Russians Force US T-39 Down

WIESBADEN, Germany (UPI)—The Soviet news agency announced in Moscow today that a Russian fighter shot down a U.S. Air Force T-39 trainer and that it crashed in East Germany, killing the American airman aboard.

A high-ranking U.S. Air Force officer said the unarmed plane was "probably shot down" by Soviet jet fighters as it strayed across the border into Communist East Germany. Three officers were aboard it on a local training flight when it disappeared Tuesday.

Tass said the U.S. T-39 plane crashed near Vogelsberg about 100 miles northeast of Erfurt after a Soviet fighter took "measures" against it. The announcement was not clear as to whether the plane was shot down.

The Soviet fighter had to be shot down in compliance with air-defense instructions as a result of the intruder's crash landing. A section of the crash site revealed that the intruder was a jet plane of the T-39 belonging to the U.S. Air Force. Three corpses of sergeants were found.

Tass said the plane was intercepted by the Soviet fighter near the town of Muehlhausen. Tass said the Soviet Union protested the alleged intrusion of the T-39 in a note delivered to U.S. Ambassador D. Kohler in Moscow.

The note called the incident a gross provocation aimed at ravaging the situation in Central Europe. Earlier, a high-ranking U.S. Air Force officer said Communist jet fighters had "probably shot down" the unarmed plane as it strayed into East Germany.

Pam-Tex Plans Expansion Here During Stockholders Meeting

Expansion plans for Pam-Tex Corporation were outlined at the first annual meeting of stockholders in plant offices on the Borger Hwy. yesterday afternoon.

Pam-Tex, formed by a group of Pampa civic leaders just one year ago this month, has grown rapidly and exceeded expectations, according to Waldon Moore, company president.

Stockholders yesterday heard a report on the first year of business. The company, a fabricator of steel buildings, delivered more than 90 fabricated buildings during the year to buyers in Texas, Arizona, New Mexico, Colorado, Kansas, Montana and Oklahoma.

The company has 16 full time employees and Moore stated that plans have been approved for plant expansion and additional equipment to meet increasing production needs.

At yesterday's meeting stockholders expanded the board of directors to 13 members. Three new members elected are Roy Sullivan, former Ca-

lifornia State Senator, and two others. Other board members re-elected yesterday were Moore, Ed Myatt, Fred Neslage, Don Cain, Floyd Watson, Luke McClelland, R. W. Curry, Arthur Aftergut, Frank Culbertson, Dick Stowers, George Scott and Ralph Milliron.

Pam-Tex Officers are: Ed Myatt, board chairman; Waldon Moore, president; Wyatt Lemons, vice president; Fred Neslage, vice president; Don Cain, secretary; and Roy Sullivan, treasurer.

An executive committee was elected comprising Myatt, Neslage and Aftergut.

State High Court Orders Redrill Of Slanted Wells

Ruling Hits Railroad Commission Over East Texas Oil Field Suit

AUSTIN, Tex. (UPI)—By a 5-4 vote, the State Supreme Court today ruled that the Texas Railroad Commission must allow redrilling of slanted wells in East Texas.

The suit was brought by Harry M. Harrington Jr. of Longview after the Railroad Commission refused to let him "redrill, straighten, and correct" three deviated wells.

"Harrington is one of the oil operators caught up in the East Texas 'slant-hole' dragnet," Chief Justice Robert W. Calvert wrote in the majority opinion.

The majority said the fact that Harrington's wells were not drilled in accordance with his original permits did not give the Railroad Commission authority to prevent him from correcting the wells.

Associate Justice Frank P. Culver Jr., in a dissenting opinion in which Justices Meade F. Griffin, James R. Norvell and Zollie Steakley joined, said Harrington's wells "are outlaw wells."

Non-Smokers Ask Equal Space on Daily News Page

A petition for "equal space" for non-smokers was received in the mails today at the Pampa Daily News.

The petition, signed by 37 persons, referred to a recent "inquiring reporters" story which the Daily News carried on page one shortly after the federal report on smoking was released.

"The petitioners ask that 'non-smokers be given equal voice on the same page (front page) as that of smokers in the City of Pampa. Our children must know the difference and the truth."

The Daily News plans, in the near future, to do a similar feature regarding non-smokers and their feelings about the report. One non-smoker was, however, included in the original story.

Wright Wronged; Patio Purloined

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—Dane Wright went outside yesterday to relax on the patio behind his house.

Saturn Launch Success

The 16-story Saturn-1, forerunner of rockets destined to take U.S. astronauts to the moon this decade, lifted from a massive concrete launching pad at 11:25 a.m. EST.

