## Transplant Of Heart 'Success'

JACKSON, Miss. (UPI)—Surgeons transplanted a heart into the body of a man dying of heart failure Thursday night. The transplant heart beat for an hour before the patient died. Physicians here said it was believed to be the first heart transplant in a human.

Officials at the University of Mississippi Medical Center said today the donor heart "ultimately proved inadequate for this patient's requirements."

"The fatal outcome could not be reversed," doctors said. Surgeons said they were gratified to confirm, however, that procedures previously worked out in the experimental laboratory with animals also are effective in man.

Many Animal Transplants. University surgeons have transplanted hearts in more than 200 animals over a period of several years, it was reported.

The identities of the patient and the heart donor were not revealed.

The university said the patient had been rushed to the operating room in shock, dying of terminal heart failure. The operation took more than three hours including one hour on the artificial heart-lung machine.

It began shortly before midnight and was completed early today.

Chilled Blood Used. During the transfer, and while being sewed in place, the donor heart was preserved with chilled blood pumped backward through the coronary sinus which is the large vein that drains the heart itself.

## Oswald's Mother Asks to Question Panel Witnesses

FORT WORTH (UPI)—The mother of accused presidential assassin Lee Harvey Oswald said Thursday she had informed President Johnson that she wants to cross-examine witnesses who testify before the Warren commission.

The commission, headed by U. S. Chief Justice Earl Warren, is investigating the assassination of President Kennedy.

Mrs. Marguerite Oswald said she had telegraphed the President asking that she be allowed to go before the commission. She said she sent copies of the telegram to Warren and to J. Lee Rankin, chief counsel for the commission.

# Broad Tax Cut Measure Goes To Senate Floor

## Abolishing Poll Tax Confusing To State Voters

Two Sets of Ballots, Boxes May Be Necessary Under New System

AUSTIN (UPI)—The passage of the anti-poll tax constitutional amendment by South Dakota Thursday left nothing but confusion for Texas voters, and according to one political leader, "it's going to be a mess."

## South Dakota Wins In Race On Poll Tax

PIERRE, S.D. (UPI)—The 24th Amendment banning the poll tax was a part of the U.S. Constitution for all practical purposes today as a result of a last minute race between Georgia and South Dakota for final ratification honors.

Senate leaders hope to start floor debate next week or by Feb. 3 and steer the bill through the Senate by mid-February. Prospects for final congressional passage by March 1 appeared good.

Final committee action came only after a frantic day of on-again, off-again decisions, climaxed by a 9 to 8 vote when the panel reversed itself and restored cuts approved earlier in the day in a host of federal excise taxes.

Enraged by the series of last-day committee votes repealing a whopping \$455 million in levies, President Johnson hopped on the telephone and dispatched emissaries to Capitol Hill to fight the excise cuts.

Johnson had counted on these revenues next year, and feared their loss would push his "economy" budget further into the red.

At an afternoon session, the panel put the taxes back, undoing what it had done at its morning meeting and tossing in \$5 million to boot.

Repeals Excise Levies. The committee had voted to repeal the 10 per cent excise levies on luggage, handbags, wallets, jewelry, watches, cosmetics, furs, mechanical pens and pencils and certain musical instruments. It restored these, plus a \$5 million reduction approved earlier by exempting from excise taxes tickets to "live" theater performances.

The net result of the administration's frantic efforts during the two-hour committee break between morning and afternoon sessions: Restoration of \$460 million in Treasury excise receipts.

Over-all, the decision taken by the tax-writing senators raised the price tag of the \$11.1 billion measure passed by the House to about \$11.5 billion.

MAJOR PROVISIONS GIVEN ON PROPOSED TAX ISSUE. WASHINGTON (UPI)—Here are the major provisions of the \$11.5 billion tax cut bill approved by the Senate Finance Committee.

Individual Rates: Income tax brackets now ranging from 20 per cent to 91 per cent would be cut across-the-board retroactive to Jan. 1. This year they would fall to a 16-to-77 per cent range, then to 14-to-70 per cent on Jan. 1, 1965. Revenue loss: \$9 billion.

