Five Killed, 14 Hurt In Blast of Fireworks

Two Patrolmen Hurt in Crash Near City Limits

Tragedy Strikes Twice as Pampa Officer's Cousin Found Murdered

New Year's Eve began like most nights for Pampa highway patrolmen.

Patrolman Lawrence Macha and Vernon Cawthon reported for duty at the Gray County sheriff's office at 4 p.m. Tuesday.

Eight hours later Macha was in Highland General Hospital, Cawthon was shaken up with minor injuries and their patrol car smashed as a result of an accident.

The tragic incident capped off a night that kept area law enforcement officials jumping and brought tragedy to the Cawthon family two-fold.

Cawthon's cousin, Amarillo city patrolman Jerry Cawthon, 25, father of three children, was found shot to death on the backyard porch of a house early this morning.

Cawthon, who had made an appearance before the Pampa City Commission last year to demonstrate police dog use in law enforcement had been involved in a chase but did not request assistance.

His body was discovered by two hospital nurses shortly afterwards. They said they saw Cawthon run across a driveway toward the rear of the house and heard a shot a few minutes later.

Three cars were seen to leave the house at a high speed minutes later. The nurses investigated and found Cawthon shot in the mouth with his service revolver nearby, one shot fired.

Cawthon's police dog the same one with which he appeared at the city commission was found locked in his squad car. The officer had been with the police department for three years.

No charges have been filed in his death as yet.

The accident which hospitalized Macha and slightly injured Vernon Cawthon occurred at 11:30 p.m. at Wells and Wilks Sts.

Shoppers Trapped As Roof Falls in

CHARLESTON, S.C. (UPI) — Five persons, and possibly six, were killed and 14 injured Tuesday night in a fireworks explosion at a suburban grocery that spewed flames and debris on shoppers and store employees.

The blast demolished the grocery and brought the roof tumbling down, trapping a number of persons.

"We heard people screaming in there but we were unable to reach them," a fireman said, because of the roaring flames.

Firemen probed the smoldering wreckage this morning in an effort to find the body of another person believed killed in the explosion.

The force of the 9:45 p.m.

blast blew out windows in surrounding business firms and residences within a radius of 200 feet.

Immediately following the explosion, fire engulfed the wreckage of the frame and cement block building, making rescue efforts virtually impossible.

Wearied firemen, who had battled fires throughout the day in this historic port city, recovered the bodies of five men from under the collapsed roof of the building.

Fourteen persons, including Herbert Livingston, owner of the Clover Farm grocery, were treated at hospitals for burns and lacerations. None was believed seriously injured.

Fire officials said it was believed the explosion occurred in a truck loaded with fireworks parked beside the grocery.

Pro Footballer Shot To Death in Chicago

CHICAGO (UPI) — Tony Parrilli, 24, former University of Illinois football star and later a linebacker with three National Football League clubs, was shot to death early today in a scuffle at a bowling alley owned by Mike Ditka of the Chicago Bears.

Du Page County sheriff's police said the bullet which killed Parrilli came from the gun of Police Chief Robert Winters of suburban Willowbrook, where the bowling alley is located.

In a scuffle which preceded the shooting fullback Joe Marconi of the Bears suffered head injuries and was taken to Hinsdale Sanitarium where eight stitches were taken in his wounds.

Sheriff's police said there have been no charges filed and the shooting "is being listed as accidental at this time." State's Atty. William Bauer of Du Page County began an investigation.

Parrilli was pronounced dead on arrival at Hinsdale Sanitarium.

The scuffle occurred in a washroom of the bowling alley in which Ditka, a star end with the Bears, is a partner.

Winters and Patrolman Stan Lachta are on duty at the bowling alley when they were told of a fight in the washroom.

No Road Deaths In City, Police Goal for 1964

Temple Bells, Jelly Doughnuts Usher in 1964 Around World

Temple bells boomed in Asia, furniture and dishes flew from windows in Italy, and Englishmen swam in an icy fountain in London today to welcome the new year.

In other parts of the world, 1964 was greeted by political pronouncements, an increase in taxi fares, and millions of jelly doughnuts.

Communist China and Nationalist China observed a New Year's cease-fire in their artillery war over the offshore islands of Quemoy and Matsu, flooded waters. The swimmers but for U.S. forces throughout the world, it was business as usual.

LBJ Pleased Over Report on School Anti-Dropout Program

President Johnson began the new year today with an optimistic report on the government's campaign to reduce the number of high school dropouts.

An anti dropout program was initiated last year by the late President John F. Kennedy.

Johnson reported today that the results of the campaign were "far better than expected."

After receiving a report on the campaign from Francis Keppel, United States commissioner of education, the President said in a special statement:

"I am very much encouraged."

Johnson's optimism was based on a disclosure from the study "that where a local effort was made, one out of two actual or potential dropouts returned to school, and nine out of 10 are remaining in school."

Fiancee of Dr. Sam To Appear at Hearing

CLEVELAND, Ohio (UPI) — Ariane Tebbenjohanns said today she hoped to get out of the hospital "within a few days" after treatment for a "complete emotional exhaustion" in time to be on hand for the court hearing of her fiance, Dr. Sam Sheppard, serving a life term for the 1954 slaying of his wife Marilyn.

