France Recognizes Chinese Reds

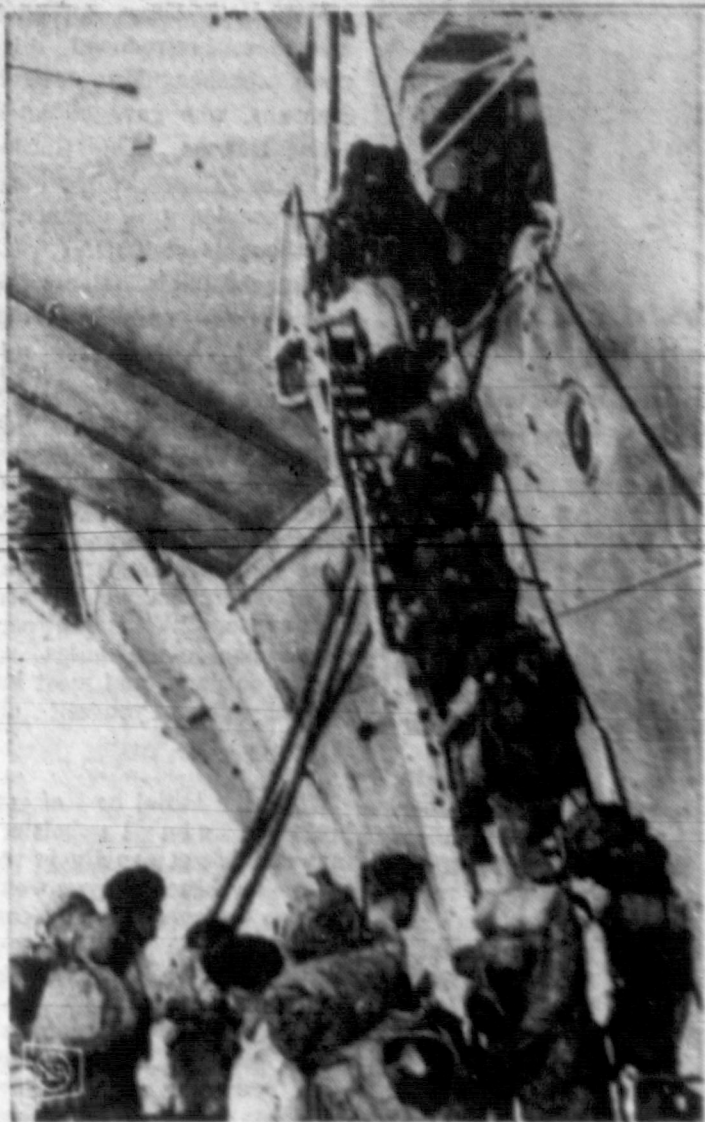
British Maintain Order After Death of U.S. Woman

Missionaries Describe Kwilu Attack

LEOPOLDVILLE, The Congo (UPI)—Seven American missionaries were killed by a Communist-led force of machete-armed youths in a two-pronged revolt against government and against missionaries. At least three Belgian Roman Catholic priests were unconfirmed reports today that a white priest at a white mission had been killed at the Kisandji mission, south of the town of Leopoldville.

Communist-led jungle fighters killed an American woman missionary and then terrorized an entire province. The missionary, Miss Irene Ferrel, 42, of Jerome, Idaho, was killed by an arrow and a co-worker, Miss Ruth Hege, 48, of Wellington, Ohio, was seriously injured in a terrorist attack on the Kwilu Province village of Mangundu. Both women, members of the Baptist Mid-Missions, were reported to have been hacked with knives and machetes by their attackers.

British troops stood guard over mutinous African soldiers in Kenya, Tanganyika, and Uganda. In North Africa, students rioted in Libya. Ghana moved toward a one-party "socialist" state. Both Moscow and Peking were making their influence felt. The Soviet Union warned Britain against intervening in Zanzibar, where a leftist coup overthrew the British-backed sultan Jan. 12. Communist Chinese premier Chou En-lai moved from Guinea to Sudan, near the East African trouble.