Corporation Rates: The 52 per cent tax rate on earnings in excess of \$25,000 a year would be cut to 50 per cent this year, then 48 per cent when fully effective next year. For small businesses under \$25,000 income, the present 30 per cent normal corporate rate would (See TAX CUT, Page 3)

Rev. Snow's sister, Mrs. E. W. Oliver, is secretary to Gov. Robert J. Fleming Jr., head of the Canal Zone government.

She wrote her brother "to live down here recently has been like one of Orson Wells stories where over the radio people were told lies and believed them, for that is exactly what was happening here. ## Barry Hits LBJ Taking Baker Gift

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Sen. Barry Goldwater said today that President Johnson should have seriously questioned the 1959 gift of a \$500 hi-fi set which he thought came from former Senate Democratic Secretary Robert G. (Bobby) Baker.

The Arizona Republican, who may be Johnson's opponent for the presidency, said Johnson should have realized that at Baker's salary "that was an expensive gift."

Goldwater conceded he was not acquainted with details of the Baker investigation.

AUSTIN (UPI)—The annual mid-winter meeting of the Texas Press Association begins today with more than 200 Texas publishers expected to be on hand.

Gov. and Mrs. John Connally were to get the meeting started by hosting a coffee from 4 to 5 p.m.

The keynote speaker at Saturday's luncheon will be Frank J. Starzel, general manager of the Associated Press, and the association will honor Charles Bates (Tex) Thornton, a native of Haskell, Tex., as "Texan of the Year" Saturday night.

Thornton will be the fourth "Texan of the Year." Other winners were baseball manager Paul Richards of Waxahachie, pianist Van Cliburne of Kilgore, and television actor Dan Blocker, who was born in Bowie County.

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## Panama City Boy Saved By Surgery

HOUSTON (UPI)—Leonardo Lemuza, a Panamanian youngster given a new lease on life by an American fund drive, left early today for home.

The 7-year-old left with his father on a Pan-American Airways flight at 8 a.m. for Panama City.

## US Plans Launch Of Largest Rocket

HOUSTON (UPI)—The United States will launch its biggest rocket next week, the giant Saturn-1, but some U. S. experts think the Russians may have something twice as big.

Scientists feel that the "new improved" space boosters the Russians have fired recently could produce up to 3 million pounds of thrust, compared with the 1.5 million pounds developed in the Saturn-1.

With this power, the Soviet Union could launch a new range of space ventures, including the hook-up of the two orbiting space ships with the main aim being a "space station" as a stepping stone to the moon.

### National Park OK'd by Connally

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Rep. Joe Pool, D-Tex., said today Texas Gov. John Connally had concurred in plans for a national park in the Guadalupe Mountains area.

Pool, sponsor of a bill to establish a national park there, said in a statement that Connally has assured the Department of Interior the state wants a national park development rather than state development.

"I welcome this cooperation from Connally and have assured him that as congressman at large from Texas, I shall work to serve the interest of my state through prompt passage of this bill," Pool said.

## Demo Poll Shows LBJ Far Ahead of GOP

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Johnson's political aides privately are circulating results of a Democrat-sponsored Pennsylvania poll showing him far ahead of major Republican contenders for the White House.

The President's advisers are most impressed with the poll's indication that Gov. William Scranton is running behind two other potential GOP presidential nominees in Pennsylvania.

Sources close to Johnson said the poll, constituting a "large statewide sampling" of voters, was conducted by a professional firm under a Democratic party contract.

The poll's results, dated Monday, were relayed to the Democratic National Committee and the White House by the Pennsylvania party organizations which sponsored it.

### Man-Made City Planned Across Gulf Swampland

HOUSTON (UPI)—A spokesman for Houston oilman John Mecom said this week Mecom plans to build a \$100-million city on a swamp south of Hitchcock.

