosebleed Ad Ways to Stop It By DR. WAYNE BRANDSTADT Q — I have a slight nosebleed at least once a day. I have been operated on for it but it still continues. What would cause this? Is there a cure?

A — Recurrent or persistent nosebleeds are common and may be due to several causes, like the removal of hard crusts that form in the nose. You can prevent the condition by using a little petroleum jelly or mineral oil on the mucous surfaces.

Q — I have been treated for a peptic ulcer for about a year. The X-ray shows that the ulcer is healed but I still have my symptoms. Can an ulcer be cured after it becomes chronic?

A — With any of a number of methods of treatment most ulcers heal within eight or 10 weeks. If the stresses that caused the ulcer are not eliminated the ulcer may come back but even the most chronic ulcer can usually be cured with proper treatment and appropriate control measures should help to prevent recurrence.
