CHARLESTON, S.C. (UPI) — Five persons, and possibly six, were killed and 14 injured Tuesday night in a fireworks explosion at a suburban grocery that spewed flames and debris on shoppers and store employes.

The blast demolished the grocery and brought the roof tumbling down, trapping a number of persons.

US Smokers Set Record In Past Year

cans smoked a record 523 billion cigarettes in 1963-despite recurring reports blaming smoking as a cause of lung cancer and other ailments.

The 1963 cigarette total was almost 3 per cent more than the total for 1962-508.2 billion cigarettes-and marked the seventh consecutive year that smoking has increased in the United States.

The Agriculture Department oted that the increase between the 1962 and 1963 total was significantly more than the 1 per cent increase between 1962 and 1961. From 1955 to 1960 the rate of increase in cigarette consumption averaged 4 per cent

The department noted that Americans preferred 'tailor-made' cigarettes to the 'roll-your-own" variety in 1963. The output of tobacco for pipes and roll-your-own cigarettes was about 70.5 million pounds,

stightly less than in 1962. But this was the only tobacco category, outside snuff, which this year. All the ethers, including chewing bacco, showed increases.



IT HAPPENED IN AMERICUS Those who say "it can't happen here" - meaning that totalitarian rule can't sweep away the powers of the 50 states of the American Union -had better take a long, hard look at the decision of a threejudge federal court in Americus,

In a 2 to 1 decision, the court broke right into the middle of a state prosecution, declared a Georgia state law unconstitutional and in effect took over the operation of a state court. It was an unprecedented decision that contains the threat of federal courts making a new power grab hardly even envisioned before this time. According to the New York Times, hardly a press observer with a bias against the court, the actions "marked the first time that the federal judiciary had halted a state court proceeding in a civil rights case at the request of a private party."

What was involved was a state prosecution of four race demonstrators on charges of insurrection and unlawful assem-

Under normal circumstances, the accused would be tried in state court. If convicted, their cases presumably would be appealed through the state's court system and then to a federal court. If a flaw were found in the court proceeding, the federal court would then return the case to the state court for rehearing. This is the traditional way in American jurisprudence.

But the federal court in Americus discarded tradition. Instead, it chose to bulldoze a state law out of the way and run over Lord help us to place more a state court proceeding. It de-

Rifkind, Wharton & Garrison. The meaning of this injunction should be made crystal clear to the American people. It has nothing to do with the merits of the case against the persons accused or with the race situation in general. The ugly meaning of the decision is that it contains a threat to all state laws and all state courts.

U.S. District Judge J. Robert Elliott, who dissented from the majority, gave his reason for doing so as being that federal courts should not intervene in

The meaning of the decision is sure in the future that he is free to push an indictment in court until it has been cleared by federal authorities. No state court can set bail for a defendant without looking over its shoulder and wondering whether the amount set will be approved by the district federal court. In practice, it means that state prosecutors and state courts will become subject to federal prosecutors and federal courts. In their minds, if not in actual fact, they will have to check out

with the federal powers that be, in order to ascertain that their work will not be thwarted by a federal injunction.


Indeed behind this decision is the ominous threat of the substitution of federal injunctions for state court action. If a state court isn't allowed to complete its proceedings in a case, which is what happened in Americus, then it is at the mercy of power-hungry federal officials.

However one looks at it, the federal court intervention in Americus, Ga., was a defeat for American freedom. It was a body blow directed at state courts and a step toward a single system of national courts in which all the rulings are shaped in terms of national public policy as decreed by the faction in power.

If it happened in Americus, it could happen in Los Angeles, Milwaukee, Boston or anywhere else. Cherished judicial rights were repressed in the Americus, Ga. case. It isn't just Georgia and Americus officials who lost the case; the American people and all the state governments were injured.

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