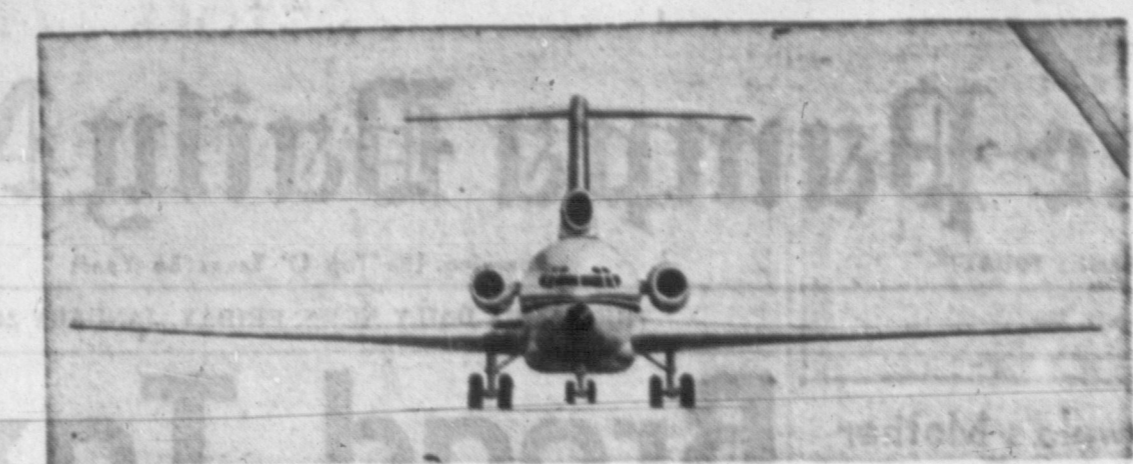
Hitchcock is a few miles from the coast, south of Houston.

The Mecom plan would raise the swamp land to at least eight-foot elevation, lace it with waterways and plot homesites along the canals so a resident could take his motorboat to the supermarket or to the Galveston West Bay for a cruise.

Russell Wolf of New Orleans, an associate of Mecom's, disclosed details of the plan and said the developed area would have 200 to 300 homes built this year.

A 5,000-boat marina is planned, as well as hotels and a yacht club, a motel accessible by water.

Mecom bought the site of the old Hitchcock Naval Air Station when the World War II station was closed. The T-shaped, 3,600-acre tract was reportedly worth \$200,000 when sold to Mecom in 1950. Wolf said Mecom has spent around \$1.5 million since then for dredging and other improvements.

### Druggist Fears \$60,000 Loss

AMARILLO (UPI)—Don Chrysler, owner of the Forest Hill Drug Store, said his customers may be out \$60,000 because of the collapse of a money order firm.

Chrysler said he had issued more than \$60,000 in money orders from the American Security Money Order Co., which filed voluntary bankruptcy at Los Angeles last week.

He said he used to operate a small independent money order service, but when a new state law made it impossible to continue, he subscribed to the American Security Co.

The new law requires money order firms to post a \$250,000 bond no matter what the size of their operations may be, said Chrysler. He said this would have cost him about \$5,000 to \$6,000.

Chrysler said that since it

was the state of Texas that caused him to subscribe to American Security, then the state might be at least partly responsible for the loss of the \$60,000.

# Dallas Hospitals Say No Over Ruby Testing

DALLAS (UPI)—Mental tests for Jack Ruby may have to be held in another county if Dallas hospitals are adamant in their refusal to accept him.

Steven T. Landregan, administrator of Parkland Hospital, said that as far as he knew, the hospital's board of directors had not changed their mind in refusing to accept Ruby.

The board of directors issued a statement Saturday saying Ruby, who shot accused presidential assassin Lee Harvey Oswald two days after the President was slain, would not be permitted to use facilities at Parkland.

NEW YORK (UPI) — Analyst Eliot Janeway suspects that a short term corrective setback, possibly a very sharp one, is in the cards in the immediate future.

# Castro Backs Soviets Over Red China Tussle

MOSCOW (UPI)—Cuban Premier Fidel Castro Thursday backed the Soviet Union significant backing in its conflict with Peking by condemning Communist parties.

Some of the world's 90 Communist parties have become into factions siding with disputing powers in the communist ideological dispute.

Castro's support for the Soviet position was made known in a joint Soviet-Cuban communique, the full text of which published by the Communist party organ Pravda today.

The communique, summing the official part of Castro's to the Soviet Union, gave a new trade pact under which Russia has pledged \$2.5 billion worth of sugar with Soviet goods a six-year period.

Western diplomats said Castro appeared to have swung strongly toward the Kremlin's line in its ideological and local dispute with Communist China, but did not pledge

total commitment. Prior to his visit which began earlier this month, Castro publicly tended toward neutrality in the Moscow-Peking quarrel. The dispute centers on the Red Chinese rejection of Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev's policy of peaceful coexistence with the West.