Scientists hoped to send the rocket's entire second stage—84 feet and 37,700 pounds of nose cone, burned out rocket casing and sand ballast—into an orbit ranging from 160 to perhaps 400 miles above earth.

An attempt to launch the Saturn-1 Monday forced a two-day delay when someone forgot to pull a plug in an oxygen line.

Today, a launch delay of one hour and 13 minutes was required because of radio interference in the Cape Kennedy area. Scientists feared it might interfere with radio commands to the rocket, particularly the mechanism to destroy the rocket if it veered off course.

"Everything looks normal," the federal space agency said in the first seconds of the flight.

Pictures from the television camera aboard the rocket flashed back pictures of the Florida peninsula. They showed the clouds below in brilliant relief.

Separation Smooth

The second stage separated smoothly from the massive booster, ignited about 48 miles above earth and sent the satellite winging on its way.

Television viewers could clearly see separation. The 562-ton Saturn-1, heavier than six railroad diesel engines, climbed from the pad atop a furious, thunderous column of smoke and flame generated by eight engines pouring out 1½ million pounds of thrust.

It was a spectacular departure. The rocket rose with agonizing slowness. Ten seconds crept by before it had cleared the top of its 30-story service tower.

As the mighty roar swept across the beaches, the Saturn-1 accelerated into the blue sky. Fifteen seconds after liftoff the rocket began a slow graceful tilt.

The awesome flight of what the late President Kennedy billed as the world's largest and mightiest rocket seemed near perfect. Pouring out an exhaust trail as long as a football field, it tore through the region of maximum dynamic pressure, when the forces exerted on the fast-moving rocket

Heavy Fighting Hits Troubled Laos Sector

VIENTIANE, Laos (UPI)—Heavy fighting has broken out in central Laos involving Communist, neutralist and rightwing forces, neutralist and rightwing military communiques reported today.

A rightwing communique said Communist Pathet Lao and Viet Minh forces have launched simultaneous heavy attacks against neutralist positions south of the Nam Theun River and against rightwing forces in the Nhommarat area.

Another communique issued by neutralist headquarters at Muong Phan said continuing attacks by Pathet Lao and Viet Minh forces which began Jan. 26 have forced neutralist troops to retreat south from the Nam Theun River towards Nakay in Khammouane Province.

The neutralists said their single battalion in the area was heavily outnumbered and outgunned by the Communist forces. The battalion executed an orderly retreat, the communique said.

The neutralist communique said an estimated six Pathet Lao battalions and one Viet Minh battalion took part in the assaults.

The rightwing communique said the attacks on rightwing positions were carefully prepared and coordinated.

It said the attacks began with a heavy artillery bombardment followed by several infantry assaults.

It said a combined Pathet

Lao and Viet Minh force of four infantry battalions took part in the attacks, which the communique said were continuing.

The communique said it was too early to determine what losses were suffered in the fighting.

