Pain of Paying Might Cause Rise From Taxpayer

By LYLE C. WILSON United Press International Rep. John Anderson, R - Ili., wants to restore some of the pain to taxpaying and now is the time for all good men to lend a hand in getting the job

The painkiller in taxpaying is the withholding system whereby the little guys who pay most of the tax bill never see the money they earn but which the Treasury takes. This painless system of paying taxes was whomped up by the late Beardsley Ruml, a business genius and tycoon, who did his country no good service when he invented the method by which the ordinary Joe scarcely reels Uncle's hand as it picks his pocket.

Don't Realize Bite What the average Joe makes is not his salary or his wage rate anymore. What he makes is his take-home pay. Takehome pay is what is left after Uncle has gotten his. There are citizens, otherwise smart and alert to their surroundings, who actually have ceased to realize that the U.S. government takes a big chunk each week of their earnings.

Anderson would remedy that, to some extent, anyway. He has introduced a bill which would permit employers, at their option, to withhold income taxes on a monthly basis even though pay periods were more frequent, weekly, for example. Good Bill

That, friends, is a good bill. Anderson claims for it that it would reduce bookkeeping and other paper work imposed on

employers by the withholding system and, therefore, reduce their expense in acting as collecting agent for Uncle Sam. That, of itself is a worth while proposition.

But better than that would be the shock treatment to which the taxpayer would be exposed. For three weeks each month his salary would go into hispocket untapped by the treasury Then, on the fourth week he would be slugged for four weeks' taxes all in one shot.

The yelps of dismay and anguish would echo over the land. The chuckle-headed taxpayers who have been suckered into the take-home-pay way of thinking would come alive, suddenly, to what the government and the slap-happy big spenders are do-

ing to them. The big-time spenders never would have gotten away with it in the first place but for the withholding system. If the taxpayers had to write checks on their bank accounts to get square with Uncle-each April 15,

the citizens would be shooting at tax collectors on sight.

That might be the only alternative for the average man faced with the problem of getting up in one bundle the annual tax levied against him. There might have been a tax rebellion in this country if it were not for the relatively painless withholding system.

Might Declare War If the little guys - they pay most of the taxes - suddenly came to realize how hard they

are being hit they might do something about it. They might, for instance, declare war on the big spending politicians who spend public money to curry favor with the voters and, thus, to maintain themselves in of-

A tax rebellion and election defeats for the big spenders just might restore the principles of sane economy to the operation of the U.S. government. There probably is no other way to restore it.

stock was widespread. Prickly pear was being burned on the Edwards Plateau and in South Texas, and ranges and pastures were dry in all parts of the state. Commercial vegetables were

making satisfactory progress in the Rio Grande Valley, Laredo, San Antonio and Coastal Bend areas. Most crops seemed to have survived hard freezes with little serious damage.

Kennedy will confer with Inionesian President Sukarno in Tokyo on Thursday about Indonesia's dispute with the newly formed state of Malaysia.

The attorney general was scheduled to meet with President Johnson at 10:30 a.m., EST oday for a last-minute briefing on his trip.

Sukarno's threats against the Malaysian Federation have stirred increasing tensions in outheast Asia, and Johnson is nder pressure from Congress withdraw aid to Indonesia if ukarno does not mend his

The main purpose of Kennedy's mission apparently is to disuade Sukarno from his announced intention to "crush" Malaysia.

Several weeks ago Johnson nt a special note to Sukarno xpressing grave concern over he military buildup in the Malaysian crisis.

Kennedy met with Sukarno nce before, in February 1962, s President Kennedy's personemissary. The attorney genral helped settle the Indonesans' territorial dispute with the Dutch over West Irian, a part of the old Netherlands New Juinea, and has been highly reparded by the Indonesians since