The communique, released by the official Tass news agency Wednesday night and published in today's newspapers, said Castro is ready to establish "good neighbor relations" with the United States. It added a warning that Russia would help Cuba "with all means at its disposal" in the event of an American attack on the island nation 90 miles off the coast of Florida.

## Foreign Commentary

One of the more interesting aspects of Premier Khrushchev's de-Stalinization campaign has been the growing independence of Romania within the Communist bloc.

This independence of Moscow first expressed itself in Romanian economic policy and in the last year has been extending to political and cultural fields.

The Romanians do not publicize it especially since, with their long common border with the Soviet Union, they cannot afford to press Moscow too hard.

Nonetheless, the country presents an outstanding example of growing nationalism within the East European Communist bloc, and, along with Yugoslavia and Red China, provides evidence that probably never again can world communism return to the monolithic state that it was in the time of Lenin and Stalin.

It probably still is too early to label Romania's 62-year-old party and state leader Gheorghiu-Dej another Tito.

But in the last year, he has defied Soviet displeasure in a number of important ways.

**Has Albanian Embassy** He established an embassy in Albania, Red China's single European satellite.

Romanian newspapers have given prominence to Red China's side of the dispute with the Soviet Union.

Gheorghiu-Dej was conspicuously absent last July when Khrushchev met in East Berlin with other satellite leaders to discuss the China situation.

At the United Nations, in lesser ways, the Romanian delegation also showed signs of independence from Moscow.

In the cultural field was the

abolishment of the Maxim Gorky Institute of Russian Language and Literature in Bucharest and its incorporation into Bucharest University.

There also was the sudden disappearance in November of the Romanian language edition of New Times, a Moscow-directed publication devoted primarily to propaganda and political issues.

**Defy Moscow Pressures** Industrially, the keynote of Romania's defiance of Moscow pressures has been its refusal to go along with Khrushchev's plan to integrate the Communist economy under COMECON, the council for mutual economic assistance.

This plan would have reduced Romania to the role of supplier of raw materials. Gheorghiu-Dej instead insisted upon the right of national sovereignty and continued to press full tilt toward industrialization.

He signed up with a Franco-British combine for construction of a \$36 million steel plate mill to be built in Romania's Danube River delta at Galatz.

He signed expanded trade agreements with both Britain and France and also is looking for markets in the United States.

Last summer he announced jointly with Yugoslavia agreement on construction of a hydro-electric and navigation project on the Danube. Estimates of its total cost range from \$400 million to \$800 million.

Romania's trade with the West has been increasing, while showing a percentage decline in the East. For all this, the Romanian regime is and remains Communist. But it represents a degree of liberalization unheard of less than 10 years ago.

# Soviets Up Price on Arms Ban Agreement

GENEVA (UPI) — The Soviet Union today raised the price for an agreement on banning the spread of nuclear weapons by insisting that France also take part.

The Soviets added their new demand to the condition they made Thursday and reiterated today that the West also abandon its projected multilateral nuclear force (MLF) if there is to be agreement on a non-dissemination pact.

A. A. Roschin, deputy to chief Soviet disarmament negotiator Semyon K. Tsarapkin, told newsmen Moscow will "insist on France being part of a non-dissemination agreement."

France officially is a member of the Geneva Disarmament Conference but has never participated. It also refused to sign last year's partial nuclear test ban and is developing its own deterrent.

Tsarapkin himself, at an impromptu news conference after today's conference session, tied

progress on a non-dissemination agreement to the West keeping nuclear weapons out of German hands.

Exclusion of West Germany from the MLF "would be a step toward solution of this problem," he said.

Tsarapkin added that Germany must be designated a nuclear-free zone before the Communists will agree to any system of observation posts on both sides of the Iron Curtain to help prevent surprise attacks.

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# Truck Driver Cited For Heroic Action

PITTSBURGH (UPI)—A 28-year-old California truck driver, who won a race with death when he chased a runaway dump truck down a steep mountain highway, was cited today by the Carnegie Hero Fund Commission.

Vernon R. Hughes of Happy Camp, Calif. was driving his logging truck last March 20 when he saw a dump truck ahead of him go out of control after its brakes caught fire.