U.S. Justice Has Praise For Texas

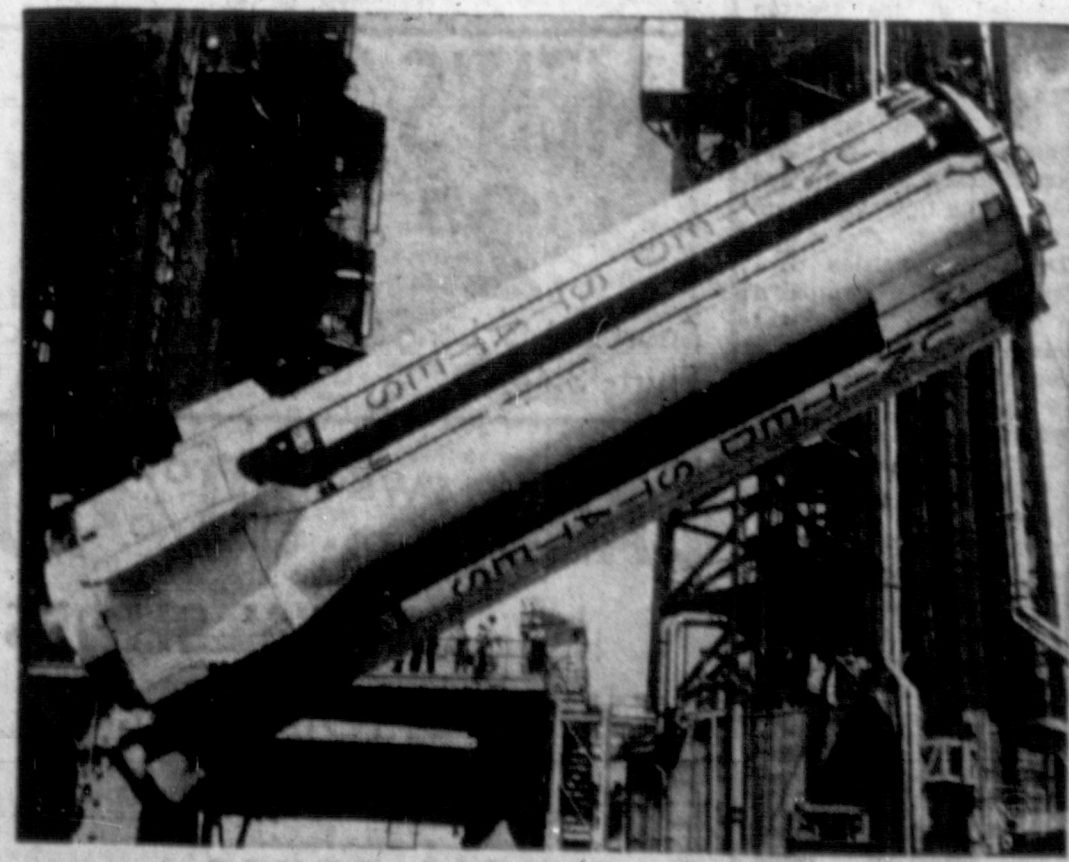
ALPINE, Tex. (UPI)—Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas 65, who battled wicked rapids on the Rio Grande, today praised the scenery in Texas' Big Bend National Park as "the finest in America."

Douglas and his attractive 24-year-old wife planned to return to Washington after a three-day trip in rugged mountainous country. The elevations dip from 6,000 to 1,500 feet above sea level in the Mexican border park.

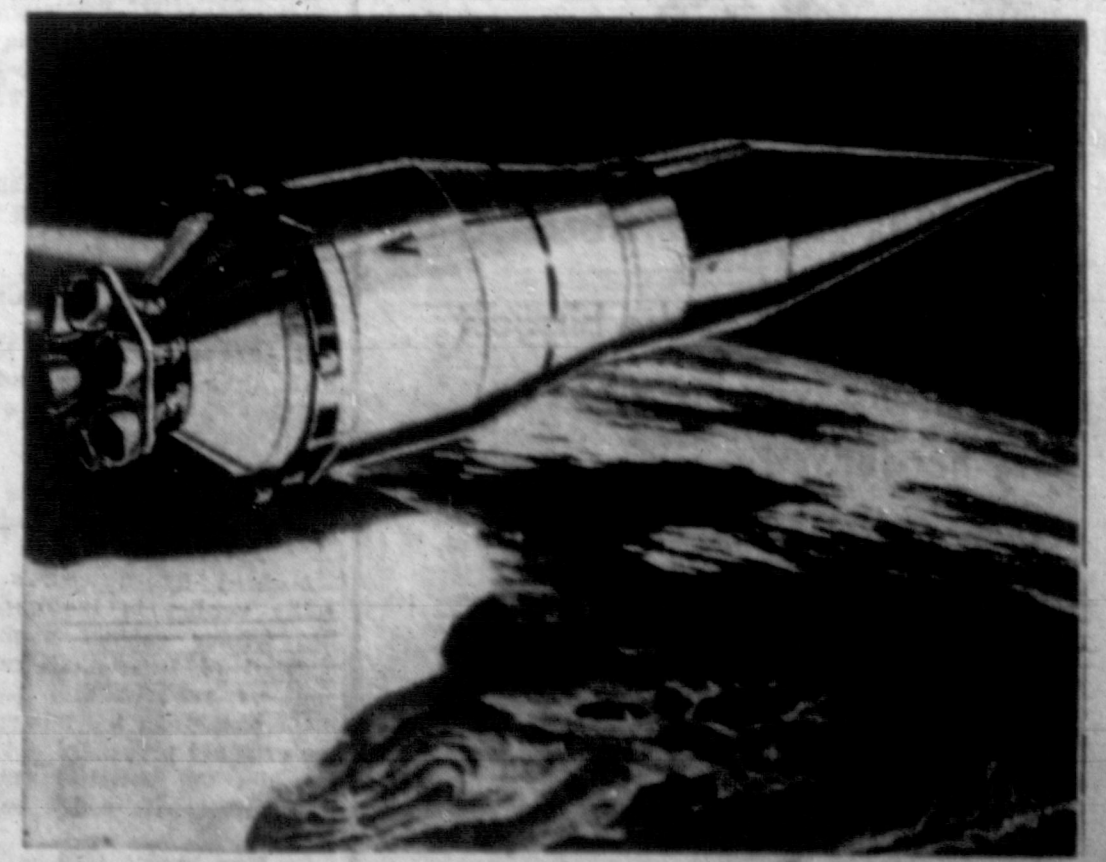
Douglas, his wife and friends climbed mountains on Casa Grande and shot the rapids through Mariscal Canyon in rubber rafts.