Phone Burglar Strikes Again At Pampa Firm

Pampa's telephone burglar was at it again this weekend. City Police reported a pay telephone taken from the wall of a laundry, where the phone had been replaced after a similar incident a few weeks ago. The telephone at the Highland Speed Queen Laundry at 2009 N. Hobart was the victim of the burglar Sunday. The phone was taken between 7 a.m. and 3 p.m., according to Mrs. T. E. Anderson, who cleaned up the firm around 7 a.m. When she returned at 3, the telephone was missing. It was the second time in six weeks for the phone to be jerked from the wall at the laundry.

Ambassadors to Be Designated Soon

PARIS (UPI)—France and Communist China today announced they have established diplomatic relations. The joint announcement followed President Charles de Gaulle's decision, made known last week, to recognize the Communist Chinese regime in Peking. The communique said the two countries will name ambassadors to each other's capitals within three months. De Gaulle, seeking to revive France's grandeur as a world power, decided to recognize Red China despite strong objections from the United States and resentment among other Western Allies. (The State Department in Washington said the United States "regrets" France's action "particularly at a time when the Chinese Communists are actively promoting aggression and subversion.")

Accidents Hit Pampa \$155,336 for 1963

Accidents cost Pampa motorists some \$155,336.22 in property damage alone during 1963, according to police surveys prepared for the National Safety Council. Pampa police investigated 540 mishaps with 204 injuries and 20 deaths during the past 12 months, Police Chief Jim Conner said. This compares with a total of 694 mishaps, 130 injuries and one death in 1962, he revealed. Conner listed speeding violations as the chief cause of accidents in Pampa with 110 mishaps logged for excessive speeds or some similar violation. Failure to yield the right of way was responsible for 108 accidents, improper driving caused 120 mishaps (this includes a number of charges) and following too closely was tagged with 88 mishaps. Conner said at least 20 accidents involved persons who were written up in reports for drinking, but not charged with driving while intoxicated. Officers issued 414 drivers of 974 involved in the mishaps traffic citations. The safety report showed Saturdays as the worst day for traffic mishaps in Pampa with a total of 98 collisions. Fridays ran second with 84, Monday was third with 83. "The hours from 4 p.m. until 6 p.m. were the heaviest for mishaps with a total of 118 accidents. A total of 41 crashes occurred between 3 p.m. and 4 p.m. while 7 p.m. to 8 p.m. reports showed a total of 40 for the year.

Conner said there were 10 pedestrian accidents and files showed 287 motorists under 20 years of age were involved. The 25 to 34-year bracket was second with 184 drivers involved and 128 drivers were from ages 30 to 34. A total of 20 drivers 75-years and older were listed in accidents. Conner said 678 males as compared with 288 women were involved in city accidents, 866 local people were involved, 87 from other Texas cities and 21 from out of state. The police chief pointed out that Pampa was currently working on two straight years without a traffic death and urged motorists to take all precautions while driving.

Saturn Shot Postponed For 2 Days

CAPE KENNEDY (UPI)—A stream of technical troubles today forced a two-day postponement in the planned launching of America's most powerful space rocket, the 16-story Saturn, on its first orbital voyage. The federal space agency said the launching, which would put the world's heaviest satellite into orbit, was set for 10 a.m. EST Wednesday—one day.

Echo Satellite Visible Here

Pampa Amateur moonwatchers today estimated that the giant Echo Satellite, launched from the West Coast Friday, would be visible here at approximately 6:32 p.m. today.

Beckwith Trial Gets Under Way

JACKSON, Miss. (UPI)—Byron de la Beckwith, a white fertilizer salesman from the Mississippi delta, went on trial today for the 1963 ambush slaying of Negro civil rights leader Medgar Evers. Spectators entering the main courtroom or its upstairs balcony were searched thoroughly by police and sheriff's deputies. "I'm sorry but we are not going to have another Dallas in Jackson," one officer told a newsmen as he searched him from head to foot. US Aid Mission to Resume Panama Job

PANAMA CITY (UPI)—The United States Aid Mission prepared to resume activities today despite a continuing deadlock in the U.S.-Panamanian dispute over the Canal Zone treaty. Benjamin Tench, head of the aid mission, called a meeting of his staff this morning to discuss problems left when the group's work was suspended because of the dispute. Tench's immediate concern was to review specific areas of aid renewal to make sure mission members will not be in any danger, particularly in the interior of Panama. Both Americans and Panamanians looked to Washington for a break in the peace negotiations that could open the way for restoration of diplomatic relations. Negotiators for the two countries met for nearly four hours in Washington Sunday, but failed to break the deadlock over Panama's insistence that the United States agree in advance that it will negotiate a new Canal Zone treaty. The U.S. government refuses to make any pre-commitments. President Robert Chiari was said to be keeping close contact with his ambassador to the Organization of American States (OAS) in Washington.