No date for the hearing has been set. Presumably it will be decided on Jan. 15 when attorneys for both sides meet with a federal judge to discuss what matters to cover at the hearing.

The 34-year-old German-born divorcee is a patient in the Bay View Hospital operated by the former osteopath's brothers, Drs. Stephen and Richard Sheppard.

"I guess my nerves just broke me," she said. "All year I've been trying to fight all my worries and troubles and tried to smile. The whole of Christmas time is not an easy one."

She turned up early last year and announced her engagement to the Ohio penitentiary prisoner, slated for a pre-trial conference in federal court at Columbus on Sheppard's petition for a writ of habeas corpus to get his freedom. He contends many constitutional rights were violated in his arrest and trial.

HOUSTON (UPI) — A law suit filed here Monday told about some anxious moments a woman spent in a hospital bed that was invaded by a snake.

Miss Jean Tulp charged in a \$45,500 personal injury suit against Northshore Hospital and the Hollis Construction Co. that the snake woke her up and caused her to fall out of her hospital bed, aggravating automobile accident injuries that put her in the hospital in the first place.

Nurses killed the snake, which lawyer Howard Lake said must have been a king snake.

The Doctor Says

More and more persons are developing chronic bronchitis, partially, it is believed, due to the increase in cigarette smoking and air pollution in general.

This disease is rarely found in persons under 35. About four times as many men as women are victims. In cities with a severe air pollution problem, the number is especially high.

Colds and other respiratory diseases that hang on for more than three weeks often lead to chronic bronchitis. Once an irritation is set up in the bronchial tree, the branches of which extend to every air sac in the lungs, the victim suffers from a persistent cough that is usually worse in the early morning and in the evening.

He may call it a cigarette cough, but, regardless of what he calls it, it can interfere seriously with his breathing and shorten his life.

The person who has true chronic bronchitis brings up an ounce or more of thick sputum daily. He finds it harder and harder to throw off a cold and the condition is usually worse in damp, cold weather. The increased secretion of mucus by the lungs not only makes breathing difficult, it also increases the chances for streptococci, staphylococci and tubercle bacilli to find a happy home.

Chronic bronchitis is especially hard on persons who already have asthma.

Prevention is far easier than treatment of the full-blown disease, and the longer the disease has been present, the less likelihood there is of a complete cure. The difficulty is compounded by the fact that most heavy smokers would rather be short of breath and keep their cough than give up smoking.

The thing that discourages many victims is that giving up smoking doesn't cure the m-

Paper Your Problem Doors

Doorways may bring special problems of their own to a home. Sometimes doors are out in an awkward relation to the rest of the room — for example, leaving a corner orphaned.

Old-fashioned panel doors often present an annoying problem. Painted panels, even freshly painted ones, will show fine vertical cracks. Other old doors are so scarred that you must either ignore or camouflage them. Let me add, however, that I do not refer to the

old wooden doors to which scratches and scars lend character nor to those we sometimes find that can be stripped of their varnish layers to a fine wood beneath.

A technique worth remembering when door surfaces are unsightly or unimpressive is the use of wallpaper. I tried this wallpaper camouflage on an old paneled door, papering just the cracked panels, and painting the frame. In discussing my experience with William Burton, Wallpaper Company, he had some other suggestions.

He reminded me that many

inexpensive wallpapers have matching fabrics. You might paper a door to pick up a pattern used for draperies, for example. He suggested, also, that amateurs might be wise to select a busy all-over pattern to make accurate matching unnecessary.

Use of pre-pasted wallpaper simplifies the papering job. Not so much for camouflage but to lift an ordinary flush door into a more impressive entrance is another job wallpaper can do. According to Burton, Bold classic prints in the Piranesi black-and-white manner,

The response was expected to be enthusiastic. Pope Paul, the austere north Italian intellectual who was more admired than loved when he was elected to the papal throne six months ago, appears to have captured the hearts of Romans with his pilgrimage plan. He was almost mobbed during recent public appearances, including a Christmas Day visit to a bleak working class suburb.

The spiritual head of 300-million Roman Catholics will be the first Pope to visit Palestine and the first in 525 years to meet a supreme leader of the Eastern church.

His meeting with Patriarch Athenagoras I of Constantinople comes Sunday on Jerusalem's Mount of Olives, where Christ prayed on the eve of his crucifixion.

Running westward and southward from the rocky shores of the Sea of Galilee, a \$200 million complex of canals, tunnels, pipelines and reservoirs is almost ready to start carrying precious water to Israel's arid Negev.

to go to war to prevent its completion. Chief source of the Sea of Galilee is the River Jordan which rises in the mountains of Lebanon and Syria, flows through the Sea of Galilee (or Lake Kinneret, as the Israelis call it), and finally loses itself in the waters of the Dead Sea to the south.

It is a project that has been 10 years in the building and is part of a still larger scheme to reclaim 825,000 acres of land, to permit new cities and the settlement of more than one million immigrants.