During the 14-mile boat trip, Douglas said, one of the rubber rafts used by the party got ripped on the bottom, "but we mended it."

"Water was high and the falls were fine, but we had no trouble in the rapids," the jurist said.

New Vice President Selection Idea Hit

A proposal that would, in effect, create a "crown prince" for the United States of America has been advanced by a group of members of my own profession, the law. Meeting at the request of the American Bar Association, the group recommended that a new Vice President be nominated by the President and confirmed by the Congress any time a vacancy occurs in the Vice Presidential office.

In other words, the process would be circumvented by which American voters themselves could have a direct voice in choosing the man closest in direct line of succession to the Presidency. The system proposed for adoption would fill the office of Vice President (at least until the next general election) by appointment—not voters' choice—in much the same way that top officials of the Executive Branch, men of cabinet rank and below, now are named and their appointments confirmed.

In 1947, Congress enacted the law which now provides for the order of succession to the office of President. The succession, thus, is now first to the Speaker of the House and next to the President Pro Tempore of the Senate and then to cabinet officers in the following sequence: Secretary of State, Secretary of the Treasury, Secretary of Defense, Attorney General, Postmaster General, Secretary of the Interior, Secretary of Agriculture, Secretary of Commerce, and Secretary of Labor. You'll note that the most recently established cabinet position, that of Secretary of Health, Education, and Welfare, has not been included in the order of succession.

This week the Constitutional Amendments Subcommittee of the Senate Judiciary Committee held two days of hearings into the weller of suggestions proposed as solutions to the problems of presidential succession and disability. I'm certainly not opposed to this study or any other being made. Certainly it is proper for any group to propose any solution deemed appropriate. And, at the same time, it is appropriate for those of us who oppose proposed solutions to speak out. It is my earnest hope, however, that no proposal ever advances beyond the talking stage if it would permit the appointment of a Vice President of the United States. Into that office carrying that Constitutionally endowed title must go a person elected by the People if our democratic processes are to be served properly.

Presidential succession has always been a knotty issue. Views change from one period in our history to another. It was only natural that the question of presidential disability would become an issue following President Eisenhower's

heart attack during his first term. And it was natural that the issue of presidential succession would again be raised following the tragic assassination of President Kennedy and the ascent to the nation's highest office of the then Vice President, Lyndon B. Johnson.

During George Washington's first term, Congress provided that in the case of the removal, death, resignation, or disability of both President and Vice President, the president pro tempore of the Senate, and if there was no president of the House, was to succeed to the Presidency and hold the office only until a special election had chosen a President for a four-year term. In 1866, there was neither a president pro tempore of the Senate nor a Speaker of the House. Congress, assuming that there never would be a time when all the cabinet positions would be vacant, changed the line of succession to members of the cabinet, beginning with the Secretary of State. In June, 1946, President Truman, having recently succeeded President Franklin D. Roosevelt, recommissioned abandoning the cabinet succession on the principle that no President that had succeeded from the Vice Presidency ought to be able to designate his own possible successor. In the Act of July, 1947, the Congress followed President Truman's recommendation by providing that the succession be first to the Speaker of the House, a man not only elected from his own constituency but also chosen by the majority of the members of the House of the majority party, and then to the president pro tempore of the Senate, a Senator elected from his state and then, to provide a presiding officer in the absence of the Vice President, by the members of the Senate. Congress also provided that following these officeholders should be ranked members of the cabinet in case of vacancies in the first two offices in the line.

Certainly problems can arise. No system we could devise would be perfect in insuring against any eventuality. But let us be careful before tampering with the present line of succession or the method by which Vice Presidents are chosen. The system has served us well. I would urge Americans to remember that many governments would topple like a house of cards were the head of state to be assassinated. Ours, thanks to the Lord and the wisdom with which our system was conceived, did not.

NEW YORK (UPI) — The Olin Co. announced Monday it will build \$40 million of new and expanded facilities in Louisiana, Texas, and Illinois in the next two years.