Members of the U.S. Aid Mission and their families returned to their homes in Panama City during the weekend. They left when rioting erupted earlier this month. The U.S. airlift of military dependents was continuing with another 240 persons going to Charleston Air Force Base. The dependents had taken refuge in the U.S.-controlled Canal Zone after leaving their homes in Panama. The rioting was triggered by student demonstrations over the flying of the Panamanian flag alongside the stars and stripes in the Canal Zone. The Chiari government subsequently broke off diplomatic relations with Washington and demanded revision of the 1903 treaty which gives the United States perpetual control over the Panama Canal.

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Boy Scout Killed In Fall off Ledge

COCHITI, N.M. (UPI)—A 15-year-old Albuquerque Boy Scout plunged 100-feet from a ledge to his death during a climbing expedition with two other Scouts Sunday. Killed was Roger Reed, a Sophomore at Highland High school and son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack W. Reed of Albuquerque. Reed's two companions remained trapped on the thin ledge for about six hours after the accident. The boys were rescued by Air Force S-Sgt. James B. Norris, who swung down a line from a hovering helicopter. As the helicopter, from Kirtland Air Force Base, moved in next to the cliff, Norris swung onto a ledge about 10 feet to one side of the stranded Scouts. The "copter moved in so close that its blades chopped through bushes growing on the cliff. Norris threw a rope to the boys and guided them to his ledge. He then lowered them to where they could walk to safety. The rescued Scouts are George Bennett, 11, son of Mr. and Mrs. George S. Bennett, and Peter Claassen, 13, son of Mr. and Mrs. Richard S. Claassen, both of Albuquerque. The accident took place about 10 miles northwest of Cochiti Pueblo in the Tent Rocks area west of Santa Fe. Reed and his two friends were members of a group of Scouts of Troop 341 in Albuquerque spending the weekend camping in the area. Army Major Ernest H. Hill, father of one of the 13 Scouts taking part in the camping trip.

State Police Capt. I.E. Salazar of Santa Fe, who took part in rescue efforts, said Scoutmaster Don Kilpatrick of Albuquerque tried to climb up to the stranded boys after Reed fell. He was unable to reach them. Hill said the 13 Scouts were accompanied by three adults.

Man Charged In Slays Of Relatives

NEWTON, Tex. (UPI)—A Hemphill, Tex., man faced charges today of murdering an aunt and uncle in a chain of violence that included the death of another aunt in an auto crash. Robert Eddie Lewis Jackson, 22, who was not hurt in the crash, was charged with the rifle slaying Sunday of Mr. and Mrs. Matthew Bowie of Hemphill, 30 miles north of Newton. The woman who died in the auto crash, Sallie Bowie, was Matthew's sister. Jackson led highway patrolman Dale Nicholson on a merry chase when he was spotted north of Houston after the killings. Newton is about 100 miles northeast of Houston. Nicholson said he chased the speeding car around rural roads north of the city. He said at one point Jackson stopped his car, put it into reverse, and rammed the patrol car. The chase finally ended when the fleeing car ran full speed into the sheet metal building at a dead-end intersection, killing Mrs. Bowie. Jackson, Sallie Bowie and her son Albert, 25, who was also in the fleeing car but unhurt in the crash, apparently went to Matthew Bowie's home on a social call. Jackson told police he shot Bowie because "he said something I didn't like." He related that he took a .22 caliber rifle he had brought along and shot Bowie and his wife, Pretha.