The Arabs charge that diversion of the Jordan waters damages not only their lands but changes the military situation as well.

Arab nations have threatened

Both charges have been rejected by the Israelis who have proceeded with at least the moral support of the United States.

Arabs Call Meeting
The near-completion of the project is the reason for next month's Arab League meeting in Cairo called by U.A.R. President, Gamal Abdel Nasser to seek unified Arab action. Of the 13-nation membership, 12 have responded favorably.

Arab opposition already has forced Israel to make substantial changes in the original outline of the plan.

At first, Israel planned to take about half the water from the almost-mineral-free upper Jordan before it emptied into the Sea of Galilee. Syrian interference in the demilitarized zone altered that plan.

Jordan's decision to divert waters of the Yarmuk River, the Jordan's major tributary, to an irrigation project of its own brought further changes.

Israel water now will be taken entirely from the Sea of Galilee which itself lies wholly within Israel. This, according to Israel, removes any technical or legal question over the diversion of the Jordan River.

Discount Showdown
Israel, with a population growth of around 70,000 a year and facing a desperate water situation, is betting that the Arabs will not go to war.

And Arab leaders, noted for bickering among themselves, also indicate that agreement on any unified action may be hard to reach.

From Cairo have come indications that Nasser believes total Arab political unity must be achieved in advance of a showdown with Israel.

An influential weekly publication in Cairo charged that Syria, Jordan and Saudi Arabia would like to see Egypt embroiled in war with Israel so they could "stab her in the back."

The charge drew angry reports from both Syria and Jordan, and the counter-charge that Nasser sought to evade his responsibilities toward Israel.

Defeat at the hands of Israel
In 1948 rankles deep in Arab minds and may lead to caution. A Beirut newspaper, agreeing that Arab unity comes first, said: "The Arab tragedy of 1948 in Palestine must not be repeated in any form."

BOUNCES RADIO WAVES
MOSCOW (UPI) — The Soviet Union says it has bounced radio waves of the planet Jupiter and recorded them on the rebound for the first time in history.

Communist China Leader Talks With Hassan in Rabat

Washington Window

Judging solely from the Republicans he already has blessed with some degree of his favor, there is no member of the party old or young whom former President Dwight D. Eisenhower would reject as a contestant for this year's presidential nomination.

These blessings extend now from Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona to Harold E. Stassen of no specific state at all. Stassen cut firm moorings in his native Minnesota and never has been able to secure himself in his adopted Pennsylvania.

Your correspondent or the reader of these paragraphs has about as much chance as Stassen to be nominated for president by the Republican party. Better, maybe!

Stassen left his political future behind him after the war when he deserted Minnesota, which thrice had elected him governor, and fled to Pennsylvania. This appeared to be a search for a broader political base in big Pennsylvania than Minnesota could offer. Nothing came of it, however. Stassen was unable to identify himself with the Pennsylvania dairy leadership.

Impure Product
Eisenhower's endorsement of Stassen as a potential Republican presidential nominee greatly adulterated the product. Moreover, Ike already had urged Gov. William W. Scranton to go all-out for the Republican nomination. There is nothing spurious in Scranton's claim to party consideration nor, apparently, in Ike's belief that the governor would make a good candidate.

But Eisenhower could not seriously contend that there is any political sense in proposing that the governor of Pennsylvania seek the party presidential

nomination and at the same time to endorse a relatively obscure soldier in the Pennsylvania party ranks.

It is likely that Eisenhower's endorsement of Stassen as a contestant was in mighty faint language, more in courteous effort to avoid offense than to promote a serious effort by Stassen. Sen. Barry Goldwater seems to have a similarly vague approval. Eisenhower said that he is not anti-Goldwater. He told reporters in Washington, D.C., last October that he had an understanding with Goldwater that the senator would clearly state his position on the major issues if he announced his presidential candidacy. General Eisenhower also indicates his intention to accept the choice of the 1964 Republican National Convention.

Big Difference
But to Eisenhower that is a big distinction between accepting a Republican nominee and actively supporting that nominee. It is conceded that Eisenhower's active support will be necessary if the Republican nominee is to be elected in November. It seems equally true that no candidate could be nominated against Eisenhower's open opposition.

It is difficult as of now to conjure up the name of any Republican whom Eisenhower might actively oppose. The field of Republicans now possessing his blessing in more or less degree is so large as to embrace practically the whole party. In addition to Goldwater, Scranton and Stassen, Ike has blessed in greater or lesser degree: Richard M. Nixon, Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge, Gov. George Romney of Michigan and Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York.

If Ike doesn't hit the jackpot, he might get a vice presidential winner as a consolation prize.

US Smokers Set Record In Past Year

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Americans smoked a record 523 billion cigarettes in 1963—despite recurring reports blaming smoking as a cause of lung cancer and other ailments.

The 1963 cigarette total was almost 3 per cent more than the total for 1962—508.2 billion cigarettes—and marked the seventh consecutive year that smoking has increased in the United States.