The company said the project will make it one of the country's biggest ammonia and high-analysis fertilizer producers. The firm will build an ammonia plant at Lake Charles, La., with higher capacity than any so far in the country. Olin spokesmen said. The project includes also a new urea plant at the Louisiana site, a high-analysis fertilizer plant and bulk ammonia storage terminal at Joliet, Ill., and modernization and addition to Olin's fertilizer plant at Pasadena, Tex., a suburb of Houston.

Foreign Commentary

In the small African republic of Ghana it always has been unhealthy to oppose lifetime President Kwame Nkrumah. By the end of this week, it will be unhealthier still.

This will be the result of a national referendum on a constitutional amendment whose phrasing, seemingly drawn directly from an article in the 1936 Soviet constitution, will make Nkrumah's Convention People's party Ghana's only legal political party. The voting will wind up on Friday, with the outcome predictable in advance. Since assuming power, first as prime minister when Ghana became independent in 1957 and later as president, Nkrumah already had consolidated his position to the point of almost total dictatorship.

Since December, he has moved swiftly to remove the last vestiges of legal opposition. Angered By Verdict Angered by a court's not guilty verdict in the case of two former cabinet members accused of treason, Nkrumah and his rubber-stamp parliament passed an amendment to the criminal procedure act giving him the power to nullify any verdict with which he disagreed.

On New Year's Day he went the next step with the announcement that he would have his Convention People's party declared the country's only legal political organization.

At the same time, Ghana's government - controlled press and radio was signalling a purge of "reactionary" elements in the civil service, judiciary, police and army, and stepping up attacks on the United States and other Western "imperialists."

In the following sweep up, he dismissed the chief justice who had presided at the treason trial, arrested two top police officials and fired others, and took into custody law professor Joseph Boakye Danquah, who had opposed him in the 1960 presidential elections, and was a pioneer in the fight for Ghanaian independence.

Demands Expulsion As part of the campaign against the United States, the Ghanaian Times demanded the expulsion of U.S. Peace Corps workers in Ghana, branding them as "spies and meddlers."

As Nkrumah moved to a position of absolute power, he naturally has made enemies. An attack on his life this month was the fifth since 1956 and the third in 17 months. While he himself has remained alive, 16 others have died in the attempts.

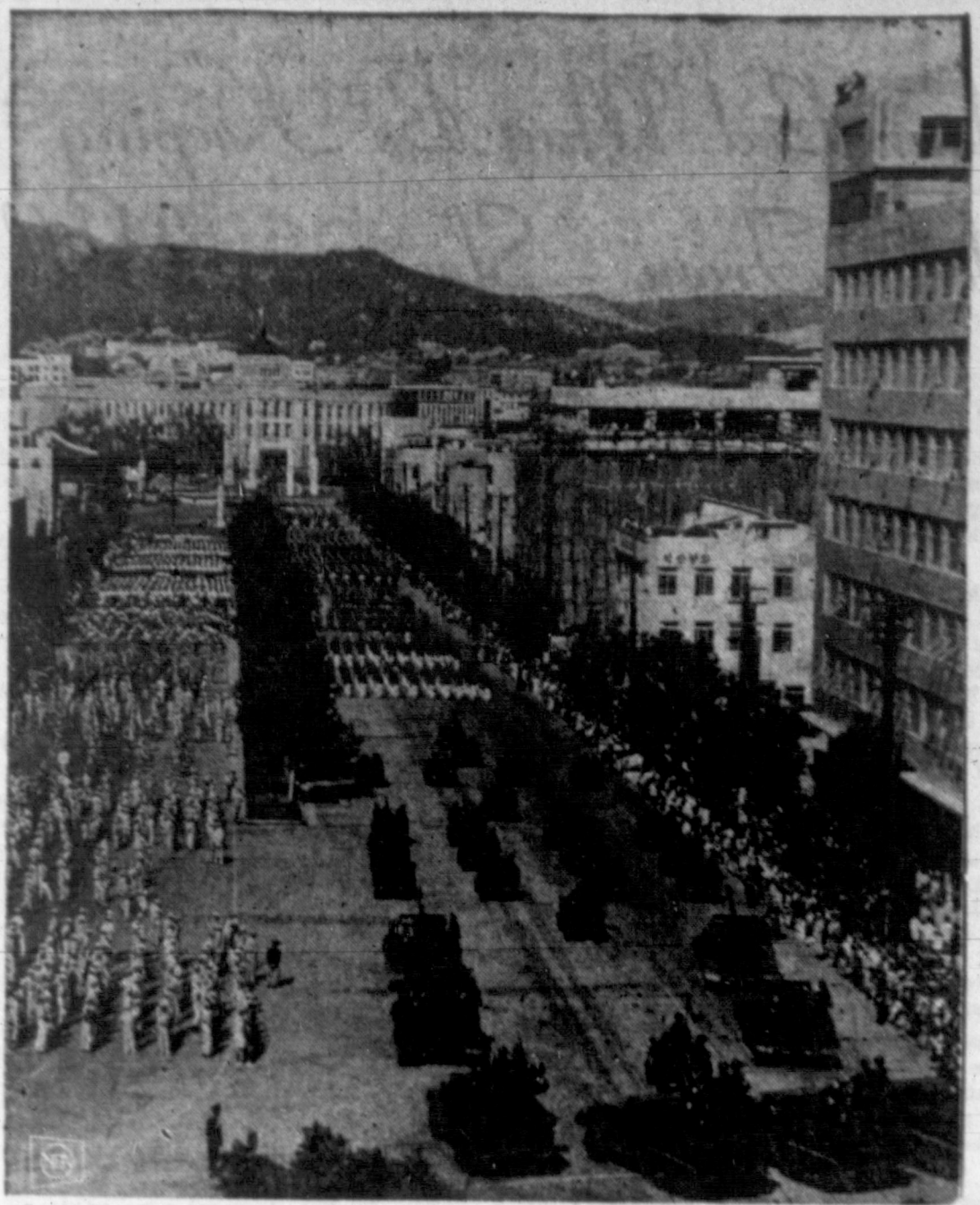
Even these, however, contain an element of mystery. An official picture presumably showing Nkrumah subduing his most recent assailant, has been widely suspected of being posed.