Hughes stepped up his speed to 70 miles an hour and pulled ahead of the runaway truck. Gradually, he decreased his speed to allow the dump truck to ram the rear of his vehicle. Both trucks came to a halt near a dangerous winding section of the highway near Blue Lake.

Hughes was one of 25 heroes acknowledged by the commission which was established 60 years ago by Pittsburgh steel magnate Andrew Carnegie. The commission awarded two silver and 23 bronze medals. Hughes received a silver medal and \$1,000.

The heroes represented the states of Alaska, California, Connecticut, Indiana, Maine, Massachusetts, Michigan, Rhode Island and Texas. Four awards were made to Canadians.

team," declared the sage of Bulldogland. "If they play as a team, then the Harvesters had better watch out! We should win as a matter of tradition, if nothing else."

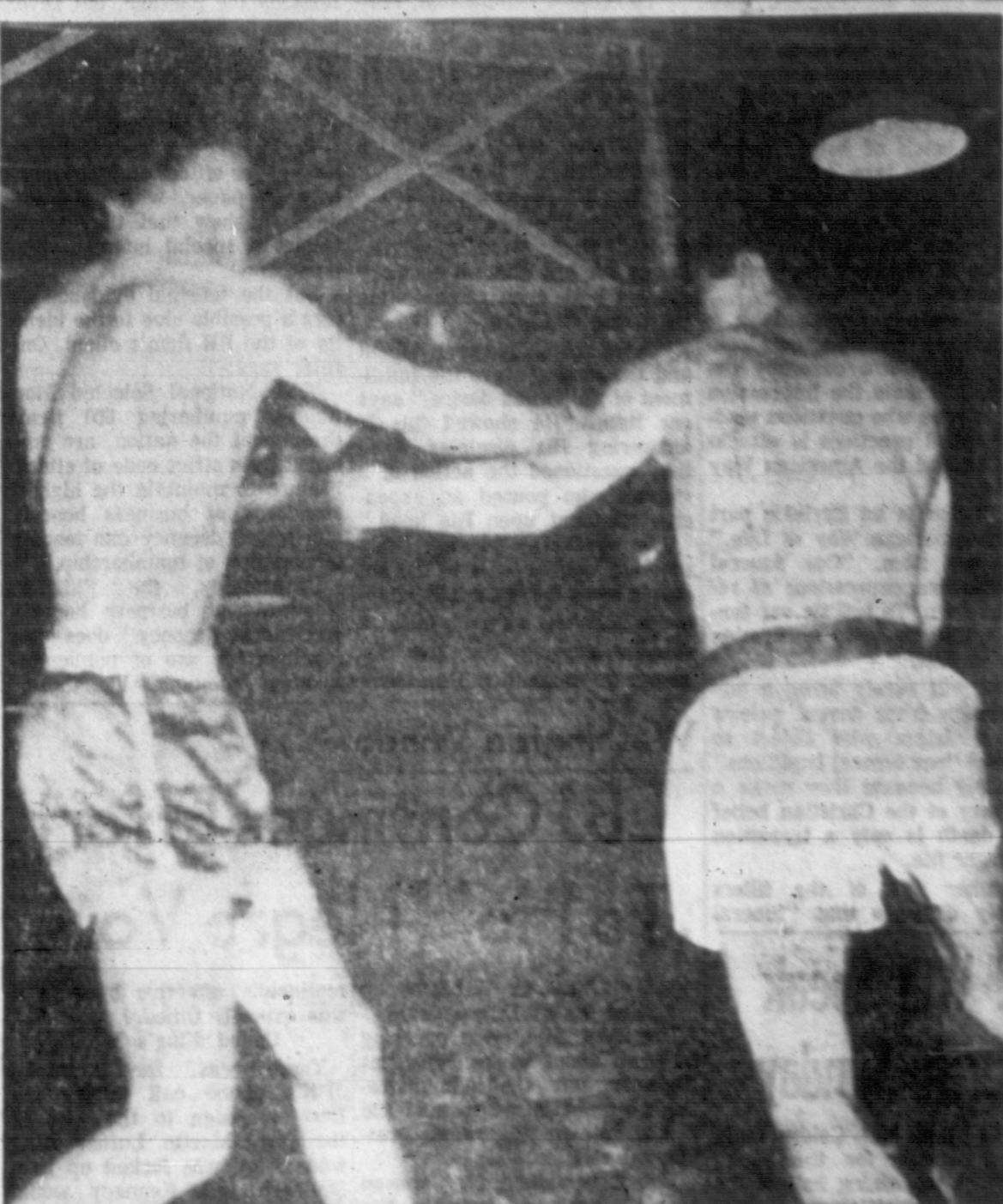

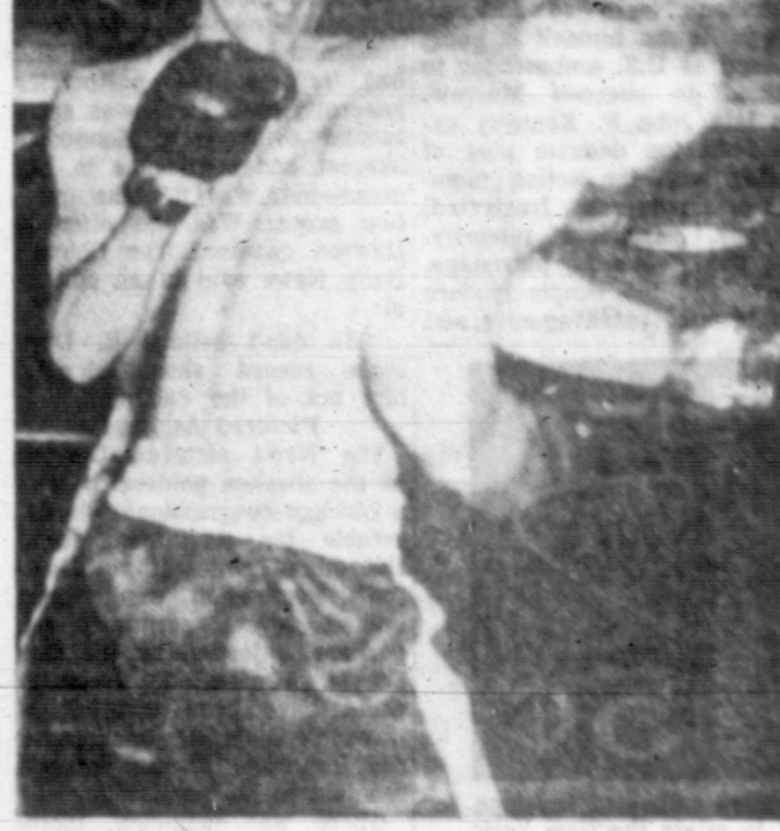
Close on the heels of the leaders came the always-dangerous Arnold Palmer and young Jerry Steelsmith, both only a shot back at the 67 mark.

## PUTTING RELIGION INTO POLITICS

Text: Isa. 1:10-17.

I. The prophets were good citizens. They had much to say about politics. They knew that the welfare of the Church was wrapped up in the welfare of the government. We live in a better day, having more light on the questions of life and duty. It may be that the evils of life today are as bad as they were in olden times; but it is doubtless true that there is more emphasis laid upon good and duty than in former times.

II. But we know that the forms of religion are worthless without the spirit, both then and now. One reason that these are better than former times is that the people now are beginning to see their righteousness is the same, but it is a louder call than formerly. The call of Isaiah is the call for the present time: "Wash you, make you clean; put away the evil of your doings from before mine eyes; cease to do evil; learn to do well; seek judgement, relieve the oppressed, judge the fatherless, plead for the widow."

III. It will be well if all the social and civic duties taught by the prophets shall be studied again by modern teachers. If there was need for righteousness then, there is, if possible, greater need for it now. The Church will never fill its highest mission until its influence shall permeate society, and influence politics.

IV. The sin and purpose of democracy has been defined as "The diffusion of happiness, through the development of character, by a process of gradual growth, the secret of which is the indwelling of God in humanity, the end of which is the brotherhood of man."

V. There are only two kinds of government in the world; One where the individual is the subject; and the other where the individual is the citizen, this second kind of government is increasing, and the first kind is losing. The citizen idea shall be victorious, and the subject shall fail.

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