The Agriculture Department noted that the increase between the 1962 and 1963 total was significantly more than the 1 per cent increase between 1962 and 1961. From 1955 to 1960 the rate of increase in cigarette consumption averaged 4 per cent a year.

The department noted that most Americans preferred "tailor-made" cigarettes to the "roll-your-own" variety in 1963. The output of tobacco for pipes and roll-your-own cigarettes was about 70.5 million pounds, slightly less than in 1962.

But this was the only tobacco category, outside snuff, which declined this year. All the others, including chewing tobacco, showed increases.

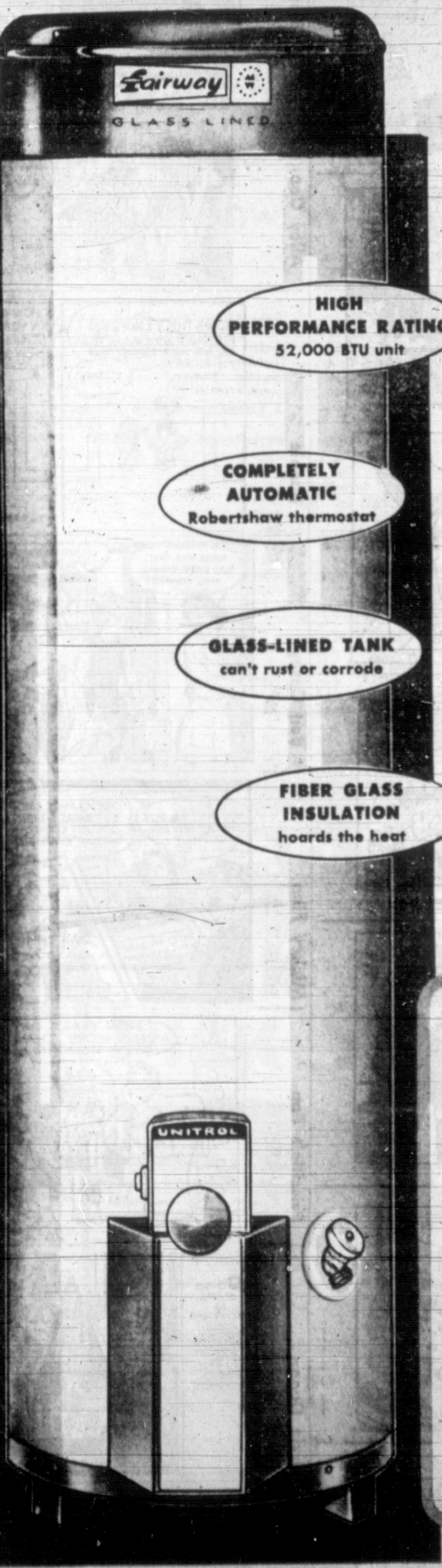

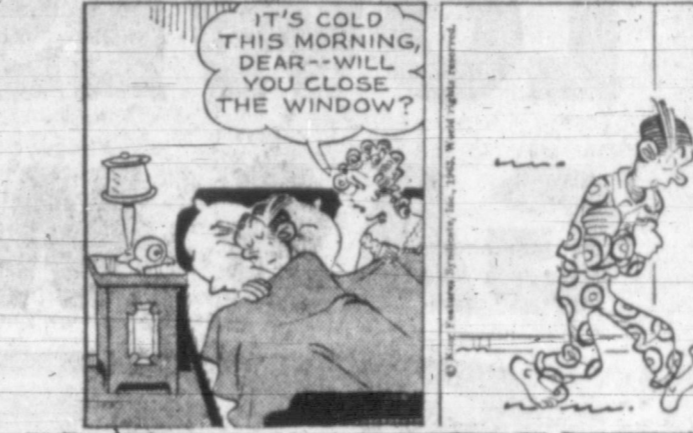
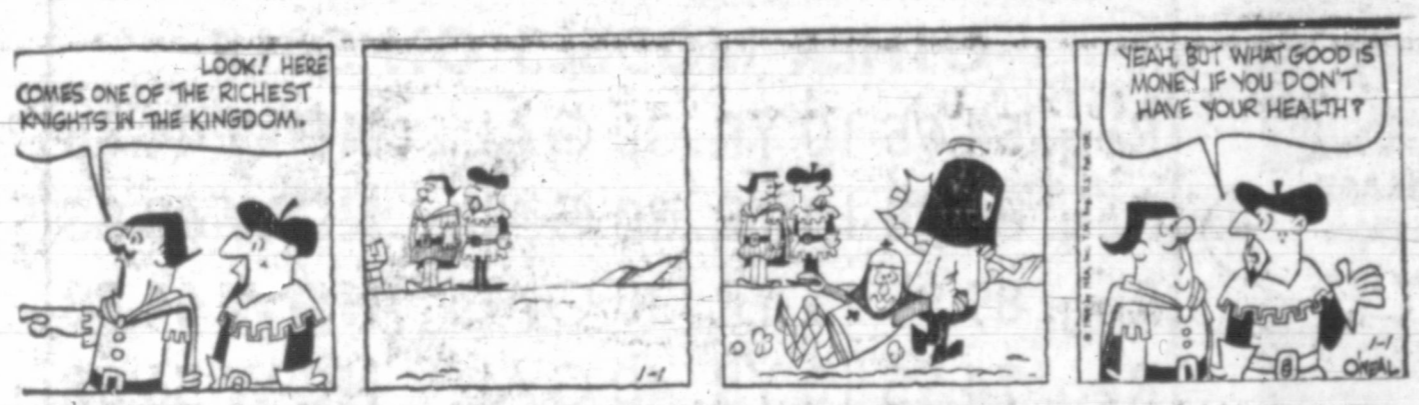

The Struggle Ahead We now are witnessing the culmination of the most spectacular political warfare campaign of all time.