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Beer Argument Leads to Death In 'Shoot-Out'

ELDORADO, Okla. (UPI)—Two Texas men argued over \$1 worth of beer Sunday and settled it in what officers termed an old-fashioned, shoot-out. One man was killed and the other seriously wounded. The dead man was identified as George Proby, 50, of Quanah, Tex. In serious condition at a Quanah hospital was Peter Pate, 64, also of Quanah. The Jackson County sheriff's office in Altus said Pate bought the beer on credit at Proby's tavern near Red River south of Eldorado. Officers said the two men argued over the purchase, drew their guns and shot it out. No others were injured.

Draped Shape for Spring

"The School Dropout... An American Calamity" was the topic discussed by a panel during a meeting of Delta Kappa Gamma held in City Club Room recently. Miss Ila Pool acted as moderator for the group with Mrs. Perry Gaut, Mrs. Ruth Watson and Mrs. Lula B. Owen making up the panel.

"The school dropouts are among the thousands of unemployable and unemployed," remarked Miss Pool in opening the discussion. "Who is the school dropout? Slightly more than one-half are male."

Panel members gave views on why we have school dropouts, how the school program is inadequate, and what society is doing to remedy the situation.

Dropouts follow a general pattern in that students: (1) cannot see the long range view; (2) refuse to conform to society; (3) have not achieved in accord with their abilities; (4) lack interest. Dropouts have the most serious handicap of today — ignorance.

"One of every three students in the fifth grade drop out of school before they finish high school."

The late President Kennedy expressed concern in a television program last August because 400,000 eligible young Americans would not return to school.

Many dropouts have returned to school due to the concentrated efforts of our entire nation specifically, the

NEA, classroom teachers, guidance counselors, newspaper and magazines. Many cities have revised their curriculums to meet the needs of the dropout by adding trade schools, providing realistic learning, and including extras such as opera and theater to raise the student above a dismal life. New York and Houston are only two of the schools that have inaugurated beneficial programs. High quality teachers and counselors will do the most for preventing dropout through a program called HOPE. The "H" indicates health; "O" — opportunity to earn money and self-respect; "P" — patience since the results may be slow; and "E" — for enthusiasm.

Neglect Breeds Two Star Rebels

It's time our second-class beauty citizens — our legs and feet — get a break.

Sheer hosiery, short skirts and revealing shoes demand a smooth, spotless complexion down to your toes.

Have you looked at these appendages recently? Are your legs rough and scaly and your pump bumps large enough to star in an ad for a foot pad company?

If true, give them some extra care as you pop in to the tub each day.

For neater legs and feet, first wash carefully to re-

move soil that builds to a grimy look. Take the time to soak in warm soapsuds for at least 10 minutes and then scrub your legs briskly with a rough washcloth, a loofah, or a body brush.

Your legs and feet work overtime, so treat them to a simple massage while bathing. As part of the scrub, pay close attention to your knees where the skin becomes rough and discolored.

As a final touch, stroke on lotion with an upward motion to stimulate circulation and combat dryness.

Bathing is not the ultimate

answer in making our legs more attractive on the surface. Shave at least once a week. More if necessary. Many women try to sneak a few extra days or a week or two in between this special grooming task. But the results are far from attractive.

Those wielding a razor for the first time can take a tip from Dad (if you borrow his razor, clean it thoroughly); don't dry shave. Usually a lather of soapsuds will soften the hair, make the razor glide more smoothly and help protect against scaly skin. Those who lean to the electric shav-

er find that a preshave lotion makes the operation easier and cuts down on possible irritation.

Give your poor, constantly cooped-up feet a breather. Don't wear the same shoes each day, change to comfortable slippers with good arch support during the day or evening and give your feet a nightly soak in soapy, warm water.

Once a week, treat your feet to a pedicure.

Mrs. Edna Sackett of Star Route, Pampa, was taken to a hospital after the automobile in which she was riding was struck in the rear by a second vehicle. The accident occurred at 12:20 p.m. Sunday at Frederic and Henry Sts. Mrs. Sackett was riding with her husband, Charles H. Sackett, 20, at the time. The second car was driven by Diane Coble, 17, 830 E. Bruno St.

Police estimated a total of \$145 damage was done to both automobiles. Mrs. Betty Mae Baxter of 713 N. Sumner was injured slightly in another rear end accident in the 100 block of N. Collins about 6:15 p.m. Sunday.