There is an even more important suspicion that Marxist Nkrumah is moving closer to communism as he moves farther from the United States.

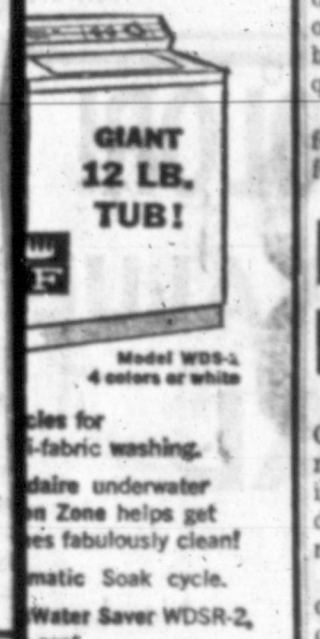

Your Bed May Be Keeping You From Sleeping Well

By KAY SHERWOOD

This is the weary season when I tell myself that all I need is a good night's sleep. I mentioned this during a gathering of neighbors and sleeping problems kept the conversation going all evening.

One fellow who stretches to 6 feet 2 when he stands straight said he is getting his first good sleep since his marriage. It seems the couple invested in a king-sized bed. "I can stretch out now," he explained.

This made me ponder about how often we fall into beds that either are too small or onto mattresses too lumpy, too soft or too hard. A friend in the bedding business says it isn't psychic insomnia but uncomfortable beds that have us tossing and turning.

We spend one-third of our lives in bed but, for example, most standard double-bed styles provide each sleeper with the same width as the baby's crib, I discovered.

He added that we tend to skimp on bedroom furniture when first furnishing a home and this also is the last to be replaced. So nightly we compound our original mistake.

A bed should be 30 inches wide and 6 to 10 inches longer than the tallest person to use it. Keep these figures in



Americans have added about two inches to their height in the last 50 years. Standard mattresses, however, have remained the same size. Studies show everyone needs a minimum of 39 inches for sleeping comfort but a standard double gives only 27 inches. Couples looking for comfort are turning to the king-sized mattress or twin beds with single headboard.

mind the next time you shop for bedroom furniture. It seems the present standard size was established 100 years ago and we are 1½ to 2 inches taller and 18 to 20 pounds heavier than our sleepy ancestors.

When buying a mattress I learned not to shop for a bargain. You get what you pay for. While in the store stretch out on several mattresses to give them the "rest test." Pushing at a mattress is like kicking the tires of a new auto — a false test.

A comfortable mattress — of cotton felt padding, latex foam or polyurethane — gives firm, over-all support but

also yields to the curves and contours of the body.

If possible, buy a mattress and box springs together because they are designed to go together. And don't skimp as so many of us did. As the expert said, "It's rest you are buying."

A real Oriental rug deserves the finest care you can give it — which means a good sudsy scrub! Spread the rug on a clean, hard surface — such as the patio or the garage floor — and hose it until thoroughly wet. Then scrub it with soap or detergent suds, hose again for rinsing, and allow several days for it to dry.