In 1961, the Soviet "locomotive of history" assessed its enormous gains of the preceding fifteen years and began to press for a giant breakthrough in the weakening front of resistance.

The draft platform of the Communist Party of the Soviet Union -- the most authoritative Soviet directive there is -- called for the elimination of resistance forces in the United States.

The American Communist Party, a dutiful subordinate of the world organization, went into immediate action and, incidentally, revealed its powerful influence.

"In the opinion of the Communist Party, there can be no question but that the threat from the extreme right is serious. If the tactical problem is solved correctly, it will be possible to slam shut the door of the ultraright, defeat it, and force a shift in policy upon the administration itself in the direction of peace and democracy."

"The Communists and their hidden allies have since been waging an intensive campaign against the forces of resistance. Those who resist them have been more and more forced into a political corner, successfully dubbed 'the extreme right' and all but isolated from the main political corridors of Washington."

However, at grass-roots level, because a sense of patriotism is still strong and religious roots firm, resistance forces still presented a formidable barrier that could be menacing at the 1964 elections.

The Communists are pressing their advantage hard now. They were the first to demand -- and incidentally, I am sure, they received -- a Presidential Commission headed by Chief Justice Warren.

The Communist campaign to "slam shut the door" will continue with increased fury in the months ahead. We will be delinquent if we do not face up to the attack. To avoid it because it is "controversial" is not worthy of us.

President Urging Rusk to Develop Detente with U.S.S.R.

A NEW YEARS PRAYER

Editor,

WASHINGTON, January 1: President Johnson is giving Secretary of State Rusk a free hand to try to avoid, if possible, any new Soviet crisis this year.

The President authorized Rusk to use all forms of communications and diplomatic contacts with the Russian leaders to negotiate a set of ground rules to govern U.S.-Soviet relations in 1964.

By proposing this unannounced detente with Russia, President Johnson hopes to prevent Premier Khrushchev from creating new crises over Berlin and Cuba while the U.S. is in the midst of a presidential campaign and a bitter congressional debate on civil rights.

As outlined in the policy paper, they are: "Work out over the longer run tacit understandings with the Soviet as to the ground rules governing our competition throughout the world."

"Close out any crises that should arise with the Soviet Union as quickly as possible with as little violence as consistent, with avoiding any net loss for U.S. interests."

President Johnson also agreed to continue the exchange of letters with Premier Khrushchev on major issues as was carried on by the late President Kennedy.

He notified Secretary Rusk that he approves of this form of summitry during 1964 rather than any face-to-face confrontation with the Soviet leader. A personal meeting should be delayed until after the presidential elections, according to Johnson.

WHITE HOUSE DIPLOMACY -- When Sir Alec Douglas-Home visits President Johnson early this year, he will bring a sensational proposal that could stir up a major dispute inside the President's cabinet.

"The modernization process in the underdeveloped areas, including the process of disengagement from colonialism, has offered the richest field for Communist exploitation of crises within the free community."

PREVENTIVE ACTION -- In defining negotiating guide-lines for Secretary Rusk, the NSC policy paper encourages the use of preventive diplomacy, as follows: "A high premium attaches, therefore, in the context of U.S.-Soviet relations not merely to the constructive policy of this government aiding the less-developed areas, but also to the timely identification of points of crises and forehanding action to resolve such crises before they lend themselves to Communist exploitation. IT HAPPENED IN AMERICA

Those who say "it can't happen here" -- meaning that totalitarian rule can't sweep away the powers of the 50 states of the American Union -- had better take a long, hard look at the decision of a three-judge federal court in Americus, Ga., Nov. 1.

In a 2 to 1 decision, the court broke right into the middle of a state prosecution, declared a Georgia state law unconstitutional and in effect took over the operation of a state court by the decision of a three-judge federal court in Americus, Ga., Nov. 1.

What was involved was a state prosecution of four race demonstrators on charges of insurrection and unlawful assembly.

Under normal circumstances, the accused would be tried in state court. If convicted, their cases presumably would be appealed through the state's court system and then to a federal court. If a flaw were found in the court proceeding, the federal court would then return the case to the state court for rehearing.

This extraordinary federal action stemmed from an injunction sought in a suit filed by Morris B. Abram of the New York law firm of Paul, Weiss, Rifkind, Wharton & Garrison. The meaning of this injunction should be made crystal clear to the American people. It has nothing to do with the merits of the case against the persons accused or with the race situation in general. The ugly meaning of the decision is that it contains a threat to all state laws and all state courts.