All other offices show only one candidate each, but rumor throughout the courthouse today indicated that Gray County Republicans were expected to make announcement of at least one candidate.

Clayton Husted, county GOP chairman, was out of the city and could not be reached regarding this rumor. The GOP office in Pampa also could not be reached by telephone.

Gray County stands as one of the few area counties without a heavy political battle expected. Officers to be voted on in the primary include district attorney, county attorney, tax collector - assessor, sheriff, justice of the peace, constables and county commissioners in precinct one and three.

No city offices are up for election, but two seats on the Pampa school board will be centers of attraction in an April 4 election.

National offices up for decision by voters include the U.S. Representative from this district, which is currently held by Walter Rogers of Pampa.

Area counties involved in the election picture include Wheeler, Carson, Roberts, Hemphill and Ochiltree.

Man Charged in Burglary Case

One Pampa man was formally charged today with burglary and a second man placed under bond on a complaint filed Friday.

District Attorney Bill Waters filed a complaint against Billy Wayne Buckler, a Pampa Negro, in the Friday night house burglary of the O. C. Vance residence at 637 S. Gray.

Buckler appeared before Justice of the Peace Nat Lunsford who set bond on the felony charge at \$1,500. Waters said some \$366 in cash and 21 bottles of whiskey were taken in the burglary. Buckler was arrested with another man Saturday morning and questioned. No charges have been filed against the second man, Waters said.

Lunsford set bond at \$1,500 for William Roe, held in the house burglary of the Bob E. Parker residence earlier this month. Roe had been charged Friday, but Lunsford did not set bond on the man until today.

Both will be held for action by the grand jury, Waters said.

England Gets Assurance on Malaysian Deal

LONDON (UPI) — Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy assured Britain Saturday that his peace-making formula on the Malaysian crisis did not include a proposal for reducing British forces on Borneo, authoritative American sources said.

Kennedy briefed British officials on the cease-fire agreement he negotiated between President Sukarno of Indonesia and Premier Tengku Abdul Rahman of Malaysia along the Malaysian-Indonesian border in Borneo.

Fighting between Indonesian guerrillas and British-backed Malaysian troops had threatened to erupt into a full-fledged jungle war. Despite the cease-fire, Sukarno has reiterated his "crush Malaysia" policy of confrontation.

Reliable American sources Saturday vigorously denied British newspaper reports that Kennedy planned to ask Britain to cut back its 5,000-man army in Borneo to prevent the border fighting from escalating.

Candidate Wants More Competition

AUSTIN (UPI) — John Van Cronkrite, Democratic candidate for the U. S. Senate, said Saturday he is anxious for other Democrats to get in the race.

"We cannot get on with the race until there is another candidate and a contest. I am ready."

Incumbent Sen. Ralph Yarborough is regarded as a certain candidate for reelection but has not yet announced. Former governor Allan Shivers is also considering entering the primary, and Rep. Jim Wright of Fort Worth has not ruled out the possibility he might run.

Van Cronkrite said that since he announced Oct. 19, "I have forthrightly taken my campaign to all sections of Texas by television, newspaper, radio and personal speeches." Other prospective candidates have been "faint-hearted or afraid," he said.

He said "Texas is definitely thinking Democratic. No Republican will get more than publicity and editorial support on a state-wide basis."