Russian Hockey Team Raps U.S.

INNSBRUCK, Austria (UPI)—Russia's powerful hockey team crushed the defending champion United States team today 5-1 shortly after the formal opening of the ninth winter Olympic Games.

The games, which will go on for the next 12 days in and around this city in the Tyrolean Alps, were officially declared open at 5:50 a.m. EST by Austrian President Adolf Schaefer with traditional pomp and pageantry before a crowd of 60,000 at the Olympic Stadium.

Then, in the first actual competition, the Soviet hockey stars completely outplayed the Americans to emphasize the fact that Russia is favored to retain the overall unofficial championship of the games.

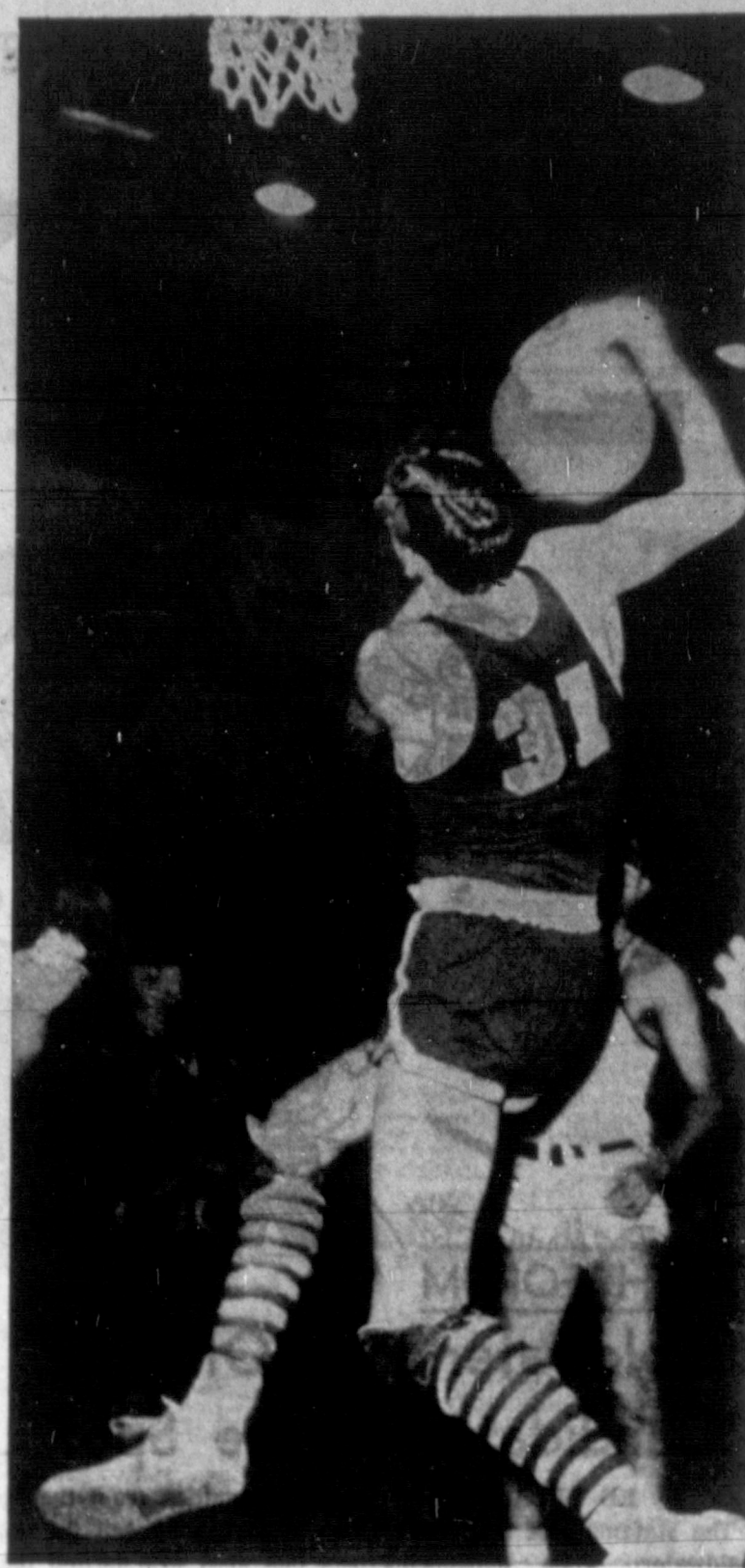
Only brilliant goaltending by Tom Yurkovich of Rochester,

Minn., despite a painful knee injury, kept the Soviets from scoring an even more lopsided victory.