U.S. District Judge J. Robert Elliott, who dissented from the majority, gave his reason for doing so as being that federal courts should not intervene in proceedings before state courts. But that's only the bare outline of the case against this dangerous decision.

The meaning of the decision is that no state prosecutor can be sure in the future that he is free to push an indictment in court until it has been cleared by federal authorities. No state court can set bail for a defendant without looking over its shoulder and wondering whether the amount set will be approved by the district federal court.

Help us to realize that if we can't take God into our recreation then there is something wrong with the way we are playing. Help us to take God into the everyday common place life, by the man who runs the lathe, by the baker, the candlestick maker, the farmer in the field, as well as the preacher in the pulpit.

Help us to teach the world about the American way of life, by example, rather than by a multiplicity of insincere words. Last of all, help us to realize our blessings under the Constitution, which gives every man the privilege of worshipping thee, according to the dictates of his conscience. Our thanks and supplications we offer, in the name of Jesus Christ.

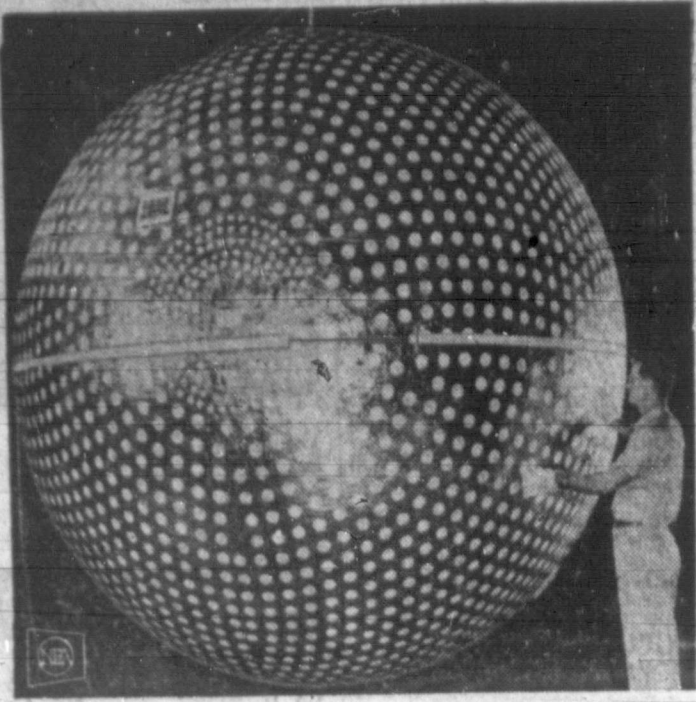

Rockefellers Expect First Child in Spring

NEW YORK (UPI)—Mrs. Margaretta Rockefeller, wife of Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller, is expecting a child, it was learned Tuesday.

Reports that the governor and his second wife were expecting their first child had been current for some time, but were confirmed today by Mrs. Rockefeller's mother, Mrs. George E. Bartol of Wynnewood, Pa.

The governor's offices in New York and Albany both said "no comment" to the report. Spokesmen for the governor had previously denied such reports.

Official announcement may be made Wednesday in Albany, N.Y., by Gov. and Mrs. Rockefeller when they entertain the public at an open house at the executive mansion.

The baby is expected next spring, perhaps in May.

"I've been very happy ever since I found out," Mrs. Bartol said. "I can't say any more than that."

It will be the previously married Mrs. Rockefeller's fifth child. She and her first husband, Dr. James Slater Murphy of the Rockefeller Institute staff, had four children—James, 12, Margaret, 10, Carol, 7, and Melinda, 3.

The 55-year-old governor had five grown children by his first wife, Mrs. Mary Clark Rockefeller, but his youngest son, Michael C. Rockefeller, died on an expedition in New Guinea in 1961.

Mrs. Rockefeller, 36, and the governor were married May 4, 1963, a month after her divorce from Dr. Murphy, a research scientist and Tarrytown, N.Y., neighbor of the Rockefellers.

The governor was divorced by his first wife March 16, 1962.

Newsman's Father Dies of Illness

NEW LONDON, Conn. (UPI)—Cornelius P. Leary, Sr., father of United Press International Managing Editor Francis T. Leary, died Monday night at Lawrence Memorial Hospital here after a long illness. He was 88.

Leary was born at Baltic, Conn., March 18, 1875, but lived in New London from early childhood. He retired from business in 1929 after the death of his wife, Elizabeth Galligan Leary. Producers Want No Rule Change

HOUSTON (UPI)—An independent producers group urged the Texas Railroad Commission Monday to ignore a new compilation of Texas oil and gas rules because it has omissions and substantial changes.

The compilation was made by the commission-appointed industry advisory committee, headed by James Russell of Abilene.

The Texas Landowners and Independent Oil and Gas Producers Association sent a protest to the commission asking it not to adopt the compilation.

The independents urged the commission to keep Rule 31 dealing with gas well allowances and 37 and 38 dealing with well spacing and density.