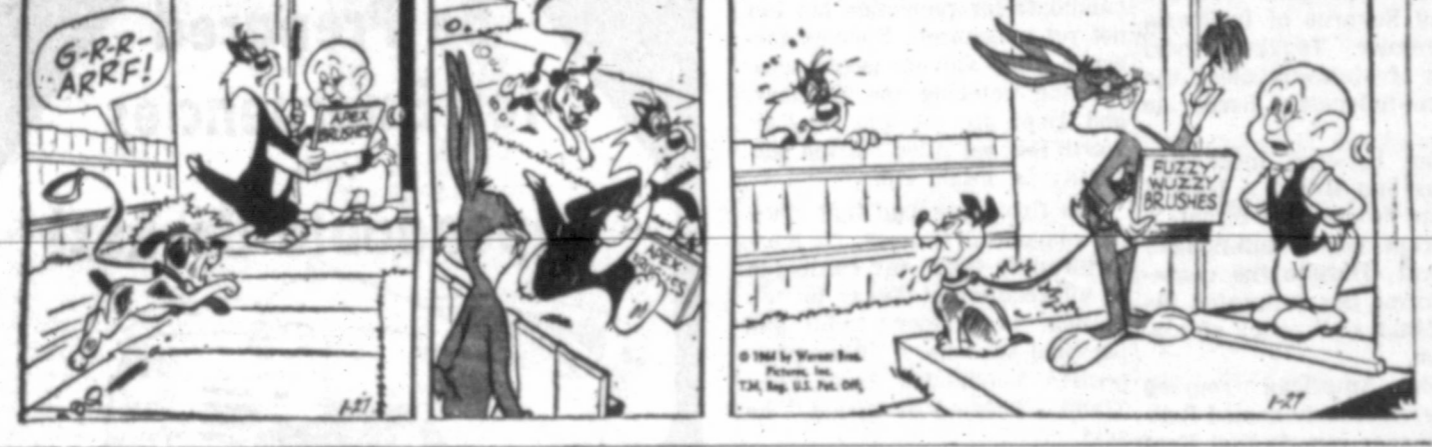
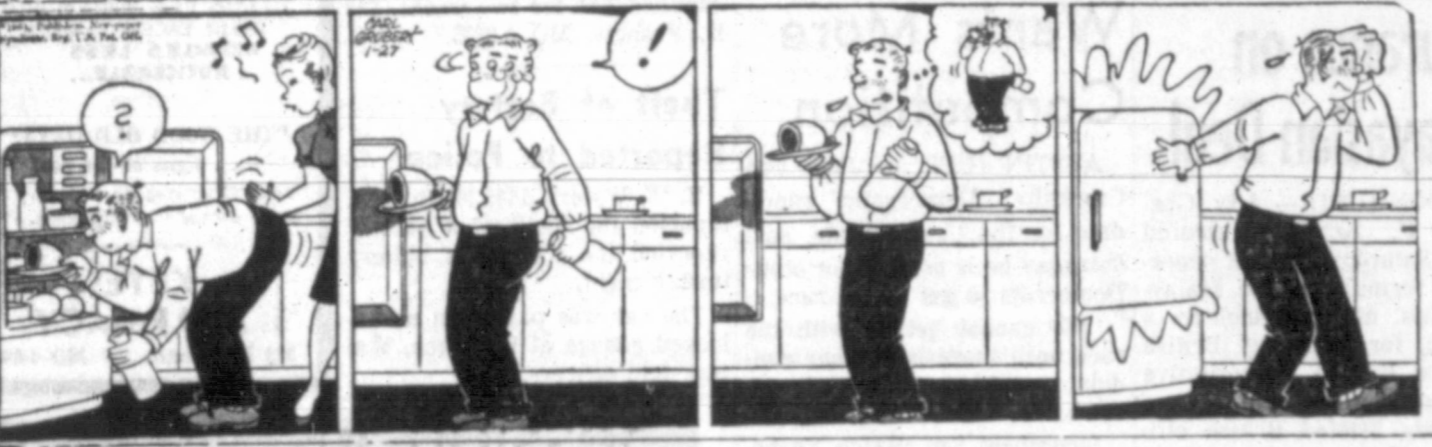

The Aggies, who have beaten both Southern Methodist and Texas on the road to go with home court victory over Texas Christian, try to chalk up another big road triumph Saturday night at Houston when they face Rice in a showdown.

The Owls sport a 2-1 league mark after losing their 19th consecutive league game to MU in Dallas just before the holiday started. So, the Aggies could afford to lose this one and still be in fairly good shape for the long stretch grind.

Texas, however, already has lost two big games—to Arkansas on the road as well as to A&M at home, and can ill afford to lose again when they travel to Lubbock Saturday night for a test against Texas Tech.

Tech also is at 2-1 after losing a one-pointer to Rice atouston and needs to stop the Longhorns to stay in the thick of the scrap.

Arkansas and SMU are in the same shape (2-1) and need to stay on the winning side this week. The Razorbacks face Baylor (6-3) at Waco in an afternoon televised game, while MU hosts TCU (0-3) at Dallas Saturday night.