Yurkovich, a 28-year-old former University of North Dakota star, turned back a total of 58 Soviet shots. He stopped 26 of them in the first period—and at the end of that period suffered a painful injury to his left knee when his skate caught on the goal post as he swung around.

At that point the Russians held only a 1-0 lead. The Soviets added three goals in the second period and one in the third while Jim Allen of Minneapolis averted a shutout for the United States team by scoring in the third period.

The defeat did not eliminate the U.S. team, since the hockey tournament is a round-robin competition.

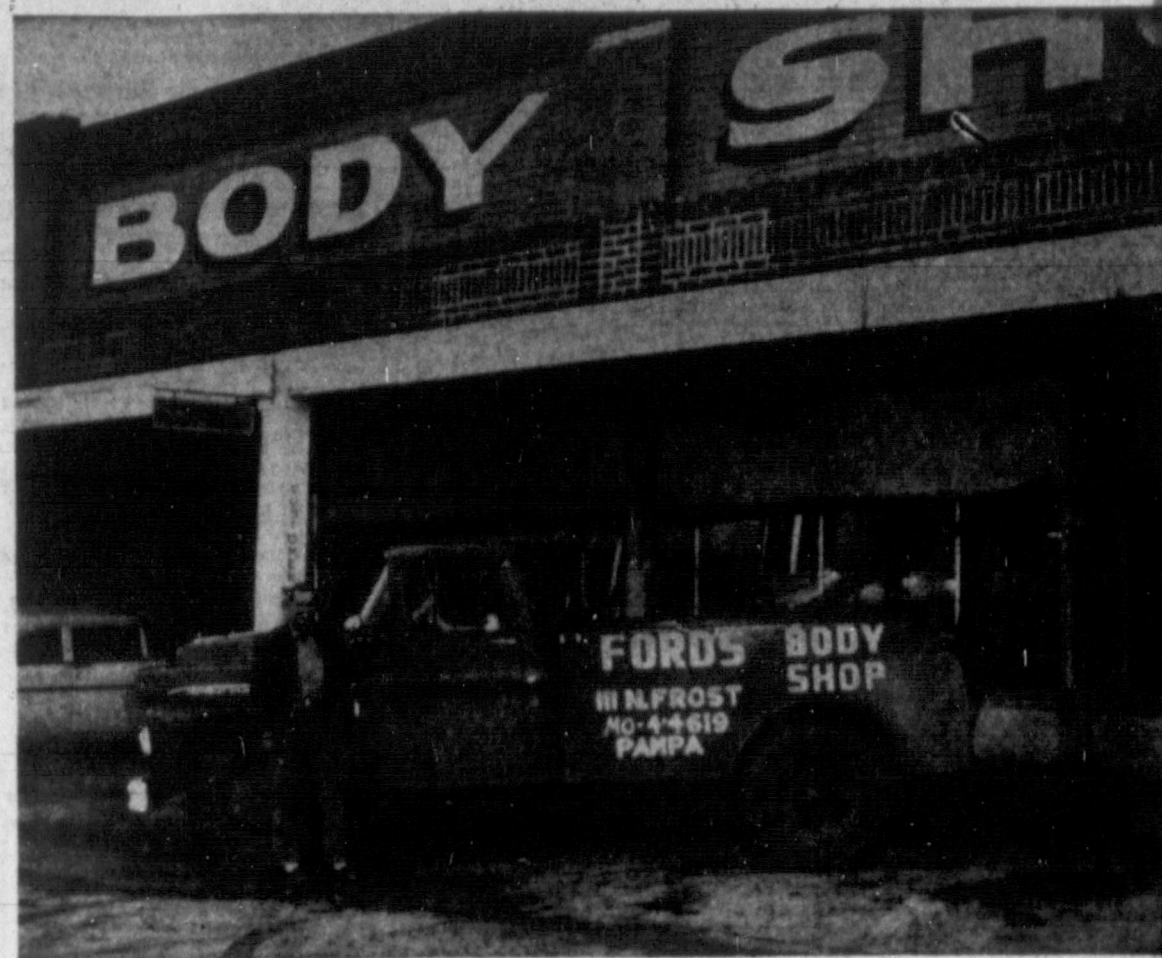

South Viet Nam Hits at France

SAIGON (UPI)—South Viet Nam charged Tuesday that France has encouraged the "expansion of Chinese communism" in Southeast Asia by establishing diplomatic relations with Red China.