LEGAL CHECKUP A Safety Measure

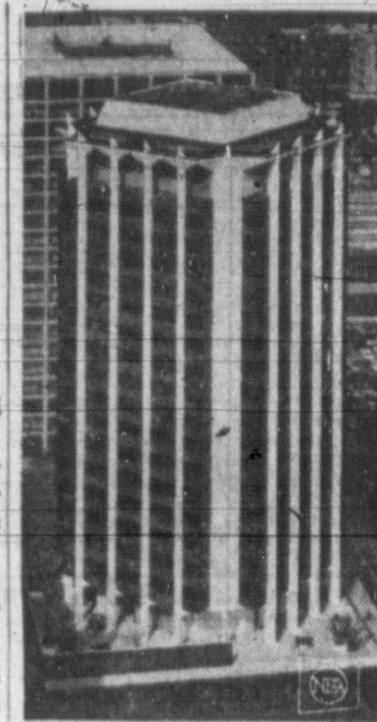
Legal trouble is easier and cheaper to prevent than to cure. Most wage earning, childbearing, home-buying, installment-paying families don't see much need for a family lawyer.

Often only under prodding, one may have his lawyer prepare a will.

But can you tell a big legal risk from a small one? Can you spot the signs of legal trouble?

Check with your family lawyer when:

1. Your status changes: upon coming of age, marriage, the birth of your children, buying a house, divorce or death. For you may then need to draft or revise your will, change your insurance, or re-figure your taxes.
 2. You buy or sell. Look out for flaws in the papers before you go into debt, part with money, or sign anything involving big expenditures or long-term obligations.
 3. You enter into other contracts. Promises, spoken or written, bind you if they call for a "consideration," something of value in return.
 4. Someone threatens your rights. The law exists to defend them—but with some rights you must take action yourself for them to work for you.
- When you can bring your lawyer "live" facts (e.g. unsigned contracts, vexing tax returns you haven't filed), he can do much more for you, and at a smaller cost than when you bring him "cold" facts (mistakes you have made which threaten trouble).
- But above all, get both live and cold facts to him at once. For time may run out in many such situations. Your lawyer may be able to do something for you today, which he cannot do tomorrow.
- Tell your lawyer what you want. Tell him all the facts, good or bad, and then keep him informed all along. He is sworn to keep what you tell in confidence, and he cannot serve you well without full knowledge.

Wall Street In Review

NEW YORK (UPI)—G. S. Colby of Colby & Co. Inc., continues to be a little uncertain about the very near term outlook for the market but is confident that the current bull market still has a long course to run.

Colby's policy is to continue to add likely situations to the present portfolios during periods of weakness.

Thomson & McKinnon says that although the market is at a record high, one important fact to keep in mind is that the averages are far from a perfect barometer. The firm says that despite the record high, there are still many issues with improving prospects at comparatively depressed levels.

The International Statistical Bureau generally will prevail in 1964 in view of the favorable economic forecasts. The firm believes the general trend of the market in the early part of the new year will be favorable, regardless of the movement over the near term.

Clark Dodge & Co. feels that profit-taking and reinvestment in the early part of 1964 and the cross current which these actions produce may bring about an erratic trend in the popular market indicators.

Thomas P. Doherty of Harris, Upham & Co. says that as long as the economic outlook for 1964 remains favorable it would seem that investors would continue to hold to their commitments and profit-taking should be confined mainly to the higher priced and more volatile stocks.

Robert H. Stovall of F. F. Hutton & Co. feels that in view of events in the past several weeks and the expectations for 1964, the closing days of 1963 are likely to be atypical and those who have been waiting for a year-end rally may be disappointed.

Producers See Banner Year For Industry

TULSA, Okla. (UPI)—Despite seven years of decline in oil and gas development, 18 independent petroleum producers today predicted 1964 may be "a banner year" for the industry.

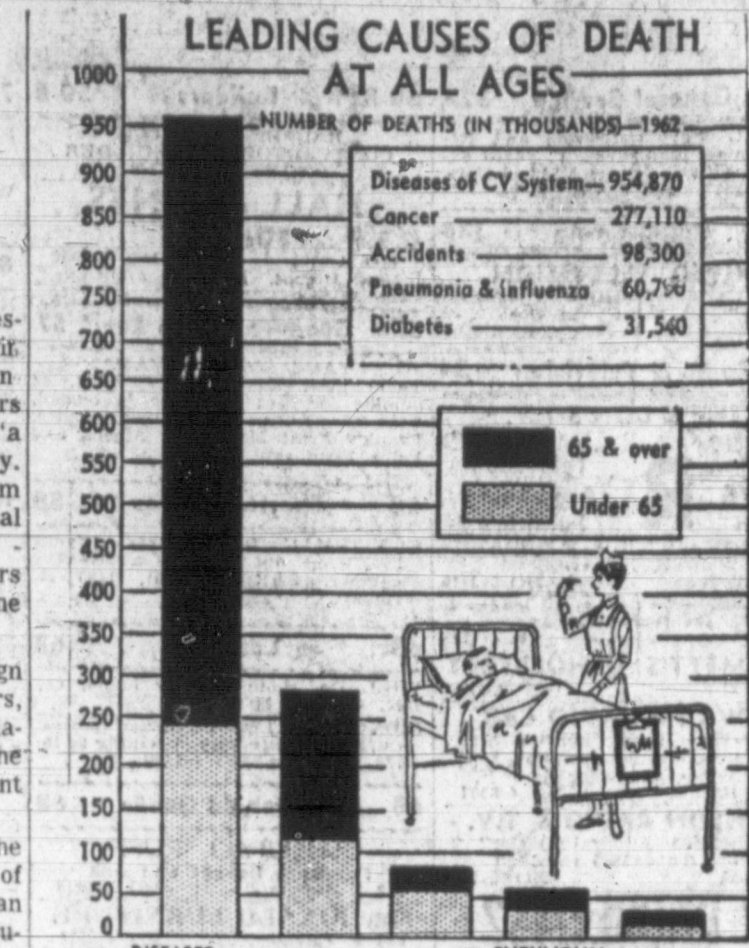
In the Independent Petroleum Association of America's annual publication, Outlook and Review, 18 contributing producers concurred that 1963's decline should be the industry's last.