Rice and SMU both looked strong last week in chalking up victories in their return to the state wars. Rice walloped Trinity 94-74 and SMU beat Oklahoma City 79-73 on the road.

Rice's Kendall Rhine sat out a big portion of the Trinity game but got 28 points to pull his season scoring average to an even 24 points. SMU's Gene Elmore collected 20 points against the Chiefs and moved into third place in the scoring race with an 18.7-point average behind the 21.5-point mark of A&M's Bennie Lenox.

Wichita (No. 8) shocked Loyola of Chicago (No. 2), 90-76, and top-rated UCLA was idle along with Vanderbilt. But the rest of the nation's top 10 all turned in relatively easy triumphs.

Rodriguez, January Play Off Golf Match

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Juan (Chi Chi) Rodriguez, a 120-pound peppercorn from Puerto Rico, and lean Don January tee off today in an 18-hole playoff for first prize money in the \$50,000 Lucky International golf tournament.

The two wound up in a tie with 12-under-par totals of 272 Sunday when the game little Latin, trailing January by one shot, birdied the final hole from 10 feet away. January had a chance to win it all with a routine par four on the finishing hole—but three putted from 30 feet away to set up the tie.

The playoff is worth \$7,500 to the winner and \$4,000 to the runnerup.

Going into the final round Sunday, January had a one-stroke lead at 204 over Arnold Palmer and sophomore Ray Floyd while Rodriguez was another shot behind at 208.

At the end of nine holes, January had widened his lead to two strokes over Palmer while Rodriguez had moved into a tie with Arnie. January had a three-under-par 33, the same as a 34.

Both Palmer and January bogied the 18th hole when they had tree trouble while Rodriguez scrapped out a par four. That left January a shot in front of Rodriguez with Palmer still two behind.

On the 177-yard par three 17th hole, January seemingly wrapped it up. After Palmer parred the hole, the Texas-born pro who now plays out of Walnut, Calif., hit a six-iron three feet from the hole and made the putt for a birdie and a two-stroke lead over Rodriguez.

But Rodriguez sank a difficult 10-footer on the final hole. January's second shot left him 30 feet from the pin and his first putt came up four feet short. He missed that one by an inch to set up the tie.

Rodriguez had a 5-under-par 66 in the closing round while January came in with 68. Palmer's final 70 gave him a 275—three shots back of the leaders—and a tie for third money with Floyd who birdied the final hole for a 70 and a 275. Each won \$3,100.

Mason Rudolph and Gene Litter closed with 72 for 277 and \$2,450 apiece. Bill Casper and Tommy Jacobs shot 278 worth \$1,850 while Jon Gustin, Art Wall and Dave Ragan collected \$1,500 apiece for 279 finishes. Jack Nicklaus, Julius Boros and Jim Ferrier shared 12th place at 280 and \$1,200 each. Tony Lema, the first-round leader with 66, finished back in the pack at 283, worth \$887.50.

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Finley in Hush-Hush Session in Oakland

OAKLAND, Calif. (UPI) — "Where's Charley?" The word was out today that Charles O. Finley, storm-tossed owner of the Kansas City Athletics, had come to town for a hush-hush session with the Oakland Chamber of Commerce about moving his club to this West Coast city.

But efforts to locate the millionaire president ran down numerous blind allies.

A spokesman for the Chamber of Commerce, however, confirmed that Finley had met with chamber executives and that an announcement might be made today.

Dan Marovich, president of the Oakland Boosters, was more enthusiastic.

"If we could get Finley's club out here, we'd turn heaven and earth to get him a ballpark," Marovich said.

The city has not had anything resembling a suitable park since the old Emeryville ball park, one time home of the Oakland Oaks, was torn down almost a decade ago.

Plans to build a super coliseum that would house the Oakland Raiders pro football team and an American League ball club have been held up by litigation.

Finley's bid to move the Athletics from Kansas City to Louisville was killed on Jan. 16 when the American League owners voted down his application by a 9-1 margin. At the same time, the league threatened to expel him if he did not straighten out his tangle with the Kansas City civic officials before Feb. 1.