The producers cited foreign imports of crude oil, price wars, government interference and labor and equipment costs as the problems facing the independent oil and gas producer.

C. A. Cash, president of the Shamrock Oil and Gas Corp., of Amarillo, Tex., said, "If we can conduct our efforts toward prudent management of our resources, there is no reason 1964 cannot be our banner year."

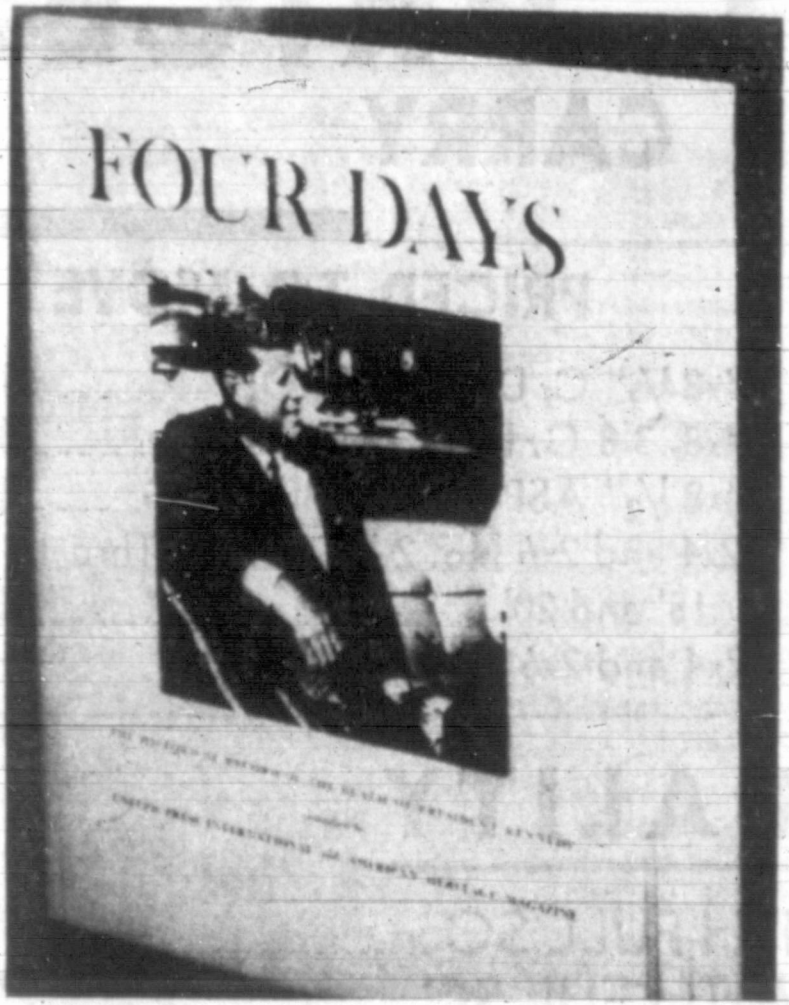
Most contributions to the association's periodical felt stability of the price of crude oil was essential to reverse the continued downward trend.

Japan Troop Cutback Set

WASHINGTON (UPI) U. S.—Air Force withdrawal of 3,500 men and 78 planes from Japan next spring and summer will be followed by buildups at bases in Louisiana and Hawaii, the Pentagon disclosed.

The withdrawal, an 8 per cent reduction in U. S. forces in Japan, involves the dissolution of the last of the old B57's Canberra medium bomb units. Forty-eight of these planes are being returned from Japan.

The Pentagon said formation of a new tactical fighter wing to include two F100 squadrons being brought home from Japan will add 700 military personnel and 20 civilian jobs to England Air Force Base, Alexandria, La.

Transfer of 16 C124 Globemaster transports from Japan to Hickam's Field, Honolulu, meanwhile will add 1,000 military personnel, 25 civilian jobs and perhaps 1,200 to 1,500 military dependents to the Hawaiian installation.

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
